VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE – APRIL 2007.

Dear Friends

What do bunnies, Easter eggs and a cross have in common? The answer is that they are all symbols of new life. For the Christian church, these symbols show that at Easter, new life is made available as a result of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. With new life, there is hope. For the Christian that hope is found in Jesus Christ. But let me start with a brief discussion as to who Jesus is.

Firstly, it has been often debated about who Jesus is. Many people have suggested many things such as Lord, liar or lunatic, prophet or just another man. Unless you are a believer in Jesus Christ, very rarely is the term Saviour or Messiah used. Throughout the Gospel of Mark, Jesus is seen by the people as one who heals physically, one who heals spiritually and one who heals both. Yes, heals people physically if they trust in him and then ask him to heal in His time not ours but what he most importantly came to heal is our relationship with God. Jesus Christ came to rescue our relationship with God after we rebelled against Him. The consequences for that is death or eternal separation from God. Hidden drug dangers on country properties

News of more than 80 discoveries of illegal drug laboratories in Victoria in the past 30 months brings one clear message and one sharp question. No region in rural Victoria is protected, with incidents at Ballarat, Benalla, Golden Square, Christmas Hills, Macedon, Cranbourne, Foster, the Grampians, Horsham, Mildura, Moe, Numurkah, Ocean Grove and Robinvale. The worrying question is "How many more secret laboratories are cooking up pills on properties in country towns and in isolated farm sheds?"

The police Crime Stoppers program is playing a major role in locating illegal labs, and depends heavily on the community to identify them by reporting suspicious behaviour. If the drug scourge is touching residents - particularly young people - in Romsey and the Macedon Ranges Shire, we all have a duty to help police to stamp it out. The officer in charge of Romsey Police, Sqt John East is keen for help in identifying illegal labs or drug-growing - not just to hit at criminals, but to also help protect our young people – the real victims of drugs.



Pseudoephedrine in cold and flu treatments relieves suffering, but once diverted to create amphetamines is a destructive drug capable of causing far greater misery. Crime Stoppers says when drug cooks start to extract pseudoephedrine, a chain of related dangers commences, with a high risk of explosion and fire.

In towns an exploding drug lab obviously endangers neighboring properties and residents. On a remote bush block the summer fire risk is heightened. Chemicals used and produced are highly toxic, caustic, in some cases cancer-causing and dangerous for the environment.

Amphetamines (speed), methylamphetamines (ecstasy) and crystal methamphetamines (ice) stimulate and affect the brain. They may cause collapse, brain haemorrhage, seizure and heart failure.

The primary objective for us to support police and Crime Stoppers in their fight must therefore be to identify illegal labs. This can only arise if the wider community is alert for clues. The most obvious is lots of short-stay visitors to a property. mostly at night. Discarded flu treatment packaging, buildings with covered windows and excessive security measures, and anyone carrying in tubing, flasks and glassware are suspicious. A strong and unpleasant smell of chemicals may be noticed. Ammonia has a sharp odour, as does a smell likened to cat urine. Ecstasy production includes the smell of ani-

Sqt East warns we should be observant but not too curious. Never confront people associated with a suspicious property. Drug producers are in a dangerous, high-risk business, for high returns. Guns and other weapons may well be in their tool-kit. Having spotted the clues and knowing the dangers they represent, people must also be willing to pass on details of suspicious activity directly to local police or via Crime Stoppers 1800 333 000. Calls to Crime Stoppers are not taped. While some of the recent raids on properties have arisen after tip-offs from the public, Sqt East says more community vigilance is essential.

Contrary to popular opinion, ordinary people are not powerless in the fight against drugs. Awareness and willingness to report are what backyard drug makers fear most. I join with John East in urging all concerned residents of Romsey and the Shire to help by being an extra set of eyes and ears for the police.

Fungi Workshop

About this time of year, as Autumn closes in, some of you may have noticed strange creatures appearing in our local forests and gardens. The mushrooms and toadstools of our childhood books, otherwise known as fungi, are a fascinating and often maligned group of organisms.

Fungi have provided enormous intrigue to people throughout history. Their remarkable qualities of being poisonous, hallucinogenic, edible and mysterious have resulted in extremes of attitudes toward them worldwide. Due to their habit of appearing suddenly and then supposedly vanishing into thin air, they were regarded suspiciously with some believing that they were the result of mysterious actions between the earth and supernatural powers.

Local ecologist and photographer, Alison Pouliot, is running a workshop on fungi ecology, to both inspire interest in these fascinating organisms and dispel some of the myths. Alison has recently been working alongside the "Pilzkontrolle" in Switzerland. As one might expect in Switzerland, these things are very well organized to the point that every town has Pilzekontrolle, or "mushroom police" – people employed to make positive identifications for foragers to ensure they don't brew up a deadly soup! To qualify for the post of Pilzekontrolle, candidates must engage in a lengthy training process, identifying 70 different wild mushrooms, including the 12 most poisonous. 100% accuracy is required in the final exam, as one misidentifacation could be lethal.

Back home in Australia, Alison spends hours crawling around on the forest floor with her camera in attempt to capture the many fascinating and beautiful forms of fungi. The local surrounding forests are home to an enormous diversity of fungi, many of which will be displayed and discussed in the workshop.

The health of our forests is very much dependent on their relationships with fungi. Their important role is often overlooked as it mostly occurs underground. Fungi play an essential role in nature by decomposing complex organic compounds and returning their minerals to the soil and gases to the air, thus making them available for the next generation of plants and animals and ensuring the continuous natural cycle of life. Australia is estimated to have at least 100,000 species of which only about ten per cent have been described.

Alison says that many people who have attended her workshops over the years are very interested in the culinary aspects of fungi. Most of those she meets foraging in the forests have a European heritage along with the knowledge of which species are edible. Those species which you can eat and those which will give you an almighty stomach ache (or worse!) are carefully described in the workshop.

There is a saying that goes, "There are old mushroom hunters. There are bold mushroom hunters. But there are no old, bold mushroom hunters!" Whether you're old, bold or just interested in fungi, you can join the workshop by contacting Lorri on 5427 0696 or 0407 818 463. The brothers are slightly eccentric and some of their guests also, while others are seeking a place of solace and healing. All of them however, hosts and guests, are bibliophiles. This is one of the attractions of the book, along with Richardson's turn of phrase and the lilting cadences of some of his sentences. I don't normally recommend a book for how it reads, but this one is a gem. Best of all the only copy the library has is in Large Print – great for reading late at night!

The Travel Book: A Journey through every country in the world.

A truly stunning coffee table book in the true sense of that phrase ie: you would need a coffee table to support it on! The luscious photos are just superb and the brief factual information about each country compliments the pictorial feast across each double page spread. If you enjoy the Lonely Planet travel guides with their quirky, offbeat humour then this is a step up in quality and presentation. Bring a bag to carry it home in. And don't forget its companion volume ... The Cities Book: A Journey through the best cities in the world. Two absolutely stunning coffee table books have recently been added to the collection. Their topics are totally unrelated but they have in common the clarity of the photography and the succinct and quirky nature of the brief narrative for each entry. The Cities Book is Lonely Planet's next folio of the world, but this time each double page spread highlights one of 200 favourite cities, nominated by Lonely Planet travellers and staff.

On the Jellicoe Road - Melina Marchetta

Melina Marchetta has written two outstanding novels for young adults and both have won the Australian Book of the Year Award fro Older Readers. I have a feeling that her latest novel may make it a hat trick in 2007. There are three separate narratives throughout the story, which really don't coalesce until at least a third of the way into the book. That aside it is certainly worth persevering with as the characters of Taylor, Jonah, Santangelo, Raffaela and Ben confront and consort with each other to keep the boundaries safe in the territory wars between the boarders, the townies and the cadets. As well as facing the future both Taylor and Jonah need to delve into their hidden pasts to discover themselves. A compelling read.

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


