State Budget delivers for the Macedon Ranges

This year's State Budget brings some great news for our region with increased funding for local schools and our emergency services.

The highlights include \$6 million from the State Government to upgrade Gisborne Secondary College. The College will now provide more educational opportunities and resources for our young people by constructing new food technology kitchens, a Science Learning Centre comprising of three Science Labs and a Science IT Room as well as a new canteen and senior student

I'm also pleased to announce that the historic Mount Macedon Primary School will be upgraded in the next financial year, and Gisborne and Romsey Primary Schools will also be upgraded through the Labor Federal Government's 21st Century Library and Learning Neighbourhood program.

In recognition of the essential role that emergency services play in our community, the Romsey CFA will receive a replacement Light Pumper Truck and Gisborne and Woodend SES will receive new Road Crash Rescue kits to increase assistance at car accidents. The Budget also includes a new police station for Riddells Creek.

To improve rail services along the Bendigo Line, the State Government is also spending \$204.6 million to start the process of electrifying the Sydenham Line to Sunbury. This project will increase the capacity and reliability of the service between Sunbury and Sydenham which will in turn improve the service along the whole of the Bendigo Line.

Overall, the Brumby Labor Government is investing in our schools, hospitals, public transport and community services to ensure our local infrastructure meets the growing needs of our community while providing opportunities for local jobs in this difficult economic climate.

REFLECTIONS continued—by Jan VanArkel

KNOWLEDGE only comes in time and experience.

Eventually I joined the bank as well. Six month later we moved to Melbourne to save four-hourly travel six days a week, as the banks were also open on Saturdays mornings. We lived in rented accommodation for four years. In the meantime we bought a large block of land in Pascoe Vale. It took me a year to build our house. When we moved in our first child was on the way. This made me think about the future. I decided to do an accountancy course at the R.M.I.T. For this I had to do HSC-English first.

Five years later I graduated. On the last class day the lecturer called the students together. He started with the guestion: "Did you ever hear me say 'I know"?

He then gave us each a paper with the words:

The beginning of knowledge is to confess ignorance and only a fool says 'I know'

A new episode of my life began. Of course, with the graduation papers in my pocket I now knew everything there was to know about business, or so I thought. I quickly found that the real learning was only beginning. What you were never taught was about people, who they were and how they reacted to adverse conditions.

To run an efficient organisation seven critical elements are needed: (1) the ability to communicate up and down the line. (2) To gain the trust of people and prove to be worthy of it. (3) The ability to discuss, negotiate without creating a disturbance. (4) The ability to listen. (5) Always be positive. (6) People need to be active, boredom destroys enthusiasm. (7) Do not use **fear**. It took many years to learn. These seven elements became my platform.

I started as a junior auditor and ended as a senior auditor and found to my horror that people were scared of auditors. I had to change that fear and used elements of my platform.

I left auditing and became a company accountant, then a systems analyst with a special task force with a large car manufacturer working in the section re-writing the company manual to bring some uniformity with the international sister companies. The next position was as company secretary in a large-scale shipping and container-handling organisation.

The company had to start from scratch; there were no cranes, no wharves and only two promising companies as clients. Everything was on drawing boards. Ships were in the early building stages and would not be completed for two years. I became involved in negotiations with prospective clients internationally as well as negotiating with the unions on the wharves and stores. At least once a week I set down to talk to fellow executives, management staff on the wharves and staff in the office.

I learned to talk, negotiate and sort out problems with the unions and ship owners from different countries. It was a whole new ballgame. I kept the teams going using the seven elements. On leaving the company the Boards complimented me in writing of that fact.

If some of what I said so far makes you angry, I am sorry. Take it out on me. To be continued in REFLECTIONS 3.




The Chooks are Here!

Classroom Helpers Program

Dear Friends

Commandment number 3 says, "You shall not misuse the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name."

We often hear people say, "Jesus Christ" out of frustration. We also hear people react with the phrase, "Oh my God!" in many situations. In many cases, this is the only way that people hear about God or Jesus.

When the commandment was originally written, the name of someone was not just a label but encompassed the whole person. The meaning of this was that when someone was given a name, it encompassed their whole character.

Throughout both the Old and the New Testament, the name of the Lord is revered. Here's one example from each. Psalm 113:2 reads, "Let the name of the LORD be praised, both now and forevermore."

Acts 2:21 reads, "And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

In both cases, respect to God's name involves praising Him and us seeking to be saved by Him.

This commandment is about respectful use of the name of the Lord and therefore respect to God the person. Disrespect will result in a black mark against your name from God. A black mark that can be removed if we call on the name of the Lord to save us.

Since late February, the Romsey Primary School Community has been supporting a Bendigo based Wildlife Rescue Volunteer Group with caring for bush fire effected koalas. This group specialises in koalas which are difficult animals to care for. Romsey volunteers have been involved with a weekly delivery of koala food. The koalas come from the Redesdale and Kilmore East areas and eat only certain species of gum trees including Swamp Gum, Manna Gum and Candlebark. These gum species do not grow within the Bendigo region and so it has been crucial to source food out of the area.

Nearly 20 koalas have been cared for with injuries including burnt paws, animal attack injuries, infected eyes, dehydration and kidney problems from not having fresh leaves to eat. More than half the koalas have been released back into the wild as close to where they were collected as practical.



Food is still required for the remaining koalas including a mother with a baby who are not quite ready to be released.

Can you Help?



The Bendigo Wildlife Rescue group is run by volunteers and would be very grateful for any help it receives.

Volunteers are needed to make a delivery to Bendigo on Saturdays or Sundays, even as a on-off assistance. Branches can be cut and loaded for you to take to the Bendigo Wildlife Shelter. There is typically 50 small branches up to 1.5metres long. If you have any of these trees as a supply source it would help or if you can cut and deliver the gums it would be very helpful to provide a break for a small tiring group.

MAKING SENSE OF WINE

Better known as a Romsey film maker, in his other life Alan Young was the author of 20 wine books, university lecturer and international wine judge. During nearly 40 years Alan Young has researched or given seminars in almost all the wine growing regions of the world from Chile to China and Canada to Germany including Portugal, Spain and France; Russia is the single exception. Alan Young's biography is listed in the French edition of Who's Who in Wine.

While living for 20 years in San Francisco, he and his wife Norma conducted the International Wine Academy; he gave seminars in more than 200 North American cities. They have now decided to offer these seminars in two Macedon Ranges towns. The first will be offered in Lancefield Neighborhood House on the Saturday-Sunday weekend of June 6-7, 2009 between 10am-4pm. Classes are limited to 14 people.

A similar event will be held at Romsey Community House on two successive Saturdays 13 & 19th June between 10am-4pm. Cost for each event is \$10 to cover handouts and bread - plus students are asked to bring 3 bottles of wine, preferably all different.

The seminars, also known as "Wine is Fun" will offer such basic information as how to understand wine labels, to cooking with wine, to such learned knowledge as how to judge wine quality without ever putting it in your mouth! (An interesting exercise but with a limited future!)

The Youngs moved to Romsey six years ago primarily to establish a small, cold climate experimental vine-yard which has been planted with 11 varieties of vines only from the cold climate vineyards in Europe and North America. Four varieties are the only ones in Australia and in 2008 and 2009 they made wine from the American French hybrid Chambourcin. Other than NSW, these the only red Chambourcin wines made in Australia and appears to have great potential in the Macedon Ranges.

Representatives of a large number of local clubs and organisations which shared in over \$40,000 in the most recent community grants allocation by the Lancefield and Romsey Community Financial Services Ltd, the locally owned company in charge of the two banks which are franchised under the Bendigo Bank's umbrella, were present, as was district MP Joanne Duncan.

Bank board director Trevor Turnham was master of ceremonies, and after three numbers from the Lancefield Primary School choir, Ms Duncan opened proceedings. Ms Duncan recalled when the "big banks" were leaving towns in droves, and the Bendigo Bank had come up with the community banking concept, now embraced by people who are keen to support their own towns and communities. Ms Duncan said she hoped people and organisations in Romsey and Lancefield continue to support their own community banks, and new customers add to the benefits which flow back into the town.

Board chairperson Maureen Wiltshire outlined how the Lancefield Community Bank had come about after a small group of enthusiastic people had determined that something had to be done to stop the town dying when it was left without banking services.

Face to face banking had returned when the Lancefield Community Bank opened, and eventually a Romsey Community Bank had opened as well.

Ms Wiltshire said board members had warmly embraced the concept of returning profits to the community, and said she was really excited to see over 50 community organisations have benefitted in the record funding distribution made recently.

"The money we have been able to give out to the community has made a real difference," she said.

Ms Wiltshire said the slogan: "I did something for my community, I did my banking today" certainly rings true as far as the Romsey and Lancefield community banks are concerned.

She outlined details of previous funding allocations, how the 500 local shareholders have received dividends, and how a vibrant business community in both towns is making a difference in people's lives.

The local board members were individually introduced, and thanked for giving so much time and expertise to help the community.

Senior bank manager, Rod Browning, spoke passionately about what the two community banks can do for locals, what they can do for their customers, and what they can do for the community.

"Our bank is your bank, it is all about you," he told the community representatives.

Mr Browning revealed he had previously worked for one of the "big banks", but now realised through his role in the last eight years that the community banking concept was by far the best approach.

He praised the local bank staff for their outstanding dedication, and introduced them to the audience, amid applause (there was special reference to James Smithwick, who gets married tomorrow).

'BIG, BIG THINGS'

Mr Browning said with increased community support, through banking at the two community banks, "big, big things" could be achieved for both towns.

"Come and give us a try" was his message to locals who may be banking elsewhere.

Mr Browning pointed out that Macedon Ranges Shire Council banks with the community banks.

"The more people that come in our doors, the more (money) we can throw out," he said. His final message was for those locals who may have taken out banking loans "out of town". Get on the books with us and you are going to benefit our towns; we're a bank with the same rates, or better. All we're saying is give us a try," he said.

Jenny Stillman, from the Romsey Region Business & Tourism Association, and other groups, and Gordon Charles (Lancefield Bowling Club) spoke enthusiastically about their experiences with the community banks helping the organisations they are connected with.

Mr Charles, a retired banker, expressed special thanks to Mr Browning and his staff for what they have done to help Romsey and Lancefield.

Supper enabled many of those present to find out more about banking services through the two community banks, as well as express appreciation for the financial support their organisations have received.


