Over the last week teachers have been in preparing their classrooms and planning programs. Staff officially return to work on Wednesday for the 2 days of professional learning and team planning. This will be an exciting additional facility for our students. Over the holidays I have met and discussed specific aspects of the upgrade and look forward to the work beginning.



MACEDON RANGES running club





Do you really need to use the lawnmower in the heat of the day?

CFA District 02 Operations Officer Chris Jacobsen suggests that it would be better if this could be carried out early in the morning or later in the evening when conditions may have changed. Mr Jacobsen stated that "now the Fire Danger Period is in force and Total Fire Ban days are being declared, when using mowers and other machinery such as welders and grinders, you need to take an extra degree of care and consideration." He also said that "across CFA's District 02, 4 fires have been started in the last week by mowers alone. In most cases these fires are preventable and a bit of careful thought will save the number of times CFA members are called out to an incident."

"Putting in a bit of time now to ensure your machinery is fitted with a spark arrestor that meets current standards, could save you a lot of hassle down the track. Taking an extra five or ten minutes can make all the difference, especially when using tools that cause sparks. Clear the area of anything flammable, make sure adequate water is on hand to extinguish a fire if necessary and most importantly you have the capacity to extinguish a fire. Lawn mowers are also common offenders when it comes to starting preventable fires."

Mr Jacobsen went on to state that "the single most important thing you can do is not to mow on windy days. If you must, do so in the cool of the morning or in the evening especially not when wind is forecast or on hot dry days. Even on cool days, in dry grass fires can start and run quickly in windy conditions."

He added that "not only was it in the vested interests of landholders to minimise the risk of unplanned fires starting, but it is also a requirement under legislation."

"You don't want to be in a situation where your actions put yours and the lives of others at risk."


Top tips for safe use of mowers, welders, grinders, etc on hot days:

- Make sure the device is free from faults and mechanical defects that may cause a fire;
- Ensure it is fitted with an efficient spark arrester;
- Have an area of at least 3 metres around the machinery cleared of flammable material;
- Check for grass build up and look back often to check for fire;
- Postpone non-essential activities on Total Fire Ban days or where the fire risk is high.

KDH Urgent Care Centre

Through kitchen tea conversations Kyneton District Health has been out and about listening to a diverse range of community perspectives, experiences and ideas.

"It's been interesting to hear what people assume we do or don't do," said CEO Maree Cuddihy. "Things like snake bites, stitches and elective caesareans have all been wrongly assumed as off the KDH radar. The group discussions are pointing out what matters to people, and highlighting information gaps in the KDH story. One important part of that story is the Urgent Care Centre, which is led by professional Rural and Isolated Practice Endorsed Registered Nurses or RIPERNS. The skilled and friendly nursing team is available 24 hours a day to respond to and treat urgent care needs. Across 2013 14 this team cared for over 2500 patients. RIPERNs have completed additional training over and above their registered nurse training. They are allowed by law to practise in specific contexts, adhering to strict guidelines.

endorsement to provide a limited range of medicines. They are trained and can respond to those snake bites or stitches. In addition to the kitchen teas KDH is receiving input from consumer representatives, whose feedback helps improve quality.

KDH was also externally reviewed recently, which affirmed the safety and quality of its nurse led model of care. Saying that, a doctor is always contactable. The team will liaise by phone to discuss your case or admission, or if your condition is more serious, coordinate a transfer to a facility that is suitably equipped to treat immediate needs. Sometimes if you call to seek advice before coming to the hospital, staff may suggest that for serious illness or injury you contact the Ambulance Service and go directly to a larger specialist health service. This acknowledges the parameters of a small rural hospital. At KDH it's about prioritising your safety and ensuring rapid access to the most appropriate level of care.

After a complex acute experience, many patients return from a city hospital to the more personal surrounds of KDH. It helps aid recovery to be close to home and family.

Fire Danger Period reminder

Victoria has experienced large amounts of rainfall and lower than normal temperatures over past weeks. However we are still in the Fire Danger Period with restrictions remaining in force right across the state. Loddon Mallee Regional Controller Mark Gilmore said "Although we have received significant rain, areas remain extremely dry and still pose a fire risk. We want to remind people that we are now in the middle of summer and are sure to see a return of higher temperatures and Fire Danger Ratings at the higher end of the scale. Along with this Total Fire Ban days may be declared as conditions worsen."He also said "Preventing fires is something that every member of the community should see as their responsibility" and went on to add that "Fire Danger Periods are based on local conditions and take into account fuel moisture, fuel loads, grassland curing, weather and rainfall." Mr Gilmore went on to say "Members of the community need to remember that burning off cannot be carried out under any circumstances during the Fire Danger Period (FDP) and property owners and works managers are reminded that they need to apply for any permits well in advance if they are planning to carry out essential work during the Fire Danger Period."

Inspector Colin Renton from Victoria Police also emphasised that "Police are called to all fires during the Fire Danger Period and will investigate and prosecute all breaches of the law."

He added "There has been a marked spike in people burning off rubbish since the recent rain event and police have prosecuted a number of property owners as a result. Any person lighting a fire without a written permit or causing a fire through failing to comply with permit conditions will be prosecuted".

The Fire Danger Period means fires cannot be lit in the open air without a written permit from the CFA.

- Schedule 13 Permit:
- This permit allows you to burn-off grass, weeds, or other vegetation during the Fire Danger Period.

Schedule 14 Permit

This permit applies to other uses of fire not covered by Schedule 13, such as industrial burning or cutting, or burning deceased stock.

Note that both Schedule 13 and Schedule 14 permits become invalid on days of Total Fire Bans.

Each summer Crime Stoppers Victoria partners with emergency services to raise awareness and encourage reporting of bushfire arson through the Zero Tolerance campaign. Arson is attributed as being the cause of 50 percent of all bushfires across the country, with 1444 suspicious fires and almost 400 people charged for arson-related offences in Victoria during the 2013-2014 bushfire season. Deliberate and reckless fires can threaten lives and property, and tie up valuable emergency service resources, leaving other areas of the state vulnerable, particularly on extreme and code red fire days. CFA North West Region Community Education Coordinator Paul Tangey urged all residents to "Check the fire danger rating in their weather district every day over summer and especially when travelling to other parts of the state." He went on to say "The Total Fire Ban Districts map and a copy of the Can I Can't I brochure which explains what is and is not permitted both during the fire danger period and on days of total fire ban, are two of the best sources of information you should have.

Mr Tangey made the comment "Don't forget if you have seen something or know something then say something by contacting Crime Stoppers confidentially on 1800 333 000."As a final statement Mr Gilmore remarked that "Fire restrictions remain in force for a very good reason – to prevent fires from starting. If you are unsure then please contact the CFA or your local council.'

Pastor's Parables

Story of Valentine's day

The story of Valentine's Day begins in the third century with an oppressive Roman emperor and a humble Christian Martyr. The emperor was Claudius II. The Christian was Valentinus.

Claudius had ordered all Romans to worship twelve gods, and had made it a crime punishable by death to associate with Christians. But Valentinus was dedicated to the ideals of Christ; not even the threat of death could keep him from practicing his beliefs. He was arrested and imprisoned.

During the last weeks of Valentinus's life a remarkable thing happened. Seeing that he was a man of learning, the jailer asked whether his daughter, Julia, might be brought to Valentinus for lessons. She had been blind since birth. Julia was a pretty young girl with a quick mind. Valentinus read stories of Rome's history to her. He described the world of nature to her. He taught her arithmetic and told her about God. She saw the world through his eyes, trusted his wisdom, and found comfort in his quiet strength.

"Valentinus, does God really hear our prayers?" Julia asked one day.

"Yes. my child. He hears each one."

"Do you know what I pray for every morning and every night? I pray that I might see. I want so much to see everything you've told me about!"

"God does what is best for us if we will only believe in Him." Valentinus said.

"Oh, Valentinus, I do believe! I do!" She knelt and grasped his hand.

They sat quietly together, each praying. Suddenly there was a brilliant light in the prison cell. Radiant, Julia screamed. "Valentinus. I can see! I can see!"

"Praise be to God!" Valentinus exclaimed, and he knelt in prayer.

On the eve of his death Valentinus wrote a last note to Julia, urging her to stay close to God. He signed it, "From your Valentine." His sentence was carried out the next day, February 14, 270 A.D., near a gate that was later named Porta Valentini in his memory. He was buried at what is now the Church of Praxedes in Rome. It is said that Julia planted a pink-blossomed almond tree near his grave. Today, the almond tree remains a symbol of abiding love and friendship. On each February 14, Saint Valentine's Day, messages of affection, love, and devotion are exchanged around the world."




