## COUNCIL NEWS.

Welcome back. By the time you read this, the new Romsey Kindergarten/Infant Welfare Centre should be up and running. With a total capacity of 180 children, there will not, in the foreseeable future, be a child in this Shire who will not have the opportunity to commence their formal education at kinder level. The Engineer has reported to Council that an order of magnitude costing to clean up the Five Mile Creek would range between \$10 - 20,000. Works suggested to improve creek flow include (a) removal of debris, (b) removal of trees and (c) straightening of creek bed. The administrative side would involve co-ordination and obtaining approval from effected landowners and the Rural Water Commission. Further on this later.

For those that live next to a vacant block of land they consider a fire hazard due to high grass etc. and wonder why it has not been slashed when fire restrictions are enforced, we offer the following (a) during Nov. a "Fire Control Notice" is sent to the owners of all vacant town land and selected rural residential properties. This notice provides information regarding the removal of hazards and has attached a list of contractors prepared to do the work. (b) commencing December inspections of all areas made with each Fire Brigade Captain and properties where work required are listed, a direction to remove hazard prepared and posted. Clearance required by 25th December and (c) any directions not complied with by 1st January will result in compulsory clearance of the hazard. The owner will then receive an account for the cost of removal plus an administration fee (currently \$75). Owners that fail to comply with a direction may also be prosecuted. If you have any further enquiries regarding this matter please contact David Bachelor at the Shire Office.

Finally, agreement is to be reached between the Shire and local fire brigade to spray and burn off our open drains twice a year. It will not cure the problem entirely, but it is a start.

## LEGAL NOTES

Access. The fairness and effectiveness of an access order is often tested at holiday-time. One of a number of factors taken into account by the Courts in making an order is whether or not an access order is workable. In making an access order, the most important consideration is the welfare of the child. Any factor which has a bearing on that welfare will be taken into account. Access is rarely denied to a parent. The feasibility of the access arrangements and their potential to either work smoothly, or to produce conflict, will therefore be considered. The most common order for access for a child of school age is: (a) during school term, each second week-end from 9 am Saturday to 6 pm Sunday. (b) One half of the December-January school holidays including Christmas alternate years. (c) One half of the April, June and September school holidays alternating each year. Each order for defined access will, however, contain many specific variations in order to cater for the convenience of the parents and the wishes of the child. If the parents live so far apart that access is a problem, access orders are modified and Court may order the travelling costs of the child to be shared by the parents. A child cannot be taken overseas without the written consent of a person entitled to custody or access. If a parent does so, he or she is subject to a penalty of \$10,000 or imprisonment for 3 years or both. The Courts recognise that parents have a positive duty to do everything to make access work smoothly. There is an implied condition that the custodial parent will ensure that the child is dressed and ready to go with the other parent for the period of access and that nothing is done physically or emotionally to spoil the access. Both parents have an implied duty to ensure that the child or children maintain a good relationship with the other parent. This can be extremely difficult for a parent who is still bitter about his or her own separation, breakdown of marriage and financial settlement. In many cases, a parent, often unknowingly, can "use" the children to express this bitterness. If a parent hinders or prevents access, the Courts have power to fine the defaulter in contempt of Court. This offence is punishable by a jail term. The Courts do not like to jail offenders, if there is an alternative, as this can increase the bitterness even further. Often the Courts order compulsory counselling for the parents and children, depending on the children's ages. At these counselling sessions a professionally trained family counsellor will try to work through the parents emotions following the separation. In many cases, once these emotions are examined, conflict lessens and access proceeds smoothly. There are also very many cases where years after divorce, access still does not proceed smoothly.

If you are in any doubt as to your obligations as a custodial parent or an access parent, you should consult a solicitor.
