Mountain" Plants on Exposed Sites. As a tour of Mt.Macedon gardens and a omparison with Romsey gardens will confirm, the performance of Rhodendrons, zeleas, Magnolias, Camellias, tree ferns etc. is improved the nearer local anditions approach those on the mount. Shade, shelter from wind and frost, roximity of other vegetation, moisture, deep friable soils rich in humus ypical of forested areas provide the ideal situation.

ttempting to grow plants which thrive in these conditions, in exposed sites ypical of much of Romsey's new estates is therefore best avoided until uitable shelter belts have been established, soils improved and time is vailable for the extra attention these plants require. Limited plantings of uch plants in protected situations near buildings, under pergolas and in ontainers where additional artificial climatic and other conditions can be et may however, be worth considering. Mulches of shredded bark, forest itter and other similar materials will also contribute to success in this limate.

ny people do not recognise that they are having difficulty coping and it may ly be when they talk to their doctor or a friend about physicao problems (like adaches, stomach pains, back ache or tiredness) or behavioural changes (like fficulty sleeping, irratability, problems concentrating or just not feeling ght) that the suggestion is made to them.

e first step in coping with stress is to be aware of it, to learn what changes ppen within yourself when confronted by changes and demands, and then to cide if you are happy with these.

specific way of managing your personal stress is through specific relaxation ercises. By using relaxation exercises you can learn to control physical and intal tension and be well on the way to greater satisfaction and well being.

Council has determined that amendments to our Interim Development Order (planning scheme etc.) are necessary. The amendments are on display and open for public comment. Amendment number 18 (outbuildings in Urban Areas) should be noted by all. Paragraph (f) states that all metal outbuildings in excess of 40 sq. metrés be pre-coloured (colourbond), this includes the roof. Cost of colourbond is great and nearly half the cost will be in the roof. What do you think?

The Recreation Vehicles By-Law has been deferred for two months so that further consideration can be given and to allow for further public comment.

Council Elections will be held on Saturday, 1st August. Voting is compulsory if you are on the roll. Cr. John LAING's term expires this year.

There is a delay in the construction of the service road north of the township on the eastern side of Lancefield Road due to an old water main running along the middle of the road. Talks with the Water Board will hopefully resolve this soon.

There will be some clearing and levelling of nature-strips in Suzanne Court. Council have determined that if your unregistered dog is caught by the Shire Ranger you will be liable to a \$50 penalty as well as registration fees. If you do not have a house number displayed (preferably not Lot No.), it is your responsibility to do so. If you are unsure as to what it is, the Shire Office staff will assist.

DMSEY FIRE BRIGADE The Romsey Fire Brigade is a volunteer organisation which ervices the township and rural areas surrounding the town. We have 3 fire ankers, one provided by the Country Fire Authority and two purchased with funds aised by the brigade and its ladies auxiliary. All of the fire fighters are plunteers and all of the officers are democratically elected.

he brigade is equipped and members are trained to deal with incidents including rass and bush fires, structure fires, hazardous chemicals and vehicles. We can lso give advice on fire prevention, including the use of fire extinguishers, urning off and general property protection.

eing the only emergency service, other than police in the area, we respond to 11 reported incidents and have contact with the police, State Emergency ervice, ambulance, special hazardous chemicals units and other fire brigades.

ires are generally reported by phone to the Fire Reporting System (FRS). When he FRS number is called, four phones in private homes and the telephone at the ire station will ring. The FRS may be answered by more than one person and a iscussion between fire brigade personnel and the caller begins. IF NO-ONE NSWERS the phone, HOLD ON and the SIREN WILL BE ACTIVATED.

e will want to know the type of incident and its location, including the earest crossroad, Determine whether any person is threatened by the fire and ake sure that the fire truck is met and a report given to the person in charge.

he FRS NUMBER is 295 333.

he fire station is in STAWELL STREET, between WILLIAMS and ROGERS STREETS, on he NORTH SIDE of the road. At the front is the old courthouse, which is now he Romsey and District Fire Brigades Group headquarters. The ROMSEY FIRE TATION is located BEHIND THE GROUP HEADQUARTERS.
