Winter has arrived and so has the season for the dreaded common cold.
The common cold is caused by a virus which is spread by contact and through the air as you walk, talk, sneeze or cough. It affects the nasal passages and throat. As the virus differs from year to year to develop a cure has, so far, proven very difficult.

The symptoms - dry sore throat, running nose, cough, fever, muscle aches and pains can all be eased by the use of the correct medication.

When a bacterial infection develops on top of a virus attack causing middle ear infection, infection of the sinuses and even pneumonia, antibiotics are then indicated as treatment. When these symptoms occur you should consult a general practitioner. The infected person should avoid smoking, overheating the house and keep up fluids. DO NOT MIX ALCOHOL WITH ANY MEDICATION.

Always blow your nose with one or both nostrils open to avoid forcing infected mucous into the middle ear. Always cover your nose and mouth with a handkerchief when you sneeze or cough.

AROUND YOUR ROMSEY HOME No.4.

Native Ground Covers. As the "user pays" system of charging for domestic water now coming to favor in many towns and shires will mean higher costs for home gardeners with lawns, the time has come to consider other choices.

Mulching with either organic or inorganic material is a favored method and has advantages in weed control as well as water conservation, and may be combined with the use of ground covering plants to their benefit as well as of adjacent trees and shrubs.

Suitable ground cover plants requiring minimum watering include many prostrate Grevillea, Myoporum, Dampiera, Kunzea pomifera, Gastrolobium trancatum, as well as the local prostrate form of Platylobium formosum and Pultenaea pedunculata which blooms profusely in Nov.— Dec. among our trees and shrubs in parts of our garden, is easily controlled and propagated, is frost and drought resistant and discourages most weeds when established. Others include various Scaevola species, Viola hederacea, Oxylobium tricuspidatum and Scleranthus biflorus over rocks.

Snail Traps. To protect snail bait from rain - and possibly pets - pierce holes in centres of tops or bottoms of boot polish tins, fit and solder in place a 100 ml. galvanized nail or similar. Pierce or drill same size hole in centre of plastic or metal bottle tops to slide up and down on nail and hold snail bait. Push into ground leaving enough room for snails to crawl under and reach bait. If cleaned and stored when not in use, these may last 40 years or more as have those of the writer made in the 1940s! - Syd Wheller.

AS A HOME AND COMMUNITY CARE (HACC) FUNDED PROGRAM THE RURAL ALLIED HEALTH TEAM BELIEVES IT IS IMPORTANT TO LIAISE WITH ALL LOCAL HACC PROGRAMS SUCH AS HOME CARE SERVICES, MEALS ON WHEELS SERVICES, ADULT DAY CARE CENTRES AND SO ON. THE AIM OF THE HACC PROGRAM IS TO PROVIDE A RANGE OF SERVICES FOR FRAIL ELDERLY PEOPLE, PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES, AND THEIR CARERS, IN ORDER TO MAINTAIN OR ENHANCE INDEPENDENCE AND THE QUALITY OF LIFE SO THAT THEY MAY CONTINUE LIVING SAFELY IN THEIR OWN HOME. CO-ORDINATION AMONGST ALL HACC SERVICES IS THEREFORE VERY IMPORTANT TO ENSURE THAT PEOPLE ARE RECEIVING SERVICES IN RESPONSE TO ASSESSED NEEDS.

THE RURAL ALLIED HEALTH TEAM IS AVAILABLE TO WORK WITH LOCAL SERVICE PROVIDERS IN THE PLANNING AND DELIVERY OF LOCAL HACC SERVICES.

SOME HOME HELP SUPERVISORS AND DAY CARE CO-ORDINATORS HAVE SAID THEY FEEL QUITE ISOLATED, EVEN UNSUPPORTED, IN THEIR ROLE, WHILST OTHERS HAVE EXPRESSED A GROWING CONCERN ABOUT THE INCREASED DEMANDS PLACED UPON THEM. THE ROLE OF THE RURAL ALLIED HEALTH TEAM IS TO SUPPORT LOCAL WORKERS, PARTICULARLY LONE WORKERS, IN ASSISTING THEM IN THE WHOLE RANGE OF SERVICE DEVELOPMENT, INCLUDING REFERRAL AND ASSESSMENT PROCESSES, REVIEW PROCEDURES, DISCHARGE AND POSSIBLE COMMUNITY INTEGRATION, VOLUNTEER RECRUITMENT, VOLUNTEER AND STAFF TRAINING, ALTERNATE PROGRAM PROVISION AND OTHERS.

COUNCIL NEWS:

S . . .

No doubt you have read newspaper reports on the fate of Planning Scheme Amendment L17, the Golf Course Development on the west side of town. Council has opted to continue the "push" for L17 by incorporating it into L20, the total Shire Planning Scheme Amendment, which is currently under consideration.

Upon complying with certain conditions, Council have agreed to allow a restricted club liquor licence for the Football/Cricket Club rooms at the recreation reserve.

A Nine Lot Sub-Division of Lot 7 Woodend Road was refused.

The Building Surveyor has reported that 44 houses within the Shire are currently occupied without a relevant certificate being issued. Sixteen are in the Romsey Riding. It appears that some of the works required are very minor, others can be a problem. Council resolved to allow 3 months for Certificates of Occupancy to be obtained otherwise legal action may ensue.

Councillor Sue Officer has resigned from Council due to family concerns and other commitments. We thank Sue for her time and contribution. An extra-ordinary election (if needed) will take place on August 3rd, the same time as annual Council Elections. The Statutory Meeting of Council will be held at 5.30pm on Wednesday, August 7th.

If you are interested in subscribing for Council Meeting minutes, it is for a 12 month minimum at a cost of \$150. The Assistant, Shire Secretary (Glenn Owens) will assist you in this matter.

The Official Opening of the Kindergarten/Infant Welfare Centre will take place on Wednesday, 24th July at 3pm.
