

VICTORIAN HERITAGE FESTIVAL - APRIL 4-16.

This year the National Trust are encouraging us to discover the hidden heritage in our own district. To assist you, the Romsey Rag Committee published a current road map of Romsey in their last issue and this month set out a tour that will help you discover our own local hidden heritage.

TOUR OF ROMSEY

The Romsey of to-day has grown and developed over the years. The rich red Romsey soil is still the same. Some of the original hotels, stores, churches and public buildings are still there together Owith more recent additions. Only with a slow tour of our town can you hope to gain an appreciation of our heritage.

SEYMOUR COTTAGE in Palmer Street, just east of the school, is unique due to its age and construction - is currently being restored by the Romsey Historical Society and is open for inspecton. A plaque was unveiled to mark the work done in renovating the kitchen area in October 1985.

From the Sidney Seymour Cottage, drive back along Palmer Street to the Primary School. There has been a school on this site since 1865 and now the school population is 307 - and growing! The school teacher's residence used to be the pretty little house south of the School. Turn south -(left)- down the Main Street, over the Five Mile Creek and immediately left beside the Plant Nursery. The little wooden building that is now the Infant Welfare Centre was once the first Shire Office! - The elected members of the Shire first met at Lancefield in 1890.

Continue along the service road (southwards) beside the Main Road, past the Mechanics' Institute. The original ROMSEY MECHANICS' INSTITUTE HALL was built in 1884 and the foundation stone was laid on May 29th that year by Sir. William Clark. The building was destroyed by fire on July 6th, 1904 and the foundation stone of the present hall was laid on November 14th, 1904 by Nicholas Fitzgerald.

The first meeting was held in 1869 on 25th August. The venue was the Lancefield District Road Board. The quorum for a meeting was 5 members (still the same today). The subscription to be a member of the Institute was 1 pound per annum.

An early lecture organised by the Committee was entitled "Mechanics Institutes and Their Uses". Eighty six people attended but apparently some gained admittance without paying. Another lecture by a Dr. Birney was entitled "The Uses and Abuses of Alcohol".

Building commenced in 1874 and the wooden building was finally completed in 1884 when Sir William Clarke baronet was requested to open the new additions.

One of the present foundation stones (dated 1884) marks this event. The original building was burnt down in 1904 and the present building was then constructed.

Renovations of the hall were completed in 1985 and the money raised at the Centenary Celebrations (Penny Concert, Old time Films & Old Time Dance) helped to defray the loan gained for the painting and repairs.

The "VILLAGE" shops, set back with parking in front of them, have been open for about 8 years, where once there was a Saddlers' Shop and a private home with a lovely garden. On the next corner was the Shamrock Hotel - one of six Hotels in Romsey.

Fred White's "UNIVERSAL STORE" was the recently closed video shop, and it sold every mortal thing imaginable! A great meeting place to catch up on all the lastest news too! Our present Shire Offices began life as the Commercial Bank, and next door is the brick Post Office, built in 1890 at a cost of 513 pounds. The 100 year old Post Office, is a well known meeting place for many generations of school bus travellers, sporting groups and commuters. On September 3rd, 1990, due to a vastly increased role and demand for services, the Romsey Post Office will move its function to its new centre in the new Shopping Complex that opened in early 1990.

The small Real Estate Office (used to be the Barber's shop) next to the Hotel (which was known as the Post Office Hotel) was taken over when renovations were made to the hotel in 1990. The Hotel was built in 1867 by Terence Keenan.

Continue straight on southwards, over Barry Street, past O'Dea's, which was the local Newspaper Office - "The Romsey Examiner", and then past the old Medical Centre - the old home has been the resident doctor's home all this century (The new Medical Centre is situated in Stawell Street.) Round the corner, behind the doctor's, to your left, was the Romsey Railway Station, (in Railway Crescent or Station St.) which operated from Clarkefield to Lancefield between 1881 and 1956, until road transport took over. (Now units for elderly citizens on site.) In August, 1990 The Shire named the short connecting street "McIntosh Terrace" after the last Station Master at Romsey.

However, retrace your tracks to the other side of the Main St. and travel back (northwards) on the service road, past the Church of England, built in 1871, with its lovely oak tree at the gate planted in 1872, past Romsey Hardware Store (which was a blacksmith's shop), over Barry Street, and the Catholic Church was built in 1926, but there was an earlier wooden church set further back and a Catholic School on the site. The parish dates from 1863. Keep on service road.

The CHEMIST and SUPERMARKET in Main Street have been Chemist and Grocer for many many years and at the far end of that block is the ex-Galway Arms Hotel, on the corner of Stawell Street.

The old BUTCHER'S shop, which was located on the corner of Stawell & Main St. was vacated in 1985, having served for perhaps nearly 120 years. This building was demolished in 1989 to give way to the new single storey National Bank complex. The beautiful solid two storey National Bank building was built in 1875. However this was not the first National Bank building to serve the growing community. After completion of the new building the construction of which took 8 years, the original building was removed by bullocks, to the site in Main Street where it was used as the Newsagency until early 1990 when it was demolished to make way for the new Shopping Complex.

When the first manager of the National Bank came to Romsey, it was a small village, situated in a district covering an area of 239 square miles and with a population of only 400. The two storey building was superceded by the opening of the new National Bank premises at the Corner of Main Street and Stawell Street in 1990.

The old BAKERY, removed in 1989 to make way for the new Supermarket complex car park was just before the Milk Bar and one of the Hotels (The Commercial Hotel) was beyond the Newsagent, but it burnt down.

Take a turn around in front of Romsey House, which was the first Hotel in the town, built in 1860, and it was The Romsey Hotel. I am told that the name ROMSEY HOTEL used to be in concrete letters on the Murphy Street side (where it now says Romsey House) until World War II, when the letters were chiselled off in case of Japanese invasion! (Romsey House at the corner of Main and Murphy Streets served the community as a Restaurant for a number of years and private residence.)

Drive west along Murphy Street to the first intersection (Pohlman St.) where the Council Yard on your left was the sale-yards - a busy day for the Romsey Hotel on market Days! - and right-turn down Pohlman Street (northwards) to the end on your left is the bluestone Presbyterian Church - also with lovely old oak trees at the gates - built 1865, and now the Uniting Church. Actually, Romsey "united" before the official Uniting Church started in 1977; in 1968, the Methodists and Presbyterians united in Romsey, and the small green weatherboard Methodist Church is now a private home - travel back to Murphy Street turn left out of Pohlman Street into Murphy Street, past Romsey House, over the Main Road straight down Murphy Street over next intersection (William St.) and the ex-Methodist Church is there on your left.

Continue past it, to the end of Murphy Street into Rogers Street. The site of the old Butter Factory (burnt down 25/5/86) is on your left behind big trees. This was a life-blood industry of Romsey from the 1880's, when dairying, butter and cheese making were thriving in the district, and in fact the Pioneer Dairy Co. (here) made the first condensed milk in Australia in 1886.

In 1922, a Head Teacher at the Primary School wrote optimistically of the newly-formed Progress Association in the town and hoped that some other industries would be attracted to the district, to stop the drift of young people from the district, to seek work, but, as far as I know, the position didn't change much and it is still the same today - or worse. (Except that commuting to Melbourne is now much faster and easier.)

Drive on to the next road on your right, and progress up Stawell Street passing the new CFA Headquarters on your right, and the ex-Police Station. The new CFA HQ is at the ex-Court House.

First left into William Street - turn left again at Barry Street and drive down to the Memorial Gates on your right (beside Park Street) at the entrance to the Sports Oval. Fither go through the gates if you wish, or up Park Street, as the Sports Oval is surrounded by:- Bowls, Tennis Courts, a Squash/Table Tennis/Badminton Stadium, a Golf Course and a Trotting Track. Something for everyone.

Return to Main Street, and on your way back to the Sidney Seymour Cottage, you may like to browse around other streets of Romsey, or glimpse the northern end of the town beyond Palmer Street, where the ex-Union Hotel is on the west side of the Main Road, with verandah in front. By entering Robb Drive you visit Romsey Heights Estate the largest Housing subdivision, providing all services to new home owners.

Further north of the town on the corner of Ochiltrees Road, is the newly renovated Royal Mail Hotel, (now a private residence) where the first Post Office and School were started. Post Office 1860, School 1859, both Five. Mile Creek/Lancefield before 1860.

We hope you have enjoyed discovering Romsey's Hidden Heritage.



STREET NUMBERING:

Street numbering is an easily recognisable means of identifying properties and in Rural Townships it is possibly of greater importance, as many of our Streets and Roads will not be familiar to all of our residents and especially to other persons who may be visiting, sight-seeing, making deliveries or collections, taxis and more importantly for mail delivery and emergency

Council wishes to take this opportunity to remind you to display your street Street numbers are generally only applicable to the Townships

If you are not presently displaying your street number then now is the time

Council's Local Laws on Street numbering provide that the owner of the property shall erect the appropriate number and that the number must be readable from a distance of fifteen (15) metres from the property line. If you are not displaying a street number and are unsure as to whether you actually have one, plese firstly refer to your 1992/92 Rate Notice, which will include the address of your property and your street number, if If you are still unsure or have any queries, please call Councils' Rate Officer, mrs. Dawn Garner.

All residents of the Shire are requested to minimise the amount of material going to the tip that may be composted. To encourage this, Council are offering a \$10.00 refund on composting bins purchased in the Shire from one of the participating retail outlets (listed below). 

Since three meetings have been held where as many as eighteen Shire residents have attended to discuss the future fund raising plans. These people have formed under the umbrella of "The Friends of the Lancefield & District Hospital", and have great plans at foot to encourage membership and financial support with many activities in the coming months. Among these are a Sixty/Forty Dance and a regular stall at the monthly Romsey market, the first of which was held successfully on march 22nd.

The Romsey Medical practice has promised full support for the re-opening, and specialists are being approached to look at the facilities and make suggestions for future expansion of the medical treatments to be undertaken in Lancefield.

Already the hospital has acquired its own fax machine and the installation of a computer system to enhance the efficiency of the administration of the hospital has been promised by one of the local support groups. management are looking to the future, and are mindful of the need to bring the hospital to an efficient and cost effective state to enter the 21st century. The Friends aim to raise \$100,000 in the next twelve months towards the refurbishment and equipment of the proposed increased facilities. Details of the proposals will be discussed at Public Meetings to be held in each of the towns of Lancefield, Romsey and Riddell's Creek. Dates for these meetings will be published in the next week or so.

ROMSEY RIDING NEWS

During March, Planning Permits were issued for a home-occupation electrical goods repair business in Whelans Place, Romsey, and for a five-lot industrial subdivision in Mitche. Court, Romsey.

Collections are now underway of glass, paper, and PET plastics for recycling, on garbage collection day. A contract has been granted for a shed to be built at Lancefield Tip for recyclable items, which can also then be taken to the Tip.

Population figures have been placed on the township signs, and the turning lane at Digby Drive has been completed. Signs will soon be erected to direct traffic to the Recreation Nontre, and repairs to the footpaths in Barry Street and Main and will be undertaken next month.

Some clarification is needed of two recent newspaper reports. The first related to the matter of ties bearing the Shire crest, and to be bought by Council. The maximum amount to be outlayed to purchase the ties is \$1,700, but the actual amount is expected to be much less. Only guests of the Council will receive the ties as presentation items; everyone else, including Councillors and Staff, must pay. This will reimburse some of the purchase cost. Furthermore, the order is being placed with the business of a Shire resident.

The second report requiring clarification concerns the provision of assistance to the Commonwealth Employment Service. The C.E.S. have clarified their request, and they do not need office space, but only an area of notice board for display of job vacancies and other information. Space is being made available in the foyer of the Shire Office for this purpose.

Council is also making office space available for representatives of the Youth Access Centre from Glenroy C.E.S. to provide information to young people on career choices, and access to services. This will be on Friday, 1st May, at the Shire Offices. Further details of this day will be advertised in the near future.




