Continuing to Serve a Caring, Country Community

For those who have a vehicle motivated by gas, Council have issued a permit for the petrol station on the corner of the Kilmore Road, Lancefield, to install a L.P.G. tank and dispenser. Instead of building units on the railway land in Station Str., Council have purchased 3 units in Stawell Str., to provide medium to long term rental accommodation. One unit being for youth, the other two for older people, people with disabilities or single parent families. Funding is by Commonwealth grant, Romsey/Lancefield Lions and Council. Our thanks to the Lions Club for their generosity (once again). Due to perceived problems in Riddells Creek, Council have adopted a multi-unit precipct density development code pending a Planning Panel multi-unit precinct density development code pending a Planning Panel hearing (appointed by Minister). The basic idea is not to have too many unit developments in any given area.

Council are undertaking a Land Capability Study. This study will provide land resource information and land capability analysis to promote sound planning strategies. These strategies are hoped to minimise land degradation and protect areas of special value e.g. water catchments. Second-hand Dealers Licences will remain at \$50 with an the initial application fee of \$100. Renewals and/or second or subsequent applications will be free.



# SHIRE OF ROMSEY

## LITTER & LITTERING

Litter is unsightly, harmful to the environment and can be dangerous.

Litter comes from many sources such as; deliberately "dumping" of unwanted items and waste; wind blown debris; overfull rubbish bins; and unsecured car and trailer loads.

Litter also comes from the careless disposal of used things such as empty drink bottles, cigarette ends, chocolate wrappers and newspapers.

The Litter Act sets tough penalties for littering and provides for specific offences in some situations such as unlawfully disposing of litter.

Another example of an offence is the damaging of public litter bins or the misuse of those bins such as placing commercial or household rubbish in them. Public litter bins are provided for the disposal of small unwanted items and waste.

Yet another example of an offence is unsecured car and trailer loads. Vehicle owners are liable for all litter coming from vehicles or trailers. It you are carrying a load of any materials (not just rubbish for disposal) then ensure that it is securely tied. The message is simple: TIGHTEN YOUR LOAD ON THE ROAD.

Litter infringement fines of \$100 can be issued for littering and more serious offences can be dealt with by the Courts. In the last 12 months, 13 people have been fined for littering offences in the Shire of Romsey and recently a person was prosecuted for dumping rubbish on the roadside and the Court imposed a penalty of \$500.

The Council of the Shire of Romsey believes that littering is a serious offence and will continue to prosecute for littering offences when it considers appropriate to do so.

Remember it is YOUR responsibility to dispose correctly of your rubbish by either placing it inside your garbage bin for collection or disposing of it at the tip.

# \*\* A Brief History of the Romsey Rag: \*\*

As a feature of this 100th edition of The Romsey Rag, I thought that readers may be interested in how the Rag came into existence and some of the features it has brought to readers over the Years. In 1984 Romsey Primary school became involved with the S.I.P (School improvement Program) which was for us, designed to increase our outreach, service & accountability to the local community. The program was initially subsidised, monitored and encouraged by the Ministry of Education and School Council. It was in fact this funding that made the first editions possible & forged the links with the school that still exist for the benefit of all.

It was soon discovered that accurately reported local Romsey news rarely made the pages of newspapers, despite items being provided. At this time I had close connection with the publication committee of the "Wallan Whistle", which was meeting the needs of residents in the Wallan area. In April, the late Mrs Val Lobb, Mrs Bev Large and I met with Mrs Barbara Rowlands, editor of the Whistle, to discuss the feasibility of initiating a similar project in Romsey. While searching for a name, it was in fact Mrs Val Lobb who suggested the now familiar title for our monthly bulletin. I can still remember her typing the phrase "collector's edition" on the first copy of the Rag. In those days we battled with waxed stencils and a messy, ink duplicator that grew increasingly unreliable, frustrating and slow over the years, as circulation and volume increased. Today the facilities of Romsey Primary School and the School Council are still provided but production is greatly facilitated by an advanced copy printer that can easily handle the printing of a 20,000 sheet edition, in an afternoon.

As a direct result of the support from local readers and businesses, the Rag became almost self funding within the first year. As a committee we considered that if we were servicing a genuine need in the community, the positive response from readers, the growing number of publication volunteers and sponsors would ensure The Romsey Rag continued to survive, expand and become self funding. This indication of success has been noted and encourages all those associated with the production.

Sponsorship of The Rottisety Rag has been well supported by a range of businesses and citizens whose contributions are again very gratefully acknowledged.

Over the years production subsidies have also been received from a small Govt. innovation grant, Romsey Shire and the

School Council.

Although now produced by computer, it was Mrs Dot Keating who first used her calligraphy skills in old English script to provide the banner style which, is still used in our current editions of The Romacy \$40.

The Romsey Rambler, who was at first anonymously provided regular monthly comments and challenging commentary on life in Romsey, was finally revealed as the Rev Adrian Peglar, Minister of the Romsey Uniting Church.

For a number of years, Mrs Beryl Cole served on the editorial committee and it was through her organisation and enthusiasm that deliveries, sponsors and collation were organised.

The regular informative tips from our renowned Country Gardener, Syd Wheller have been published monthly for years now. We thank him and remind you that Syd is only too happy to provide advice and expertise should you require it, at any time.

Despite the tragedies and traumas that have occurred in the lives of the community over the years, the editorial committee have been determined to report the more positive side of life, to encourage, challenge and provide news of recovery rather than describe accidents and misfortune. I trust that this policy will continue.

Circulation of The Romsey Rag has doubled since its the first edition was published, with 1000 copies now being produced and distributed by a team of willing volunteers. There have been so many people associated with the publication over the years that it would be impossible to name them all but our sincere appreciation is expressed to all those who have braved the elements during transported typewriters. contributed articles, become covered with messy ink stencils or ended up with back ache after collating hundreds of The Romsey Rag is always seeking written contributions. 

# SCOUTING BY BP





When BP was sent to southern Africa in the 1880s. he had the chance to put into practice many of these "scouting" skills. He wrote a book called "Aids to Scouting for NCOs and Men". Many of the skills taught in this book were included in "Scouting for Boys". The quirks of fate which caused Baden Powell to be the commander of the garrison at Mafeking which withstood a siege for 217 days before being relieved in May, 1890 were extremely significant to the formation of the Boy Scouts. Three factors are important.

First the shortage of manpower in the beleaguered garrison caused Baden Powell to use boypower for many of the duties in the town. He found that boys, if trusted and relied upon, would do their duties as well as men. These principles of trustworthiness and reliability were to become fundamental to Scouting.

The second factor is that although Britain had won the Boer War, it had taken an enormous amount of men and effort to subdue a few thousand Boers. Many in Britain, Baden Powell amongst them, felt that young Britons lacked the physical strength and strength of character to maintain the nation, and all that had made Britain great. There were many efforts made to form boys' organisations aimed to develop manliness, physical health and strength, and character. Within months after the seige was relieved Baden Power had given assent to the use of his name in the formation of an organisation called the "Baden Powell League of Health and Manliness".

Boys who joined were expected not to smoke until they were 21, to live healthy and physically active lives, and to do good turns. They signed a pledge to this effect. The notion to do good rather than simply be good, and the idea of making a promise also became fundamental parts of Scouting.

The third factor is that the relief of Mafeking made Baden Powell a hero of the nation, and known around the World. His fame and prestige gave a great impetus to Scouting.

# THE ORIGINS OF SCOUTING

The popular myth about the start of Scouting is that Baden Powell was somehow moved to write Scouting for Boys after testing his ideas in a camp on Brownsea Island. Then the book "took off" and Scouting started itself. This version is very much an over-simplification which gives little credit to the energy and vision of Scouting's founder. We can see the formulation of aspects of Scouting in Baden Powell's history over 30 years prior to the publication of Scouting for Boys in early 1908.

In 1876 Baden Powell commenced his military career as an officer in the 13th Hussars stationed in India. During his time in India he taught the soldiers under his command the skills to look after themselves in the outdoors, and the bushcraft skills to function as army scouts. In modified form these were many of the skills which he taught his Boy Scouts. Baden Powell also discovered in India that soldiers who had learned these skills preferred to wear a special badge for proficiency on their uniform rather than get a small increment in their pay - the forerunner of the proficiency badges in the Scout programme.

In the early years of this century BP approached Sir William Smith, founder of the Boys Brigade, to incorporate some of his ideas into the Boys Brigade programme. Upon receiving a luke warm reception, BP decided to go it alone. He ran an experimental camp on Brownsea Island in the summer of 1907 for 22 boys, some from public school backgrounds, and some from working class backgrounds, to test his ideas. With the experience of this camp he put the finishing touches on his handbook "Scouting for Boys".

With the help and financial backing of publisher Arthur Pearson owner of the Daily Express and the Evening the Standard, Scouting for Boys began to appear on British bookstalls in January, 1908 in monthly instalments. Supported by a series of public lectures given by BP, sales took off in Britain and around the World boys formed patrols and took up Scouting, and in those early years Scouting was the fastest growing youth movement the World had ever known.

Today Scouting has grown to a huge Worldwide organisation approaching 20 million members in approximately 160 countries. The skills and activities taught to Scouts vary widely from country to country, and are constantly being updated, but the aims and principles remain faithful to those developed by Baden Powell almost a century ago.

Once again the ugly problem of Parvovirus infection has occurred in the district, with its expensive and fatal consequences. Treatment of Parvovirus infection can save the dog but not in 100% of cases. The chances of survival vary with the size, age and promptness of diagnosis, and correct treatment. Treatment involves intensive care and expensive drugs. The signs of Parvovirus infection are-

(1)DEPRESSION

(2) REPETITIVE VOMITTING

(3) DIARRHOEA-often with BLOOD.

The disease can be prevented by vaccination and isolation of young pups. Please note that YEARLY booster injections are required to totally protect dogs, however your local Vet will be more than pleased to answer any questions regarding this serious, contagious disease

of dogs.

LIVER FLUKE: A large number of sheep, cattle and other susceptible species e.g.alpaca, have been found to be suffering from this internal parasite recently, resulting in both illthrift and death. Presumably this is due to the wet seasons we have experienced which has allowed greater survival of the intermediate hosts, and consequently greater numbers of infected animals. Some affected properties have no previous history of a problem. Affected animals show illthrift, anaemia and scouring- in advanced cases the typical "bottle jaw" appearance.

REMEMBER- PREVENTION IS BETTER THAN CURE, particularly with these two diseases. Your local Veterinarian will be able to give advice

to any enquiries.



# Government Sponsored Home Loans

Concern about these loan has caused some loan condtions to change. It is now possible for borrowers to make fortnightly re-payments. This can decrease the final amount paid dramatically. All current loan holders should have received letters about this change in early August.

Repayments of these loans begin at 27% of your income and increase each year. Currently the amount of repayment increases by 3% per annum (and will be for the next 3 years) for example: if your initial repayment is \$100.00 per week, it will be \$103.00 next year, \$106.09 the next and \$109.27 the third year. Increases for the following years are yet to be set.

There appears to have been some exceptions to this process but the Department of Planning and Development state that they are unusual.

#### AROUND YOUR ROMSEY HOME No. 23.

The Importance Of Microclimate. As many long-term gardeners are aware, there are places within every garden where some plants grow well and others repeatedly fail. While this is often a matter of good or bad drainage, exposure to wind, frost and excessive heat or shade, soil type and cultivation practices may also contribute. Sloping sites where natural water flow is blocked by buildings or solid fences can become water logged and unsuitable for many plants unless corrective measures are taken.

In the Central Highlands, south of the Dividing Range, in the vicinity of Mt. Macedon where prevailing winds are usually cold and strong, frosts often severe and growing seasons short, the protection of north-facing walls (NE to NW) are often essential to success with plants from warmer climates such as citrus, passionfruit, gardenias, macadamias and some vegetables. The advantage of the more elevated sites in this area becomes obvious when the effects of frosts can be seen in gardens in the creek valleys where some vegetables can suffer even in mid summer.

Windbreaks, especially on the south side are essential with most of the warm climate plants not otherwise protected, as well as to animals and people and drainage can sometimes be improved by grading a block to remove unwanted humps and hollows in addition to weeds before or during building operations, perhaps creating desirable level areas for outdoor activities at the same time, while not neglecting the need for adequate vehicle access.

As will be apparent from a tour of the newer estates, the choice of surfacing materials for driveways often causes problems after heavy rains where fine materials such as sand often finish up on the street and heavy erosion occurs to the surface, a problem which could be minimized by the provision of adequate drains to direct surface water away and the use of coarser surfacing materials. — Syd Wheller.
