The Month of occupation has finally arrived and on Sunday 17th Octobe Letween 2 - 4.30 in our Junior School Councilles will be proud, acting as hosts and guides around the ew complex. We trust that you will be avail yourselves of this opportunity to visit and tour your new community facility during this Open Afternoon.

Over the last few weeks there has been much feverish activity aimed at completing many tasks in preparation for the children's first day on Tuesday October 19th. All the new furniture is now in place and on Saturday October 16th we will be transporting a good deal of furniture from our current site. I would like to thank all those who have offered assistance on that day. Although many pupil's tables and chairs will be sold to other schools, parents are also made aware that we will be selling the tables at \$20 & chairs for \$6. If you want to purchase any equipment, or have queries, please feel free to contact me at school on 295099.

Pupil Free days on both Friday 15th & Monday 18th of October will enable us to to move books & equipment. As you can imagine there will be thousands of books to move, just in re-establishing the Library. Over the last 8 Saturdays, we have conducted working bees, with volunteers providing invaluable labour & expertise to complete tasks planned for the opening. Acquisition of this equipment was been made possible by the school's participation over a number of years, in sharing the organisational responsibility for Romsey Bingo on Thursday nights and a special fundraising walkathon held last year. Residents are asked to note the changed traffic flow plan, which directly relates to the operation of the new school but is effective immedia; Iv. Railway Cres & the northern end of Station St have now been blocked allowing two way traffic flow in those areas. Due to the changes, extra care and patience will be required. Angle parking spaces have been marked on the Eastern side of Station St outside the school and parallel parking ha been provided on the western side The School Crossing in Main Street will be moved and become operable as from Tuesday 19th Oct. 

Bone Marrow Treatment Appeal

AN APPEAL to help obtain expensive medical treatment for a 10-year-old girl suffering from a rare bone marrow disease is being considered by community groups in the Romsey and Sunbury areas.

Bonny-Kate Nettlebeck, of Romsey (formerly of Gisborne), suffers from aplastic anaemia, also known as anaemia of bone marrow failure.

A family member said the lifethreatening disease was extremely rare.

Bonny-Kate, who played netball for Rebels before her disease was diagnosed, is now unable to go to school, play sport or ride a bike and requires frequent hospital treatment.

The family member said some community groups, including the Brownies, had been conducting informal fund-raising activities and talks were going on about organising a fullscale appeal.

"We hope something can be organised; Bonny-Kate is suffering from an acute disease and we will need all the support we can get to provide the medical attention she needs," the family member said.

ALTERATION TO TRAFFIC FLOWS


STATION STREET, ROMSEY

Closure of Railway Crescent and Station Street at McIntosh Terrace. This will result in two way traffic flows in these roads north of McIntosh Terrace.

McIntosh Terrace to become one way only traffic as will be Station Street south of McIntosh Terrace.

It is hoped this revised traffic flow arrangement will improve the safety of the area and the co-operation of the public will be greatly appreciated.

We are survivors... consider the changes we have witnessed! We were born before: television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, Frisbees and THE PILL. We were here before: radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens. We were here before: pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes, and... before man walked on the moon.

We got married first...THEN lived together! (How quaint!) In our time closets were for clothes, not coming out of. Bunnies were small rabbits and Bugs were not Volkswagens. Designer Jeans were scheming girls named Jean and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins. We thought FAST FOOD was the food you ate during Lent, and OUTER SPACE was the back of the Tivoli Theatre. We were here before: house husbands, gay rights, dual careers, computer dating and commuter marriages. We were before day-care centres, group therapy and nursing homes. In our day GRASS was mowed... COKE was a cold drink... and POT was something your mother cooked in. ROCK MUSIC was Gran's lullaby and AIDS were helpers at school. We were certainly not before the difference between the sexes was discovered but we were surely before the sex change. We made do with what we had and we were the last generation that was so dumb as to think that you needed a husband to have a baby.

No wonder we are so confused and there is such a generation gap today!!! But we survived.... what better reason to celebrate?

LANCEFIELD-ROMSEY LITTLE ATHLETICS CENTRE

We are moving!!!! Our new temporary home is the "old" Romsey Primary school grounds. When the oval at the new school is ready, we will shift there. The season starts on Sat.9th October. Registrations can go to the Secretary Phil Francis (295 968) anytime. Early registrations will save time and reduce the potential for chaos (as long as that butterfly doesn't sneeze) on the first morning. Cost is \$30 for the first child and less for the rest of the kids in the tribe. This includes the centre t-shirt, insurance and record book.

The season goes to the middle of December, breaks for Christmas and resumes in January before finishing towards the end of first term. The Centre encourages participation in all the Little Athletics activities: long and high jumps, shot and discus, and running. 
ROMSEY RIDING NEWS

During the month of September Council has been concentrating on reviewing the Shire's services and finances in determining next years rates. As a result of efficient utilisation of resources Council is proposing a moderate 1.5% rate increase for 1993/94. With inflation being in the order of 1.9% for the last 12 months and predicted to be 3.5% for 1993/94 the proposed change in rates for next year is considered to be an excellent result for residents.

Station Street adjacent to the new Primary School is complete and Council recently planted mature trees along the entire Southern boundary as part of its overall programme for landscape improvements in this area. Plans are to be developed for beautification of part of the Council owned land bounded by Station Street - White Avenue and Main Road. The area to be landscaped over a period of time is situated along the White Avenue frontage.

A special thank you goes to the Emergency Services, CFA and Council employees who were actively involved in protection and maintenance works as a result of the recent heavy rains.

TIDY STREET COMPETITION.

As part of the Tidy Towns Judging Programme and as a way of encouraging residents to participate in the Tidy Towns Competition the Committee will be inviting the Judges to select the Tidiest Street in Romsey. They will be making their decision based on general appearance of the street, litter free, tidiness of spoon drains, resident usage of recycling service, etc. The Romsey Shire Council will install a Special Street Name Plate indicating the Tidiest Street.

Here is an ideal opportunity for us all to become involved in ensuring that Romsey is at its best for the Judge by having your property and street frontage looking neat and tidy.

ROMSEY-LANCEFIELD WATER BOARD

The rates struck by the Board at its meeting on 27th July, 1993 have been set for a user pays water tariff system and for the expansion of the Sewerage Irrigation District.

The Board will move to the user pays system in relation to water consumption in the 1993/94 year which commences on 1st October, 1993. All water consumers will pay a service availability charge of \$165.00 and a consumption rate of 60 cents per kilolitre.

We are all very much aware of what a precious commodity water is and the Board will be enclosing an Information Brochure with the Rate Notices, including details of how to read your own water consumption. An explanation of how to read your meter is also enclosed below.

The user pays system is a charge based on consumption rather than property valuation. In summary, you pay for the water you use.


How to read your water meter

Often consumers wish to check their water usage and for your convenience you can do so by:

- Lift the protective flap to read water meter. The numbers to the left show kilolitres and to the right decimals of a kilolitre.
- All meters below read 1234KL with the number of decimals to the right dependant on the meter type.
- For imperial conversion 4.5 litres equals 1 gallon.

Try this test:

- Record your meter reading.
- Record the reading 24 hours later and subtract the first from the second reading to determine water used.



Note

There remain in service a small number of older meters with gallon registration, but these are being replaced.

To find out if you have any leaking pipes or taps, do the test over a period when you believe that no water will be used, (it is best to test overnight). If the meter records any change during this period have a plumber check your water pipes and appliances. Ensure your meter is easily accessible.

LAMINITIS/FOUNDER IN HORSES

When finally the warm weather of Spring arrives after the recent soaking rains, again the problem of laminitis (founder) in particularly ponies occurs. However, already we have seen a number of cases. Horses which foundered previously are more prone to this condition occurring when the lush, rapidly growing pasture develops, with heavy clovered pasture more dangerous. Now is the time to organise 'starvation' paddocks/areas with minimal green feed so that only a basic roughage dit can be supplied. This space does not allow for the scientific explanation or veterinary treatment of this condition, therefore consult your veterinarian NOW and allow for prevention, rather than cure (not always possible).

COUNTRY LIVING AND WANDERING DOGS

Recently we have been aware of several dogs being shot by irate primary producers, notable sheep farmers because of dogs wandering over their plot and attacking sheep. Occasionally dogs will herd cattle and attack calves but this is less frequent.

Under the Dog Act, dogs must be controlled at all times and the 'law of the land' allows any farmers to shoot any dog on their property even if it is only 'sniffing around' and only suspected a 'livestock' killer.

Most farmers will shoot to kill however occasionally animals are only wounded and end up at the vet. = COST It is important to be aware of the risk of your dogs wandering, both for the dog's welfare, eg cars, farmers, and your pocket, eg Ranger.

Therefore adequate dog control within your property, particularly while you are not at home, is critical. Modification of a dog's behavioural patterns and interaction with it's owner, can aid in some wandering problems. Your local vet will have some ideas which may help.


