A few people around town are asking "What is Bungawitta?" Well, it's the name that Romsey Playgroup has given to their new Home, The Old Romsey Primary School.


The name comes from an aboriginal word meaning "Place of Little Possums"

Our latest news is that we have funding for the LEAP project. LEAP is a DEET funded labour market program, providing formal training for unemployed 15 to 20 year olds. The Romsey Bungawitta Restoration Project.funded by LEAP, sponsored by the Romsey Playgroup and the Lancefield / Romsey Lions Club, with the Department of Business and Employment acting as broker, will run for 26 weeks commencing the 13th June 1995. The Project

includes the restoration of all the exterior woodwork of the School building, and the establishment of an environmental playground and parkland at the site.

The Playgroup will be moving in at the beginning of the third term (mid July) This also means that the rooms will be available for community use (meetings classes etc). Phone Gillian for rental details 295448.

To start the project off, we are having an official house warming.



ROMSEY MEDICAL CENTRE REDEVELOPMENT

The Romsey Medical Centre is in the final stages of a substantial extension and refurbishment programme due to completion in July. In addition to the existing five doctor general practice, the new medical centre will also house a suite of rooms for emergency and surgical procedures, a full time dentist, a physiotherapist, pathology, specialist X-Ray and ultrasound services and a wide range of visiting medical and paramedical specialists.

It is not much more than five years since the Romsey Medical Centre was built on its present site at the corner of Main Street and Stawell Street. These purpose built premises replaced the much smaller rooms that the practice had occupied for over forty years next to the house of Dr. Lindsay Francis, who retires in June. At the time of the move it was felt that the new premises would serve the practice for a long time but the business grew so rapidly that the first expansion took place after only two years. The current redevelopment will double the size of the original medical centre.

NEW SKILLS

The visiting consulants will include specialists in cardiology, orthopaedics, paediatrics, surgery, ophthalmology, plastic surgery, gynaecology, rheumatology and oncology (cancer treatment). Audiology, counselling, podiatry and orthotics (surgical foorwear) will also be available on-site. The specialists will bring with them many new skills to the area, such as colposcopy (the examination for diagnosis of suspected cancer of the cervix). In the emergency suite, the practice will be able to treat a wide variety of problems including cardiac arrest and the stabilisation of trauma patients prior to their being airlifted to Melbourne.

FUTURE VISION

The Romsey Medical Centre already offers a seven day a week service with doctors on call 24 hours a day. The aim of Drs. Paul and Sally Carter, Dr. Noel Cunningham, Dr. Petrina Barson and Dr. Paul Muirden is to build upon this excellent base and provide a first-class, comprehensive, "one-stop" medical service for the residents of the Shire of Macedon Ranges. The new Medical Centre should certainly start to fulfill that dream.

OPEN DAY

To celebrate the opening of the new facility there will be an open day on Sunday, 16th July from 11.00a.m. onwards. On this day the Medical Centre will be open for public inspection and there will be demonstrations of resuscitation and First Aid procedures. It is also planned that Ambulance Services Victoria will hold an Ambulance Day at the Medical Centre. So, everyone is invited to go along to what should prove to be a most interesting visit.

individual children or small groups in their classes. Mr Hickey is continuing the special daily mathematics program that involves children from all classes thus reducing the numbers with which the class teacher is working.

As a result of School Council action, Mr Stevan Janusko (Steve) is undertaking maintenance tasks around the school. The paving he has already set in place outside the main Junior school entrance has already proven to be very successful.

Vic Kick is well under way for our aspiring young footballers every Friday night, thanks to the efforts of parents and the initiatives of Mr Sherren & Mr Rowley. Vic. Swim information has been recently distributed in each school.

Parents are asked to complete the forms & return them to allow time to plan venues & organise With all of the publicity regarding the Learning Assessment Program, a Forum was conducted to openly discuss the program. The assessment publicity certainly program confused a lot of people. The assessment was directly related to the new Curriculum & Standards Framework documentation with which all staff throughout the state are becoming familiar. The results of the testing, available early next term, will not reflect a pass or fail situation but will indicate the range in which the child's performance was recorded at that time and this will be explained to parents by staff who know the children. quiet apparent however that we all need to become far more aware that the CSF is set in ability stages which do not link numerically with the old grade structure. For example a year 6 student who was deemed as well at the stage 4 level should be very happy. Stage 4 = the expected developmental skills of grade 6

Stage 3 = Year 4 level Stage 2 = Year 2 level

Stage 1 = Prep Year level

As you can see an adjustment of thinking is required and any staff member would be more than happy to explain these changes to you. The 8 KLA'S (Key Learning Areas reflected by the Prep Year curriculum are clearly setout in the displays in those classrooms at the moment.

Education Forums are conducted on the second Wed. of the month at 7.30pm. Topics are advertised in the school newsletter & are open to all interested people.

Next month the topic will be Religious Instruction Schools. was recently surprised by the statement of a school councillor who said that more than 30 parents had approached him regarding their opposition to the half hour per week spent in Religious Education studies. would like to clarify that parents have the option to with draw their child from this program at provided written time. a cancelling the statement, permission already provided, is given to the principal. A full set of material used by the trained instructors is always available to parents. scrutinised by Please contact the Principal if you have any queries regarding this or any other program.

The school year opened with enthusiastic students who have, during these months, been involved in a wide range of curriculum activities. Specialist areas this year have seen weekly periods of Visual Arts, Music, Library Skills, Physical Education and Japanese.

Miss Hiromi Hagihara visits us each Tuesday and all students - Prep - Gr. 6 - enjoy their experience of Japanese language and culture. Parents were treated to an evening with Hiromi recently and they were delighted to meet with her and chat about a Japan that is so different from the one we imagine.

Rivalries of 1885 (do not confuse with 1995)

The following article appeared in the Romsey Examiner of Thursday, 28th August, 1884.

MURDER

Under the above heading the following paragraph appeared in last week's "PUNCH". The writer has evidently discovered something which the Romsey and Lancefield people have permitted to escape their notice........
I quote "The rivalry of neighbouring up-country towns is proverbial. Once upon a time there were two such townships, whose jealousy of one another was proverbial. They wee five miles apart (8km). The name of one was Spearfield and the other was Rumsee. The one boasted that it was the centre of Agriculture Interests, the other that it was the seat of the Shire; the one was puffed up because it was the elder and better able to make conditions; the other vaunted its advancement through commercial enterprise; the one had a brass band, the other was forthwith about to procure one, thus they lived and prospered but neither ever said 'Give me thy hand'.

Curriculum Standards

Well there was a murder committed, almost equal distant between the two townships. Greatly to the offence of Spearfield the trial was held at Rumsee. (Rumsee scored one). At this point the populace of the elder was highly indignant, and consulted together how they might avenge their wrong. Then up rose an aged SIRE in the forum (read bar parlor), a champion of many conflicts, whose grey hairs and vaunted experience had gained for him a respect equal to that of Nestor among the Greeks, and thus he spake - 'My fellow townsmen, dry your eyes! Let us not be wrath with the rapacity of these vultures; Let Rumsee have the trial; but let us take pride in claiming for ourselves the credit of the murder itself, which is by far the more glorious and honourable of distinction, that the generations unborn may hereafter know how great were the achievements of their forefathers.' Thus he spake (and Spear-acre scored). The faded laurels of Cicero were placed upon his brow as he was hailed the father of his country."

We do not know the identity of 'the father of his country', but we do know the story of the murder (not quite in accord with some of the stories extant) and 'the generations now born' will hear this in a later edition.

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
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
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Romsey & Laucefield Christian Fellowship

A-AND TALK ON ASSISTED IMMIGRATION

The first government assisted immigrants to the Port Phillip District arrived on the barque Hope in 1839. These were mostly married couples with young children who had emigrated from the United Kingdom to Sydney, but could not find work there. Governor Gipps sent them to Melbourne, where they quickly found employment. Later that year the David Clarke arrived direct from Scotland with labourers and shepherds, who obtained work at very good wages within a few days. From this small beginning - 900 assisted immigrants arrived in 1839 -- the influx reached its peak during the gold rushes with 16,318 arriving in 1854. The same year 31,895 others paid their own passage from the United Kingdom. The sale of land in Victoria funded these immigrants from the United Kingdom. Many different schemes were tried, bounties were offered, and later employers were able to pay for the passages of future employees. Private assistance was given by such organisations as Caroline Chisholm's Family Colonisation Loan Society', the Scottish 'Highland and Island Emigration Society', the Committee responsible for Irish orphan girls, and the 'Australian Emigration Association', which resulted in the Bacchus Marsh area being settled. After forty years of assisted passages to Victoria the system gradually faded out in the 1870's. Some assistance was given to migrants in the 1920's and a major revival took place after the last World War with hundreds of thousands of people being assisted to migrate from Europe The topic of assisted immigration to the Port Phillip District and the colony of Victoria will be featured at an Historical Society "Tea and Talk Evening" at the home of George and Elaine Lobb, "Woodlands", Romsey, on Friday June 30 at 7 p.m.. To assist with catering for the meal those wanting to attend this interesting evening should let the society know by June 23.. The cost of the evening is \$10 per person. 

During education week last week, Noel was honored by the Directorate of Education for his 35 years service to education. Noel and his family also have long time association with the Romsey Uniting Church which has provided another focus for Noel's service to the community. Noel also actively supports the operations of the Romsey Mechanics Institute. I have never heard Noel complain about opening or closing the hall, setting up seating or restacking tables after a function. Thankyou Noel for being one of those who really care for our country community. Congratulations on your long service award from the DSE and a sincere thankyou from those you have taught and cared for over the years.

Residents of the Macedon Ranges Shire Council can easily assist in sustaining our environment by making use of their kerbside recycling service. By placing recyclable items out for collection every week, valuable resources are conserved and the amount of waste going to landfill is reduced. Recyclable items that can be put out for collection includes paper, glass bottles and jars, aluminium cans and plastic such as "PET Rocket Bottom" soft drink bottles, clear bottles with R logo, plastic milk bottles and plastic cordial bottles.

A large proportion of the domestic waste stream comprises garden and food waste. This waste can easily be composted in the backyard. Good quality compost can be produced and thus organic matter which would otherwise be wasted or discarded can be recycled to produce a combined fertiliser, mulch material, soil improver and growth stimulator. Compost has matured and is ready to use when it has a crumbly appearance and a slightly earthy smell. The compost can then be dug into the top soil of garden beds, spread under trees and bushes as a mulch or used to make up a potting mix for house plants for seeding trays. The key to successful composting is to maintain control of temperature, moisture and odor. An alternative method to composting your food waste is to utilise earthworms. Worm farms are becoming more popular. The end product is a liquid fertiliser, high in valuable nutrients, that can be used for house plants and the garden. Compost Bins and Earthworm Farms are available at the various Offices of the Council at reasonableprices.

If you are concerned about the environment, then the best approach is to adopt the "Waste Management Hierarchy" which emphasises "REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE".

Romsey A Tidy Town?? When did you have a close look? It certainly could not have been very recently. The litter build up around the shopping centre car parks, football oval hedges and road sides clearly indicates that the standard or the amount of community pride has slipped. A community does not revolve around just one or two people who are prepared to give up their time and effort for the sake of others, it revolves around the real community concern we have for one another and our willingness to share and care. Instead of walking around that litter you will see in Romsey, embarrass someone by bending down and depositing that litter in a bin.
