

Romsey Primary School News July 1996

Congratulations are again extended to one of our staff members, Mrs Carol Hewson who has been nominated by parents for the second year in succession in the Teacher of the Year competition. This year Carol has reached the final five in the judging and we wish her well for the final result. Simply being nominated is a source of pride and reflects the ideals of the teaching profession. Carol is currently on long service leave and will return to duty next year. She has been sharing a year 1/2 class with Mrs Vicki Byrne while that teacher undertakes training in Reading Recovery. In the afternoons. Carol teaches science in the other year 1/2 classrooms to allow those staff members to undertake specialised reading and literature programs with small groups or individuals from their own classes. I would like to take this opportunity to thank those many parents and friends for their very positive support of staff and the school over the past term. With winter upon us and the demands placed upon staff for extra commitments associated with the school it is understandable for people to feel a little flat at this time of the year and so notes of encouragement and constructive comment are most appreciated. remember that staff are available for interviews at any mutually convenient time through out the year and would encourage parents to make contact with them.

Other special programs include visiting experts and performers. Recently the whole school was involved in "Destination Space" and the amount of interest generated and integrated studies associated with this space topic could be seen throughout the school. Technology, one of the eight Key Learning Areas of the school curriculum, will be the feature of this month's display of children's work in the school fover. Technology is far more than computers and calculators. Technology encourages children to solve problems, create answers, plan solutions and try out their projects to see if the criteria have been successfully met. Usually encouraged to see if small groups are then improvements can be made and provide positive fed back to the originator. Last term year 5/6 students were working individually on a complex bridge building exercise at home. Constructions were then brought to school, compared and evaluated. These models will be a feature of the Technology display. Please feel free to come in and admire the work at any time.

NEW ALCOHOL & DRUG COUNSELLOR FOR COBAW COMMUNITY HEALTH SERVICE

Alcohol and drug use is commonplace in all Australian communities. We are a drug using society - whether it be prescribed medication, a coffee to get us started in the morning, a cigarette after dinner or a beer to relax after work.

For some people, the use of alcohol or other drugs is not an issue for concern. However as the recent report of the Premier's Drug Advisory Council chaired by David Penington highlights, for others alcohol or other drug use is a significant problem.

Cobaw Community Health Service new Alcohol and Drug Counsellor, Carole Meade says she is pleased to see the issue opening up for community debate. "We need to acknowledge that the problem is widespread. The Penington report calls for creative approaches to deal with the damage done not only to individuals but also their families and the community at large"

"However we need to realise that the drug problem isn't just confined to illicit dtugs like heroin. In fact the bulk of damage done is caused by the legal drugs - alcohol and tobacco which account for almost 90% of the cost of drug abuse."

"More often than not, it is the legal drugs that we see as being acceptable that are doing the most damage in our society."

A chief aim of Cobaw's alcohol and drug service is to reduce the risk of harm when using alcohol or other drugs - whether this be not driving while intoxicated to prevent car accidents; smoking outside to prevent others from passively smoking; or using sterile needles for injecting to protect the community and self from diseases like HIV (AIDS).

In her role as Alcohol and Drug Counsellor, Carole hopes to provide the community in Kyneton, Woodend, Romsey and Lancefield with a range of services including:

counselling for individuals through a confidential, non-judgemental exploration of alcohol and drug use and the effects this has on the induvidual's life

support for family and friends who are challenged by the difficulties faced through a loved one's alcohol or drug use

information and education about the effects of alcohol and drug use and risks involved can be provided for community service providers, community groups, schools etc.

free needle & syringe exchange to minimise the risk of HIV (AIDS virus) and Hepatitis B & C to the individual and community.



FIVE MILE CREEK

The original name for Romsey, Five Mile Creek, has been commemorated with the erection of a sign bearing the name where the creek crosses the Main Street in Romsey. As settlers made their homes in the area it acquired this name, as it was five miles from the earlier settlement at Lancefield. This distance was significant in the days of travel by bullock wagons, as it was about a day's journey, and the creek would have provided a good camping place for the night. Today there are 74 Five Mile Creeks in Australia, and some 118 other landmarks, such as gullies, hills, and watering places, bearing the name. The Historical Society is very grateful to the Macedon Ranges Shire for marking this historic site.

The land around Romsey was the northern area of the Bullando Vale pastoral run taken up by John Brock about 1838 and formally leased to him in 1848. It covered about 25,000 acres and was estimated to carry 300 cattle and 12,000 sheep. A little later John Pascoe Fawkner, who held the adjoining Mooneejette run, disputed ownership of some of

Brock's land. This was finally settled by Brock buying Moonejette in 1850.

Among recent donations to the society is a large ledger containing the entries for the West Bourke and Romsey Agricultural Society shows from 1891. This is most interesting as it contains the names of those who had entries in the shows to about 1907. Some of the trophies mentioned in the book are still held by the families who won them. This book is very useful in research for the period covered. Thanks go to Mrs Betty McDonnell, Jan Thompson and Kerryn Solomon for obtaining this treasure for posterity.

The next meeting of the Historical Society will be held at 'Woodlands', the home of Elaine and George Lobb, when Robyn Poletti will speak on the Aboriginal stone quarries at Mount William. Stone from these quarries was traded far and wide throughout South-eastern Australia as it had special qualities for making implements. This should prove a most interesting evening, followed by supper around the open fire. All members and friends are welcome to enjoy this meeting, which will be held on Tuesday, 23 July at 8 p.m.
