# STATE CHAMPIONS AGAIN:


Romsey Primary School is justifiably very proud of the fact that it's korfball team has taken out the annual "State Primary School Championships" for the 2nd successive year. We are not only proud of the team, which has changed dramatically since last year, but also of Mr. Tim Rogers and Mr. John Fryer who have coached both championship teams and encourage pupil involvement with many lunchtime practices.

Korfball is the only game designed specifically for females and males to play together. It was invented in Holland 95 years ago and has been played in Australia for about 20 years.

It is a game which emphasises the skills of sportsmanship and co-operation. So much so that at junior levels the umpire/referee awards points to determine the final result of the match in three areas: game result, korfball skills, and behaviour. The winning team is the one with the highest score over 20 - not necessarily the team scoring the most goals.

Each team is made up from four boys and four girls.

A goal is scored when the ball passes through a team's basket which is inside the court and allows for scoring from all directions. There is no contact allowed, running or dribbling of the ball and the ball cannot be knocked or taken from the opponent's hand.



#### **FERTILISING**

All spring flowering annuals should be kept moving with liquid fertiliser such as Thrive or Aquasol and shrubs should be fed with a complete fertiliser. You can also apply to your hydrangea's (where blue flowers are required) Hydrangea Blueing Fertiliser. If you prefer pink blooms lime can be applied.

#### LAWNS

Weeds may be a problem in the lawn now. Broad leaf weeds can be controlled with the application of a selective herbicide. Weed & feed has two actions rolled into one. It kills broad leaf weeds and feeds your lawn at the September is an ideal month to sow new lawns. Arid lawn seed is ideal if you are looking for an evergreen lawn that is tolerant of heat and drought and will survive in most climates.

## PEST AND DISEASE CONTROL

Petal blight can be a problem on Azalea's now. If your Azalea blooms turn brown and stay on the bush, sometimes even before they have opened, this is usually the indication that you have Azalea petal blight. every two weeks over the flowering season with Bayleton.

#### BULBS

Summer flowering bulbs such as Lilliums, Dahlias and Gladioli need to be planted now.

# **VEGETABLE GARDEN**

In our cold climate we can safely plant seed potatoes now. Lettuce, onions, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, silver been can all be planted but summer crops such as tomato's need to be protected from frost. RESTORATION OF DEAN MacCULLAGH'S GRAVE

The Historical Society and the Anglican Parish of Lancefield and Romsey intend to restore the grave of Rev Dean MacCullagh in the Lancefield cemetery. He was the first Church of England minister at Lancefield, starting as a lay reader in 1863. He was ordained in 1866 and returned to the parish. The funeral of his wife was the first he conducted for his church, and he requested a move from Lancefield. He went to Bendigo where he served as Dean and Archdeacon of the Sandhurst Diocese from 1870 to 1917, and is fondly remembered for his kindness and generosity to all who came in contact with him. Dean MacCullagh returned to Lancefield each year on the anniversary of his wife's death to conduct a service at Christ Church.

The grave is a large one and in a poor state of repair. A public appeal in 1993 brought in \$160 and the Historical Society and the Anglican Vestry will share most of the cost, and a grant has been applied for from the Holsworth Cemetery Endowment Fund. This was set up by Mrs Carol Holsworth to assist in promoting the preservation, study, and appreciation of Victoria's rural cemeteries and other monuments to early colonists in rural areas. If the grant is received work can commence, but will require a little more fund raising to complete the restoration.

The Historical Society is most grateful to the organisers of the Lancefield B & S Ball for the donation received following the successful ball held at Lancefield earlier this year. The money will be used to help finance the publication of the brochures being prepared as a guide to historic sites in Romsey and Lancefield.

The September meeting of the Historical Society will be held at Seymour Cottage, 20 Palmer Street, Romsey, at 8 p.m. on 24 September.



# UPDATE ON COUNCIL'S PROPOSAL TO SPLIT OUR TOWNSHIP......

A deputation of local residents met with the Minister of Local Government and Planning, Rob MacLellan, on Wednesday, 28th August. Also present was the Head of the Local Government Board, Mr. Tony Abbot. Grant Newman and Daryl and Louise Tranter presented the petition of 520 names and letters to the Minister. The 20 minute appointment was extended to 45 minutes.

The Minister questioned and queried the motivation for Romsey people's need and commitment to having the

township in one ward.

At first the Minister's approach was to support the Commissioner's Ward decision but ultimately he confessed that there was a good case to keep townships united and in ONE WARD. However, the problem is the mechanism of change. He declared that the Macedon Ranges Shire Ward Option would be postponed to give his Local Government Board time to research our situation.

The Minister will be holding discussions with the Local Member - Mr. Tom Reynolds.

Tom Reynolds has not had community negotiations as the people had regarded this as being a Council problem. #### **EPILEPSY**

Epilepsy is a disruption of brain function that results in seizures or fits. It can affect anyone of any age, level of intelligence and ethnic group. Up to 350,000 Australians could have epilepsy though estimates Most types of epilepsy respond well to regular medication and many people become seizure free. There are numerous epilepsy syndromes and each has its own symptoms, seizure types, cause, method of diagnosis and management. There are three main types of seizures:

Tonic-clonic seizures are seizures that involve the whole brain. There is a loss of consciousness, the body stiffens and the limbs jerk. These seizures generally last one to three minutes after which the person may wish to rest or sleep.

Absence Seizures mostly affect children. These seizures also involve the whole brain and are associated with brief (up to 30 seconds) periods of loss of consciousness that may occur many times a day. Absence seizures are often mistaken for daydreaming or lack of concentration and can disrupt learning by creating gaps in information received.


Simple and complex partial seizures occur when the abnormal cell activity affects only part of the brain. These seizures can vary widely depending on which part of the brain is involved. experience stiffening or jerking of the body, a loss or distorted awareness of surroundings, unusual experience stiffening or jerking of the body, a loss or distorted awareness of surroundings, unusual feelings, tastes or smells and temporary speech impairment. The person may also be unresponsive or confused

What to do in case of a seizure:

For Tonic-clonic seizures do the following:

- Move harmful objects away. Put something soft under his/her head and shoulders. Don't put anything in his/her mouth. Don't restrain.
- 2. As soon as possible, roll the person on to his/her side to assist breathing.
- When the seizure is over the person may be confused. Reassure the person until he/she is fully aware of surroundings; speak calmly, don't restrain or try to stop activity unless such action is dangerous to self or others, stay with the person until he/she is aware of surroundings, and offer assistance to get home.

Absence seizures don't usually require any form of assistance other than reassurance when the attack is finished.



## Roaming Round Romsey:

- A special note of appreciation to the Shire grounds staff who have been mowing and cleaning up the nature strips around town. A Tidy Town can reflect the pride of its inhabitants and it is about time that we acknowledge the efforts of our locals who are maintaining the street scape. Wet roads greatly extend the area to safely stop a speeding car.

Although the patronage of Romsey residents has been insufficient to keep this commercial venture alive, we trust that the move to Woodend will be really successful. Readers only have to look at Lancefield to see for themselves what happens when services deminish and local business are not sufficiently patronised. Many country towns face the same plight. Let's all ensure that when contemplating a purchase we give the locals a go, and bear in mind the added fuel and time costs of travelling to larger centres to make the same purchases.
