

Are you really prepared?

Tragedy has struck Canberra on a magnitude similar to the Ash Wednesday Fires of 1983, some are saying that they were even worse. Fires in the North East are threatening property, fires in Lysterfield put pressure on local residents.

These are salutary lessons on what can happen in a short period of time, events that will change your life forever.

We ask the question again, "Are you prepared?"

Being prepared means having a plan that includes the very important question of whether you are going to stay and defend your home.

Research in Victoria found that the main reasons for loss of life and injuries were the lack of a

plan or failure to maintain the plan. Some reports coming out of Canberra suggest that many of the injuries occurred when people attempted to flee after the fire had almost overtaken them.

The graphic footage of that evening in Canberra clearly shows why we stress that if you are going to leave, leave early and not get caught in the open.

Remember people save houses and houses save people.

Fire Behaviour

In normal years the trigger to be alert are strong northerly winds, high temperatures and low humidity, unfortunately with such dry conditions dangerous fires can occur on relatively mild days with strong winds from any direction.

"We've had a number of fires in the region that run under a southerly wind, the nearest was in Konakaderra Road near the Deep Creek bridge" said David Allen, Group Officer of the Romsey Group. "With everything so dry it doesn't take much for a fire to take hold."

"We must be vigilant for any possible causes and question everything we do to ensure we are not responsible for any outbreak." he added.


Locals Support to the North East

Local brigade members have been providing crews to serve in the Ovens and Kiewa Valleys as fires burn in the Victorian Alps.

8 members are leaving every three days to do a day or night shift engaged mainly in asset protection in and around the towns and villages in the Victorian Alps.

Between 21/1/03 and 1/2/02 approximately 60 fire fighters will have served some time in the North East.

Romsey Group also had 3 members undertake roles in the Incident Management Team working out of the Ovens Department of Sustainability and Environment.

A new year is a little like a blank canvas. It's outcome has not been pre-determined. It is full of endless possibilities and hope.

Yet 2003 has dawned amidst a sense of anxiety and

There's the possibility (probability?) of war in Iraq. Should we be for it, against it, or completely out of it? How will the tension and conflict affect prices and the economy? Then there's the drought. We've been through drought before, but this seems to be something stronger. When will it break? How many farmers will survive? How will the reduced local supply affect prices and the economy? Related to the drought is the uncertainty over our water supply, both quantity and quality. What measures will we need to take just to survive? How will the strengthening of restrictions affect our quality of life?

Finally, along with many others, I have a child beginning school for the first time. Others will have children attendin, new schools (such as the beginning of secondary

ool) or beginning their VCE. These situations all have their share of uncertainty, of how the child (and parent) will

From the church's point of view, all of these issues are simply signs of the times. We live in a rapidly changing world. There are numerous philosophies and beliefs driving people to action. As population grows, the demand on natural resources increases. Our attempts to control our environment for our own benefit has wider implications that are only beginning to come to light.

in short, the world does have a number of problems. However, it's my belief that most of our problems are caused by people.

The existence of problems does not deny hope. Indeed, the existence of problems gives hope meaning. Hope is the belief that things can, and will, get better. It is only by confronting the source of a problem that there is any possible way forward.

My belief is that the source of the problem is human nature (greed and self-righteousness in particular). It is also my belief that the perspective needed to recognise and address this problem can only be found in God.

It is my hope that the church in 2003 will be able to point to God as the source of all wisdom and knowledge, and the hope for solutions, rather than claiming to have all the answers itself. If that happens, then we might just be seen as relevant to your world.





Rotary awarded scholarships to Tahne Walker, who will attend Assumption College, and to Julie Redmond who will attend Sacred Heart College.



The Pledges are used as a gauge of the support of the project. If for example, we receive under \$450,000 in Pledges the Project would be unlikely to proceed.

Will I receive a dividend on my investment?

The rate of return will be dependent on the support given to the new branch and the profit level achieved. One option is to pay a return on funds based on a higher interest rate than would normally be offered by, say, a term deposit. Any excess would be returned to community projects.

Letter to Mt William Ward February 2003

A Common Sense Approach

I hope 2003 has started well for you! I had a heart warming experience in Romsey one early Sunday morning in January. I popped by the skatepark to check out the litter situation, and found keen and talented skater. Daniel Van den Heuvel, and his younger brother Dean, vigorously collecting rubbish around the park and sweeping the skating surface. I discovered that they do this regularly off their own bat. It was very good to see that our combined community efforts to train youngsters to take responsibility for the park are having success. Congratulations to the boys and their parents, the committee and Liz Wynne, the Macedon Ranges Youth Officer. As with most things, it is a minority who do the wrong thing, but that's often what gets the attention. That's why I really wanted to highlight this 'good news story' - as a way of honouring the silent army of people of all ages, who not only do the right thing themselves, but cleanup after others as well. Thanks to all of you who contribute to the maintenance and care of shared community facilities. This is common sense in action!

A lot of people say to me 'it's just common sense', so I've been pondering what we all mean by this. Most agree that common sense is not as common as they'd like! Another way of looking at it is that common sense means the understanding we have in common, or our shared sense of what is right or serves the common good. To me, finding this deeply shared common understanding is vital to good decision making. It's what we're looking for when we engage in community consultation — and it's not easy to reach. I trust in our collective wisdom, when the right questions are asked and we explore a subject beyond our 'knee jerk' reactions.

It is vital that we come to a 'common sense' approach to what kind of development we allow on rural land in the Shire. The Rural Land Review and the planning scheme amendment C21 based on it, are on exhibition now. The general principles described in the review seem sound and are based on wide consultation. They rightly stress protection of the environment, particularly water and native vegetation, and of agricultural land. I'm not so sure about some of the planning controls included in the amendment to put these principles into practice. Particularly in relation to agricultural land, I think the controls are too rigid and exclude new ideas. I want to see room for innovative solutions. I asked for this frequently during the meetings with the consultants and am disappointed that examples of more creative development models from Australia and overseas were not brought to the discussion table. To me it's not whether more people live in rural areas, it's how they live. Houses can have minimal environmental impact. More people residing on good agricultural land does not mean it can't be farmed. It can mean more resources to manage land better. I agree that the C21 proposals don't address the difficulties of our farmers whose land is becoming uneconomic to farm. Is this fair? Do we want only very rich people to live on farms? There needs to be a lot of debate about this so please examine these documents and discuss them widely. It's important for all of us, not just those who live in the rural zones. Please express your views. You can get together and write group submissions. Please let me know if you think there should be further meetings.

The drought is worsening and the Council's **Drought Relief/ Recovery Committee**, which includes local farmers and reps from the VFF, Rural Counseling Service, Victoria Police, Department of Primary Industry, is continuing its work to ensure everything possible is done to help farmers and others affected. The committee has recommended not applying at this stage to the Federal Government for Exceptional Circumstances. This may seem strange until you discover how huge a task this application process is and how unlikely it is that Macedon Ranges would

qualify. We will be expressing loud and clear that a regional approach should be taken and State Government should be the leaders, not local.

Romsey residents will be aware that **stage three water restrictions** are now in place. It's good to see that Western Water are actively increasing the water supply to Romsey and that, while restrictions are an unfortunate necessity for this very low rainfall period, our towns are not facing the plight of places such as Kilmore, Broadford and Wallan where water is being trucked in.

Some further work has been done to present the **Macedon Ranges Vision 2025** in a beautiful and meaningful way and to develop it further in the ways people suggested in their responses. 'The 2025 Vision 'promise' is really a broad statement of what we want this area to be like into the future and a call to us all to work on making it and keeping it true. The word 'promise' here is used to mean something the whole community deeply aspires to. The vision says:

<u>Our Promise</u>: We are a vibrant and sustainable region that deeply values our community, heritage and environment, providing a fulfilling quality of life for all.

Our Values

Awareness: We are aware of the attributes and potential of our region

Rich Fabric: Our character is a unique tapestry of People, Heritage and Nature.

Our Home: This area provides everything that we need to live the life we want

Deep Connection: It is a part of us and we are a part of it

These broad statements ring true to me from many things that people have said to me over the last three years. There a many commitments contained in this promise, commitments which I share. Commitments to sustainability, to valuing community, to valuing our heritage, to caring for the wellbeing of all members of our community, to the richness of diversity, to working together to provide what we all need to live well.

We have the vision 2025. It is the beginning of creating the future we want. There are many further steps to build on this foundation. For instance Community Planning for local townships. I want to see each community create a plan for their township and district, describing what is locally valued and priorities in terms of design, development, facilities and services for YOUR town. All the big issues will fit somewhere in this planning approach. For example, gas supply, passing lanes on the Melbourne road, a secondary school for Romsey, a standing library, community transport.

So, with these things and many others in mind, I've decided I will be nominating for the elections in March. It has been be a privilege to represent the Mt William community on Council. I would like to continue to work with the Council and the community for a common sense approach to everything we do in the Macedon Ranges.

ROMSEY-LANCEFIELD CENTENNIAL TRACK

At 12 o'clock on Australia Day, 2003, Mrs. Jean Tom, our President, officially handed the Track over to our Mayor Geoff Neil on behalf of the Macedon Ranges Shire who will now be responsible for the track's maintenance and on-going improvements. This means that the job of the committee is now finished.

Towards the end, our committee numbered eight - Jean Tom, Leo Vandervalk, Vice President, Trevor Turnham, Treasurer, Heather Turnham, Beryl Cole, Charlie Smith and Joan Sparkes and myself. We have spent the funds we raised with the last act being the placing of the seats along the track and the signage which is being organized by the Shire and will be in place soon.

A large crowd attended, many who had been invited as a small thank you for their help in making this magnificent track a reality, and when I looked back on my rather large file of correspondence and copies of press release, I realized just how many people we had called on to help, and all at the drop of a hat, and all the families who had donated \$20 to purchase cury for keeping the momentum going. a metre of track.

It all started with a public meeting in August, 1998, when a small crowd of local representatives from various organizations attended with the view of coming up with an idea to mark the Centenary of Federation in 2001. We eventually came up with the idea of a Bike/Fitness Track between Romsey and Lancefield, thus joining the two historic towns whilst providing a safe venue to keep fit or just to have a quiet walk!

We applied for a \$30,000 grant from the Centenary of Federation Committee which we got, then secured another major grant of some \$46,000 from the Department of Sport & Recreation, applied for every grant ever advertised and asked the people of the district to become a part of the project and buy a metre of track - this was very well subscribed to and made people feel they were a part of our project.

We then got on with the job of hands on fundraising and keeping the public interested in the project and my committee would just like to thank the people who helped us along the way.

The need for equestrian facilities will be monitored, however, it is requested that horse riders use the mown strip alongside the track.

The necessary signage will be erected at the completion of the project reminding users of this. We ask the community to monitor this situation and the police have kindly offered to keep a friendly eye on the use of the track.

WHY WE MUST BACK OUR COMMUNITY BANK

Romsey residents have a great opportunity to join more than 80 communities around Australia in establishing a communityowned and operated branch of the Bendigo Bank.

Most residents would have heard of the public meeting we held last June to get the project off the ground, and no-one could have failed to see the street banners, Saturday morning stalls, letterbox information or the bright red thermometer in the main street charting our progress as we work towards the \$400,000 in pledges we needed to take the first step. After an initial flurry of pledges, our total has reached a plateau over the past couple of months, at around \$180,000 from some 60 Romsey residents and businesses.

It is perhaps timely to remind residents why we need a Community Bank branch, and to reiterate that a branch is not a gift—if we want one we have to meet certain criteria to demonstrate our support.

Why?

A community-owned and operated branch gives us the opportunity to "bank-proof" our town. If we get it up and running, and provide it with enough custom to make it profitable, we keep it. It's as simple as that. If we support it with our business, it will always be there when we want it in Romsey. But residents have to make their pledge to make this happen.

The big banks work to a different agenda. We saw our Commonwealth branch close at the end of June. We saw Lancefield which had two banks in the 1990's suddenly left with one. Lancefield has now "bank-proofed" its town by working as a community to get a Beridigo Bank Community Branch. We in Romsey have the chance to do exactly the same, and to be in charge of our own financial destiny.

Your pledge indicates your intention to buy shares in Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services Ltd, the community company established to operate the Lancefield branch. If we're successful, our expanded community-owned company will operate both branches. Under the Community Company concept, the branches operate as full branches of the Bendigo Bank. They provide the full range of services of a Bendigo branch, and deposits and all other business have the same level of protection as the Bendigo's own branches.

But there are some differences in how Bendigo Bank Community Bank operates. They operate like banks used to.

When was the last time you were able to do your banking on a Saturday morning? When was the last time you spoke to a bank manager without having to phone through to Melbourne? When was the last time you had an appointment with a bank manager who came to your home or business without having to go to a Melbourne office?

You will be able to do all of these things right here in Romsey if we get a Community Bank going.

Many people will have already come face-to-face with the energetic manager at Lancefield, Rod Browning. If we get our Romsey branch up and running Rod will manage both and will be co-located in both towns.

Many of our local business people are already familiar with Rod. He visits Romsey and walks down the main street, and calls in

and visits traders. He knows our community. He can make decisions without having to refer everything to head office, and if potential clients have their documentation together, he can approve home loans and business loans on the spot.

You can also see him on Saturday mornings, when the branch is open for business.

What are the other advantages?

Under the Bendigo Bank's Community Bank concept, a proportion of profits go back into projects of local community benefit. A percentage of profits go to Bendigo Bank, a proportion is distributed to our local shareholders, and then the community benefits. Some of the other towns which have Community Banks have already distributed significant funds. In other communities welfare, sports and community groups have benefited, funds have been directed to providing infrastructure to improve their towns, and grants and projects have stimulated local business and the encouragement of professional services. The sky's the limit

Romsey residents who work in Melbourne will be a key part of our bank. They won't have to come through the door to be a part of it. As long as their accounts are domiciled at Lancefield or Romsey, business conducted at Bendigo's Melbourne branches or at the ATM's or branches of other banks, counts as our local business, and contributes to our profit.

Bendigo also has a very advanced electronic banking system, and accounts can be opened via the Internet.

So what can you do?

As the Lancefiled branch has demonstrated the Community Bank is a wonderful concept, and enables towns to "bank-proof" themselves and be in control of their future. But it doesn't just happen. It's not a gift. If we're to get a Community Bank branch in Romsey, we have to work for it, and demonstrate to Bendigo that we want it. That means putting up \$400,000 in pledges to get to first base. Pledge forms have been mailed around the town. handed out at the street stalls and attached to the Romsey rag.

If YOU make a pledge to our Community Bank, our Romsey Community Bank Steering Committee will make a pledge to you. If the community reaches the \$400,000 target in pledges, and fulfils the requirements which follow for a sustainable business plan and the successful filling of shares. We will pledge the 'bank-proof' Romsey and ensure the town always has a bank. The Romsey Community Bank branch of the Bendigo Bank.



Events	Events conducted during the spring/summer Track & Field season can include sprints, middle distance, shotput, discus, javelin, long jump, triple jump, high jump and hurdles events depending on the athletes age. Cross country events are distance races varying in length according to the athletes age and are run over autumn/winter.	
Training	Skill development coaching is offered during competition meets to all new athletes, and also at scheduled training events to all athletes who are interested in improving. Training/coaching over the school holiday period is only by prior arrangement with Centre Coaches. Training is usually run each Friday (5pm—6pm) unless otherwise advised. When training is on, our Centre sign will be on display at the corner of Barry Street and Main road in Romsey.	
Opportunities	We have a number of special centre days including Novelty day, Championship days where athletes can win medals (Centre Track & Field, Centre Multi-Event, Interclub Challenge Day versus Kilmore Little Athletics Centre) and our end of season function, Presentation Day. All special Centre days are focused on family involvement. Activities outside the Centre are at additional cost and include Region and State Championships, as well as Open Days at other Centres.	
Parent Help	Parents are needed each week for a variety of simple tasks. No experience is necessary. Each week all Centre volunteers receive free entry into the bi-annual prize draw at Centre level, as well as free entry into two Statewide draws for a chance to win a \$500 voucher at a store of the winner's choosing.	
Awards	There are still two Centre Championship days to be held where our athletes will vie for medals. Every athlete who participates regularly will receive at least one medal on Presentation Day. Most annual centre trophies are awarded based on athlete participation, sportsmanship, and improving personal best times, so that every child has an equal chance to win at season end. In addition, we offer weekly encouragement awards to athletes who participate and try hard.	
Costs	Registartion fees include all Centre activities such as special family days, coaching, competition and champion- ships, weekly and annual awards, Centre Information Booklet, weekly newsletters and importantly, insurance. This season fees are \$65 for one child, \$130 for two, \$160 for three and \$190 for four children (from the same family).	
Uniform	Uniform is optional unless competing against other centres, at Open Days or Championships at outside Little Athletics venues—Centre shirt (\$15), plain black shorts or sports briefs, suitable running shoes. Most children compete in suitable clothing they already have, such as shorts, T-shirts, runners and a tracksuit for cooler days. Athletes are encouraged to wear a hat and sunscreen and carry a drink bottle to all events. All uniform items are available by order from the Centre.
