BUSINESSES BACK OUR COMMUNITY BANK

Romsey shops and businesses are proudly showing their support for the project to open a Bendigo Community Bank Branch in our town.

Romsey Community Bank Steering Committee chair Maurenn Wiltshire and other committee members have been presenting laminated certificates to businesses and shopkeepers who have put up their hands and made a pledge to the project.

"I urge local residents to look for these certificates, and support the shops and businesses that are supporting our community. Our local businesses are the best ambassadors for our own Romsey Community Bank. Many of them are already Community Bank customers through the Lancefield branch, and can testify to the benefits of having a local bank committed to the local community. A locally-based manager who understands local business and community needs is an added bonus."

Mrs Wiltshire urged residents and businesses who had not yet signed a pledge to take up shares in a Romsey Community Bank branch to do so without delay.

"I encourage everyone to follow the example set by the businesses which are displaying our certificates, and make a positive commitment with a pledge," she said. "Community Bank branches are owned and operated by community shareholders. We make the business decisions. Mrs Wiltshire said that \$171,200 had been pledged so far towards a target of \$400,000 needed to go to the next stage of the project—an independent feasibility study on potential business levels.

Pledge boxes and forms are also available at the Romsey Bakery, IGA Supermarket, Southside Service Station, the butchery, The Clay Coffee Shop and the newsagency. In Lancefield there is a box at the Community Bank at 20B High Street, or pledges can be mailed to the Bank at that address.



Student Leadership at Romsey Primary School

The development of student leadership at all levels at Romsey Primary School is an area of great focus throughout the year. While we have peak representative bodies and positions for our students, nonetheless, there are real and meaningful leadership roles for all students.

Every week all classes have a *grade meeting* where students are able to voice concerns, raise issues and offer suggestions. In most classes students are able to chair these meetings with all students being given the opportunity to assume this role during the year.

Additionally there are other roles such as Peer Mediation, where students are empowered to assist others sort out their minor problems in the playground. Training in becoming an active listener, negotiator and mediator are really useful life skills. All classes are linked with buddy grades where students of different ages under-

take activities to enjoy each other's company, help each other and on occasions develop special projects within the school. One such project last year was where a 5/6 class and Prep grade developed, designed and helped implement our new environmental habitat area *Honeyeater Haven*.

School Captains

Each year students are invited to nominate for the position of School Captain. School Captains are selected through the presentation of a written application responding to selection criteria, an interview with principal and assistant principal, and through the school contacting referees. The school captains are expected to be highly responsible, loyal, articulate, be able to represent the school and students on particular occasions, and undertake one or more special project throughout the year.

This year the school is happy to announce that our school captains for 2003 are Caitlin Whelan and Josh Ellis.



Junior School Council

Our Junior School Council meets weekly. Representatives are drawn from all middle and senior grades, with students allocated to report to, and draw ideas and suggestions from all junior classes. Junior School Council reports to our full School Council each month through two representatives coming to each of these meetings. Junior School Council is expected to represent student opinion and forward ideas and suggestions for the improvement of the school. Junior School Councilors are also expected, along with all students, to live and demonstrate our school values of caring, learning, relationships, inclusion, and happiness. Ideas form Junior School Council in the past have led to upgrades of our outside equipment, the installation of the school's second sandpit and the development of the soccer pitch and installation of the soccer goals.

Our elected Junior School Councilors for 2003 are:



Macedon Ranges Seniors Citizen Celebrate Victorian Seniors Festival



As this goes to press, men's division 3 are in there with a chance at 5th on the ladder and 2 weeks to go.



BOLINDA PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

Welcome back to another year of information and happenings around Bolinda Primary School. For those readers that don't know us, let briefly introduce Bolinda to you. We are situated on the Romsey-Lancefield Road just south of the Monegeetta store in Mulalys Road. We are a small school of 57 children (having grown from 24 just 6 years ago), with a total of 8 staff who work varying times during the course of the week. We are also able to help those children who may require additional assistance.

Our 7 new Preps have started their school life with enthusiasm and are extremely happy to join in the activities of their new school and join in with all the children in the different playground activities. One of the magical things about a rural school is seeing children of all ages mixing in together and learning to get along with each other. The new preps particularly love collecting the eggs from the school chooks every day along with their teachers Mrs. Julie Cooke and Mrs. Lorraine Lee.

Grades 3, 4, 5 and 6 all went to the wonderful production of The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe at the State Theatre. We thank TELSTRA for their assistance of an Arts Grant that helped defray costs to each family. Some of the comments from the children are worth noting, "a great performance", "a fantastic piece of fantasy drama", " a magical story", "the show was spectacular", "it was excellent", "go and see it!", "I loved it!", "5 stars", "one of C.S.Lewis's most marvelous books on Earth!". Do you think children can appreciate live theatre and classic stories ????

The whole school will be joining with Clarkefield and Darraweit Guim in a few weeks for our annual Athletic Sports day, where again the children will mix in with others as part of the process of learning to participate and enjoy activities in a happy environment.

On March 21st we as a school will take part in Harmony Day. This day coincides each year with the United Nations International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. On Harmony Day we think about the different cultures of the world and the people who have come to Australia from different lands with different languages that contribute to our community. The theme for Harmony Day is YOU + ME = US.

The Children's Fundraising Committee which comprises four Grade 6 students, have decided to have their first activity in support of the East Timor Eye Project. The special day is called "National Sunnies for Sight Day", where children can wear their sunglasses or make extra special decorative sunnies. For every \$5 raised, a child can have an eye examination, get a pair of suitable glasses and gain the enjoyment of learning to read and have a successful education.

All schools have workers behind the scenes, and often during the holidays, that help the school in ways that everyone doesn't see and don't necessarily know about. People who water gardens, clean out chook pens, sweep pathways, check out water pumps, cut grass, lay out new garden beds, check spouting, mend desks, wash tables and a lot of other little jobs that just have to be done. In a small school like ours, people just tend to jump in and help where and when they can. We have also had our major "Back to School" working bee where a lot of work was done around the school which all helps to make the place just a little more pleasant and enjoyable for children to come along each day. Thank you to all the helpers.

For those people who are regular readers of our news, the chooks and cats are all well, having survived the holidays where again we had willing volunteers each day to come to school and feed the "stock"!! Special thanks to all concerned.

Far from over...

A number of national and world events, including the possibility of war in Iraq, peace marches and the playing future of cricketer Shane Warne, have all swayed the media's focus and attention away from the current North East and Gippsland fires. For more than three weeks, the fires headed TV and radio news bulletins. The size and impact of the fires have rallied community support and appreciation for CFA and the agencies that have played a key role in combating this state emergency.

"I have no doubt that there is now a perception in the wider community that the campaign fires are all but over. As you are well aware, that's not the case. In fact, our current CFA commitment remains very significant. We still have more than 700 people involved. This includes hundreds of fire fighters, regional staff, infrastructure support and members who are part of Incident Management Teams. All up, almost 3000 people remain directly involved in the fires. Let's not also forget that we continue to daily combat significant fires and other incidents across the rest of the state." said Neil Bibby CFA's Acting CEO. "Over the coming weeks, there will remain a major CFA commitment to these fires and therefore a huge demand on people and resources. That means that CFA will continue to rely on the goodwill and flexibility of both self- employed volunteers, and employers, to continue the commitment to the resourcing required for the remainder of this long fire season," he added

Over the past month the Romsey Group has had 15 people rotated through Gippsland, some of these members on their second and third trip. Overall around 60 members have spent time either in the northeast or recently in Gippsland. The tasks undertaken have been many and varied ranging from crewing tankers, leading strike teams, divisional commanders, working in incident management teams as resource officers, logistics officers, planning and incident control

As you can see there is more to fighting fires than jumping on fire trucks and rushing off.

Brigades are always looking for new members including those who may never want to jump on a fire truck. If you are interested drop into the fire station on any Sunday morning around 10:00 am.

Common Sense!

I believe that deep down we agree about what really matters. That's what I want to find and work with as a Councillor, the common ground we share, the common ground which is common sense.

Romsey-Lancefield Seniors Club

It was lovely to visit this flourishing club recently and meet the people who enjoy each others company there each week. The group were keen to explain some of their access issues in getting in and out of the club and around the town. The good news is that the third pedestrian refuge opposite the club will be built by the Shire very soon. We have had difficulty getting a contractor to do this small job but that is all sorted out now. Also good news is that a solution has been found for the high gutter outside the bakery and chemist. The road will be built up, temporarily at first, to reduce the height of the step. A proper job will be done when the road is next resealed. Solutions for access into the

club rooms will be discussed via the Shire's new Disability Advisory Group. This group is interested to hear from any resident who is having difficulty accessing services in the Macedon Ranges. Contact Angie Lausell, the community development officer at the Shire.

'Conveniences' near Skatepark may collect own electricity and water!

A sustainable approach is being considered in supplying the new toilets near the skatepark with water and electricity. The Lions club will start building the vandal-resistant building soon and costings are being done to work out whether money saved by not connecting to the grid could fund a solar system. New systems exist

now for this type of location and the benefits would be ongoing electricity savings as well as contributing to a cleaner atmosphere. A water tank may also be installed, or if funds are short, at least provision made for one, so that it can be easily added when more funds are available.

The Big Dry goes on.... Every drop of water is precious

A Western Water spokesperson recently described the water situation in Romsey as 'extreme'. The situation is covered for now by the temporary bore which is supplying about half of Romsey's water. The new pipeline is being urgently built from both ends and will make 70 megalitres of water available. Once the pipeline is open, 30 megalitres will be transferred to local storage for greater security of supply. Restrictions will not ease until the weather breaks and may be increased, if usage remains too high. So water your gardens with care and follow all the 'water wise' tips! A drought relief information sheet is available from all Shire service centres. If you need help, don't wait too long.

Retaining the Unique Character of Romsey

The Heritage Overlays of the planning scheme are being reviewed, which should help to protect the environment around heritage buildings. Romsey also needs neighbourhood character studies and township design guidelines soon as possible. I am making it very clear to Council that Romsey needs these studies to protect its character from inappropriate development.

Rural Planning

It is vital that we come to a 'common sense' approach to what kind of development we allow on rural land in the Shire. I don't believe that the draft rural amendment currently on exhibition is the best and fairest solution. We need many submissions from people who would be affected. These will all contribute to coming up with a better way to retain agricultural land in useful parcels and to have enough people living in rural areas to manage land well. Please call me and/or the Shire planning department if you want to talk about the Rural Land Review and the planning scheme amendment C21. The time

for putting in submissions has been extended to March 21st.

What's News

The imminent (as I write this) war with Iraq is dominating our news. Either it's the latest find by the UN weapons inspectors, or some new deployment of troops, or a pronouncement by George Bush (or Tony Blair or John Howard or even Saddam Hussein) or some other government official, or a large scale protest somewhere in the world.

No matter where we turn, we find mention of Iraq and war. But what has it got to do with us? Sitting here in Romsey, are we going to be affected by what does, or doesn't, happen half a world away?

Whether we like it or not, the conflict in Iraq does impact on us. At a fundamental level, petrol prices will be affected one or way or another. Then there are any locals who are a part of the military, or the families and friends of military personnel. And then there are issues of world stability and possible threats against our country.

Most of the people I speak to seem to have an opinion on this issue. They may not be rabidly passionate, but there are still strong feelings. And even the oft-quoted public opinion poll had only 2% or respondents with no opinion.

My faith is about life and affirming life. The reality of war is life denying for many people, including civilians. However, oppression and threats are also life denying, forcing people to live in fear. For those who remember *Strictly Ballroom*, 'A life lived in fear is a life half lived.'

So what are we to do? Whilst many people want to wait as long as possible, to give the maximum opportunity for a diplomatic solution, I want a peaceful and stable solution as soon as possible. I hate conflict, and would prefer that there is no war, and I think that most people would support that. My current struggle is to consider whether that is realistic or not.


