
Romsey Primary School News

Garden Award Win

It was recently announced that Romsey Primary School was again a regional winner in the school garden awards. Our region covers a huge area of Victoria from Gisborne to Mildura taking in the districts of Bendigo, Echuca and Swan Hill. The Garden Awards don't just take into account general appearance but consider student involvement; parent, teacher and community involvement; evidence of new plantings; other special features such as vegetable gardens and hot houses and ground facilities. Over the past year the school has developed a number of areas that not only enhance the appearance of the school but also add to the positive learning experiences of our students. In caring for our environment students are encouraged to "think globally and act locally" in enhancing our facilities and immediate environs. A number of our major projects have included:

Frog Pond Garden

This project resulted from our successful submission with the Junior Landcare Project and is supported by Mitre 10. This project is now fully planted out with a range of indigenous trees, shrubs, grasses and water plants. We have two frog ponds and a linking path featuring a dry creek bed and small bridge. The area is fully landscaped and should become home to a number of small native animals as well as the frogs.



Honeyeater Haven


The Honeyeater Haven project was developed from work done with senior and junior buddy classes. The students developed the idea of developing a part of the school grounds that were to be planted with native bird attracting trees, shrubs and grasses. A path and outside passive learning area with circular bench seating was installed. Both the Frog Pond Garden and Honeyeater Haven areas are adjacent to the school library and are a natural extension to this learning area.

Vegetable Gardens

All junior classes are currently busy planting out the school vegetable gardens. These raised beds have been helped along with rotted compost and stable manure from supportive Romsey families. The school vegetable garden area also has had installed a wonderful hot house that will help the school with propagation for future plantings.

Sensory Gardens

The garden areas between the main buildings have bee completely refurbished this year. One garden bed has been developed as a sensory garden, while other parts of this area will reflect the changing seasons and add colour throughout the year. Again students were active helpers in planting out these areas led by our active parent gardening group. A feature of these gardens has been the addition of a school totem pole painted and designed by students. This artistic installation documents our school values.



School Camps

During October both the Middle Unit (Years 3&4) and Senior Unit (Years 5&6) have been away on school camp. The Middles travelled to Anglesea, visiting the Marine Discovery Centre at Queenscliff along the way. This camp combined a number of marine studies along with adventure activities. All children (and teachers and parent helpers) came back tired but very happy to have taken part in such a great educational experience. At the time of writing, the 5/6 classes are at Philip Island for their fourday camp. We look forward to their stories of the great experiences they have had with the camp focussing on adventure activities.

Music Trivia Night

The recent Music Trivia night was a great success for the school with close to 120 parents and friends of the school coming along to test their musical knowledge as well as have a lot of fun together. This event was organised by our wonderful parent club and helped raise over \$2000 for our school students.


Litter Free Lunch Challenge

Representative students recently attended an award ceremony for the school's achievement for the Litter Free Lunch Challenge. At a ceremony at the Melbourne Museum, we were presented with a cheque and framed certificate by Minister of Educational Services, Jacinta Allen. During the challenge students were able to reduce rubbish by an amazing 70%. Throughout the year our Junior School Council has worked as an improvement team in reducing the litter in the schoolyard. By empowering the students to study the current situation, develop a theory for improvement and then implement the changes and study the results, students have developed a greater sense of ownership for the school environment and are taking better care of this aspect of our school. Improvements recommended and implemented have been the number and placement of bins, the availability of some items from the school canteen, the allocation of parts of the schoolyard for class groups, and the monitoring of yard litter by the students with results announced at Monday assembly.


Athletics

COUNCIL NEWS

"WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE AND ALL THE BOARDS DID SHRINK WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE NOR ANY DROP TO DRINK"

From the Rhyme of the Ancient Mariner.

After 7 years of below average rainfall we are facing an urgent challenge to secure a sustainable water supply NOT only for now but also for our future. We have the driest continent and yet we are the biggest water users.

CSIRO research suggests our climate is likely to become even drier therefore we need to find ways to use LESS WATER. Currently in Victoria, over 270 towns are on water restrictions and our reservoirs are at their lowest levels in more than a decade.

The recent rainfall has helped to recover some reservoirs in the Macedon Ranges region. Romsey has had good runoff in its catchment and the Kerrie reservoir is over 70% full.

Nevertheless the region will remain on restrictions until Western Water is confident that the water storages have fully recovered from the drought.

Romsey derives its water from 3 sources

- (a) Surface runoff
- (b) Supply piped from Riddell
- (c) Bore

Lancefield relies solely on bores and storage tank.

Just as a point of interest the Rosslynne reservoir at Gisborne remains a low 11% (at the end of August).

As you can see the drought is far from over. Western Water is the responsible authority for our water needs.

Western Water Board Chairman, Terry Larkin has put security of the regions water supply at the top of the agenda for ensuring sustainable growth in the Macedon Ranges.

Western Water's corporate plan focuses on social, environment and economic responsibilities with emphasis on ensuring a secure supply for the region.

This year Western Water has introduced two new water conservation programs and will continue to invest significant resources over the coming months to ensure capacity to meet the demands of the regions future population growth. Some of the key challenges for Western Water are –

- Providing for the water and waste water infrastructure needs of the fast growing region.
- Delivering on the organisations commitment to recycle 100% of waste water by 2006; and
- Ensuring future changes to water pricing would be implemented fairer with regards to the needs of all customers

Western Water recently completed a \$1 million upgrade to its waste water purification plant at Romsey, which will ensure plenty of capacity to treat wastewater and store recycled water from the region for the next 20 years.

The upgrade included construction of 2 new treatment lagoons plus a massive winter storage lagoon for treated recycled water.

The winter storage lagoon will ensure that Western Water can hold recycled water during the wet season, when it is not needed for irrigation purposes. It is the size of a soccer field so future storage of this valuable resource will be assured.

Western Water would soon be assessing the tender applications to construct an irrigation system to supply recycled water to the fields around the Romsey plant.

The Romsey farm was recently leased to Salesian College of Sunbury for use as a recycled water irrigated demonstration farm, enabling agriculture students to learn more about recycled water and sustainable farming techniques.

This new system will include very large centre pivot spray with an irrigating diameter of over a kilometre and will be connected to the winter storage lagoon for use in the growing season.

For your information:

Western Water is injecting \$16.5 million into projects in the Macedon Ranges region.

All projects are designed to improve our water supply and wastewater services to you. The following works and investigations will be completed or commenced over the next year.

In addition to these projects, Western Water is spending \$260,000 and \$180,000 across our service area in 2003/04 to upsize existing sewer trunk mains and water mains respectively, and \$130,000 and \$540,000 on replacing existing sewer lines and water mains respectively.

Green Paper for a sustainable future

The Victorian Government recently launched a Green Paper for state water reform that outlines over 80 proposals to protect and manage our long term water supplies.

The Green Paper, titles Securing our Water Future, will form the basis of community discussion ahead of new legislation to be introduced next year.

Key to the plan is ensuring that water is used more efficiently in everyday life, through reducing the amount of water used, and reusing the recycling wherever possible.

Proposals in the Green Paper include:

- Encouraging an efficient and accountable water sector that fosters innovative ways to manage water and deliver diverse water services;
- Establishing pricing principles that reward water conservation and better reflect the costs associated with the provision of water services;
- Permanent water restrictions for regional towns;
- Requiring all new housing developments to achieve water savings of at least 25% through implementing recycled water systems, rainwater tanks and/or stormwater reuse;
- Establishing consistent arrangements for whole of catchment waterway management and strengthening the Catchment Management Authorities role as caretakers of river health; and
- Increasing the use of recycled water for industry, agriculture and environmental uses.

The Green Paper is available to download from the Department of Environment and Sustainability (DSE) website at www.dse.vic.gov.au All Victorians are being encouraged to contribute to the discussion, via public meetings or submission forms available from the DSE website.

In the Romsey Vegie Garden By Brussell Sprout

Spring is in the air, quick, better weed the vegie patch and get cracking!




It is too early to plant most summer vegetables (unless you can protect them from frost). Jackie French suggests not to plant summer vegetables until the ground is warm enough to sit on with your bare bottom!

Potatoes can be planted now. Certified seed potatoes which are disease free are recommended. There are varieties to suit different cooking methods. Try Kipfler – nutty flavour, excellent boiled, steamed and in salads (my favourite), Bintje – buttery flavour, excellent for boiling, steaming and frying, Sebago- a good all purpose potatoes, and Desiree – creamy, buttery flavour, excellent for boiling, steaming, roasting and salads. Growing potatoes is an excellent way to create a new garden bed with no digging involved! Simply cut the grass or weeds very short, place the seed potatoes on the ground and cover with straw, manure and compost to create the multilayered 'sandwich effect'. The pile should be as high as your knee as it will decrease in height as the organic matter breaks down. Water and leave it alone. You may need to add extra

straw around the plants later on. Potatoes must not see sunshine because they turn green. Feel underneath the pile during summer to see if watering is needed.

Peas can be planted now. We prefer climbing peas for a higher yield in less space. Peter

Cundall suggests the soil to be limed, with good drainage, organic matter, and a few handfuls of blood and bone mixed through.



Tomatoes !!! I'm never organised to grow tomatoes from seed. Instead, seedlings are purchased in punnets and planted into tree

tubes or very small pots and placed in a sunny spot during the day and put under cover at night. These plants are treated very badly with only enough water to keep them alive and no fertilizer (Peter Cundall adds a pinch of sulphate of potash). This harsh treatment forces the plant to flower early and the sooner the flower the sooner the fruit. Once flowered, treat the plant kindly with a liquid fertilizer. The plant might need repotting before it is time to go into the ground (remember the bare bottom) and beware of the late frost.

If you have children, consider growing cherry tomatoes, they ripen early and can be grown in a large pot on the porch. Yellow Pear is another small fruit with the same qualities as cherrys and add colour to the salad. Rouge de Marmande is an




early ripening fruit with a fleshy centre. Black Russian is purplish when ripe with an interesting flavour, and of course the Grosse Lisse. Due to the water restrictions last year, our tomatoes, which were heavily mulched, were lucky to be watered once a

week – we received our largest yield. It is too early to mulch, the ground needs to warm up first.

Be prepared for the change in the weather when you feel that the frosts have finished for the year and it is full steam ahead with summer crops. Weed beds and apply compost and old manures.



Members all over the State knit, sew, send clothes, kindergarten goods, school and sewing aids, and money to cover the cost of dispatch. All are sorted and packed to go the most suitable recipient. Blankets, toiletries, warm clothing, knitted garments are sent to groups such as Hanover Welfare Services. and to Sister Anne and the other nuns who run a refuge in Preston. Sister Anne also has a van in the city to support homeless youth. Hospitals are supplied with premature baby clothing and other goods, Vic Relief receives blankets and other support, and Leprosy Mission Australia is sent specially knitted bandages.

Boxes of materials, sewing aids, kindergarten aids are sent to our fellow members of the Associated Country Women of the World in Fiji, P.N.G., Tonga, Tuvalu, Nuie, Kiribati, Samoa and the Solomons. The Association has offered to help fund a woman from the Solomons to attend the ACWW World Conference in Hobart in March 2004.

The outreach work of our Association is very important and we have been fortunate in the Romsey Branch to have had two members now who have been State International Officers: Wendy Laing 1991-1993, and Elaine Baldwin 2001-2003. Branch members are encouraged to work and be knowledgeable about the international side and work of the Association.

Locally, the Branch has supported Romsey Red Cross, Romsey CFA, Romsey Artists Group, Lancefield Neighbourhood House, Kyneton Hospital, and local welfare.


News from the Romsey Kindergarten Inc.







LANCEFIELD BUSH NURSING HOSPITAL

Lancefield Bush Nursing Hospital was closed 1996. The Board and Committee Members agreed to allocate the funds raised from the sale of the hospital, land and equipment, to assist Rural Ambulance Victoria's submission to the Victorian Government to construct a new ambulance station in the area.

After a long struggle and a few changes of government, Rural Ambulance Victoria (with the aid of the Romsey-Lancefield Ambulance Auxiliary) were given approval by the Victorian Government, for a new ambulance station to be constructed in Romsey and this was eventually completed and manned at the end of 2002.

We were very happy to learn that the entire project was fully funded by the Government, leaving funds from the Lancefield Hospital to be distributed in the community.

At a Special General Meeting held on 1st May, 2003, the Board and Committee Members agreed to dispose of the assets of the Hospital as follows:-

- 1. To fund the purchase of a Transport Vehicle for the Romsey Ambulance Station with replacements to cover approximately ten years of service total \$110,000
- 2. To purchase Mobile Intensive Care Equipment for the Romsey Ambulance Station at a cost of \$14,800
- 3. To supply Cobaw Community Health Service Physiotherapy and Hydrotherapy unit with much needed equipment to the value of \$15,326;-
- The balance of funds to go to the construction of the new Kyneton Hospital this amounted to \$60,217.59 which
 was handed over to Brendan Lourey, C.E.O. of Kyneton Hospital at a presentation ceremony held on Thursday, 7th
 August, 2003.

Total: \$200343.59

At a ceremony held at the Romsey Ambulance station on Thursday, October 2nd, Dr Noel Cunningham, president of Lance-field Bush Nursing Hospital, handed over the transport vehicle and mobile intensive care equipment to Mr Doug Kimberley, C.E.O. of Rural Ambulance Victoria, thus expending the last of the funds raised by the sale of the hospital. We thank all residents for their support over the past few years.





Monegeetta Ward

Water is always an issue that is frequently in the media and not far from our minds. People have always used the weather, how dry ,wet, cold or hot it is, as an' ice breaking' topic of conversation. The state government recently released their green paper on water management in Victoria. Submissions need to be in by the end of November. I will certainly lodge one as I am not satisfied that the state government is listening to local councils on water issues, nor has it considered the plight of rural Victoria in the drought. The paper focuses on Melbourne's future growth and the trading of water in irrigation areas. Some rural towns were surviving on carted water until recently. Romsey's water supply is precarious, as we have seen last summer and into the winter. We still need soaking rain to lead us into this coming summer.

There are also concerns, that have not been addressed in the green paper, about the future impact on under ground water supplies by the amount of ground water that is being used, and the increasing impact of salinity, even in the Macedon Ranges Shire. Salinity around some areas of Riddells Creek and Romsey is a sleeping danger to future landuse. The department of Sustainability and Environment has just finished a study on salinity in Victoria, which will be published shortly.

On a more positive note I went to a shire Art's Committee meeting a fort-night ago, where I met with some very energetic people determined to place the Macedon Ranges on the art's map. We have ten sculptors in the area who have exhibited work throughout Australia and some overseas. What a wealth of talent!

The arts committee will be advertising for some new members. If you are interested please contact Shane Murphy on 5422 0354.

The shire will soon have an Environment Advisory committee up and running. It has been some time in coming, but at last we are there. Watch this space for further news.

Congratulations to Riddells Creek Pony Club on their hugely successful reunion and official opening of their new club-house. Sitting about two hundred people down to lunch and conducting a rally was no mean feat!

What's News

In early November each year, we cement our place in the world as the only country to have a public holiday for a horse race! So what is it that makes the Melbourne Cup so spe-

It could be that we are simply a sports mad society who will make any excuse to celebrate. Of course, that assumes that horse racing is a sport. Whilst it clearly is for the trainers, horses and jockeys, and is as much a spectator sport as any other sort of racing, for many people it is more than a sport.

Horseracing has several other associations that either aren't present in other forms of racing or aren't as prominent. For example, fashion is a significant part of the scene, especially through the Spring Carnival. Gambling is also important to the industry, and occurs on a much grander scale than most other sports (at least in this country). For some people, Melbourne Cup Day (and some other major horse racing events) is simply an excuse to party and get drunk.

Some parts of the church are quite prominent in their criticism of gambling and drunkenness. From this perspective, the excesses of Melbourne Cup Day become a place for prayer at the shame of society. Whilst I grew up in such a church, we used Melbourne Cup Day for Sunday School picnics (since everyone else was pre-occupied by the Cup)!

I believe that life is about more than chance and selfobsession. I don't begrudge bookmakers from earning a living, but I do think that gambling is primarily entertainment. Some may earn a living from it, but simply hoping for 'the big win' is wasted effort - and money.

As for drinking, well, I know many people, including church members and ministers, who enjoy a drink. They enjoy the taste and refreshment, and drink in moderation. Getting drunk is usually about escaping - from responsibility; from the world's problems (if only temporarily); from one's own life. I don't believe you can legislate morality. However, I do be-

lieve that everyone has a right and responsibility to speak out against whatever they believe is wrong, harmful and corrupt-

I probably won't win many friends with this article, either inneed to guard the line between enjoyment and abuse, both for ourselves and for others.

I pray that we can all bear this in mind and not find Melbourne Cup Day is a day we'd rather forget.

The Platypus Guides have been discussing the food pyramid, as they are aiming at gaining the food badge.






