



# October in the garden

Spring rolls on and the last half dozen of the 100 red tulips I planted over a decade ago are about to bloom. I think the other 90 failed because they were bavked to death over summer. Other bulbs to do well here are all the daffodils, grape hyacinths, pineapple lilies, ixias, arums, scilla and gladiolus. Actually the spring flowering Gladiolus cardinalis 'Amanda Mahy' is budding up nicely and will soon be a blaze of tangerine! It's a great undemanding bulb that has multiplied nicely and is a welcome burst of colour when it blooms.

Elsewhere in the garden the wattles are finishing and the odd blob of lilac on the ground proves to be one of the carpobrotus flowers, it is doing a great job as a weed suppressing ground cover. The berberis is coming into its purplish bronze leaves and soon the smokebush will be bursting into leaf too. My succulent collection is waking up too with many of them flowering now. I have cute little hanging blooms on my echeverias in red, orange and yellow, most of the sedums are yellow and my aeoniums are all yellow except for one which is white. Most succulent enthusiasts will tell you to cut off the flowers because they attract aphids but it's up to you. I like to let mine bloom!

In the vegetable garden (if I had one) I would be taking the opportunity to dig compost and manure into the beds in readiness for the summer seedling planting blitz in late October. Its always a conundrum to know how long to leave the winter crops before you need to plant the summer crops! And that white variegated Hebe 'Abbey Rose' that stressed a brilliant hot pink? As soon as I moved the pot up against the house the plant began to lose its colour. So the small amount of shelter and warmth radiating off the house helped it to become less stressed. It is almost completely back to being green and white again!

# Planting trees this Spring? Remember - plan before you plant.

Greater Western Water reminds us to be careful where we plant trees this spring.

Trees provide welcome shade and habitat for wildlife. Underground can be a different story! Tree roots cause so much damage to pipes. Thirsty tree roots seeking moisture reach out towards underground pipe. They can eventually penetrate them causing blockages and even spills.

# Tree roots are a leading cause of sewer blockages across the region. So...

- Choose trees with non-invasive root system
- Plant away from the underground infrastructure. (Using root barriers can also minimise damage). A good rule of thumb is that tree branches extend about 1.5 times the distance of its branches.
- You can contact Greater Western Water or go online to Dial Before You Dig to find out where pipes are located on your property.

A little planning first can prevent costly issues down the track.

# Home Care Packages Information Sessions

For those preferring to receive help at home rather than go into an aged facility as they get older, the government's 'Home Care Package' scheme provides an allocation of funds to individuals for them to access services which will enable them to live safely and independently at home.

One of the federal government's responses to the Royal Commission into aged care back in May was to announce the allocation of 80,000 extra home care packages over the next two years. Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health has been a Home Care Package provider in Sunbury for the last four years and it is expanding its service to include residents of the Macedon Ranges.

"We work with Home Care Package recipients to tailor services that meet their needs and their goals," says Carly Visscher, Sunbury and Cobaw's Community Connections Manager. "With over 40 years' experience delivering a range of health and wellbeing services in the local community, we offer a trusted, personalised support where the individual has choice and control over their care."

The types of services that can be purchased include exercise groups, help with housework, gardening and maintenance, assistance with shopping or transport and healthcare supports such as podiatry and physiotherapy

The organisation is holding an information session on Tuesday 5 October on the types of services that can be purchased through the packages and about My Aged Care, the access point for government funded aged care services. Having recently had some local police members depart, it is with great pleasure that I can advise that we have since welcomed 2 new officers to Romsey, Senior Constables Grace DUNN and Simon BOWEN.

They are experienced, knowledgeable members having both come from policing in Werribee and have hit the ground running since arriving.

They each bring specialist knowledge with Senior Constable BOWEN having spent time in the Werribee Community Safety Team targeting youth crime and drug activity and Senior Constable DUNN having worked in the Family Violence unit.

Though obviously still a smaller station, their arrival means we are now fully staffed and though we may not be always be in the office, we are still around and reachable through the Kyneton Police Station.

Recent local crime incidents include;

- a burglary in Monegeetta where offenders gained entry to a shed on a rural property, stealing hand tools and made an attempt to steal a tractor. This continues a theme we've mentioned previously in these articles where sheds and shipping containers are being targeted. If relevant to you, please ensure your shed's, outbuildings and shipping containers are secure, consider installing

CCTV and please report any thefts or suspicious activity.

- damage caused to the fencing surrounding the playground at the rear of the Romsey football ground where the gates were ripped off the hinges.

- an infringement notice issued to a 36 year old male for possession of a controlled weapon without a lawful excuse after he was intercepted and found with a baseball bat concealed in his vehicle.

# Romsey Town Structure Plan – Process underway!

MRSC Strategic Planning recently briefed RRBATA committee on the process for the Romsey Town Structure Plan. This plan is reviewed periodically to define Romsey's town boundary. It has an effect on economic development and amenity so is a very important document for all residents and business owners.

An Emerging Options Paper is being prepared based on the 2018 Issues and Opportunities Paper. This will go to the community for consultation in early 2022. Once accepted by Council, it will inform the final Town Structure Plan. This plan will go to the community for consultation from mid 2022, to be finalised by Dec 2022. It will then lead to a planning scheme amendment.

In its advocacy, RRBATA is active in "big picture" issues for our region and makes submissions on Council strategies - the latest was the draft Economic Development Strategy. The Town Structure Plan is one that RRBATA looks forward to.



# Deep Creek Landcare

October is a great time to get busy in the backyard.

Whether planting the summer vegies, replacing tired old plants or doing a complete makeover, these months are ideal. Good moisture levels and rising soil temperatures get your plants off to a good start and established before winter sets in.

Our garden is a mixture of natives and exotics. I am embarking on a native garden bed, close to the house, on the north. Planting in the Macedon Ranges is all about location, location, location or in other words, micro-climate. Anne, from the nursery in Lancefield says it is a couple of degrees warmer in the middle of town rather than on the outskirts due to the heat-sink effect of the buildings and roads.

The new garden bed will receive full sun for most of the day and is protected from cold southerlies. Its location allows for good drainage and less impact from frost than further down. In planting natives I consider the natural environment as well as our tastes and knowledge of what grows well here.



A native garden is relatively low maintenance - less fertilizer, less protection from disease and bugs and less watering than many exotics. The bonus for us is that the garden will provide food and shelter for birds and butterflies. Our garden has regular visits from nectar eaters - spinebills, honey eaters and wattlebirds. We want a continuous supply of nectar so we can enjoy their company all year round - to go with the omnipresent seed eating parrots and cockatoos and the delightful insect eating thornbills and blue wrens.

We will plant correas, grevilleas, banksias, callistemons and kangaroo paws interspersed with a few seaside daisies, billy-buttons as well as common and clustered everlastings. For show, I might sneak in some leucadendrons! Check the labels to see the plants are frost tolerant, or ask the local nurserymen. Alpina is an indigenous grevillea and many of the rosmarinifolia crosses fit the bill. Mallee Dawn, Lady O and Scarlet Sprite do well. Our banksia spinulosa cross called Black Magic (pictured) has provided food through winter into spring. We also have exotics such as camellias (enjoyed by white-cheeked honey eaters during winter} and long flowering salvias which the eastern spinebill enjoys through summer and autumn.

Deep Creek Landcare has nesting boxes for sale. We ask for helpers to plant 500 indigenous trees at Gallagher's Crossing on Deep Creek, east of Romsey. This working-bee is planned for Sunday morning, October 24. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. # **Support to educate Hepburn & Macedon Ranges on new recycling services**

Victorian councils are being supported to roll out new education campaigns to help residents understand the four-bin recycling system, as part of the Victorian Government's goal to divert 80% of waste from landfill.

All Victorians will soon be sorting their household waste and recycling into four streams – with all local governments to transition to new glass services by 2027 and new food and garden organics services by 2030.

Local Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas said that both the Macedon Ranges and Hepburn Councils are two of the 17 councils across the state to share more than \$1 million in grants.

This funding will support Macedon Ranges Council's 4-stream household recycling services by targeting all households with a new campaign to reduce contamination, increase use of the food and garden organics service and minimise waste.

In Hepburn, the funding will have a focus on new household organics, food, garden and recycling collection. The council will be introducing a food and garden organics service in May 2022 to all households. An opt-out option will be provided to those who process their own waste.

Sustainability Victoria will provide communication materials based on behaviour change theory and research, developed in partnership with local government and industry, allowing councils to focus their funding efforts on advertising and engaging with residents.

All councils and alpine resort management boards are eligible for funding under the \$6.03 million Recycling Victoria Household Education and Behaviour Change Fund to be shared across four funding rounds. For more information on the Fund, visit Sustainability Victoria's website.

# **AVOCADO ICE-CREAM DESSERT**



# Ingredients

- 2 Avocados
- · Juice of 2 lemons
- Splash of brandy
- 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 cup vanilla ice-cream
- 3 egg whites
- · Whipped brandied cream
- Strawberries for decoration

### Method

- 1. Peel the avocados and take out the stone.
- 2. Pop them into your blender with the lemon juice, brandy and sugar and puree them.
- 3. Let the ice-cream soften and fold it into the puree, then beat the egg whites until they stand in soft peaks and fold them in too.
- 4. Pour into individual serving dishes and pop into fridge until set.
- 5. Decorate with a dob of whipped cream (with a spoonful of brandy whipped in if you like), and top with a strawberry.

# **DE CASTELLA'S HEALTH BALLS**



## Ingredients

- 3 Slices multi-grained bread, crumbled
- 1/4 Cup sultanas
- 1/4 Cup raisins
- 1/2 Cup crushed nuts
- 1/2 Granny smith apple, cored, not peeled but finely chopped
- 1/2 Cup grated tasty cheese
- Good pinch dried rosemary leaves

- 1 Clove garlic, crushed
- 3 Thin slices fresh root ginger, finely chopped;
- Freshly ground black pepper
- Juice of half an orange
- · Juice of half a lemon
- 1/4 Cup wholemeal flour
- · A little more lemon juice
- 1/4 Cup sesame seeds
- 1/3 Cup olive oil for frying.

### Method

- 1. In a bowl mix together the bread, sultanas, raisins, nuts, apple, cheese, rosemary, garlic, ginger and freshly ground black pepper.
- 2. Pour in the orange and lemon juice and mix well. Take spoonfuls of the mixture and form into balls this amount of mixture will make 8-10 balls.
- 3. Roll the balls in flour, sprinkle with a little more lemon juice then roll in sesame seeds.
- 4. Heat the oil in a large heavy frying pan, then fry the balls till they're golden brown they'll only take a couple of minutes.
- 5. Drain on kitchen paper and eat hot.

# Council providing free mulch for remainder of 2021

Macedon Ranges Shire Council is pleased to offer residents free mulch at all Council transfer stations until 31 December 2021.

Residents are encouraged to head to their local transfer station and claim up to one cubic metre of free self-loaded mulch.

The mulch is produced from garden organics dropped off at Council's transfer stations and is available to residents living in the Macedon Ranges Shire. Residents will need to provide prove that they live in the shire, such as a driver license or rates notice.

This is a first-come, self-load offer. Residents should bring their own shovel, containers or trailer, and protective clothing. There are many benefits to mulching your garden, including water conservation. Mulch stops the top of the soil drying out, keeps the soil moist, and can reduce watering by about 60 per cent.

# Other benefits to mulching include:

- Prevents weeds and weed seed germination, which compete with plants for moisture and nutrients.
- Keeps the soil temperature constant, and using an organic mulch means you are adding extra organic matter to the soil.
- Greatly improves soil conditions for the root zone of all plants

The amount of mulch available at transfer stations varies and is available while stocks last.



# Addressing the Disconnect

# **Supporting Mental Health Connection Via Telehealth - Locally**

Romsey Neighbourhood House is seeing the benefit of addressing mental health support - locally.

A successful six-month collaborative pilot connecting the community of Romsey to mental health professionals via telehealth has recently received a state government grant to continue the service, with a focus on the well-being of those in caring roles. The first in the Macedon Ranges.

MindHealthHub provides individuals a supported connection to psychologists via telehealth, enabling the connection for those 12 years and over.

Those who have converted to Zoom and Google Meet for virtual work or family hook ups are familiar that technology can assist connection however many of our local community aren't connected. Having limited or no data and tech or experience tech black spots. "We have created a safe and private space at Romsey Neighbourhood House for our community to use the MindHealthHub service to connect with mental health clinicians" says Michelle Balthazar.

Abbey Brown, the innovator behind MindHealthHub shares her passion about providing individuals an opportunity to try telehealth to connect with mental health professionals - in community.

"Those who have accessed the service are really seeing the benefits, saving both time and costs often associated with seeking professional support in traditional allied health models. This is exciting. We're supporting and educating a new way for people to connect with clinicians to manage their mental health - locally".



There is no cost to access the service with supported connection, data, tech and the private space to do the work all provided by Romsey Neighbourhood House. At this stage, sessions are conducted on a Wednesday. Those eligible for the service must be 12 years or older. 

# The Fountains of Macedon

# Recently the Gisborne Gazette featured an article on the town's fountains. The history was so similar our own here in Romsey. Local residents may be interested in a story of Romsey's fountains

I live in Romsey, which has had an association with fountains for over 120 years. Similar to the 'sabotage' in Gisborne, in 1924, the original Romsey fountain, at the junction of Main and Barry Streets, was unceremoniously demolished as 'a danger to traffic'. No effort was made to preserve it. The pieces of that substantial monument virtually disappeared into thin air.

This Memorial Fountain was dedicated to the public by the President of the Romsey Shire, Councilor William Somerville JP on 24 July 1901. It celebrated the Federation and the reign of Queen Victoria who had recently died.

This fountain had a 12 foot brick and cement basin. A centre pedestal supported dolphins and sea eagles, and a figure of a woman – all cast in cement. When the fountain was 'in play', the dolphins and sea gulls spouted water. The water ascended 19 feet to the top and fell onto two ornamental concave dishes. The basin was kept filled to eighteen inches to water stock.

This was convenient for Romsey - the town saw daily arrivals of horse-drawn Cobb and Co. coaches - before the motor car made a striking difference. For children and locals, it had a thumb pressure tap with an enameled cup.

In 1901, Councillor Somerville was optimistic: '... the fountain would be an enduring monument to her memory, but if in the process of years it should crumble away, he would be confident that it would be re-erected as the respect for the Queen would pass down from generation to generation.' He did not anticipate attitudes such as Councillor Robb in the 1920's 'it had no ornamental value, and was an obstruction and danger'.

This fountain was identical to the Gisborne one. In 2001, a new Romsey fountain was unveiled in front of the Mechanics Hall. Less ornamental and impressive than the one at Gisborne, it was constructed through the financial generosity of local citizens.

Unveiled in November 2001, the gardens around this fountain are a point for locals to meet. The Macedon Ranges Shire do maintenance and remedy occasional vandalism. The original fountain site has now morphed into the much-anticipated roundabout.

# Good News for Seymour Cottage

# **Heritage listed Sidney Seymour Cottage Property**

On 9 September, The Hon. Richard Wynne MP, Minister for Planning and Minister for Housing announced the successful applicants for Round 6 of the Living Heritage Program. We are overjoyed to announce that Romsey was successful!

The Historical Society's application was a matter of 'third time lucky'. After two unsuccessful attempts – the first in 2011-2012 and the second in 2018-19 – we are at last a winner! We hope that this Heritage Grant will, as Minister Wynne notes, 'breathe new life' into Seymour Cottage for the people of Romsey and Lancefield - and for all Victorians.

Minister Wynne: 'The Living Heritage Program is about protecting significant sites across Victoria for future generations to enjoy and learn from. These are the sites that tell stories about our history and play a major role in rural and regional Victoria's tourism industry – we're proud to protect these treasured community assets.'

Seymour Cottage is a treasured site. It tells us about the history of the township. When the Cottage was open for its first 'History Tea' in April 2021, over 150 people attended, keen to discover what they could about the Cottage and its former owners. Others, disappointed they missed that date, are now looking forward to future events at the Cottage. This grant ensures future events will happen.

Works funded are the development of a Conservation Management Plan, a Heritage Landscape Plan, and a Structural Condition Report on appropriate remedial measures for Seymour Cottage.

All works will be subject to approvals under the Heritage Act 2017. Funds granted total \$37,000.

Look out for further updates in 2022 as the program progresses.
