

Romsey Mechanics' Institute

A group of locals organised an evening at the Romsey Mechanics Institute on March 15th to discuss the future development of the town and surrounding districts. The event was well attended. We put down 100 chairs and there were people standing at the back and along the sides of the hall. A number of speakers addressed points including the need to protect highly productive farming land, the poor supply of power and internet to the town and the inability of the water treatment plant to handle material from the current population.

Many concerns were voiced and the five councillors who attended now have a far clearer idea as to what the community is worried about and what the community is hoping for from long term planning for the development of Romsey. April in the garden

And just like that it's autumn. Which means its planting season! I have been planting here there and everywhere! Emptying out my little nursery of plants in the backyard. Pelargonium cuttings struck in their own pots in January are ready to plant out already. A heap of other January cuttings are ready to pot up and they should put on some growth before winter.

What is looking good at a time of the year when many gardens are looking tired? A quick stroll showed me a dazzling display of pineapple lilies both white and burgundy; a clump of tall bright yellow golden rod (solidago); the cream seedheads of clumps of the ornamental grass miscanthus waving gently in the breeze and several solid blocks of pink are the 'Autumn Joy' sedum covered in happy bees. I carried out a little experiment cutting back a clump of sedum in late October in a process called the 'Chelsea Chop' (google it) and this resulted in more but smaller flower heads. It was an interesting experiment!

In my vegie boxes I am madly picking tomatoes; I am about to harvest my second crop of basil and the cucumber plants have 3 last fruits. Soon it will be time to ready a box for the garlic. The rhubarb is growing but hasn't really produced any stems of a decent size – I don't think they are really suited to growing in pots – even really large self-watering pots. The tree watering eco-bags are turning out to be fiddlier than I anticipated. Trying to get them to deliver the right amount of water is a tricky process!

Public Open Green Space

Romsey is blessed with a large open public green space, Romsey Park. This park was officially gazetted in 1883 and has served the people of the town and surrounding districts for nearly 140 years.

In the 1870s and 1880s Romsey, like Melbourne was fortunate to have some long-sighted people who saw the value of large areas of open public green space, today, all too often these areas are put underneath a tennis centre, a museum or some other seemingly very important facility. That open space, once gone will never be regained by or for the community.

the fifteenth day of October in the year One thousand eight hundred and eighty-three [1] the land described in the First Schedule to this Act was permanently reserved from sale under the provisions of The Land Act 1869 as a site or place for a Public Park²⁹

Many people are aware of the sporting ovals and associated buildings but may not realise the this is only about 20% of Romsey Park. The remaining 80% of the Park is the town's green space and contains the golf course. It is generally well maintained and numerous plantings have seen a once very lightly treed area become an area of great natural beauty with a growing and diverse population of trees and bushes including native creatures.

Each week between 250 and 350 people use the open area of Romsey Park. They may be golfers, visitors taking a stroll, family groups or mums and dads walking baby in the pram, community members walking their dogs, others jogging or running and some just sitting by the bottom dam watching the yabbies as they dig their holes into the bank. There are also numerous community members actively involved in maintaining and improving the Park

As Romsey expands, as it surely will, we need to plan properly, set aside land for the many new facilities our growing community will need, not just chop bits off our version of New York's famous Central Park.

Events to Bolster LGBTIQ+ Pride, Strength and Inclusion

A regional Pride Prom and a program to create short films and features celebrating lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans and gender diverse, intersex and queer (LGBTIQ+) Victorians to be shown at a drive-in are among the activities the Andrews Labor Government is backing to celebrate diversity, inclusion and connection across our state.

Minister for Equality Martin Foley today announced 20 recipients of the Pride Events and Festival Fund, which helps community organisations and LGBTIQ+ social enterprises host events that help to connect Victoria's diverse rainbow communities.

A diverse range of events and activities across the state will receive grants of up to \$10,000 - including 'Rainbow Yarning,' a series of workshops and yarning circles for Aboriginal community members to explore their LGBTIQ+ identities, connect with others and build inclusion and pride. Almost half of the funded activities will be in regional Victoria, including 'Queers on the Catwalk', an event that will support LGBTIQ+ people of all ages in the Macedon Ranges and surrounds to express their identity through clothing.

All events will include LGBTIQ+ people with disability, and some will be delivered digitally, either to complement or in place of physical gatherings, to ensure they can be accessed by all people across Victoria.

Along with providing opportunities for LGBTIQ+ communities to connect with each other, activities will improve the visibility of LGBTIQ+ people in their communities and promote understanding of their experiences.

The program aligns with the Labor Government's long-term plan to create safe, strong and sustainable LGBTIQ+ communities under Pride in our future: Victoria's LGBTIQ+ strategy 2022-2032, which was released last month.

The strategy will drive the Government's work to change laws and policies, strengthen state-based services and support LGBTIQ+ organisations and events over the next decade to drive meaningful change.

Mentoring teenage boys

Men who work with or regularly interact with teenage boys in the Macedon Ranges are being invited to take part in a six-week program which aims to explore the important role mentors play in guiding young people as they move towards adulthood. The program will cover topics such as masculine stereotypes and the impact these can have, and the importance of encouraging boys to reach their full potential by focusing on their strengths.

"More so than ever we need positive male role models within the lives of our **young people,"** says program facilitator Joel Hines from the Man Cave Academy.

"Teenagers are struggling to find their identity and they are looking to the adults in their lives for a bit of guidance. Being surrounded by a broad range of healthy masculinities helps disrupt the stereotypical narrative and enable boys to shape the kind of man they want to become."

Anyone in a leadership or mentoring role such as sports coaches, teachers and community group leaders are encouraged to attend and it is hoped that the more people across the Macedon Ranges that take part, the bigger the impact will be on the whole community. The sessions will tap into the knowledge and diversity within the group exploring heathy, positive alternatives to support boys on their journey into adulthood.

"If you are willing to be a learner but also a teacher, and are prepared to reflect on your own personal views of masculinity while being open to different points of view and new experiences," says Joel, "then this program is for you."

Chocolate Zucchini Cake

Ingredients

- 2 Cups all-purpose flour
- · 2 cups white sugar
- ¾ cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- · 4 eggs
- 1 ½ cups vegetable oil
- 3 cups grated zucchini
- 3/4 cup chopped walnuts

Method

- 1. Pre heat oven to 175 C, Grease and flour a baking pan.
- 2. In a medium bowl, stir together the flour, sugar, cocoa, baking soda, baking powder, salt and cinnamon.
- 3. Add the eggs and oil, mix well. Fold in nuts and zucchini until they are evenly distributed. Pour into the prepared pan.
- 4. Bake for 50-60 mins in the preheated oven, until a knife inserted into the centre comes out clean. Cool cake completely before frosting with your favourite frosting, or cream cheese icing.

HAVE THINGS CHANGED MUCH

HOME HINTS - TRANSFERRED FROM PAPER CLIPPINGS - January 1995- Herald Sun

- Charcoal pieces mixed with soil at the base of plant pots keep soil sweet and help drainage
- You can boil cracked eggs if you wrap them tightly in foil
- To keep cauliflower white try adding a strip of lemon peel or two tablespoons of milk when cooking
- Use celery tops as a basting brush when barbecuing
- Onions are useful -if you get grit in your eyes chop an onion and let your tears wash it away
- To brighten an aluminium pan, boil citrus peel in it
- Rub lemon peel over your chopping board to clean and deodorise it
- Stiffen the end of thread with hair spray to help thread a needle
- Top speed ripening of tomatoes, place in a paper bag with a banana. Pinch a few holes in the bag first



Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

Should we revere one group of people shooting another group? Amongst other things, that's what war is, folks.

Of course we must protect ourselves from an oppressor - such as Hitler or Pol Pot or any of the other bad guys. But as time passes and memories fade, the glory and excitement takes over and removes us from any involvement. Little boys see themselves as heroes, gloriously winning the VC, and little girls being Florence Nightingale.

And so it will be on the day we celebrate Winston Churchill demanding we invade another man's country and kill the inhabitants who try and defend their homeland. (Mind you, although we now know Churchill's reasoning was wrong on that occasion I'm glad he was on our side.)

But it's that invasion and its deaths where Australia came of age (so we're told). Even though our troops (young men who didn't know a tin of Bully Beef from an ash tray on a motor bike) went to be killed or kill.

Sure, it was a grand adventure - if you survived with all your limbs. Sure, bravery won our praise and gave us stories to relate, of the need for it all. Mind you I take my hat off to the young chocos who braved the Japs and won in New Guinea's jungles and those teenagers who flew Spitfires in the Battle of Britain. And I admire so many young folk who saved our way of life by their bravery,

But let's hope all that history remains just that - history. (And remember, it's the winner who writes the history.)

Let's teach our young to remember, not emulate.

I served six and a half years in the CMF (Citizens Military Forces) and did National Service and was trained and ready to defend Australia from aggressors. But I wasn't ready to be an aggressor.

And so I give you Anzac biscuits. It's a recipe I pinched from somewhere or other, but of impeccable heritage.



ANZAC BISCUITS

Ingredients

- 1 cup plain flour
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1 cup desiccated coconut
- 1 cup sugar
- pinch of salt
- 125 g unsalted butter
- 3 tablespoons golden syrup
- 2 tablespoons boiling water
- 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

Method

- 1. Sift the flour into a large bowl then add the rolled oats, desiccated coconut, sugar and salt.
- 2. Stir the unsalted butter and golden syrup together in a small saucepan over a low heat until the butter has melted. Meanwhile dissolve the bicarbonate of soda in a couple of tablespoons of boiling water then stir it into the melted butter and golden syrup which will bubble up.
- 3. Pour this over the dry ingredients in the large bowl making sure you combine the mixture well.
- 4. Oil and line a baking tray with baking paper and drop onto it spoonsful of the biscuit mixture, leaving enough space between each for the biscuits to spread. Pop the tray into the oven pre-heated to 180 deg.C and bake until the biscuits are a dark gold colour (about 14 minutes).
- 5. Take the tray out of the oven and put the biscuits onto a wire rack to cool. When sufficiently cooled, transfer them into a container with an airtight lid.

This recipe should make 30 biscuits.

So that's a recipe for Anzac biscuits. But I still buy mine from the shop.



News from the Shire



CFA declares end to Fire Danger Period in Macedon Ranges Shire

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has been advised by the Country Fire Authority that the Fire Danger Period for the shire will end at 1am on Monday 21 March.

Residents wishing to burn-off after that time, must ensure they are abiding by Council local laws which prevent burn-offs on land less than 4000 square metres (one acre) without a permit. Residents must also register their burn by calling 1800 668 511.

With significant amounts of debris left over from the June 2021 storms, Council requests residents be mindful that burn piles do not exceed the size conducive to their land as set out in the local laws.

Council's Director of Assets and Operations, Shane Waldron, said residents should consider a number of factors before burning off.

"It is important to keep an eye on weather conditions that may change throughout your burn off.

Watch for overhead branches before igniting your burn pile and ensure you have an adequate water supply on hand," he said.

Free disposal of green waste excluding noxious weeds, is also available at Council's transfer stations.

Large landholders who would like to conduct a burn outside of council laws should call Council's

Municipal Fire Prevention Officer on 5422 0333 to discuss applying for a free permit to burn.



Bridging the Divide

Macedon Ranges Shire Council are seeking participants for a new and exciting community climate change project.

Everyone in the community will continue to experience the direct and indirect impacts of climate change, regardless of their circumstances. Ageing or isolated people may be more affected by extreme weather events, while youth are already talking

about the mental health risks arising from living in a changing climate. Unfortunately, an understanding of these climate-induced health and wellbeing concerns has rarely been explored in an inter-generational setting. This is something Council hope to change.

This creative project will pair younger people with older people in conversations to discuss intergenerational concerns, actions and personal experience of climateinduced health and wellbeing risks. Conversations will be filmed to create a series of short videos helping us all to talk about climate change and learn a few new actions to help us take care of ourselves, and others.

At Risk - Historic Eden Park, a Romsey Icon

The historic homestead, Eden Park, Romsey is at risk. The Macedon Ranges Council are considering re-zoning east of Romsey for new housing. Eden Park, settled in 1858 by Peter Mitchell, is at grave risk as a continuing farm.

This 100-acre property on Romsey Road may be within a new town boundary in MRSC's Emerging Options Paper (Option 3). If town growth moves east into the Farm Zone, a developer will move in. 164 years of Romsey history will be lost!

In one family since 1858, it is now owned by the fifth generation. Peter Mitchell purchased the first block at land sales in Kilmore in 1857, possibly from C J Baggott, a grantee of large acreage. Eden Park, running cattle, sheep and growing grain – including chicory, has provided



employment and local economic benefit since 1858. The gabled and verandah section (east end) was built earlier than the hipped roof Italianate stage (commissioned / designed by Matthews and Round). The stage in 1875 was built of bluestone guarried from the site.

Bluestone outbuildings include a stone cottage built for farm workers - once occupied by John Allen, then a ploughman and later Premier of Victoria from 1924-27. Magnificent stained glass windows surround the front door, depicting the Scottish thistle and grains - the story of the original owners. These were created by Ferguson & Urie, the first stained glass window producers in Victoria - who made windows for Ripponlea, Labassa and Mandeville Halls. This property appears to meet the nine criteria for heritage listing,

The Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society supports the immediate heritage listing of this vitally important property - an icon of Romsey history.

Over the last couple of months counterfeit banknotes have been circulating, and have been presented at several stores through town. Mostly in the \$50 denomination, the notes have taken different forms with some very difficult to identify at first glance.

Common points to look out for are a seven-pointed star on the older style notes, with all 7 points coloured in when held up to a light, and a smudge free clear window. On newer style notes, the images in the clear panel should have a rolling colour effect when tilted in the light.

Refer to banknotes.rba.gov.au – on the Reserve Bank of Australia website - for a list of all security features.

You can refuse a banknote if you suspect it to be counterfeit - and/or contact police.

Though the use of these notes in town has dried up over the last few weeks, it is something to remain vigilant about.

The more frequent use of e-scooters has been noticed. You may be surprised to learn that most e-scooters, being over 200 watts and capable of traveling more than 10km/h, are classified a motor vehicles. As such, they are subject to the same legal requirements as vehicles - including licencing, registration, drink driving laws and compliance with road rules.

An e-scooter therefore cannot be used on any Victorian public road, cycle lane or footpath. As it stands currently, they can only be ridden on private property – though still subject to rules such as drink driving which can still occur on private property.




Deep Creek Landcare

March rolled around... summer had ended abruptly but what a summer it was! It was a goldilocks summer, not too hot, not too cold, with a lot of days that were just right for the garden and our local environment.



The absence of extreme heat and strong northerlies kept the danger from bushfires lower and although December and February were dry the good January rain has kept a green tinge in the paddocks and Deep Creek flowing.

I cannot remember a better year for the veggie patch. Temperatures in the twenties to low thirties are ideal for summer vegetables... tomatoes up here were ready before some parts of Melbourne! Similarly, in the flower garden exotics and natives have all flourished. Penstemons and salvias



Out in the paddocks we also planted a couple of substantial groups of local native trees and shrubs comprising mainly of wattles, hakeas, tea-trees, banksias and bottlebrush. With a bit of supplementary water they have taken off and will quickly create an environment suited to local insects and birds.

Deep Creek Landcare Group in conjunction with the Australian Plants Society is working together to promote planting gardens that will attract frogs, bees, other beneficial insects and native birds.

The benefits are that indigenous plants once established require very little water. They range from ground covers to bushes up to 1-2 meters tall in a variety of colours and tend to flower for long periods of time. Our Gardens for Wildlife stall will be at the Farmers Market on the 4th Saturday in March, April and May.

In February our group conducted an extensive clean up along the path on the eastern boundary of Lancefield Park. Lots of weeds and suckers were removed and the overhanging trees along the path were given a substantial prune. During March we will conduct the first of our roadside clean-ups along the Lancefield-Kilmore Road from Doggetts Bridge into town as part of our commitment to the Keep Australia Beautiful campaign.



Autumn is the best time to plant natives in Lancefield so at this stage in April we are planning to plant approximately 300 trees and shrubs at Gallagher's Ford and 50 or so to replace losses up on the hill at Forbes Crossing. If you can give us a hand we would be very appreciative!

We have nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Landcare membership is \$20 per family. You can follow us on facebook, contact our President, Phil Severs (0476 324 000) or attend our monthly meetings in the Lancefield Mechanics Hall.

Last year Clare Watson was appointed as the new Landcare Facilitator for the Upper Deep Creek Landcare Network of which we are a member.

Clare is based in Seymour with her family and has many years of experience locally as a volunteer in environmental groups and as a wildlife carer. Clare's background is in environmental science and ecology and she has a passion for all things wildlife and their native habitats. Clare is available, free of charge, to visit rural properties and offer advice to landowners. She can draft brief property plans that will detail the natural assets and relevant land management issues along with suggestions of how to improve the property's productivity, sustainability and biodiversity values. Our Landcare members are also available to visit properties, big or small, to give advice on improving the environmental values of your property.

The Key to Success - The 20 Mile March

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


