
Alby Mangels – A Colourful Life

• **Solar Battery:** A few years ago, the CoM was able to install 30 solar panels on the roof of the RMI. This ensures that our electricity bills will be more than halved. DELWP has now identified us as a location that would benefit from a solar battery. This would allow us to store energy during the day when fewer people and groups use the RMI then use that stored energy at night when the hall is more active. The battery will be 10.24Kw, will cost \$22,000 and it is estimated that it will save the CoM over \$2,000 in electricity bills each year.

March in the garden

FI have a water bowl filled with nardoo (Marsilea drummondii) which is a four-leaved water fern. It's the plant with which Burke and Wills tried to supplement their diet: but they still died. The explorers watched the aboriginal people grind the spores to make a flour which was then made into a johnny-cake and baked. My nardoo has never produced spores but the birds like to bathe in the water bowl and each day they splash so much out, I have to refill the bowl once or even twice a day!


The rain has stimulated amazing growth on the smoke bush (Cotinus Grace), the giant grass (Miscanthus giganteus) and the contorted filbert (Corylus avellana Contorta). Have I told you the urban myth about the last one? Supposedly the contorted filbert and the tortured willow (Salix matsudana Tortuosa) and one other plant that I've forgotten; all arose from within 50km of a supposed meteor landing site in England (cue spooky music)! What a great story! They make great dried arrangements with their weirdly twisted and corkscrew stems.

The red cannas are finally making a vibrant display as are the indigo agapanthus cultivars. Also my Geranium Big Red is sensational! Such a brilliant fire engine red. I have to mention that the good old geranium/pelargoniums are great battlers. They get frost bitten over winter but bounce back in spring and are currently covered in flowers. I have been collecting cuttings



from various places and these seem to strike much better than some modern cultivars I recently purchased. I suspect the modern ones might be grown by tissue culture and they don't seem to grow as quickly as the older cultivars and their cuttings take longer to root and grow. They are drought hardy and need very little attention other than a light prune in March.

Romsey Rag March 2023

Each year many community groups hold activities and events. Often they advertise these activities using road signs.

The Shire has put up metal posts for signs at various points along the roads into all towns.

There is a process for the use of these posts.

- Signs must only be on display for a fortnight before the event.
- Signs must come down within three days after the event.
- · VicRoads stipulates that signs can only have four lines of writing
- Once contacted the Shire will stipulate which signs a community group may use
- All signs must be placed at the top of the poles, if not then it may be taken down.
- Only one sign is allowed per set of poles.

Also, it is more than disappointing when one group, who has done all the right things, finds a second group has placed signs on poles already allocated to the first group.

Many of these rules are eminently sensible as we do not want distractions on the roads.

However, to make it simpler and safer to follow the rules surely the Shire is required to make sure that there is level ground at the base of these poles so that people, often older members of the community, can safely use a ladder to place the signs at the top of the poles?

Its tomato season, if like ours we have lots but they are not turning Red, so here is something you might be able to do.

Green Tomato Pickles. Makes about 8 375gr Jars

Ingredients

- 2 Kg green tomatoes, 1Kg onions, Salt
- 4 cups sugar, 500ml white vinegar, 1 teaspoon curry
- Powder,3 tablespoons plain flour,1 dessertspoon
- Ground turmeric,1 tablespoon mustard powder.
- Cut up tomatoes and onions sprinkle with handful salt stand overnight.

Method

- Drain Liquid and put tomato mix in pot with sugar and vinegar bring to boil for 45 mins.
- Mix the remaining ingredients with a little vinegar to a pouring consistency add to the pot to thicken the pickle. Cook further 5 mins. Put into warm sterilized jars and seal.
- Pickles will keep for up to 2 years.

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

"Et tu, Brute" or something like that was written by Shakespeare , which he attributed to Julius Caesar uttering after he was stabbed entering the Forum on the Ides of March (which is March 15). The Ides of anything is about the middle but to be more accurate it's the 15th of March and so I've chosen an Italian dish for today's offering.

Spaghetti was the obvious, and spag is what's tied Italia together. Nevertheless, since Julius was stabbed 23 times (60 aggressors were in the mob) they most probably cut up his liver. (And as the English bard was partial to liver, liver it is.

But the Poms eat lambs' liver, as we did (lambs' fry) and the Italians calfs' and pigs' liver. Anyway I digress.

I've chose chicken liver, not because Caesar was chicken but because Brutus and his mates were. It's a VERY simple recipe which could do with some garlic and other additions like a poached egg, Sherry or mustard. But I'll leave that to you to think about - in the meantime remember Julius and the 15th of March.

The Year of the Butterfly



According to the Chinese Calendar, it is the Year of the Rabbit; I thought it was the Year of

the Butterfly! As usual, we have a few rabbits on our block but butterflies seem to be everywhere. Even when we go for a run along the local roads we are frequently engulfed in a cloud of butterflies. Many are the orange Common Brown males; the lighter coloured female is much less common.

Back in October last year I wrote an article on insects and their importance to the ecosystem; many are beautiful when viewed up close but few have the aesthetic qualities of butterflies. I pointed out that insects "... aerate the soil, pollinate blossoms and control insect and plant pests. Many insects are scavengers, feeding on dead animals and fallen trees, thereby recycling materials back into the soil. It is estimated that without insects for them to eat we would lose most reptiles and amphibians and about half of all bird species. Several species of insects are on the brink of extinction which could have a cascading effect on upper levels of the food pyramid and upset ecological balance."

Butterflies and moths (Lepidoptera) have been part of ecosystems for a long time. The latest evidence shows that they evolved more than 200 to 250 million years ago in the Triassic period. That's almost when the dinosaurs appeared! "Butterflies and moths can be hard to tell apart, but butterflies have clubbed antennae, more slender bodies than the plumper moths, fly more in the day, fold their wings straight up when resting and are often more brightly covered. All moths and butterflies pupate from caterpillars and undergo metamorphosis. Both butterflies and moths are important pollinators, feeding primarily on nectar. Instead of a mouth, these insects have a long straw-like structure called a proboscis, perfect for sucking. Australia is home to 400 butterfly species and 11,000 moth species."1

Declining butterfly populations have been noticed in many areas of the world, and this phenomenon is consistent with the rapidly decreasing insect populations around the world. These changes have been linked to climate change and habitat destruction. Recently, my sister-in-law and husband walked across England. They noticed a lot of buddleias, commonly known as the butterfly bush, but did not see any butterflies feeding off them. England has an insect problem and is actively re-wilding to address the situation before it is too late.

Many gardeners would have a love hate relationship with butterflies after enduring a "brassica massacre" at the hands of the white butterfly, commonly known as a cabbage moth or cabbage white for obvious reasons. In the past I have used derris dust to control the hungry caterpillars but now I tend to avoid growing vegetables from the brassica family over summer or I cover the plants with fine netting as I have presently done with my pak choi crop.

Attracting butterflies to the garden is easy. Favoured plants include: hardenbergia violacea (happy wanderer), goodenia species, buddleia, verbena, salvia, native grasses, daisies, herbs and "weedy" plants such as nettles. Notably, sweet bursaria flowers are well known for supporting a range of butterflies and moths and it is the only host plant for the larvae of the endangered Eltham Copper Butterfly. Its wingspan is only 2.5 cm and when its wings are closed they are very dull underneath, making it hard to see, however, it has bright copper colouring on the tops of its wings. It was first discovered in Eltham in 1938 and was thought to be extinct by the 1950's but rediscovered in 1987.

Currently, they can be found around Greensborough/Eltham, Bendigo, Castlemaine and in three locations in the Wimmera. Because they have become environmentally isolated the genetic diversity in their gene pool has been reduced, thereby, increasing their vulnerability. No wonder the sweet bursaria is one of our groups' favourite plants!

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. Work Shed: The club met with Shire staff to look at options to locate a new shed. Relevant MRSC departments will review items discussed and hopefully decide on options. We hope that works can be approved and begin shortly.

Park Bins: Five times each year, club members empty the 20+ rubbish bins around the park (mostly located at tees). Rubbish is tipped into a trailer and sorted. Cans/plastics are separated from glass and placed into large rubbish bins. All other waste, including copious amounts of dog waste, remains in the trailer. We usually end up with two large bins each of glass and cans/plastics and about 1/2 a trailer of other waste. Everything is taken to the Romsey Transfer Station. The club is looking into other ways for dog walkers to dispose of their pet's waste.

Coring the Greens: Coring will finally go ahead on Wednesday March 1st. Our thanks to all those Wednesday golfers who were happy to support the club and give up golf that day. The greens will be virtually unplayable on the following Saturday. Members are encouraged to play at other clubs.

2023 Summer Cup: This club event -designed to get more people playing more golf - is in its 9th year. There are four rounds and players have the opportunity to play on a Wed and Sat. Their best round score from those two days can be counted. At the end of the month all players' best three round scores are collated and prizes are awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Fight cancer by supporting the Lancefield Relay For Life.

36,974 Victorians were diagnosed with cancer in 2021. That's an average of 1 new cancer diagnosis every 14 minutes. In 2021 in Victoria 32 people died from cancer every day.

But it is not all doom and gloom as the 5-year survival rate for Victorians diagnosed with cancer has increased 22% (to nearly 70%) over the past twenty years.

These are not just tasks for researchers and clinicians, they are goals that need to be supported by the wider community by fund raising and by giving comfort and care to those who have cancer.

Lancefield Relay For Life is a Macedon Ranges based event run to support those who have cancer and to raise funds for the Cancer Council of Victoria("CCV").

The money raised is used by the CCV to fund research, the provision of a range of services to those affected by cancer and to support the advocacy work of the CCV. It was CCV which gave us the enormously successful Quit and Slip Slop Slap campaigns. CCV also runs a Cancer Support Hotline(phone 131120) staffed by trained cancer nurses. The CCV website(cancervic.org.au) contains an amazing amount of information about cancer and the work the CCV undertakes.

Nationally, Cancer Councils invested almost \$250 million in Australian cancer research over the past five years.

In March 2002 a marvellous group of local people, most of them women who had lost friends or family to cancer, formed a committee and rallied the local community to run and support the first Lancefield Relay For Life. In 2023 we will have our 20th Relay (COVID robbed us of one event). The Lancefield Relay For Life has raised about \$1,500,000 to date.

You can help CCV and those who have cancer by becoming a part of the 2023 Lancefield Relay For Life on Saturday 4 March from 11.00am to 9.00pm. For more information and to become a participant see *relayforlife.org.au*.

DEVELOPMENT APPLIED FOR AT PARK LANE/BARRY ST CORNER

Everyone is aware that Romsey is developing and that new houses, town houses and flats are being built. We welcome all these new community members and hope that they too get to experience life in a small country town. A small country town means space for children to play at home in their backyards, quiet streets where there are rarely more than one or two cars at a time and getting to know the neighbours. Recently a new development application was put forward.

A large, single house block in Romsey is to be replaced with 30 town houses. It will be right next to Romsey Recreation Reserve, home of cricket, golf, lawn bowls, tennis, netball, little athletics, soccer, scouts & cubs Men's Shed and football. Some quick facts;

- MRSC Planning Department failed to respond to the application in 60 days and so developers fast tracked to VCAT
- There were six objections to the development (note: objectors need to pay to go to VCAT)
- 30 Town houses with an approx. 106m2 footprint
- Mostly 2-bedroom but some 3-bedroom and 4-bedroom options
- Possibly congested access to sporting facilities and events
- Just five visitor carparks
- Not affordable housing

Imagine the scene on Saturday mornings with up to 30 cars coming out of the development onto Barry Rd to go shopping or to drop individuals off at sport.

Upcoming School Immunisations

Consent cards have recently been distributed to all secondary schools within the Macedon Ranges for the free school-based immunisation program. If you have a child in year 7 or 10, look out for immunisation information and a consent form coming home with your child.

Students who are eligible for vaccination must return the form to school completed and signed by their parent or guardian. Take time to talk with your child about vaccination – why it's important and how you both feel about it.

If you wish to decline the offer of free, school-based immunisation, you can return the consent section of the form to the school, marked as 'declined'.

If you have any questions not answered by the information provided, please contact your GP or Council's immunisation service on 5422 0333.

Changes to the School Immunisation Program

From 6 February 2023, the routine two-dose HPV vaccine schedule provided to young people aged 12-13 years through the National Immunisation Program (NIP) has changed to a single dose schedule using the same Gardasil®9 vaccine.

The dose change is based on advice from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) who have considered the international clinical evidence that supports a single dose providing comparable protection to the two doses. These changes simplify the HPV vaccine schedule and will make it easier to vaccinate young people for HPV.

The schedule has not changed for immunocompromised people. A three-dose schedule of 9vHPV vaccine is recommended for people with severely immunocompromising conditions, regardless of their age when they started vaccination.





Why register your pet?

Council pet registrations renewals are due by 10 April 2023.

There are four important reasons to register your pet:

- Pets found wandering unregistered and un-microchipped make it difficult for rangers to reunite them with their owner. Sadly, some pets are never reunited and end up rehomed or worse yet, euthanised.
- It's the law. Your cat/dog must be registered with Council by three months of age.
- The registration cost is much less than the fine.

• Registration fees assist Council in providing animal management services, education materials, incentives and programs, and welfare assistance for animals in our shire.

There are a number of ways you can renew your pet registration including in person at a Council service centre, by mail, BPay, or online.


With the line-up on offer for 2023 it is sure to be another successful year. The 2nd production opens in May......more about that next month.
