#### **Street Lights:**

A few years ago up-lights were placed in the footpath outside the Institute, this was as part of the Main Street upgrade and was intended to highlight the façade at night. These lights were also placed on the old shire offices and the bridge. There have been a number of problems with the lights on the RMI. Bulbs have blown and been replaced and in recent times they have begun coming on in the mid-morning rather than mid evening so all their efforts, and the energy, are wasted. #### **Solar Power:**

Earlier in the year we told you that the RMI was being considered for a major upgrade to our solar power system. News has recently come through that we will be receiving additional solar panels and a 7.7Kw battery Additional panels will see that system expanded to 3.735 Kw. These works will take place over the next few months and should be finished well before the end of the year. Having a greater supply of our own power on hand will again assist us to keep our fees as low as possible and help locals celebrate locally.

#### July in the garden

The slow slide into winter is complete. The trees are leafless, the ornamental grasses have turned beige and the last few red rose hips wave forlornly in the weak winter sun. On the plus side the bulbs are poking through the soil, the red-hot pokers are starting to push their way through the mass of strappy leaves and the catkins are beginning to swell on the contorted filbert.

**Update:** the cordyline layers I did over 12 months ago and removed from the parent plant in February, have successfully produced heaps of roots and then grew well and filled a 200mm pot. I planted them in a garden a few weeks ago and they are settling in well; although I had to stake them as the north

wind kept trying to blow them out of the ground. So, it took over 12 months, but I did eventually get three new big plants for free. Aerial layering looks tricky, but its actually not too difficult and can be done on a variety of plants including figs, rhododendrons, camellias and magnolias. My first aerial layer I ever did at Burnley as a student was on a rubber tree!

Yes, I am still in my current house while we wait for the last few things to be finished on the new house. Over at the new house the soil has been pushed back around the building and I'm starting to get a sense of levels, views and possible microclimates. Now I have to co-ordinate the move of well over 100 pots of various sizes to

the new home! Some pots are tiny, but some will require the services of a hand trolley and some strong people. Note to self: don't water the pots the week before the move so they can dry out a bit and be lighter!

#### **GWW Fined**

Environment Protection Authority Victoria has fined Greater Western Water Corporation \$9246 for failing to properly manage a large discharge of sediment to Deep Creek in February this year.

EPA Officers were called to a site on Portingales Lane Romsey to discover a brown-coloured plume of water discharging from a catchment dam from a nearby site, which was being developed by GWW contractors for the future irrigation of reclaimed water to the immediate area.

The GWW contractors operating the dam had pumped sediment-laden water down and into the creek.

EPA north-west regional manager Dr Scott Pigdon said duty holders like Greater Western Water, had an obligation to manage all works undertaken at their properties, whether it was their own staff or contractors directly employed them.

## RRBATA Submission to MRSC Draft 2023-2024 Budget

## Following its written submission, RRBATA recently presented to Council's Draft 2023-2024 Budget Submitter's meeting.

RRBATA welcomed the commitment to progression of the *Romsey Town Structure Plan* process and looks forward to a reviewed timeline for this being soon determined. It also welcomes the commitment to road improvements in the eastern corridor.

Whilst RRBATA welcomed the upgrade of the Five Mile Creek footbridge in its submission, it drew attention to the omission from the Draft Budget of any funding for further implementation of the 2019 Five Mile Creek Master Plan (Stage 2) https://www. mrsc.vic.gov.au/About-Council/Our-Council/Strategies-Plans/Romsey-Five-Mile-Creek-Master-Plan - an item RRBATA lobbied for in its pre-Budget submission. Eastern corridor visitation is well below that of the other zones of the Macedon Ranges (Visitor Economy Strategy 2018) and businesses in Romsey are closing. In addition, Romsey's anticipated population growth over the next decade will increase the need for well developed open space resources such as that dictated by the Five Mile Creek Master Plan (which dovetails nicely with the award-winning Romsey Ecotherapy Park precinct). Even allocating a portion of the (at last estimate) \$365,000 required for Stage 2 implementation could provide leverage for funding from other sources. RRBATA appreciates the financial challenges confronting Council at this time and the need for prioritisation of expenditure. However, RRBATA is concerned that a potentially short-sighted approach in this case will jeopardise Romsey's tourism and community amenity which will further contribute to compromised local economic development. In addition, it would be reasonable to anticipate that the cost of the Master Plan's implementation will only increase the longer it is delayed, thereby further compromising its likelihood of ever being realised.

RRBATA has implored Council to reconsider the budget in relation to this issue.

## FREE REGO FOR ALL VICTORIAN APPRENTICES

The State Government is backing Victoria's hardworking apprentices, helping to ease cost of living pressures by making vehicle registration free for eligible apprentices from next month. Premier Daniel Andrews and Minister for Roads and Road Safety Melissa Horne today visited the Kangan Institute in Broadmeadows to meet apprentices who will be eligible for free vehicle registration from 1 July, saving them up to \$865 every year.

The \$10 million initiative is being delivered in the Victorian Budget 2023/24 to put more money back in Victorian apprentices' pockets – and will provide free registration to apprentices like carpenters, joiners, bricklayers, plumbers, electricians and chefs if their employer can verify that their vehicle is an essential part of their work. The initiative adds to a number of measures the Labor Government has already introduced to ease financial pressure for trainees and apprentices across the state.

Rocket is known in many other countries as Arugula, a small green leafy plant, which can be said to resemble radish tops and grows wild in the Mediterranean region. It's related to mustard and has a peppery, bitter, acidic taste, nevertheless is a good addition to a salad. For instance, it is often used in a Nicoise of salad leaves and mesclun.

Julius Caesar is said to enjoy it at the odd orgy, where his chef quickly sautéed a handful of the leaves in olive oil and served it with a form of pasta.

Anyway, I'm combining it with pine nuts and Parmesan cheese.

## POTATOES, ROASTED IN THEIR JACKETS, WITH ROCKET PESTO

#### **Ingredients**

- 6 large potatoes
- 125g rocket leaves
- 2 tablespoons pine nuts
- 1 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

#### Method

- 1. Wash the potatoes, don't peel them but bake them in a hot oven until they're cooked through. The time that takes depends on their size I start the oven at a medium heat (for 20 minutes) then turn it up to 180 deg.C for another 20 minutes or thereabouts.
- 2. Wash the rocket leaves, drain them then dry them. Roughly tear the leaves then pop them into a food processor with the pine nuts and process them until you have a smooth paste. Add three-quarters of the Parmesan cheese and process again then, with the motor still running, pour in the olive oil until the pesto is well mixed.
- 3. When the potatoes are cooked, take them out of the oven, make a deep slit in the top of each (lengthways) and fill with the pesto. Serve hot with the remaining Parmesan cheese sprinkled on top.

#### In our young... we trust

We know that our First Nations people were the custodians of what is now known as Australia for 60,000 years and that the early settlers from abroad inherited a tough, but pristine land. So pristine in fact that the land was defined as "terra nullius"!

A lot has changed. My grandfather used cross-saws, axes and wedges to cut railway sleepers in the foothills of the Great Dividing Range then used draught horses to haul them out of the bush. He then spent some time hunting whales in nearby Twofold Bay with his father in law, George Davidson. With a crew of 6 in the row boats and using only hand held harpoons and lances to kill the whales, the Davidson family continued whaling until the death of Tom in 1930. Tom was the last of a pod of killer whales that included Jackson, Cooper, Hookey, Humpy and others. The skeleton of Tom now resides in the Whaling Museum in Eden where the unique story is told of the role played by the killers in the Twofold Bay whaling industry.

Fast forward to the present day; just around the corner from Davidson's small whaling station is a huge pile of woodchips ready to be shipped off to Japan. Since opening in 1970 large swathes of forest have been irreparably damaged and yet the woodchip industry continues despite the devastating impact of the 2020 bushfires. "In 2020, 97.5% of trees logged in the Eden region become woodchips or firewood".1

Whaling may have ceased in Australia in 1978 but not before the use of modern technology made whaling so efficient that many whale species were over-exploited and came very near to extinction. Our modern logging industry bares no comparison to the work done by my grandfather and risks the same consequences as whaling. In recent times, much of the logging has been taking place up in the remote high country where the sought after Mountain Ash and Alpine Ash grows. The method of clear felling is clearly unsustainable given that in reality the forests and their unique eco systems cover such a small part of Australia.

Environmental groups are doing what they can to arrest the damage, to educate the public and do what they can to rehabilitate damaged areas. After decades of campaigning to protect Victoria's native forests from state-funded logging, it was great news to hear that the Victorian Government is bringing forward the end of native forest logging from 2030 to January 2024.

There are encouraging signs, yet many challenges remain and we trust that the kids of today will take up the challenge. They and their offspring have the most to gain or lose from the decisions we take now and into the future. Education is important; recognition of First Nations people's knowledge and an understanding of our complex ecosystems are essential.

Emma Stevens took on the role of Junior Landcare Facilitator at the beginning of the year and has hit the ground running in her work with our local schools. With funding from the Queens Jubilee Tree Planting fund, she organized and coordinated the planting of indigenous trees and shrubs in parkland near Lancefield Primary School on May 19. The activity involved members from the Parks Committee, our landcare group and students from Lancefield P.S and St Mary's P.S.

Emma is working with kindergartens, primary and secondary schools from across the Macedon Ranges and has been met with an enthusiastic response from teachers and students. The activities include: environmental story times, dung beetle projects, plantings of indigenous trees, shrubs and wildflowers, guest speakers, nest box building and the removal of gorse at Barrm Birrm by students from Alice Miller/Candlebark working with Riddells Creek Landcare.

Old, young or somewhere in between if you are concerned for the environment and want to be part of the solution we would love to hear from you.

We would prefer to pass the baton to the next generations rather than pass the buck!


#### Home Care Packages

#### **Buildings in Romsey**

There were many general stores in Romsey in the 1800's due to Romsey being on an alternate route to the Bendigo gold fields. Those general stores sold practically anything and everything. The one that we will feature in this article is the Supermarket now referred to as the 'ghost supermarket', at 89-91 Main Street. Robert Tynmouth Beasley is believed to have established this general store. When the post office was moved from the Royal Mail hotel in 1864, it was incorporated into Mr. Beasley's store which William Tweedale Moffat and his wife's brother



purchased in 1871. The business was advertised locally as 'Butson and Moffat,' Wholesale and Retail Draper, Post Office and Beehive Stores. Mr. Moffat was the postmaster until 1883 when the post office was re-located to a private home next to the store. Moffat fell on hard times and was forced to sell in the 1890's. Mr. Richard Merriefield moved into Moffatt's Store in 1898. Mr. Merriefield sold the business to Mr. Edward Ellis Oct 1906. Mr. Ellis was a young, single man that played football for Romsey. Subsequent owners were; Mr. Quigley 1924; Mr. E.S. May, who ran it through the years of the Depression and the War until he sold it to H. D. Allen in 1944 who renamed it the 'Romsey Self Service Store.' W. Moss 1964; Giveil 1969; B. Cornford 1975; R. McIldowie 1979; and the Habib family 1984. The original building was demolished and rebuilt in 1990. The Supermarket has been closed since 2014.

#### **Encourage Church**

Last month I provided an overview of Encourage Church. It is being reprinted this month for those who may have missed the June article. Encourage Church is an amazing church (yes, I am biased), so this month I am going to describe who we are and some of the things we do.
