

# Duckholes Village - Did You Know?

Set at the corner of
Duckholes Road and
Lancefield Road,
this former timber
hotel is now clad
with corrugated
iron but displays the
traditional splayed
corner entrance, simply
pitched hipped roof
form and early corbel
topped cemented brick
chimneys. The stables
at the rear have been
altered and re-clad.



The Duckholes hotel was first licensed in 1862. It is the last remaining building of the Duckholes village. The small village of Duckholes got its name from the numerous crab 'holes' in the area, which attracted hordes of ducks after they filled with rain, flocks of 2000 ducks were a common sight. Stock sales were held monthly in Romsey and Lancefield, stock on route to Clarkefield and Melbourne stopped at Duckholes reserve. There was also a school built about half a mile away from the hotel on Black Range Road, and it is believed that they were built about the same time.

The school opened in 1861 and closed in 1903, the school building was moved to Monegeeta where it formed part of the general store. The Duckholes post office was run from the Hotel until it was transferred to the school in 1876. There was a race track at Duckholes which held annual race meetings which brought the community together. The last licensee was Fred Stammers who found a gold nugget while burying a dead cat. The hotel was delicensed in 1896 and used as a residence by the Allen family for several decades.



# Why I support the Voice

# There are many disadvantaged groups in Australia, all of whom would surely like to have a greater say in government matters affecting them.

So why should one group, Indigenous Australians, be given a special and constitutionally enshrined voice to parliament? There is no doubting the extreme level of disadvantage in many Indigenous communities: the statistics on, for example, life-expectancy and imprisonment, are shocking and unacceptable. But while that is an often-stated reason for the Voice, it is not, in my view, a sufficient reason. So why do I support the Voice?

Firstly, the proposed Voice is intimately connected to the proposed recognition of Indigenous Australians in the words of the constitution - a recognition (widely supported) that they were the custodians of this land for thousands of years before colonisation. Such recognition is central to what defines Australia, so it should be more than just words. It needs to be more substantial. In my mind this justifies giving Indigenous Australians their own Voice to Parliament: that would be tangible recognition.

Secondly, the disadvantage that many Indigenous Australians experience has a different genesis from that of other disadvantaged groups. Much is the result of colonisation: their land was taken from them, many of their children were taken away, they were omitted from the national census, they lacked electoral franchise, they have been subjected to paternalistic laws. The impact of colonisation on them and their way of life has been nothing short of catastrophic, and warrants redress in a tangible way.

Thirdly, modern Australia has much to learn from the traditional practices and beliefs of Indigenous culture. Top of mind here is "connection to country", respect for non-human life, living in harmony with nature, being custodians not owners of the land. In contrast, modern Australia, with its worship of wealth, consumerism and exploitation of nature is demonstrably unsustainable both environmentally and ethically. It is perhaps wishful thinking on my part, but a louder indigenous voice could show us a way towards a brighter future.

# Uluru Statement from the Heart

"We, gathered at the 2017 National Constitutional Convention, coming from all points of the southern sky, make this statement from the heart:

Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander tribes were the first sovereign Nations of the Australian continent and its adjacent islands, and possessed it under our own laws and customs. This our ancestors did, according to the reckoning of our culture, from the Creation, according to the common law from 'time immemorial', and according to science more than 60,000 years ago.

This sovereignty is a spiritual notion: the ancestral tie between the land, or 'mother nature', and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who were born therefrom, remain attached thereto, and must one day return thither to be united with our ancestors. This link is the basis of the ownership of the soil, or better, of sovereignty.

It has never been ceded or extinguished, and co-exists with the sovereignty of the Crown.

How could it be otherwise? That peoples possessed a land for sixty millennia and this sacred link disappears from world history in merely the last two hundred years?

With substantive constitutional change and structural reform, we believe this ancient sovereignty can shine through as a fuller expression of Australia's nationhood.

Proportionally, we are the most incarcerated people on the planet. We are not an innately criminal people. Our children are aliened from their families at unprecedented rates. This cannot be because we have no love for them. And our youth languish in detention in obscene numbers. They should be our hope for the future.

These dimensions of our crisis tell plainly the structural nature of our problem. This is the torment of our powerlessness. We seek constitutional reforms to empower our people and take a rightful place in our own country. When we have power over our destiny our children will flourish. They will walk in two worlds and their culture will be a gift to their country.

We call for the establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution.

Makarrata is the culmination of our agenda: the coming together after a struggle. It captures our aspirations for a fair and truthful relationship with the people of Australia and a better future for our children based on justice and self-determination.

We seek a Makarrata Commission to supervise a process of agreement-making between governments and First Nations and truth-telling about our history.

In 1967 we were counted, in 2017 we seek to be heard. We leave base camp and start our trek across this vast country. We invite you to walk with us in a movement of the Australian people for a better future."

#### **SAUSAGE ROLLS**

#### Ingredients

- 1 packet of sausage mince
- I medium onion, diced
- 1 carrot, grated chopped parsley

- 1 egg beaten

# RECIPE

#### Method

- Combine sausage mince, onion, carrot parsley and seasoning in a large bowl.
   Cut pastry sheet in half horizontally. Spoon mixture onto one side of the pastry, brush opposite edge with egg mixture. Roll up pastry to enclose filling.
   Cut into required size.
- 2. Brush top with egg mixture and place onto a baking tray. Bake for 25 -30 minutes until golden.

#### APPLE TART WITH BURNT HONEY BUTTER

The little tin shed was in the back yard which was home to the chickens and the piglets and their pen with its mud puddle floor. The shed was where Buttercup, the Friesian cow, was milked each morning.

Leaning against the outside wall of the milking shed was an addition, in which the bees' honey was processed. The hand driven centrifuge and all the other paraphernalia needed to extract the bees' honey from the combs in which it was encased was tidily stacked under a rickety table.

Once Buttercup's milk was encouraged from her udder it was separated and churned into butter, which was stored beside the bottled honey before it was put into the fridge.

An apple tree branch loaded with Granny Smiths hung over the ring lock fence and it was from that direction that the bush fire crept into our life.

Fortunately, there was practically no wind to drive the flames, which we put out from around the home block with wet sacks attached to saplings.

And after the drama of the fire was over, I cooked a meal for the helpers. The dessert was an apple tart with burnt honey butter.



#### Ingredients

- 5 tablespoons honey
- 100g butter, softened
- sheets of puff pastry (unfrozen)
- 4 large Granny Smith apples



- 1. Line a baking tray with baking paper and then a layer of puff pastry. Slice the apples finely and layer them, slightly overlapping, to cover the pastry leaving free a 1 cm border around the edge. Bake in the oven, preheated to 200 deg.C, until the edges of the tart are golden. (About 20-30 minutes.)
- 2. Whilst that's happening, put the honey into a small double boiler saucepan and bring slowly to the boil (keeping your eye on it) then take it off the heat immediately. Whisk the softened butter until it's fluffy then add the hot honey.
- 3. When the apple tart is golden, take it out of the oven and brush gently with the honey-butter. Put the tart back in the oven for 5 minutes until the glaze starts to bubble.

That's all folks!


Support may include identifying your parenting goals and connecting you to parenting groups, counselling, family violence

RRBATA's VISION is: A vibrant, collaborative and prosperous eastern corridor community which enhances liveability in the region.



He has one more week with us and we have more experiences planned for this young man of 16 years.


He has been a delight to have in our home and show around, and will be sorely missed when he leaves us.



#### AUGUST 5th working bee to assemble LIFE-SAVING BIRTHING KITS

"Over 500,000 women die annually from infections like Tetanus caught from giving birth on unclean surfaces or using unclean equipment. Birthing kits provide the basis for a clean birth, with a clean mat, gloves, soap, clean blades, gauze and cord ties" said Dr Annamarie Perlesz, Zonta member and local GP.

Most Australian women can look forward to the safe arrival of a new baby. This is unlike parts of the developing world where maternal mortality is unacceptably high. About 800 women worldwide die from childbirth-related complications every day (World Health Organisation (WHO) report, Feb 23). Sub-Saharan Africa accounted for 70 percent of maternal deaths - and Southern Asia about 16 percent.

The Zonta Club of Kyneton will work to reduce these tragic deaths - assembling 800 birthing kits at a public working bee, from 10am August 5th at St. Mary's Church Hall, Hutton St, Kyneton (from 10am).

The kits will be distributed to 30+ countries via community outreach programs for pregnant women in rural and under-resourced communities.

Over 11,000 kits have been assembled by the Zonta Club of Kyneton since 2004, with the help of secondary school students and volunteers.

Our kits have been distributed as far and wide Ethiopia, Fiji, Papua New Guinea, Uganda, Afghanistan, Congo, Indonesia, Kenya and Haiti," Dr Perlesz said.

"We welcome volunteers to assist us at this special and important life-saving event on August 5th,' she said.

# Romsey soft plastics trial update – Romsey Rag

The Romsey soft plastics trial has shown some positive results since its launch in November 2022. In the last six months:

- more than two tonnes of soft plastic has been collected and processed into oil
- 50 per cent of participants had not used the Redcycle program before, demonstrating growth in our soft plastic recyclers
- 88 per cent of participants would like the trial to continue.

Over the next six months, Council will continue to monitor the trial and continue to work closely with the Australian Food and Grocery Council (AFGC) to look at ways to expand our recycling services across the shire.

#### From the Desk of Pastor Tim

#### | Giving All

I recently came across the story of Charles Mulli. Born in Kenya and with a traumatic childhood including abandonment by his family at age 6, begging, being abused and contemplating suicide. At age 16 he was invited to a youth meeting where he accepted Jesus as his personal Saviour and Lord.

At age 18 he started a number of odd jobs around Nairobi which helped him fund the purchase of a car four years later. The car he turned into a taxi and started his first business. This business continued to expand until he was operating a large transport company called "*Mullyways*". Charles also expanded his business interests into insurance, motor vehicle parts, LPG gas and agriculture, ending up very wealthy.

However, God spoke to Charles through an interaction he had with a group of street children, reminding him of his childhood. Three years later, Charles began selling ALL his properties and businesses and dedicating the proceeds to helping street children. He gave all that he had. Charles has operated "*Mully Children's Family"* for over 40+ years, even after initial rejection from close friends, business associates and his church. "Mully Children's Family" has assisted over 26,000 children in that time.

Charles Mulli story reminds me of the rich young man mentioned in Matthew 19:16-22 in the Bible. When he asked what more he could do, Jesus responded by telling him to "sell your possessions and give to the poor" (verse 21). The young man went away sad because he couldn't bring himself to do it. Yet Charles Mulli is an example of someone who did sell all, when Jesus asked him the same question. Charles is now storing up treasure in heaven. The question for us, is where are we storing up treasure?








#### | Winter offers us a time to reflect

#### Bible Reading: Isaiah 55: 10-11

"For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it."

The reading from Isaiah reminds me of how cold it can be in the snow. It reminds me of attempting to ski or stay on a toboggan, and trying to keep dry and warm. The prophet uses this illustration from nature to remind us of how important winter is for the water cycle, plant life and food production – and how God's Word achieves God's purposes.

This passage reminds me of the part we can play in responding to God's Word.

As God's children we have the capacity and responsibility of listening and acting on the words we hear from God, and to take part in the fulfilment of the Word of God.

Winter provides us some opportunities to pause and reflect and discern our response to the moving of God's presence and action in our community.

I pray that this winter, we might discern God's Word, and step out in faith to join in what God is doing.


