

The Continuing series of notable buildings in Romsey

(Former) Romsey Post Office 1890-1990

Much like matters concerning Romsey today, getting services and infrastructure from our government required the town to work together and put pressure on their public servants.

An open letter was published in the Romsey Examiner on the 19th of November 1886 requesting a proper post telegraph office. "You are treating us shamefully, and we cannot stand it any longer. Give us a decent post office straight away or we'll go into open rebellion."

Land was purchased for the site of the new post office in 1887 at 96 Main Street. The site sat vacant for two more years, and by February 1889 there still was no sign of progress of a post office for Romsey. Once again an open letter was written in the Romsey Examiner

"The present post office is not fit for a pig to live in in the winter, yet the very obliging lady who is now in charge has before her the anything but pleasant prospect of having to pass another wet season within its damp and fusty walls, with the monotony varied occasionally by the spectacle of her furniture floating about in the flood waters which annually make their way through this delightful building into the street."

Tenders were called finally in late February 1889. It was awarded to N. Irwin for the contracted amount of 1,315 pounds.

The residents of Romsey had their ideas for what they wanted their post office to look like.



"We would like a more attractive architectural scale than the one which has recently been erected by the Postal Department at Lancefield." There was a request for a clock tower as an example of this was built for the Bacchus Marsh post office. By 1890 the post office was built, but remained vacant a further two months due to bureaucracy. The clock tower, bathroom and veranda were added in 1900.

The Romsey post office is the oldest government building in the town. This post office was closed in 1990 and now forms part of the Romsey Hub.

Constitution a body that will be able to provide advice to governments on laws

Our Constitution does not give detail, it provides basic information and enables the parliament to add the detail. For example, the Constitution gives the federal government power to collect tax the Constitution does not mention income tax, company tax, taxes on petrol/diesel, cigarettes etc. That detail is the job of the parliament. The parliament can add to or subtract from its own legislation to cater for changing conditions within the country.

Should the referendum be approved, it will be up to the parliament to write and approve the legislation that enables "The Voice" and allows indigenous peoples to advise parliament and the executive on laws relating to their own peoples.

Over many years our state and federal governments have spent billions of dollars to improve health, housing, education and employment of the indigenous and while there have been many successes, today many indigenous people still live in conditions that the average non-indigenous Australian would not accept.

There are many successful indigenous people within our society but there are far more who have not had that opportunity.

Part of living in a democracy is informing ourselves so that when we vote we have the facts at hand. You owe it to yourself to find out for yourself, not just listen to the loudest voices.

October in the garden

Why grow indigenous plants.

Deep Creek Landcare Group plants indigenous trees and shrubs that we either grow from seed ourselves or source from suppliers such as The Tree Project or from Ian Taylor over at the Western Plains Flora in Wildwood. To understand the reasons why we should be planting as many indigenous plants as possible, I thought I would go to the experts at Grow Locals in Woodend; the brainchild of Tully Sumner and Marty Roberts. In addition to buying some tubestock for my garden, I received the following response from regular staffer, Lisa Gormley. In addition, Lisa and Marty generously provided some of their photos for use in the article.



Grow Locals is a local native nursery and landscape specialist. We are passionate about central Victorian communities and local plants and are committed to empowering people to act local and plant for climate resilience.

We grow locally, from locally collected seed. This has many benefits as indigenous plants are adapted to local climates and soils. Once established, they can survive the extremes and play a big role as refuge in times of drought when remnant populations are stressed.

Indigenous plants also provide for the specific needs, such as food and habitat, for local fauna and the beneficial insects that aid pollination and keep pest populations in check. The habitat they create provides opportunities that would otherwise not exist. Native plants and native animals have evolved together over time, so planting indigenous plants can help preserve the natural balance of your local ecosystem.

Grow Locals is keen to support everyone to create diverse local landscapes for the benefit of local species and local communities and offer a range of services such as plant supply, contract growing, consultation, revegetation plans and implementation.

Tully and Martin started their ecology education as local teenagers, exploring woodlands and waterways. What they found was often weed infested and devoid of diversity, silent and uninspiring. This experience set them on a course to make a difference. They have both been working in conservation and restoration ecology, the restoration of systems and ecological function, for 25yrs.

Working in diverse environments, from saltmarsh to grasslands, from damp forests to box ironbark woodlands, they have learnt by observation, they have been taught by environmental leaders, true visionaries, by researching stories, by doing, and by listening to the wider landscape, the ultimate teacher.

These experiences have provided insight into adaptive management approaches, which is the key to restoration success and staging efforts to create resilient projects and achieve landscape scale impacts.

Restoration success requires understanding structure, timed intervention and focusing resources. It requires knowledge of the local plants, the living components, and their needs. Every plant successfully established, changes the environment where it is. This is especially true when located in fragmented landscapes, as they create critical links to remnant populations, supporting the movement of genetic diversity, providing a lifeline for many species.

Grow Locals recognises that people are key, and that with the right information and supported with the right plants, they will make a difference to their local communities.

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. LEMON BUTTER

Ingredients

- 2 eggs 125g butter
- · 250g white sugar Zest of 2 lemons
- Juice of 3 lemons



Method

- 1. Beat eggs with sugar over a saucepan just until whisked, not stiff. [make sure the bottom of bowl is not touching the water]
- 2. Add butter, lemon zest and lemon juice. Stir over medium heat for about 15mins until mixture thickens like Honey. Cook for another 2-3 minutes, DO NOT BOIL. Keep in fridge for 3 months.

Tree Removed at Seymour Cottage

The State Government's 'Heritage Victoria' Department, who are responsible for Seymour Cottage's registration (H 2268), were required to notified and agree to its urgent removal and that a prior Heritage Permit or Permit exemption were in the circumstances not required. However Heritage Victoria did impose heritage protection conditions and the requirement for the prior submission of a Arboriculture tree report. Following requests for quotations from several Macedon Arboriculture businesses Lee Guppy and his team at Cut & Climb Tree Services were contracted the delicate task of removing the tree without damaging the heritage listed Seymour Cottage. From the photographs of the works you can see the Pin-Oak's impressive height and close proximity to Seymour Cottage. Removal of this potential tree danger will enable our Historical Society to safely consider and plan another Seymour Cottage Community Open Day in 2024.



Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

Many years ago I was best mates with a professional tea taster. But he died of bowel cancer (nothing to do with the tea he drank). He carried his knowledge of tea and its mysticisms and intricacies through to his everyday life.



He was a great friend and had me drink my tea in the correct fashion.

For instance, he maintained that one must put the milk into the cup AFTER the hot tea in case the hot tea SCORCHED the milk. He was a Scot with a broad accent and when I interviewed him for the ABC, I thought he said if one put the milk in first the hot tea would SCOTCH the milk.

And so I'd gone along with the belief that, if I put the tea last into the cup, I was drinking Scotch tea!

He was a member of the Naval & Military Club and he argued with the waiters and all became clear.

SCOTCH TEA demands a 'dram' of whiskey instead of milk.

ATLANTIC SALMON WITH A CREAM-TEA SAUCE

RECIPE

Ingredients

- 6 pieces
 Atlantic Salmon
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 tablespoons loose tea leaves
- 2 cups water
- 2 cups fish stock (or vegetable stock)
- 1 cup sour cream
- 3 fresh sage leaves

Method

- 1. Heat the olive oil in a large heavy frying pan till it's very hot. Carefully put the salmon pieces into the oil, skin side down and cover the pan. Heat for 10 minutes to seal the juices into the fish then take out the fish and put it onto a warm plate and keep warm till you're ready to serve it.
- 2. Make the tea with the tea leaves and 2 cups of hot water and let it brew for 3 minutes then strain out the leaves, stir in the stock and heat the mixture thoroughly.
- 3. Skim the fat off the bottom of the frying pan, pour in the tea/stock mixture and stir to deglaze the pan. Keep heating the liquid in the pan until it's reduced by a half then stir in the sour cream and continue heating to reduce the liquid by another third. Stir in the fresh sage leaves and let them warm through about a minute.
- 4. Pour a little of the hot sauce onto each of 6 plates, put a piece of salmon onto the sauce and pour more sauce on top of the fish.

Serve hot.

New Community Local Law 2023

Council has adopted a new Community Local Law 2023 – replacing the General Purposes and Amenity Local Law No. 10 of 2013 – which will come into effect from 25 September 2023.

The new Local Law was designed for the community to protect safety and amenity throughout the Macedon Ranges over the next decade.

Some of the key changes include:

- burning in the open air now prohibited on land less than 2,000 square metres
- broadening of accountability to include landowners – not just perpetrators
- gambling advertisements now prohibited on Council land or on a road
- new clause added to allow fireworks (conducted by a pyrotechnician) on private land, under strict conditions
- heavy vehicle parking now prohibited on land 2,000 square meters or less
- events, filming and busking now its own clause
- smoke-free zones added to the Local Law, allowing Council to prescribe and declare smoke-free (including e-cigarette-free) zones
- prohibiting collection of wood from Council land or a road
- stricter regulations around:
 - o unsightly and dangerous land and buildings
 - o scare guns
 - o building sites
 - o shopping trolleys

Thank you to everyone who provided feedback earlier this year which helped shape and enhance the new Local Law.

Council strongly encourages all members of the community to familiarise themselves with the new Community Local Law 2023 available online at *mrsc.vic.gov. aullocal-laws* and at Council offices.

Recycle your textiles, polystyrene and soft plastics for free



Council is now accepting textiles and clean polystyrene at resource recovery facilities (formerly transfer stations), in addition to soft plastics.

Council has partnered with Upcycle4Better to offer residents a sustainable recycling solution for their damaged clothes, shoes, linen and more. This free service is only for damaged or well-used textiles. Items that are in good condition should still be donated to your nearest op shop.

You can also recycle clean, white expanded polystyrene for free as part of a new trial, with the recycled product turned into items such as picture frames, skirting boards, decking and other household products. To be recycled, the polystyrene must be clean and free from dirt, tape, labels and ink.

Don't forget, you can also take your soft plastics for free too. A recent audit of kerbside general waste bins showed up to 70% of the bin was taken up by soft plastics.

Free catch-up HPV vaccinations

Council's immunisation clinic is offering catch-up HPV vaccinations for people aged 25 or under who have missed out.

The HPV vaccine protects against nine types of HPV that cause almost all cases of cervical cancer, other HPV-related cancers and genital warts. Australians aged 12-25 years can receive the HPV vaccine for free through the National Immunisation Program. Most people will receive it through school-based programs when they are 12-13 years old.

Usually, only one dose of the vaccine is required to be protected against HPV-related cancers and diseases, however people that are immunocompromised will require three doses of the vaccine.

If you or your child are under the age of 25 and haven't had a single dose of the HPV vaccine, you can find out more about Council's free immunisation sessions and make a booking at mrc. vic.gov.aulimmunisations

Rock Solid Future For Hanging Rock

The State Government has purchased Hanging Rock's East Paddock and released a new masterplan to further protect the cultural significance of the cherished destination.

Minister for Environment Ingrid Stitt announced the \$3 million investment will provide a clear pathway for the future management of the iconic Hanging Rock.

The newly acquired East Paddock will be integrated into the Hanging Rock Reserve – ensuring the precinct remains protected for years to come.

Events at the East Paddock will be carefully managed to limit impacts on nature and the surrounding environment.

Traditional Owners groups and the Macedon Ranges Shire Council were consulted extensively to develop the Hanging Rock Precinct Master Plan which outlines new actions on how to sustainably promote the regions cultural heritage.

The Plan also outlines future developments to protect the natural environment and improve the visitor experience, including a new revegetated 'Songline' walking trail and a visitor centre that will act as a hub for dining and education purposes.

The Government says it will continue to work towards a joint management arrangement with Traditional Owners,

Macedon Ranges Shire Council will continue to manage the day-today operations of Hanging Rock for at least another three years.

From the Desk of Pastor Tim

| The Faith of Friends

We have just finished re-roofing the Encourage church. As the roofers were taking the old tin off, it reminded me of the four men who brought their paralyzed friend to Jesus to be healed (see Mark 2:1-11 and Luke 5:17-26).



Jesus was preaching in a house. There was such a crowd that the four men could not carry their friend close enough. So, they went up onto the roof (the houses in those days had a flat roof and stairs to get up there) and dug a hole in the roof, letting their friend down through the roof into the crowd right in front of Jesus.

I'm not sure how I would react if people cut a hole in our newly done roof (hopefully with grace), but what is most striking is the effort the friends went to, to help their friend. When a difficulty arose, they came up with an innovative solution - one that wasn't easy to do. Mark 2:5 says "when Jesus saw their faith..." – the faith of friends.

I recently heard Lucy from LightFM talk about a difficult time in her life when she was depressed and suicidal. A close friend would ring her daily, sometimes hourly, and then had Lucy move to a granny flat on her property. That's the modern-day equivalent of cutting a hole in your roof for your friend.

If you think that you don't have friends like that, or like those of the paralyzed man, we'd love to become your friend. Come and visit us at 10am on a Sunday morning at 7 Mitchell Court in Romsey.
