Relay For Life

2024 will see the 21st Lancefield & Macedon Ranges Relay For Life (RFL). In its first 20 years this community event has raised \$1,738,000 for cancer research, prevention and support services. There are many other Relays all around the state every year.

Figures now indicate that every 2nd person will have some form of cancer, this may be a small, benign growth that is easily removed or a far more serious cancer requiring invasive surgery followed by one or both of radiation-therapy or chemotherapy. Both may make you very sick as they attack the tumour.

During 2022 just under 100 people were diagnosed each day with some form of cancer. Melanoma, skin cancer, diagnoses in rural Victoria are 47% higher than in the larger cities.

For each of these 2002 - 2023 Relays community members have clubbed together to form teams to raise funds through activities such as trivia nights, raffles and regular stalls at markets or IGA. Some sporting clubs have held special cancer events and many local businesses have donated items or funds to teams.

As with all these type of events the whole thing relies on the hard-work of a small band volunteers. The organising committee must work with both the Cancer Council and the various teams to make the day run smoothly and assist all to raise as many funds as possible.

The research that comes from the funds raised has seen better treatments for many cancers and break throughs that have resulted in higher survival rates.



The 1860 Opens

For Alexander Gorman, a good pub can be the glue of a community, a lesson he learnt in December from opening what is currently the only pub in Romsey, in the Macedon Ranges. The 1860 Romsey served 770 meals in its first 24 hours.

The town had been without a pub for seven years after its only other pub, the Romsey Hotel, had its application to install slot machines rejected and closed its doors. It has since lodged another application.

"It's divided the town," says Gorman.

"We want to show that we can run a hotel successfully without the need for pokie machines, based on really good food and good drinks."

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke

Recipe

We, who live by western dictates, understand that soup starts a meal, followed by an entree. Then we consume the main course, then the cheese, and finish with the dessert (though many Australians have the cheese after the dessert, or forgo one for the other).

Whereas many Asians have two soups during their meal - one being near the end of their meal.

We all know that many Asian meals are made up of a selection of small dishes containing diverse flavours and textures, unlike our main course of a slab of flesh beside



overcooked vegetables covered in a salt-laden, fatty, grey, glutenous gravy. (Mind you, the Asian cooks use too much cornflour to thicken their sauces, which is a flavour frightener.)

Anyway, I'm suggesting you combine the entreé in the soup. And maybe, depending on the size of the 'starters', you reduce the main course to its main ingredient - and don't have that too big either - remember you may have a cheese platter followed by dessert. If so, don't make the cheese platter a Botanic Gardens look alike! Keep it simple!

Or one can totally confuse the issue by starting the whole meal with a grilled pork chop with a walnut and garlic sauce then the soup and entreé.

Anyway, folks, make your favourite soup - any soup - and, while it heats, so will a small piece of salmon you've put in the soup (with its skin on to stop it falling apart during the heating). Make sure you cook it through. Take it out of the soup, remove the skin and put a crumbled portion in the bottom of a soup bowl, sprinkle a little Chinese Five Spice Over it. Pour in the soup. Pop in a half slice of toast which you've 'buttered' with Hummus and serve the bowl decorated with ONE baby spinach leaf.

*PS. The flavour of the soup is immaterial. It can be anything from pumpkin soup to tomato soup - whatever is your favourite!*clump together when cooked and forms 'glutinous' rice. Although all rice is naturally gluten free, 'glutinous' refers to its glue-like or 'sticky' rice texture.

PS. This recipe doesn't go well with a traditional Christmas cake, but a Lions Christmas cake, wet with a little brandy and fashioned into miniature Christmas cake balls with a little melted white chocolate on top is good-oh. For those brave enough to put a spoonful of glutinous rice beside the Christmas cake - good luck to you.

Tea 4 You?

In colonial times tea-trees were unloved; cleared to make way for crops and grazing. Except when tea supplies didn't arrive from England - then an infusion of native teatree leaves in hot water had to suffice –hence, their common name.

Tea -trees are a favourite of our Landcare group. We've planted plenty of Prickly Tea-trees (leptospermum continentale) and Woolly Tea-trees (leptospermum lanigerum); often in damp areas and along creeks. Prickly Tea-trees grow quickly to around 2 to 3 m and flower profusely in late spring and summer. Woolly Tea-trees flower then also and grow quickly to about 4 m. Both can be cut back and hedged or used in flower arrangements. Tea-tree flowers attract a myriad of insects and birds. Manuka honey comes from the nectar of leptospermum scoparium, indigenous to New Zealand and coastal Australia. Tea-tree oil, however, does not come from tea-trees but from Melaleuca alternifolia.

Similar shrubs we love are Sweet Bursaria (bursaria spinosa) and Bushy Needlewood (hakea decurrens). Like tea-trees, the flowers are small and sweetly scented. Sweet Bursaria grows quickly to 8 m and flowers in early summer. Bushy Needlewood grows to 5 m and has white, sometimes pink winter flowers. Both are great habitat plants – prickly and offer protection for small birds such as blue wrens and flowers attract bees and insects which in turn attracts micro bats and birds that feed on insects.

Varroa mite is a problem for the European honey bee. Insecticides and climate change impact on insect populations around the world; consequently, we must improve habitat and diversity of pollinators.


Australia is home to 400 butterfly, 11000 moth and 2000 bee species. There are 1300 known species of ants, 3000 species of beetles, 5650 species of bugs and up to 30000 species of flies1! Add in caddisflies, dragon flies, earwigs, cockroaches, wasps, lacewings, grasshoppers, phasmids, mantids, mayflies, scorpion-flies, spiders and others. No wonder, when I pop outside to look at indigenous plants, I see a vast array of insects. Many are beautiful and unknown to me. But I know they are important – sustaining ecosystems, millions of years in the making. These insects need shrubs, trees and grasses - and the plants, in turn, need insects. Planting Tea-trees, Sweet Bursaria and Bushy

Needlewood is a great step in the right direction. Their size allows many insects to be at eye level - easy to find and observe, but be patient! Insects are skittish but get used to our presence and resume activity. Add this to beautiful, scented flowers and we are on a winner!

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25; and Myna bird traps to Ioan. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. Upgrades to the unsealed Kettlewells Road in Romsey are now underway, improving safety and amenity for a route commonly used by heavy vehicles.

Home to Council's award-winning storm waste facility, the Kettlewells Gravel Pit Reserve and several rural residences, a large section of the road is set to benefit from road sealing, improved drainage and a new bus shelter at the intersection of Melbourne-Lancefield Road.

These works are funded by Emergency Management Victoria and the Kettlewells Gravel Pit Reserve, and are expected to be finished by the end of the year. Minor delays are expected for road users during the works.

Kettlewells Road is among a number of road upgrades prioritised across the shire as part of Council's 2023/24 Capital Works Program.

Protect yourself from mosquito-borne disease

Mosquitoes can carry diseases that may be passed on to people through mosquito bites. In Australia, some of these include Murray Valley encephalitis virus, Ross River virus, Barmah Forest virus, Dengue virus, Japanese encephalitis and West Nile virus.

Periods of heavy rainfall or floods can lead to ideal breeding conditions for mosquitoes, even in non-tropical areas. Diseases that are spread by insects are known as 'vector-borne' diseases. Mosquito-borne diseases can make people ill and, in severe cases, can cause death.

How to avoid mosquito bites:

There are many simple things you can do to avoid getting bitten by mosquitoes, including:

- wearing long, loose-fitting clothes if mosquitoes are around
- covering up as much as possible
- using an effective mosquito repellent, containing either picaridin or diethyltoluamide (DEET) on all exposed skin
- using plug-in mosquito vaporisers or diffusers with repellent-treatment pads in enclosed external areas like verandahs and decks these should be switched off as soon as the area is no longer in use
- · preventing mosquito breeding around your own home
- maintaining fly screens on windows, doors, vents and chimneys (screens should be no coarser than 12 x 12 meshes per 25mm, or 1.2mm - use an even coarser mesh if you wish to keep out other smaller biting insects, like sandflies)
- using mosquito coils in outdoor areas these should be supervised at all times.

Feedback is now invited on designs showcasing what the new Romsey Skatepark would like, with \$550,000 already committed by the Victorian Government towards construction.

An upgrade driven by the Lancefield Romsey Lions Club for a number of years, including periods of community consultation throughout 2022 and 2023, the new skatepark would feature a large bowl, a quarter pipe, pump track and a series of hips and corners.

Council endorsed a period of community consultation at its November 2023 Council Meeting, having allocated \$20,000 towards initial planning works in the Budget 2023/24. Work is continuing behind the scenes to secure the full funding amount required to build the new skatepark.

Your Soul

If you try to hang on to your life, you will lose it. But if you give up your life for my sake [that is, for Jesus], you will save it. And what do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul? Is anything worth more than your soul? (Matthew 16:25-26, NLT)

Your soul is where the physical (your body) meets the spiritual. Your soul is all of you, your 'life'. When you refer to "my soul", you are literally saying "I, myself". The original word in Greek in the verses above is psychē ($\psi \upsilon \chi \dot{\eta}$), which sums it up pretty well. Even the translation of 'life' in the verses uses the Greek word psychē.

I have always found "And what do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul?" an evocative question. A number of bible translations actually say "forfeit your soul", making it sound like you have cancelled yourself. An attribute of your soul is its existence beyond physical survival and success. The verses above are saying that the things of this world will not do you any good if you "forfeit" your eternal existence.

We often think about "gaining the whole world" in terms of material possessions, but for me it also means instances of lowering my standards or compromising my morals. Romans 12:2 says "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind."

Are you chasing after the things of this world, or are you compromising the things that you shouldn't? Is anything worth more than your soul?

How you feel depends on what you think, so if your thoughts are getting you down, turn your attention to something that tickles your funny bone.


A genuine smile can be as good as a present for someone in need of love, hope or attention.







Road and footpath upgrades have now been completed along the west side of Hutchinsons Lane in Romsey.



Romsey Mens Shed Report!

New members and a good year! We encourage men from the District to come along and join the Romsey Mens Shed. As we reflect on the past 12 months, we kept our membership at around 60. Probably the largest in Macedon Ranges Shire. A nice size for interaction and friendships; our main objectives. Some members engaged in woodwork, metal work, welding and automotive - where a key project is restoration of the 1925 T model Ford. 2023 activities ended when three members performed at the Carols function at the Romsey Primary School.

T Model significance. The T model is stripped to the chassis, as it is being restored from the ground up. It still attracted attention when displayed on a trailer at the Romsey- wide Market Day, Caribbean Gardens AOMC motor show and outside the IGA, at a sausage sizzle.

Thanks to Bendigo Community Bank funding we are refurbishing wheels on Stage I of the project. Get the "T" chassis mobile. The T model series has historical relevance as the first from the Henry Ford mass production process.

Shed activities. This is members choice. We provide a "safe" comfortable place for men to gather and if they want to, work on projects - sometimes community-based ones - or just mix, have a coffee and chat. About four times a year we have bus excursions and now have a federal government grant for subsidised excursions. We meet quarterly with other Macedon Ranges Shire Mens Sheds to exchange ideas.

Wanting "hands-on" for a new or enhanced skill? Our section leaders can organise practical workshop training; even glass cutting, by arrangement. We also make novelty items for the Romsey Co-Op.

Thursday \$5 BBQ/Light lunch day. The Thursday \$5 barbeque/light lunch at 12 is well attended by members and an occasional guest and the donations from Joshs' Eggs enhance the snags. 9.30 to about 2pm is the usual Thursday open time. Occasionally we have guest speakers on topical subjects.

Tuesday and Wednesday. On Tuesdays we are open from 9 to 4 and the Woodwork group gather on Wednesdays, with open times depending on projects. Other times can be arranged.

Future expansion plans. From an AGM in an empty concrete and steel shell in November 2020, demand for Mens Shed activities has increased and we need more space and our new Mezzannine floor has helped. And after negotiations with the MRSC (Macedon Ranges Shire Council) we hope to get our Crown Land lease expanded East a few metres and when we get the funding, build an extension.
