

Absolutely Faking It - Tiana Templeton



The rains across the end of autumn have signalled a likely end to our extended drought – but have also signalled a looming problem for Romsey town residents and rural landholders. The unseasonably warm May coupled with the rains has encouraged the germination of a range of weeds – particularly Capeweed and Paterson's curse. The easiest time to recognise you have a weed problem is when they begin to flower in spring – but that's often the most difficult time to control them.



Now's a good time to consider preventative maintenance to root out your weed problem before it really takes hold in spring. It's a potential problem both for town gardens and lawns as well as rural paddocks. Paterson's curse and other broadleaf weeds are in the rosette stage at the moment, so people should identify them and get onto eradication promptly.

The drought has potentially contributed to the weed problem. These weeds can be introduced to your garden in mulch such as pea straw. The use of mulch has increased during the drought, as people try to save their gardens. You should be asking questions such as where the mulch is from, and about its quality. The transport of mulch and fodder over the drought also poses a problem for our roadsides and rural properties. Vehicle hygiene is critical to avoid weeds spreading on our road network.

Capeweed and Paterson's curse can ruin gardens and lawns by growing vigorously in spring, and then dying off – leaving large bare patches which can then be colonised by other weeds. The vigorous growth can also be spread by your lawnmower. Capeweed is very noticeable in late spring and early summer with its increase in size and profusion of large yellow daisies with black centres. Paterson's curse is an erect biennial with purple flowers. Although stock will eat Capeweed, it's of lower nutritional value than good pasture. Stock can also die if they over-graze on it, as they may accumulate toxic levels of nitrate in their bodies.

Grubbing is an effective control in autumn through to spring. You can loosen the surrounding soil with a fork then lift out the weed, taking care the entire root is intact. Herbicides are also effective. Council's weeds project officer, Andrew Scanlon can provide advice and information on weeds and their control, and can be phoned on 5429 9606.

Fire safety – get in early

Rural landholders and those living on small acreages or bushland properties should be thinking now about getting ready for next fire season. Now's a good time for cleaning up around the home and property after summer, and reviewing your fire plan. We should all be thinking about speaking to our local CFA for information and advice. Now's the time.





Recently I received a phone call asking if 'nannas' can join our toy library. And the answer is ... absolutely! Grandparents are most welcome to join the toy library and borrow toys to help entertain visiting grandchildren. And, with so many grandparents now providing day care on a casual or permanent basis for their grandchildren, they are sure to find our service very handy! We already have a number of members who provide a Family Day Care service and like to ensure they have a many and varied range of toys on offer in their homes.

All toys can be borrowed for two weeks at a time and this is a great way for grandparents to have a constant new source of amusement for the little ones. It also means grandparents don't have to go to the expense of buying new toys and the often difficult task of finding somewhere to store them!

With membership of the library just \$15 for six months and \$25 for a whole year, our fees are very affordable for everyone.

Call into St Mary's Hall (behind the Catholic Church) in Main Street, Romsey, on Saturday mornings from 10am-11.30am and you can view our range of toys and sign up!

Another question I am often asked is whether Lancefield residents can join the library. And the answer is, once again, absolutely! Anyone who lives in the area is most welcome to join, as long as they are able to visit the library in Romsey on Saturday mornings as, at present, that is the only time we are open.

Once again, drop in and see us and we'll sign you up!

Toy Library Secretary Anna Quigley and I have attended several meetings regarding the planning of the new Romsey Community Hub, of which the toy library will be a part when the hub opens next year. The meetings are held every month to ensure the planning for the hub and the transition into it go smoothly. More on that next month.

The cheque for the toy library's fantastic \$2717 Federal Government has arrived and is being spent as I write on a new laptop, software, portable first aid kit, digital camera and storage containers for the library. For those who missed out on the news, the toy library has benefited from the Federal Government's Volunteer Small Equipment Grants (FACSIA) program, which helps the work of volunteers within community organisations.

We have gained more new members in the past month, so a big welcome to them! We very much appreciate your interest and support, and hope you are enjoying borrowing from our range.

The toy library's application for a Shire of Macedon Ranges grant to help improve and extend our range of toys has been lodged, and we are anxiously awaiting the outcome. If successful, the toy library is likely to begin a 'party pack' which will be able to be hired by members and people in the wider community. Details are still to be finalised, but it's likely the party pack will comprise lightweight, child-sized tables and chairs and a range of toys people will be able to use when hosting a party at home. Items such as our nylon collapsible tunnel and games which children can play i.e. sacks for a sack race, will take the burden off parents having a party at home. The party pack hire fee will

enable the toy library to gain some much-needed income and reduce our reliance on grant money to improve and expand our service.

Special advance notice to members and the community alike of the toy library's one and only fundraiser for the year – a sausage sizzle at Bunnings in Sunbury. The date is Saturday, September 2 – the day before Father's Day, so we expect the store will be extremely busy! More on that event in next month's column.

A special thank you to the St Mary's Parish for allowing us to operate from the St Mary's Hall, as we have for many years at a nominal rent. While the toy library committee is extremely excited about moving to the new Romsey Community Hub next year, we are at the same time very grateful to the Parish for allowing us to use their hall on Saturday mornings to run the toy library and for giving us storage space. The parish community has been a supporter of the toy library from the beginning and we could not run without them, so thanks for their ongoing support of the local toy library.

As always, we need new members! Memberships are still \$15 for 6 months or \$25 for one year, regardless of the number of children in your family. We have lots of 'big toys' – scooters, Cozy Coupe cars for toddlers, jeep rideones, trikes, see-saws and the like – which are great to borrow as they are expensive to buy.

Come along one Saturday morning and check out our range! We have hundreds of puzzles, games, large and small toys, ride-ons, LeapPads, Leapsters and educational CD-ROMs for you to borrow for children aged from birth to 12 years.



In The Community Forum— Woodend, March 2007.

Summary of day

More than 40 people came together from across the Macedon Ranges Shire to have their say on local issues at the first In the Community event for 2007. Hosted by the Department for Victorian Communities at the Woodend Community Centre, the forum provided the opportunity for local community members and business leaders to share ideas and debate issues affecting their communities. One recognised feature of the Shire is the lack of an obvious centre It was a useful meeting and talking with or hub. Each township has a unique identity and passionate communities - but collaboration between townships is limited. Community members who attended the event were keen to encourage more information sharing and exchange across the Shire, to bring people together to generate ideas and learn from one another.

Welcome and overview

MC Lynne Haultain opened the evening. Macedon Ranges Shire Mayor, Councillor Helen Relph, asked people to channel their passion for their townships and consider the possibility of getting a community project started. The Minister for Skills, Education Services, Employment and Women's Affairs, Jacinta Allan, highlighted the opportunity to listen and learn from one another. She said a priority for the Government was to provide services in growing areas that meet community needs. She said government representatives at the forum could help provide advice on Government grants to help finance great ideas, or help link-up with other government departments or similar projects.
