

As the rollout of gas continues in your town, its important that all households wishing to connect to natural gas put in an 'Expression of Interest' to a gas retailer

You have the opportunity to apply to three retailers for connection to natural gas, they are;

- AGL -1800 680 430
- TRUenergy 8635 3074
- Origin 8635 3074

Natural gas is also a much more convenient energy source than fire wood and is a cleaner energy alternative.

You might also like to ask your chosen retailer about deals for combining your gas and electricity bills that could further reduce your energy costs.

We have already seen significant extensions to the network thanks to the cooperative efforts of neighbours.

For those not in the initial reticulation area I would urge you to put in a joint application to a retailer with your neighbours for an extension of the network.

The Natural Gas Extension Program is one of the biggest investments in infrastructure in our community and I am very proud to be part of the Government that, in cooperation with SP AusNet, has enabled gas to be brought to our towns.

Connection to natural gas will significantly reduce your energy bills, with the average household saving between \$600 and \$1200 a year.







Limb trim push for overhanging trees

The Council needs to ramp up its program of trimming dangerous branches overhanging our roads for improved safety, and I'll be pushing for this to be done. A number of residents have raised this issue as one of concern, and I agree that we need to devote more staff and resources to it. However, there are a number of authorities who have responsibility for different parts of our roads, including VicRoads, and Council will also be calling on them to do their bit.

Our Road Management Plan needs to be reviewed to provide for more inspections of the town and rural roads and streets which are our responsibility, and for works crews to be available to promptly carry out the trimming and pruning required. These extra resources need to be covered in the upcoming budget, and I will be seeking adequate funding to enable the program to be expanded.



In most cases, trees on roadside reserves will not need to be removed. Careful pruning and removal of limbs should ensure that the aesthetic qualities of our roadside vegetation are not unduly impacted on, while at the same time improving safety. We have all seen instances where high vehicles have hit and brought down branches as they travel along the road, and other instances where some quite large limbs have fallen across the road in a storm or high winds. Pruning of limbs on the overhanging side of the trees will reduce this impact. Low-hanging limbs and foliage, especially on bends and embankments can also obscure signs, which can be a safety issue.

Roadside vegetation plays an important role in wildlife habitat, particularly as corridors for animals to travel between more extensive habitat areas. Thoughtful pruning of trees will enable this role to continue. In many cases, some of our best hollows and shelters suitable for birds, possums and other wildlife are in the older gums on roadside verges. A regime of pruning will enable the retention of most of these hollows, and I will be seeking to ensure our environmental services continue to be involved in the program along with our works crews.

I believe the ramping up of our program and review of our Road Management Plan will enable Macedon Ranges Shire to again be to the fore in balancing the needs and amenity of our residents with the wildlife and habitat retention which makes our Shire such a desirable and attractive place.

Anyone with concerns over particular overhanging trees on roads should bring them to our attention by phoning the Council on 1300 656 577 or contacting VicRoads, or calling in at one of the Council service centres.

Romsey Primary School News

Over the first days of the school year all classes participated in the "Quality Beginning" program. This explores and strengthens understanding of our school values of Happiness, Learning, Inclusion, Caring and Relationships. Additionally students identified the elements of a good classroom, student and teacher; covering our Positive Behaviour Management Program, resiliency Bounceback program and working on setting learning and social goals for the year. The commencement of the year is the time to set high expectations for behaviour and learning.

ICT Upgrade

Information & Communication Technologies at school is the use of computers, digital cameras, scanners and other electronic equipment as tools to enhance student learning. At Romsey Primary School we provide the opportunity for all children to interact and develop skills in Information & Communication Technologies which can be used in a broad range of applications. Our goals are:

- To regularly update and expand the range of Information & Communication Technologies hardware, software and access to improve student learning.
- To achieve the Departmental suggested guideline of one computer for each five students, and,
- For students to be competent and confident with a range of Information & Communication Technologies hardware and software.

In order to keep our Information and Communication Technology current the school has undertaken a number of key strategies in recent years. These have included the leasing of equipment so our computer stock is up to date, the expansion of the range of communication and information technology to include scanners, digital cameras and additional printers, and the greater integration of this technology into a wider range of curriculum areas. Parents of senior students were treated to the work our students had completed in LOTE, Visual Arts and Performing Arts last year with very impressive digital presentations.

An on-going challenge continues to be in expanding and upgrading our school computer network infrastructure and incorporating an expanding range of

Communication and Information Technologies available to schools. Recently Walking School Bus we were informed that a submission forwarded to the Federal Department of Education in the "Investing in Schools Program" has been successful. Under this program we will receive \$85,000 for a network upgrade and the kids find their feet. The Walking provision of a number of interactive whiteboards. Interactive whiteboards are a powerful learning tool with applications across a range of curriculum areas. They operate as an active touch 'driver' leading from the front and an screen visible to the whole class. Our long term plan would be to have this facility in all classrooms. This funding will enable our students to continue to enjoy up to date and powerful tools to support their learning.

Student Leadership

There are many opportunities for students to develop advanced leaderships walk is rewarded with a certificate. We skills at Romsey Primary School. In addition to the formal positions of School Captains and positions on Student Council, students have opportunities to develop leadership through sports teams, Peer Mediation, class meetings and in the daily living and demonstrating our school values. Congratulations to these students.

The Walking School Bus program was launched at Romsey Primary School last year and continues to go from strength to strength. This program provides an ideal opportunity to let the School Bus involves a group of children walking to and from school under the supervision of adult volunteers. The 'bus' operates with an adult volunteer adult volunteer 'conductor' supervising from the rear. The group walks along a set route which is safety audited by council and picks up 'passengers' along the way at designated bus stops. Each registered passenger on the bus is given a passport. Every-time the child boards a 'bus', their passport gets stamped by the conductor. Every 10th call it the Frequent Walker Program.

The Walking School Bus program provides considerable individual and community health benefits including:

Health: walking to and from school provides children with the opportunity to engage in regular physical activity.

Environmental: by providing an alternative to car travel, it is environmentally friendly and helps to alleviate traffic congestion and decrease pollution.

Safety: walking helps people to become more familiar with their neighbourhood. It also provides children with the opportunity to develop and improve road safety and pedestrian skills.

Currently we have two routes and are still looking for volunteers for an additernoon a week, so if you have an hour free once a week, why don't you put your name down as a volunteer on a bus. It's a great way to meet other families in your neighbourhood. All volunteers undergo a police-check and have to attend a short training session. Information kits for volunteers are available from the school office.

Once your application is approved you need to contact a licensed plumber or gas fitter to arrange any necessary appliance conversion or installation works. There may be charges applicable depending on the works required.

Step four

You now need to contact your natural gas retailer to arrange the installation of a gas meter. To do this your natural gas retailer will require your plumber's licence number and your certificate of compliance.

Even if your street is not on the initial reticulation route there is still an opportunity to connect to natural gas. Residents need to contact a retailer to express their interest, and we recommend getting together with neighbours and others in your street to submit a group application. FRAN SECURES FUNDING FOR MACEDON RANGES LOCAL SCHOOL PROJECTS

Our Macedon Ranges region received a great start to the new school year with almost \$1million in new Federal funding for local schools, Local Federal Member Fran Bailey said today.

"I am delighted to have been able to secure more than \$680,000 from the Federal Government's Investing in Our Schools program for our local schools to carry out projects which they have identified as being important," Fran said. "On top of this great news, we have a further \$300,000 investment for Stage Two of Gisborne Secondary College's new building works; this adds to the \$1million already invested in 2006. Investing in Our Schools is designed to help our schools achieve projects which are often high on the list of needs, but it is difficult for parents and teachers to fundraise for these amounts. We are very lucky that all of our region's schools have great support from parents and friends of the school community, but there are only so many fundraising cake stalls, raffles and fun-runs that you can hold in a town where there are many other groups desperately in need of funding. Primary schools in Bolinda, Clarkefield, Hesket, Lancefield, Mount Macedon, Riddells Creek, Romsey and Woodend Primary Schools and Gisborne Secondary College, will be able to carry out important projects such as building extensions, playground development, airconditioning installation and information technology system upgrades."

Gisborne Secondary College Principal, John Flanagan, said the school was delighted to receive both the capital funding and Investing in Our Schools funding, to start off the school year.

"We are delighted that the Investing in our Schools Program will provide Gisborne Secondary College with funds to purchase a mini-bus," Mr Flanagan said. "This has been a dream of ours for many years but it has always proven too difficult to raise the necessary funds. The bus will enable us to further enhance the range and quality of the programs we can offer our students. We are very appreciative of the support of our Federal Member, Fran Bailey, in seeking this funding. The news of an extra \$300,000 from the Commonwealth Government for our Capital Works program, on top of the \$1.1m allocated last year, is a wonderful surprise. I am hopeful that we will be able to significantly expand the scope of the proposed project and make further, much-needed improvements to our buildings."







The following article is taken from a booklet called "Love is a wild bird". Written by Eddie Askew and published by the Leprosy Mission International in the United Kingdom.

Jeremiah 18: 3-4 (New International Bible)

So I went down to the potter's house, and I saw him working at the wheel. But the pot he was shaping from the clay was marred in his hands; so the potter formed it into another pot, shaping it as seemed best to him.

Sitting on the table in front of me is a present – a beautifully engraved silver bowl. A lovely gift. Some time ago I was in India, visiting a hospital where I'd been invited to share in the opening of a new ward.

The ceremony's similar all over the world – a white ribbon strtched across the main entrance, the medical staff and all the patients who can walk standing on either side with local dignitaries. A few speeches later I was handed the scissors to cut the ribbon. I tried, but unfortunately the scissors wouldn't cut. I tried again. The ribbon just got caught between the blades. I say blades. That was the trouble. The scissors were real silver, made especially by the local silversmith in the bazaar but they were too blunt to cut.

Then smiles of embarrassment gave way to relief as a resourceful nurse passed over a pair of surgical scissors, stainless steel and sharp. They worked. We all laughed and forgot about it. Weeks later, when I was back home, a parcel arrived. Inside was the silver bowl with a letter. They'd taken the original scissors back to the silversmith and he'd reused the silver to make the bowl.

The scissors, blunt and not very useful, were given a second chance, and something beautiful had come out of it. It's always good to give people a second chance when things don't work out quite right. Afterall, we all need one.

Lord, help me to see the best in everyone I meet today. And thank you that you do the same for me.



Radiofest in Kyneton

Up to 1,000 amateur radio enthusiasts are expected to flock to a new major event 'RadioFest' at Kyneton next month. Centre Victoria RadioFest Chairman, Jim Linton said strong interest is being shown from within Victoria and interstate by those already engaged in the hobby or wanting to know more about it. Mr Linton said the event at the Kyneton Race-course on Sunday, 22 April will include traders with the latest radio products, a huge second-hand market, come n' try activities, displays and interesting talks. He said, "Recent licence changes have resulted in amateur radio becoming one of Australia's fastest growing hobbies and a fascinating new way to communicate for everyone. It's an interesting activity that enables ordinary people to communicate all over the world and even to talk to crew members on the International Space Station. For anyone thinking about a career in technology there's no better skill to have than that of being a radio amateur."

Mr Linton said since the Black Friday bushfires of 1939 they have provided emergency communications during times of natural disasters with the latest being the summer bushfires in north-east Victoria and Gippsland.

A revival in amateur radio is mainly due to a new Foundation Licence that has seen more than a 1,000 people in 12 months join the hobby "This new entry level licence requires about 20 hours of study that usually includes a weekend training course, before qualifying for a licence and getting on the airwaves," Mr Linton said. "It's now attractive to people from their pre-teenage years through to senior citizens and is an ideal common interest for several members of any family."

He said Kyneton is an ideal location for the RadioFest, intended to become an annual event, being less than an hour from Melbourne, Ballarat and Bendigo.

RadioFest, organised by the statewide body Amateur Radio Victoria, Central Goldfields Amateur Radio Club (Maryborough) and Midland Amateur Radio Club (Bendigo), will be at the Kyneton Racecourse on Sunday, 22 April starting at 10am.


