



# Septic sceptic

The Shire has been doing considerable work on the disposal of domestic waste water, and part of the job has been to carry out a census on properties connected to septic tanks. A profile of the Shire indicates we have 7730 septic tank systems, but our investigation indicates there could be considerably more. I have supported the program to connect our towns to the sewerage system, but we need to ensure that those properties which are still using septic tanks do so efficiently and with minimal impact on their neighbours. The Shire has prepared its draft *Domestic Wastewater Management Plan*, and it will lead us to developing policies to ensure that the waste from septics is retained on-site. Our figures show that Romsey has 369 properties still using septic tanks, Lancefield 428, Darraweit Guim 148, Clarkefield 113 and Riddells Creek 640. A further 547 rural properties in the Deep Creek catchment are on septic.



A septic system works efficiently in disposing of effluent – if it is properly maintained and if further development of the property does not compromise the ground where the liquid is meant to be absorbed and disposed. Inefficient use of the system can lead to pollution of local waterways along drainage lines, and also threatens the integrity of groundwater.

People should remember to have the sludge in their septic tank pumped out when required, and to avoid over-use which can lead to overflows. I have seen cases where people have built facilities such as driveways and tennis courts over their effluent fields, and this significantly restricts the ability to dispose of the waste. People wanting more information about how they can most efficiently use their septic should ring Phil Harvey at the Council on 5429 9600.

### **Dry argument for road maintenance**

Residents using some of the unmade back roads around the district may be a bit concerned that the Shire is falling behind in its maintenance – and they are right. But the gravel roads maintenance is not on schedule due to limited access to water, and I will be pushing for the program to be ramped up as soon as the weather breaks. Water is required during routine grading maintenance to ensure that the road-base material is compacted. The current dry conditions after years of drought mean that water is still in short supply. Normal inspections of gravel roads is still being undertaken. Only roads that urgently required grading will be done until water availability improves.

#### **Water concessions**

People on eligible concession cards who have had to buy in water for domestic purposes during the drought are eligible for rebates. The Carted Water Rebate allows up to three rebates per year to assist low-income households with the cost of purchasing non-mains domestic water. Anyone from Romsey or surrounding areas who thinks they are eligible should ring the Department of Human Services Concessions Unit on 1800 658 521.



The Youth Action Committees provide opportunities for young people to develop skills and gain confidence in areas such as community consultation, youth leadership, communication, conflict resolution, negotiation skills, organizational skills, media liaison, publicity and public speaking.

On Sunday 28 January and Monday 29 January 2007 all OurS Youth Action Committee members have the opportunity to attend a two-day Leadership Training Course, specifically designed to develop their skills critical to the OurS Project, but also incredibly important in everyday life. Participants will get to put their new skills into practice on the second day when they are faced with the 'Pinnacle of Terror' program, which involves participants completing six adventure activities that challenge participants both physically and mentally.

OurS Project Coordinator Annie Rowland said the OurS Project is going to be full of obstacles for these young people. "It is not an easy task attempting to improve outcomes for young people and develop something from nothing. I am hoping that the combination of the training and the 'Pinnacle' experience will put these young people in the best possible position to get the community on board and really create some tangible changes for young people in their local communities," she said. "It is the young people that will lead this program and we have some fantastically talented and committed young people involved in this project. Having said that, there's still time for other young people to get involved."

Adult volunteers are also sought to help mentor and support the Youth Action Committees. 

### The Olive Sisters - Amanda Hampson

It is always so enjoyable to read a new author's first book and think, "That was a great read; I wonder when her next book will be published?" This was the case with Amanda Hampson's first novel, 'The Olive Sisters', which tells the stories of three generations of the one family, tales that weave their way together around the central feature of the olive grove. Just like olives, some of the characters are better developed than others, but overall the story is a quiet reflective piece about family life and secrets.

Even after all this time: a story of love, revolution and leaving Iran - Afschineh Latifi

In recent years it has become politically acceptable in Australia to rename refugees as either illegal immigrants or queue jumpers – as though there were actually migration procedures available in the totalitarian regimes from which they have fled. This clever misrepresentation of their situation diminishes their claims of asylum in the public's eyes.

However in this fascinating and, at times, heart-wrenching book Afschineh Latifi allows the reader a poignant insight into the reality of life after a fundamentalist revolution installs a dictator and his henchmen into power and the resulting harassment and fear of the majority of the population.

The author was just 10 in 1979 when the Shah fled the country of her birth, Iran, and the Ayatollah Khomeini seized power. She tells her family's remarkable story of heartbreak and resilience under such a harsh and repressive regime. Her father is unlawfully executed and her mother defies all the odds, not only to keep her family of four small children together for as long as possible, but to impress upon them both the importance of learning and the importance of helping others less fortunate. Given that two of the children became doctors and the other two lawyers she succeeded admirably. A remarkable book.

#### Tamar - Mal Peet

Never judge a book by its cover...well I grabbed this one because it had a photo of a Lancaster bomber on the front, thought it might appeal and it certainly did. Set in the present 1995 – 2005 in England and at the very end of the Second World War in Holland, it tells the story of Tamar, his operational name, who parachutes into occupied territory, falls in love with a Dutch girl and tries to unite the various resistance factions in his part of the country. Many years later he suggests to his son that his grand-daughter to be is called Tamar and it is left to her, as a teenager, to unravel the mystery of not only her grandfather's wartime secrets, but her own father's disappearance when she was five. A fascinating read that allows the reader to experience the 'famine winter' of 1944-45 and all its repercussions.



We always welcome new producers of fresh vegetables and fruits, as these items are the most in demand from consumers to the market. People with small amounts of produce are encouraged to make use of the Backyard Produce space – come along and trade, and make a donation to the Neighbourhood House at the end of the day.



Buskers are welcome at the market – amplification can be prob-

lematic though, as we use a very narrow space in High Street, please come along and play if you wish, keeping in mind the other buskers on the day – space yourselves well and there should be no problems...






