Supporting local farming

Dear Friends

We are very fortunate in the Macedon Ranges to have access to award winning local wine and produce.

In a time of unprecedented drought, and changes to farming as a result - supporting our local farmers and growers is now more important than ever before.

The Victorian Government recently announced a \$205 million Future Farming package to support farmers to have productive farms by using the latest technology and the best farming practices.

The Future Farming strategy will tackle some of the key agriculture issues in our area such as; weeds and pests, eliminating phylloxera, supporting organic farming and developing systems for controlling animal disease.

Weeds are a big issue in the Macedon Ranges, and as part of this strategy a \$20 million fund has been established for councils and shires to manage roadside weeds and more effective control of weeds and pests on public land through the Government's Good Neighbour Program.

\$3 million over four years will be spent on a targeted program to improve the biosecurity of Macedon's grape-growing region. The region will be surveyed for phylloxera to enable the area to be declared as a phylloxera exclusion zone.



KIDZ UNPLUGGED

A music program for parents and children aged 0-5 years, incorporating movement to music, dance, singing and instrument play led by a trained music teacher.

KIDZ UNPLUGGED is a community service non profit music program that includes movement to music, dance, singing and instrument play in an exciting environment that enables children to explore and enjoy a wide range of musical experiences. Participation with other children provides a social environment that helps children develop self-confidence and positive self-esteem.

Parent participation enables mums, dads or carers to incorporate many of these activities into the children's play and daily routines such as bath time, packing up time and sleep time.

All sessions are followed by a morning tea where children and parents can meet new people or chat among friends. This program is currently being successfully run in Sunbury, Gisborne and Riddells Creek and we would like to start a morning group in Romsey in July this year. The music activities last for 45 minutes, followed by morning tea for the adults and children.

Fees may be paid in advance per term with a discount, or on a weekly basis. Discounted fees are applicable for Health Card holders.

Term fees are 1 child \$7 per session, 2 children \$10 per session and 3 or more children \$12 per session. Health Card holders pay \$5 for 1 child, \$7 for 2 children and \$10 for 3 or more children.

Weekly fees are 1 child \$10, 2 children \$15 and 3 or more children \$18. Health Card holders weekly fees are 1 child \$7, 2 children \$9 and 3 or more children \$12.

Here's to the Hub - and thanks to the Bank

Residents can feel proud of our Romsey Integrated Library & Community Hub, opened almost a year after the old Romsey Shire Offices were vacated. The facility has transformed the old post office and offices from a multi-level mixture of small office and work spaces to a bright and airy air-conditioned facility. The construction work has been of excellent quality and any visitor and user of the facility will be impressed.

Users will be able to access Council customer service staff, tourism information, VicRoads learner

licence issuing, library facilities, the toy library, playgroup, Neighbourhood House, arts workroom

and display area, IT training areas, a Council meeting chamber and medical and other consulting rooms.

And thanks to our Romsey Community Bank for sharing its premises with our Council officers while Hub construction took place. This excellent partnership with our own community-owned Bank ensured that residents in Romsey and the east of the Shire were still able to access Council services close to home.

Not having a whine: Tourism's vital for us

My complaint last month about the Macedon Ranges being left off a key winery district map was not just sour grapes – our wineries and tourism are vital to our local economy! New figures out of Canberra show that our Macedon Ranges region attracts an average 126,000 domestic overnight visitors per year – and food and wine outlets are a huge drawcard. And with the National Wine Centre of Australia having left us off its display of Australia's wine districts at its Adelaide centre, how many

more are missing out on visiting us because they just don't know about our premier wineries and vineyards!

The Canberra tourism figures show that as well as the 126,000 domestic overnight visitors, we had a further 526,000 Australians who came into the Macedon Ranges Shire on day trips. Of the 126,000 overnighters, 35,000 came from interstate – and if they've

been to Adelaide they would not have known to come here because of our wines!

These latest tourism figures show that we need to capitalise on our tourist potential to benefit the local economy. The overnight visitors spend around \$26 million per year in our Shire, while the day-trippers spent a further \$31 million. The overnighters average 2.5 nights in the Shire – so that's a big boost to the bed-and-breakfast operations, the hotels and motels and the wineries which offer accommodation.

We're getting a good spread of age groups as part of our tourists – 47% are aged 15 to 44, 34% are aged 45 to 64 and 19% are older. We're especially popular with young midlife singles and couples, and with parents with children, and the majority of the overnight visitors are travelling with family and/or friends and relatives.

Rave Reviews

The Uncommon Reader - Alan Bennett

A delightful little spoof about the Queen's latently awakened desire for a good read. "Had the dogs not taken exception to the strange van parked in the royal grounds, the Queen might never have learnt of the Westminster travelling library's weekly visits to the palace. But finding herself at its steps, she goes up to apologise for all the yapping and ends up taking out a novel by Ivy Compton-Burnett, last borrowed in 1989." And so her journey of self-discovery begins, much to the chagrin of her equerries and government ministers. A subversive and enjoyable read.

Because it's there: the life of George Mallory - Dudley Green **Ghosts of Everest – Jochen Hemmleb**

Into thin air - Jon Krakauer

Nepal is a fascinating country. Apart from a population of exceedingly friendly and welcoming people it also has three distinct geographical areas that run the length of its east/west axis. In the south the Terrai emerges from India with its jungles, flat paddy fields and humidity. The terraced foothills rise up from this and villages are scattered along their length and north of all this, as the majestic scenic backdrop, looms the mighty Himalayan mountain range. Dwarfing everything south of the magnificent peaks one is overawed by their sheer size and beauty. Although there are many spectacular peaks the mother of them all: Sagamatha - goddess, mother to the world (or Everest as we know her) is a stark, usually black, pyramid with a snow plume trailing across the sky. This little hat trick of books deals with men and women who have tried to conquer her mighty peak.

Dudley Green's book deals with the life of George Mallory who, along with Andrew Irvine, may or may not have reached the top almost two decades before Edmund Hillary and Tenzing did. He appears to have been an interesting chap who not only managed to survive the ravages of the Western Front but who was also a superb mountain climber. Unfortunately his body still lies on Everest's upper slopes.

In 'Ghosts of Everest' Jochen Hemmleb documents the 1999 expedition to try and find the bodies of Mallory or Irvine and tries to discover whether they did in fact reach the top of the world. It is a fascinating read about both the recovery expedition and the original ascent.

1996 was a particularly busy year for climbers on Everest and Jon Krakauer was one of them. His riveting book documents those who did and didn't make it and questions whether Mallory's original claim of "Because it's there" (when asked why he wanted to climb Everest) has now morphed into "Because I can afford to". All are great reads.

Hoot – Carl Hiassen

This is Hiassen's first book for children and he does an excellent job of transferring from one audience to another. Roy Eberhardt has just recently moved to Florida and as the new boy on the block is attracting unwelcome attention from the local bully. As a result of having his face mashed against the bus window he notices a boy running effortlessly away from the bus, with no school bag and most curiously, in bare feet. He is intrigued and decides to find out who he is. At the same time as Roy starts his investigations the site for a new Mother Paula's All-American Pancake House is being sabotaged so that construction is continually delayed. Is there a connection between the two occurrences and why does anyone want to stop Mother Paula from selling her pancakes? Throw in a couple of really cute burrowing owls and it makes for a great story.



Letter To the Editor:

Dear Editor

It's 4 years – would you believe it – since some people took on community work that they didn't expect in Romsev. The pub wanted to put in 50 poker machines. Was it important to the town? Between Geoff and Pam and Jay and Noel and Kym and Leanne & myself – who talked to this one and that one - it seemed it was. People didn't want them.

I'm just writing to the Rag to say 'Where have we got to?"

More than 100 people helped in letterboxing and in a video to show the Gaming Commission what Romsey was like – a family town, friendly, children are safe, not up market but OK. Many many people wrote letters. And the survey –using the 2004 electoral roll – showed pretty strong feeling against. But I think it has been far more drawn out than anyone expected. What have we gained?

Well, there are children now, who for 4 years, have had money for school outings and holidays and other things, where mum or dad haven't blown it all when there's been a blue or disagreement at home (don't we all get them sometimes?) and one or other has gone to the pub for a bit of personal space.

Somehow, going to the pub for a drink, even putting some money on the horses, is a lot less expensive, than \$200\$500 on a machine, looking for a quick 'fix' to feel better. So many children are better off already.

Romsey hotel was always a place to go for a good meal, even 15-20 years ago. But as a mum of teenagers said "The price (the effect of pokies on families) is too high to pay if that's the price (of hotel improvements)." Maybe the earlier pub owners were in a better position, and maybe other pub owners will be in future. What about Holgates and the other Woodend pub – they've kept doing improvements without pokies.

There is still another court hearing to go. And people are still talking around the town. Quite a few new people don't want pokies. One guy had a shop in a small town that got pokies – he said the effect on families was not pretty "you don't want them here'. The way that courts operate, you have to keep repeating what you want in a town. At least the last court hearing said that residents' views are important.

So - don't write off your chance to say what you want in Romsey. The court has said it will listen. No matter whether you've been here 3 years or 30, you know what you want - and that's important.





LOANS SCHEME GOOD NEWS FOR FAMILIES IN MACEDON RANGES

A no interest loans scheme is now available to low income people in the Macedon Ranges. The program provides loans of up to \$1200- for individuals and families to purchase essential household items, medical equipment or computers. This is a community run program which is distributed to the community by the Macedon Ranges No Interest Loans Committee.

To be eligible for the loan people need to have lived in the Macedon Ranges for 6 months, be a low income earner and have the capacity to repay the loan. The loan application involves an interview where people bring details of their income and expenditure, tenancy and personal identification. There is no interest, fees or charges on the loan If the application is successful the money is repaid fortnightly at a low rate over 12 months to 2 years.

The no interest loans program is delivered from the Kyneton Community & Learning Centre and works on the principle of recycling funds throughout the community. As a person repays the loan another person will receive those funds. For more information phone the Kyneton Community & Learning Centre on 54223433.

Our District had other recipients who unfortunately lived too far away to attend, so another Lions Club will hold a ceremony for these people.

On Sunday the awards were presented by the District Chairperson P.D.G. Lion John Thorpe and assisted by Lion Julie Starec. Also present were our district Governor Ross Wood and President Lion Fred Jacobs of Castlemaine Lions Club, and representatives from other Lions Clubs. There were also over 50 family members and friends of the recipients. After the awards a morning tea was enjoyed by all, provided by the members of the Lancefield Romsey Lions.

The truly amazing stories of the young people honoured on the day were read out. The recognition of these young people's achievements will hopefully inspire them to continue to believe in themselves and increase their self-esteem. The children received an inscribed trophy.

Awards are given in three categories:

Special Needs—Children with special needs who have shown courage in the face of adversity. This includes children with disabilities or those who have undergone long periods of medical treatment, surgery or hospitalization.

Courageous Act—Children who, without regard for personal safety, have been instrumental in preservation of life and property, or who have rendered assistance in an accident, or whose concern for others is worthy of recognition.

Sporting Achievements—children who have overcome personal hardship and/or disadvantage to achieve a high degree of sporting prowess, either individually or as a team member.

Children aged between 5 and 15 years are eligible for these awards.

This year there were 3 recipients in Special Needs category and one in the Courageous Act category.

Tate Kemp from New Gisborne was sponsored by Lancefield Romsey Lions Club. Tate is a 6 year old boy with cerebral palsy. He sees nothing is impossible for him to achieve, is full of smiles and communicates really well with the aid of his picture book.

Hannah Thompson from Castlemaine was sponsored by the Castlemaine Lions Club. Hannah, who is 10, has cystic fibrosis, and was recently diagnosed with diabetes related to this condition. This has added 2 insulin shots and four finger pricks to her daily routine of twice daily physiotherapy and 35 vitamins. Hannah has been in and out of hospital since she was 4. Despite this condition that affects her lungs and digestion, she is constantly smiling.

Daniel Pappalardo was sponsored by the Lancefield Romsey Lions Club. Daniel is 6 years old and has aplastic anaemia. This causes his bone marrow to break down and he required a bone marrow transplant. In preparation for this he underwent chemotherapy, showing incredible courage through this process. His transplant went well, and he ins now out of hospital and off medication.

Samantha Paapalardo was also sponsored by Lancefield Romsey Lions Club. Samantha is Daniel's 13 year old sister, who gave him a second chance at life by being the donor for his bone marrow transplant, after it was found out that she was a perfect match. Samantha was happy knowing that she had been able to help her little brother.

Unfortunately Daniel and Samantha were unable to attend the awards day, but were presented with their awards later in May at a special Lions dinner.
