

Rosslynne water topping up town's supply

Drinking water supplies for Western Water customers in Romsev and Lancefield are now being supplemented with water from the Rosslynne supply system due to low levels in local reservoirs.

"Our system inter-connections make us wellplaced to cope during periods of high demand," Western Water's Acting General Manager, Customer and Community Relations, Nicole Laurie, says. "We are able to move water between reservoirs as needed, and if necessary draw on water from the Melbourne system to supply our region."

Until recently, Romsey and Lancefield have been supplied from smaller local reservoirs, supplemented with a small proportion of bore water. Unlike local water sources, Rosslynne water is fluoridated in line with Department of Health and Human Services requirements.

Customers who have any questions about water fluoridation can call the department's Water Fluoride Information Line on 1800 651 723, visit www.health.vic.gov.au or speak with their dentist or doctor.

Customers may also notice a change in the taste of their water, as water from different sources has different characteristics.

"As always, we are encouraging customers to be careful with their water use and not waste this precious resource," Ms Laurie says.


