#### STRONGER COMMUNITIES GRANTS PROGRAM -

#### FOR GRANTS OF UP TO \$20,000

I am very proud to have been able to support so many excellent projects across our region in Round 1 of the Stronger Communities Grants Program.

This program was established to allow Members of Parliament to work with their communities to recommend important local capital investment projects.

Round 2 of the program is now open and I am asking community organisations to let me know about projects that are important to them.

Up to a total of \$150,000 of funding will be available in the electorate of McEwen in the next financial year for small capital projects that improve participation and contribute to the vibrancy and viability of our communities.

Individual grants of between \$5,000 and \$20,000 are available for capital projects but to be eligible the projects require matched contributions, in cash or in kind on at least a dollar for dollar basis.

The program is open to community based not-for-profit organisations that are not owned by a state or territory government. All applicants must operate as a legal entity with a current ABN.

Unfortunately the Turnbull Government's guidelines specifically state that applications from schools, hospitals and technical colleges will not be accepted.

Concept/Master Plan Development > in progress.



#### BANK DOES SOME HEAVY LIFTING FOR THE MEN'S SHED

Community Bank has done some heavy lifting for the Lancefield Men's Shed helping the members avoid sprains and strains as they go about their work.

A \$2,000 Community Bank grant enabled the members to build a concrete apron on the east side of their building, enabling deliveries of material right up to the door.

It will also help them to safely store the tradesmen's trailer, which they bought with a Community Bank grant in 2014.

Lancefield bank manager, Michael O'Gorman, said the Men's Shed had recently received funding for lifting equipment, but the rough and muddy ground outside the main door limited its use.

"Now that the Shed has a 10 by 6 metre concrete apron, the men have a flat and sturdy platform to load and unload their building supplies and their finished products, and move them in and out through the main door," Michael said.

"A few of the members had accumulated some sprains and strains lifting heavy materials, so the combination of our flat apron with the lifting equipment will allow them to move heavier objects with a minimum of fuss."

The concreted area will also aid more social gatherings between Shed members and the community - particularly the children from the 'Kids in Shed' program, who can now visit and socialise in a pleasant area, which is large enough for a barbecue and tables and chairs.

Grants to community groups and projects of local benefit are a key part of how the Lancefield and Romsey Community Bank branches contribute to the local community.

David Plunkett, who recently assumed the role of chair of the Community Bank, said local groups have now shared more than a million dollars in grants and sponsorships from the Lancefield and Romsey Community Bank over the past 15 years - being money we have generated from customers who have chosen a truly local bank.

January/February

(Palmer Street - look for the blue Heritage Plaque on the gatepost on the left; open on the last Sunday of the month, from 11-2. Barton (Seymour) Cottage is a heritage listed dwelling built around 1855.)

The Friends of the Cottage are looking forward to welcoming visitors again to the Cottage on February 28<sup>th</sup> – and the last Sunday of each month throughout 2016. We have been busy with some planning ahead and outlined this at the annual meeting of the Historical Society (held in November 2015). The following is a summary of our key aims:

"FORWARD PLANNING: In line with the attempt to understand, advertise and develop the potential of the Cottage we have some planning already in hand as briefly follows:

- Consider the actual status of the Cottage and its importance via National Trust, Heritage Victoria, etc. (Only state importance - or possibly of national significance?)
- Continue the research into the Cottage (handed over to Romsey as 'Barton").

- Re-visit the excellent architectural plan already carried out and utilise this.
- Consider the setting up of various areas such as a bathroom.
- Liase closely with the MRSC via Arts, Infrastructure, Places for People, Maintenance, etc
- Consider storage needs to enable a changeable display.
- Develop the garden to a high quality with appropriate planning.
- Promote a range of interests/displays such as sustainability, environmental (we have begun a bird calendar), gardening ( yearly journal is underway), local communities (Springfield was our first), bread -making (Red Beard Bakery, Trentham are coming to visit) etc.

"The Cottage has enormous potential to become a highly valued asset to Romsey and district and it deserves to be fully utilised as such. This would honor the gifting of the generous donor, the extremely hard working committee who first restored the home, and the many folk who have assisted in its maintenance since then."

#### 20 million trees program.

The Authority for Melbourne's western water catchments (the Port Phillip and Western Port Catchment Management authority PPWCMA) is launching a program "Greening the West" to revegetate the western part of the catchments.

The project is part of the Federal Governments 20 million trees program.

Melbourne's western catchments are some of the fastest growing areas in Australia. They are also drier and often warmer than other parts of Melbourne. As the population increases so too does pollution, heat and pressure on the environment. Trees and vegetation are vital components for liveable, healthy suburbs and provide many social, environmental and economic benefits.

Trees and vegetation help to combat climate change by removing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. As our cities warm they also contribute to reducing the 'urban heat island effect'. Cooler, shaded spaces in our parks, in streetscapes and alongside homes can reduce heat stress particularly for those in our community who are most vulnerable to high temperatures.

The aim is to plant 400,000 trees in the Werribee and Maribyrnong (include Deep Creek and its tributaries) catchments.Landholders are encouraged to join the program the CMA will provide trees from a local nursery (and possibly some extras like guards if possible within budget) to the landholder. The landholder will be responsible for prepping the site, planting and maintaining the trees. If you're interested obtain more information from Deep Creek Landcare - Secretary




#### Film Society Off To A Touching Start

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## "Project Romsey" Update No. 1 2016

Welcome to the first Project Romsey Update for 2016. These updates will be a regular inclusion in the Romsey Rag, Romsey Online and Facebook. Each update will be a summarised listing of key developments in Romsey's streetscape and cultural development project for Romsey.

- Streetscape working groups (Town Pride, Main Street Trees and Gardens, Arts Culture and Events, Lighting and Roads, and Five Mile Creek) continue to meet to progress ideas for discussion and possible inclusion in the Streetscape Master Plan.
- **Temporary signage** to be erected as streetscape works are being conducted to indicate Streetscape Project in progress.
- RRBATA committee members met with Vic Roads representatives on Wednesday 13th January 2016.
- Roadside plantations north and south of Rom-Vic Roads focuses on safety related issues rather than the trees' aesthetics due to budget constraints. However, it is happy to work with MRSC and RRBATA to formulate a suite package of works to be done. RRBATA will investigate the Adopt A Highway program which currently engages Rotary and Lions to manage the roadside rubbish in this corridor.
- Barry Street/Main Road intersection State Government money has been allocated to fund a study in 2016/2017 of the best fit solution for
- Feature Town Entry Points -The Town Pride working group will progress the development of these early in 2016, engaging both the local general and arts communities to formulate components and design.
- Signage (Tourist, town businesses, destination etc) - The current generic business signage on Main Street will be rationalised and revamped to indicate direction and distance to certain generic businesses and services (e.g. Post Office, Toilets etc).
- RRBATA committee members met with MRSC officers in Romsey on 10<sup>th</sup> December 2015 14<sup>th</sup> January 2016.
- Community Hub Outdoor gathering/seating space development to proceed with current Information boards to be removed and possibly replaced with a

- smaller version.. Mud map of space development to be drafted by Trees and Main Street Gardens group to include desired features (seating, shade etc).
- Feature Street lamps This was a suggested initiative by Lighting and Roads working group to be installed between Barry Street and Palmer Street on the eastern nature strip, utilising the original Romsey street lamp design.
- Building Illumination Lighting and Roads working group has suggested illumination of the Mechanics Institute (including better lighting of fountain and trees), old Post Office building and Shire Office building.
- Main Street Gardens Redevelopment of Main Street nature strip gardens to be soon undertaken following dialogue between Main Street Gardens working Group
- Regional Development Victoria (RDV) Funding -The Romsey Streetscape Project will be considered for RDV funding which will significantly assist a Stage 1 development of this project.
- Concept/Master Plan will be developed soon Community consultation will follow.
- Service Club Signage -Stephen Mahon (Manager Council and Customer Service) will be sending a letter to RRBATA about this.
- Communications Jenny spoke of the need for RRBATA to effectively communicate and engage the community re the Streetscape Project's progress. A working group member had suggested small signs to be erected when elements of the project were being worked on. Council were supportive with that, although noted that if RDV funding was involved with any works, then the mandatory State Government signage would have to be used. Jodie will send a template for a communications plan.
- **Romsey History -** The significance of the heritage buildings and sites in the Streetscape zone (Barry Street to Palmer Street) has been noted. RRBATA will assist the Historical Society's development of accessible information (including walking tours) and its building/site plaque program.
- Town Tidiness possible Tidy Town involvement and whole town clean up event to be progressed by Town Pride working group.



A truncated version of the 2015 President's Report is presented below.

RRBATA's year in 2015 has been dominated by the initiation of the Romsey Streetscape Project (known as "Project Romsey"). It was borne out of a desire by RRBATA to reinvigorate the town centre precinct to enhance economic development, tourism and local amenity. It is hoped this report will demonstrate RRBATA's ongoing commitment to the promotion of the Romsey region in a business and tourism con-

text whilst fostering engagement with local community. The Year In Review:

Much has already been documented in the local media about "Project Romsey". The initiative has been enthusiastically received by local community and Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC). After two community forums, a number of working groups made up of community members were formed. Under the umbrella of RRBATA, these groups are methodically formulating options for inclusion in a Romsey Streetscape master plan. RRBATA believes this is an important project for Romsey but one which needs to respect a strict sense of process and collaboration with all stakeholders in order to effect a sustainable outcome. Good things take time!

As President, it has been particularly satisfying to meet residents who are passionate about making a difference and motivated to give their time and expertise. It has also been wonderful to have such strong support from Macedon Ranges Shire Council to progress this vision. Peter Johnston, Dale Thornton, Sophie Segafredo, Leanne Davey and Kylie Lethbridge warrant particular thanks.

For the first time, RRBATA ran a Christmas in July event, "An Evening with John Marsden", at The Grange Lancefield. This was a successful evening with a different target audience in attendance. RRBATA will most likely run such an evening again in 2016.

The 6th Annual RRBATA Business Breakfast was held at Cope Williams Winery, Romsey. RRBATA wishes to acknowledge the generous sponsorship from the Romsev Community Bank branch of the Bendigo Bank for the event. Ms. Lisa Stribley from Deloitte Private was the guest speaker who gave the audience a great insight into cloud accounting. This event is an important opportunity for local businesses and community members to network and develop insight from the speaker. RRBATA is already looking forward to the 2016 Business Breakfast.

The Romsey Primary School's 150th Birthday Celebrations saw RRBATA assist by inviting hospitality businesses to offer special deals over the weekend. This was a way of enticing visitors to the School's events to "linger longer" in our town.

Romsey Online (www.romsey.org.au) continues to be an important online resource for local community and business as well as those planning visitation (as tourists or potential residents) to our region. RRBATA has this year received a much appreciated grant from the Romsey Community Bank branch of the Bendigo Bank to reinvigorate the web site. It is hoped to share the "back end" of the site as a partnership with Lancefield to highlight resources in the eastern corridor whilst retaining allowing separate "front end" website access to retain and highlight the individual character of each town. Greg Powell must be acknowledged for

his work as the "webmaster" for Romsey Online.

RRBATA has joined the social networking scene with the development of a Facebook account. This has been made possible by the generous offer to manage it by Simone Plunkett. RRBATA is most grateful for Simone's assistance as this will be a valuable tool to spread the

Monthly Romsey Rag contributions from RRBATA continue. These are a great way of informing the broader community of RRBATA's activity. As is the case every year, I want to acknowledge the Rag's Robyn Moore for her tolerance and understanding of my sometimes late submissions!

A review of the Model Rules and Statement of Purpose, needs to be addressed with priority in early 2016.

The importance of RRBATA in the advocacy and promotion of Romsey region business and tourism opportunities in both the region and more broadly cannot be overemphasised. With new residential estate development and associated population increase, the need to support local business and reduce economic leakage is ongoing. However, ongoing stakeholder support is needed in order to do this.

#### Meditation: Matthew 18: 21-22

Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother when he sins against me? Up to seven times?" Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times."

Thinking about Good Friday two names spring to mind - those of Judas and Peter. Both were followers and close friends of Jesus, and both turned their backs on him in the crisis.

Judas betrayed Jesus to the authorities, helped them arrest him and put him through an illegal trial that Amnesty International would shout about today. Peter, identified as a disciple after the arrest, denied that he'd ever known Jesus at all. "Not me", he said, "I've nothing to do with him."

A few hours later both of them - Judas and Peter - realised how wrong they had been, what a mess they had made of things. So far, they look pretty much alike. But then came the difference. Judas, slowly realising the enormity of his actions, reaching that point of darkness where guilt and horror and fear spill over into consciousness, rushes out and hangs himself. He threw away more than the 30 pieces of silver - he threw away his life. If only ... he had waited. Because Judas died at the dawn of forgiveness. He died while Jesus was on his way to the cross, on the way to that greatest act of reconciliation which brings us, sinful as we are, back into fellowship with God. And which, surely could have done the same for Judas! One can only think that Judas believed that there was no hope for him, because he had denied everything of real value. But so did Peter, and there was forgiveness for him - Jesus forgave and restored. Thomas refused to believe - Jesus made a special point of meeting his need. Would he not have done the same for Judas?

Think of Paul the killer of Christians, the enemy of Christ, and yet later exulting, "Christ lives in me."

Two ways of dealing with failure. One lets failure win, the other says there's light at the end of the tunnel. Good Friday and Easter are about hope conquering despair, and giving us all the chance to start life again. Forgiveness has no limits.

Lord you are always there with your forgiveness, as you forgave Peter, Thomas and Paul, so you forgive me, and accept me, as you accepted them. Thank you seems so small a word, but it is all I've got.

Don't flush and forget, warns Western Water Western Water is reminding customers to think twice about what they put down the toilet or drain at home, to help prevent sewer blockages. While it's easy to flush and forget, what goes down the sewer system can cause serious problems, including blockages that lead to sewer spills. Sewer spills can mean raw sewage entering waterways, streets or even people's homes.

So-called "flushable wipes" are increasingly causing problems in the sewerage system as they do not break down quickly in pipes like toilet paper. Western Water is urging customers not to flush wet wipes, sanitary products, nappies or rags down the toilet. Cooking oils and fats should also never be poured down the sink, as they can build up in pipes and cause blockages. Let them cool before placing in the bin or in the compost.

Western Water has a program of inspecting and maintaining its 1,200km of sewer mains, including regular monitoring with closed circuit TV cameras. Western Water treats more than 9,000 million litres of sewage a year at its seven recycled water plants.


The sewage is treated to produce high quality recycled water, most of which is pumped to sports grounds, school ovals, parks and businesses across the region for irrigation.

#### New database protects animals from bushfire

CFA has partnered with an Australian-first project that aims to provide better protection of horses and other companion animals during bushfires.

The National Equine Database (NED) has been developed by CFA volunteer Jenna Kelley, founder of the Walking Forward Disaster Relief Team.

The database, launched this week, works by linking equine owners with property owners who have the capacity to temporarily house animals during bushfires and other emergencies.

By networking through the database pet owners in bushfire prone areas can establish plans to move their animals to a nominated safe place on days of predicted peak fire danger.

Ms Kelley said the idea came about from not having anywhere to evacuate her thoroughbred to on days of significant fire danger.

"The loss of animals and family pets from a fire is devastating and the impact on surviving animals can be felt for months afterwards," she said.

"Moving large animals from harm's way isn't always possible during the chaos of a fire.

"That's why planning ahead, and knowing your trigger to move before fire breaks out, is the best option."

CFA Chief Officer Joe Buffone said the project was important for building community resilience.

"Just as we ask people to ensure they have a bushfire plan, animal owners also need to plan ahead," Mr Buffone said.

"Horses need a large open space with minimal vegetation to avoid harm during bushfires.

"Many people whose properties don't meet these criteria choose to agist their horses during the Fire Danger Period, but that isn't possible for everyone.

"That's where a national register like NED can play a critical role."

NED can also store animal identification details and other records to help prove ownership.

The database will be launched mid-February and can be accessed at www.tepscon.community.



#### Macedon Ranges Community Wind Farm - A long windy ride

More than 8 years since the first meeting of the Macedon Ranges Sustainability Group (MRSG) community wind farm project committee (WISE), there is finally some real progress being made with regard to a community wind farm. Prior to the 2010 election WISE had: identified a suitable site; secured government commitments in relation to State Planning regulations; obtained pro-bono assistance with project scoping; erected an anemometer (wind measuring device) at Black Forest Mill; and enjoyed strong community support.

The idea of a community wind farm was inspired by Hepburnwind – a 2 turbine development, just south of Daylesford. Unfortunately the Ballieu Government obstructed the development of wind farms throughout the state and, through the introduction of wind farm planning regulations (VC 82) in 2011, banned any wind turbines from Macedon, Surf Coast and part of Mt Alexander Shires.

Four years on, with a new State Government, and the persistent members of WISE are back on the job. On Monday 1<sup>st</sup> February a reconditioned anemometer was erected at the originally proposed site.

The site is in the pine forest, 7 kms south of Woodend about 1.5 km from the nearest house and close to grid lines for connection. Recent harvesting of the pine trees nearby gives clear access to the site and should allow for an accurate measurement of the wind

At least twelve months of data is required to verify the wind resource and this will inform the business model, including the number of turbines. The data collected from the anemometer will be on display and available via a smart phone App in the near future. MRSG will run a community consultation process to ensure that the project has strong local endorsement. A 2014 survey of 500 residents reported an 84% support for a community wind farm in the Macedon Ranges.

MRSG is determined to extract maximum community benefit from the project .Community members will also be also be given the opportunity to invest in the project.
