

Thursday April 7th - Romsey Challenge Bowl

It was a wonderful day for golf, still, clear and sunny with a temperature in the low 20s and the course in excellent condition. It is mid autumn and when you combine a few heavy dews, some good rain on Wednesday and regular irrigation using re-cycled water any golf course should be looking pretty good. The fairways generally had good cover and the

greens and surrounds were in top nick; all players knew they would usually get a good lie on the

fairways and that the greens would hold and putt very true. Sixteen teams from thirteen clubs contested the 23rd Romsey Challenge Cup, a team stableford event.

A number of players found their "chip and run" game, so important on dry courses, was not going to help card a quality score and had to quickly reappraise how they were going to play the round. A few others who had played some of the nine-hole "Chicken Run" social golf on Friday nights at Romsey knew the course well and were better able to handle the conditions and come in with a good score. As the round progressed it grew tighter and tighter at the top of the leaderboard.

There will be 15 for small birds such as tree creepers and orange rumped parrots and 15 for small mammals such a phascogales and antechinus. Our thanks to Dave Richardson who is making many of the boxes and to William Terry from MRSC who is assisting us with all facets of this project.

After a full 12 months of irrigation we now have a much better idea of how much water we need and when to apply it. While the course and the Park has done well we know that we need more water to do the job properly. The club will be meeting with Western Water in late April to see what can be done about increasing our annual allocation of water

FROM THE COTTAGE... April-May 2016 (Palmer Street - look for the blue Heritage Plaque on the gatepost on the left; open on the last Sunday of the month, from 11-2. Barton (Seymour) Cottage is a heritage listed dwelling built around 1855.)

The Friends of the Cottage are looking forward to welcoming visitors again to the Cottage on April 24th and May 29th and the last Sunday of each month throughout 2016. Our Easter Open Day was a rather quiet affair. Many folk were catching up with family and of course many others took the opportunity to travel over the break. The quieter day gave us a good opportunity to spend more time with those who did attend. One interesting visitor (though our visitors are all interesting, really!) volunteers at the Melbourne Fire Brigade Museum, so we were able to exchange ideas regarding attracting visitors. The Fire Brigade Museum sounds like a very interesting place to visit for both individuals and groups. We are grateful to the Macedon Ranges Shire for recommending the Cottage as part of 'Museums Australia' and we look forward to working towards valid Museum status.

The Cottage grounds are looking dry and we are hoping that a damp autumn will freshen them up. As the early settlers did not have spare water for garden maintenance

(apart from food and medicinal necessities) they generally planted bulbs and perennials hardy enough to flourish in their own good time. The committee who accepted and maintained the Cottage from the 1980's onward, also planted to this regime; so there is always some little horticultural treasure either flowering, seeding or budding...At present, the Hellebores, donated and planted last year, are just emerging, the Arums (palaestinus) leaves are unfurling, the Winter Iris 'Moses-in-the-Basket (1. stylosa) and the wonderful shrub Garrya elliptica is forming catkins. Greg Boldiston, (Longinomus Rare Plants) has just donated – and planted- some autumn flowering crocus; they will be another lovely feature in the years to come. Don't forget that Greg brings an excellent selection of rare plants to each of our open days. It is a good chance to buy rare plants that are grown and therefore acclimatised for local conditions.

"The community was concerned about pedestrian safety on Main Street. We've listened and taken action." Ms Thomas said.


The \$300,000 project, which has incorporated pedestrian operated signals, provides a safer location for people to cross Main Street, particularly students making their way to school and local sporting areas.

Main Street is one of the small community's busiest roads in a growing area, and local residents were included in the development of the project to ensure the location of the crossing would best meet the needs of the community.


Ms Thomas added, "This new pedestrian operated crossing mean locals, especially school kids, can now make their way around the community safely."



GETTING PEOPLE BACK TO WORK IN MACEDON

Local Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas is encouraging local employers to access the updated Back to Work scheme and hire unemployed workers in Macedon.

The Back to Work Scheme, which is a capped two-year \$100 million fund, has been further boosted with a significant increase to the payments to employers to assist with hiring and training of young unemployed and retrenched workers (up to \$5000) and for the long term unemployed (up to \$12,000).

Employers can also receive payments of up to \$4000 where they provide accredited training to the new employee. This will be in addition to any other payment received under the scheme.

"I have received correspondence from a number of locals in Macedon and I am aware of how difficult it can be to find secure employment, especially as a young or long term unemployed person." Ms Thomas said.

A new \$20 million Reconnect Program will also help address the drop in early school leavers taking up training, and will provide Back to Work participants with fee relief and VTG exemptions.

The eligible employee categories will also be expanded to include specific provisions relating to sole parent pensioners, disability pensioners, aboriginal unemployed, drought affected farm households and refugees.

Ms Thomas added "We're helping people in Macedon to get the skills they need to find the job they want. That's what will grow our economy, and it's what we're getting on with."

Commentary:

The Lord is my shepherd I shall not want?

Really?

Our whole culture is built on indoctrinating people to say "I want". I want a new car, a bigger house, a better lifestyle, a holiday, a new phone, the latest TV, better opportunities for my children, better health care, free education. All this wanting seems somewhat ironic when one thinks about how wealthy and free we are in Australia. Consider, for example, our current access to housing, food, education, and healthcare, and our freedom to worship.

One would think we would have reallized that we do not really want for much.

But we still want. It brings to my mind that great Rolling Stones song, "I can't get no satisfaction".

This cost of saying "I want" is great not just to our culture but also to those places around the world where our Western materialism is propped up by people who earn next to nothing, some of whom could even be considered slaves - all to provide us with the things that we want. Psalm 23 redirects us to the source of our life and being as the remedy for the emptiness in our lives that we so often try to fill with stuff.

Questions: How do you temper your desire for new things? What experiences have you had of off-loading material possessions? How did it go?

Out-of-control burn-offs prompt warning.!!!!



CFA is urging Victorians to take extreme care when burning off after responding to a high volume of out-of-control private burnoffs since the end of fire restrictions in the majority of municipalities.

CFA State Duty Officer James Dullard said dryer than normal conditions for this time of

year have caught many residents by surprise.

CFA has responded to more than 40 burn-offs on private property in the northeast of the state alone in the past week. "We understand residents want to take advantage of milder conditions to clean up their properties, but the effects of an out-of-control fire can be devastating," Mr Dullard said. "It is vital people do the right thing by checking conditions, complying with local by-laws and registering their burn offs. "Some parts of the state tomorrow will be warm and windy. If a fire is left unattended in windy conditions it can spread quickly and put neighbouring properties, homes and bushland in danger.

"It is absolutely essential that you have enough water on hand to put out a fire. There isn't enough time to run back to your house if your fire gets out of control. You also need to leave a three-metre fire break, free of flammable materials around any burn-off."

Burning off undergrowth and other vegetation is generally permitted outside of the Fire Danger Period, however landowners should register their burn-off with the Emergency Services Telecommunications Authority (ESTA) by calling 1800 668 511.

Property owners must be aware they have legal obligations when burning off and failing to comply with local council by-laws may lead to a fine.

Mr Dullard said registering burn-offs with ESTA on 1800 668 511 would ensure the burn could be added to the state wide register.

"All calls to Triple Zero about smoke sightings are cross-checked with that register, and fire fighters are called out if nothing is listed for that location," Mr Dullard said. "False alarm calls to unregistered burn-offs take volunteer fire fighters away from workplaces, families and other emergencies."

Keep burn-offs safe:

- Check regulations set down by your local council
- Register your burn with the Emergency Services Telecommunications Authority (ESTA)
- Notify neighbours at least two hours before starting the burn
- Check the weather forecast for the day of the burn and the days afterwards
- Establish a fire break of no less than three metres cleared of all flammable material
- Make sure there are enough people to monitor, contain and extinguish the burn safely
