



THE FRIENDS OF THE COTTAGE ARE LOOKING FOR-WARD TO WELCOMING VISITORS AGAIN TO THE COT-TAGE ON JUNE 26TH AND JULY 31ST - AND THE LAST SUNDAY OF EACH MONTH THROUGHOUT 2016.

On our first cold Open Day for the year the fires were burning brightly and the soup bubbling away; the Cottage gives a very welcoming atmosphere in winter. Perhaps because it has not usually been open in the colder months, we only had two visitors, but they got a personal guided tour, enjoying the special features of the Cottage while the other helpers were able to begin the work of checking items in the Cottage against the individual identification number and the description in the Accession Register. This is a lengthy process, but very necessary before we can begin to research the date, etc, of each item. Some of the items have a fascinating record.

The Cottage grounds are looking lush after the rains and cooler weather; the Lapigeria (Pink Wax Flower) continues its almost non-stop flowering and the Iris stylosa (lovely blue Winter Iris) are looking lovely. A tree dahlia is flowering, two late roses (old-fashioned varieties) are in full bloom and the Viburnum tinus is beginning to flower. The bright pink berries on the Euonymus are very eye-catching; Arums, Hellebores and spring bulbs are emerging – there is always something happening in the Cottage garden. We have begun to set aside the 2nd and 4th Thursdays in the month to work at the Cottage. Just an hour's work from 10 to 11 - and then a coffee at one of the great cafes Romsey has to offer. Keeping the work time short makes it all very enjoyable. You would be very welcome to join us no experience required. Just enthusiasm! We are continuing with the Accession Register and the gardening (just a

little light weeding and mulching). All in keeping with making sure our volunteers are enjoying helping out. Just phone to check if you are coming along for the first time, in case we've had to change plans. We'll trial this for July and

On May 28th two of us were able to attend a seminar, on archiving, at the Public Records Office. June was a very busy month with working bees and World this year be focused in the Environment Day.

On Friday June 3rd members helped plant 500 trees and plants at Lancefield Primary School.

It was wonderful to see the students interested in the planting with teachers, parents and Deep Creek Landcare members helping with holes, stakes and tree guards.

On Sunday June 5th members planted 80 plants in an area bordering 3 Chain Road Lancefield also replacing guards and stakes.

On Monday 6th June World Environment Day was celebrated at Deep Creek.

With a planting at Deep Creek in Romsey.

2016 marked the 11th year that the 3 groups have partnered for the annual planting day with around 25,000 indigenous trees and shrubs planted in that time.

This year Port Philip Catchment Authority also joined the project donating 600 tree and Melbourne Water contributed extra funding.

These plantings have had a huge impact on the health of the creek helping to progressively reduce erosion and sediment run off into the creek, improved water quality and created habitat for fauna such as frogs, platypus and the rare Yarra Pygmy Perch

It has been a wonderful learning experience for hundreds of students over the years.

Species planted include Drooping She-Oak, Sweet Bursaria, Golden Wattle and Hedge Wattle.

Free Serrated Tussock assistance to Gisborne landholders

The Victorian Serrated Tussock Working Party (VSTWP) is resuming its quest to provide serrated tussock education and management advice to Gisborne landholders. Continuing on from last year's project, VSTWP community

engagement activities will this year be focused in the areas to the west and south of the Gisborne Township.

This year's target area will include 224 parcels of land and cover nearly 2000 hectares of farmland and rural living properties around Gisborne, this includes the waterways of Stephens Creek and Koroit Creek East Branch. The new stage will roll-out over a 12 month period, with all landowners in the target area being offered the opportunity to participate and receive assistance.



All landholders in the target area will be offered a free property assessment from a VSTWP Extension Officer and a property map noting any serrated tussock infestations located, as well as technical advice on control and management for each situation.

Monitor Hazardous Atmospheres Training

On 28 and 29 May 8 members of the Brigade undertook training in Monitor Hazardous Atmospheres which will complement the issuing of our new MSA Altair Atmosphere Detector. The new Altair detector simultaneously monitors 5 atmospheric conditions including Oxygen, Hydrogen Sulphide (Hs2), Carbon Monoxide, Hydrogen Cyanide and the Lower Explosive Limits of Flammable Gases. It replaces the CFA issued LD332 gas detector which was only able to monitor Lower Explosive Limits. The Altair will be responded to Hazardous Material Incidents and Structure Fires within our group area and it is a fantastic edition to the Brigade's apparatus which will significantly improve fire fighter safety. The Brigade acknowledges the support received from the CFA by issuing this new device to us and would like to thank Instructors Peter Brown, Mark Price and Steve Zeran for an informative two days of training.



A Creator behind Creation

A book requires an author - like a program requires a programmer - like a poem requires a poet - like a design requires a designer - like an invention requires an inventor - like creation requires a Creator.

When we see an artwork, do we believe that the artwork created itself or is it self-evident that an artist created it?

Evidence was provided by a variety of cycling advocacy groups, government agencies, such as VicRoads

motoring organisations such as RACV. Overall, it was a very rounded and open discussion that we all hope will lead to improved safety on our roads.

Everyone who drives a car is expected to be aware of other road users as well as hazards such as kangaroos and fallen trees. It's a hard job that requires a lot of

concentration. There is no place for distractions whether that is from other passengers or from a mobile phone.

Similarly, everyone who rides a bike needs to be aware of the roads that they are riding on and how visible they are on the road. Do you really need to be on that main road at peak hour? Yes, you have a right but it's not exactly fun to have a constant stream of cars passing you at speed. Consider alternative routes and the conditions you are

riding in - rain and fog need extra care.

"It's a staggering fact that nine out of ten Victorians actually pay more than they need to for their electricity," Ms Thomas said.

The average Victorian household spends about \$2,800 on energy bills every year, which is about 2.3 per cent of average household income and up to about 7 per cent of income for lower income households".

"Despite the fact that regularly reviewing energy plans is one of the most effective ways to save on energy bills, one in three (32 per cent) Victorians have never switched electricity or gas retailers".

"Energy retailers have hundreds of different pricing plans for customers to choose from. Comparing them is complex and time consuming resulting in many Victorians paying more than they need to - which is especially bad for people on a fixed income," Ms Thom-

To empower consumers, the Andrews Government has established an independent website, Victorian Energy Compare, which provides an easy-to-use, online comparison tool

The website makes it easier for Victorians to review their electricity, gas and solar plans and save money on their bills.

"All you need is a recent electricity or gas bill and a few minutes of time to switch and start saving money," Ms Thomas said.

More than 70,000 Victorians have used the Victoria Energy Compare site since it was launched three months ago, with data showing 70 per cent of users can save at least \$220 on annual electricity bills and at least \$150 on annual gas bills.

"Winter is a good time to make sure you're getting the best deal from your energy retailer because this is when our energy consumption goes up".

Cover your water meter to prevent it freezing

As the winter cold sets in, Western Water is advising customers to put a cover on their water meter to prevent it from freezing.


When a meter freezes, no water can pass through the meter until it thaws out, leaving households without hot water on a freezing cold morning.

There are plenty of options for covering your meter, including a large bucket, cardboard or plastic box, half a tyre, a hessian bag or an old blanket.

The important thing is to ensure the meter is fully covered to trap the warmer air inside, and that the cover can be easily removed for meter reading and maintenance.

Frozen pipes can also be an issue if the weather is very cold. To stop pipes from freezing, first ensure they are clean and not leaking, then wrap in insulation material (available from hardware shops).
