Based loosely on Andrew Hodges biography of Alan Turing, the film stars Benedict Cumberbatch as the real life cryptanalyst Alan Turing. Turing worked for British military during WW2 designing and building a 'computer-like' decoding machine to decrypt German military messages. In so doing, helped shorten the war saving many lives.

The film, also starring Kiera Knightley as Joan Clark, Turing's assistant and faux love interest, touches on attitudes to, and vilification of, homosexuality.

Turing, a homosexual, was prosecuted as such in 1952. He committed suicide in 1954.

some acts of war were allowed to be committed against the British, costing many lives.






The opening of the Cottage on the last Sunday in August saw the grounds looking at their best; the spring flowers – daffodils, jonquils, hellebores, pink flowering currants - were looking a delight. There is a lovely tranquil atmosphere around the Cottage and it is always a privilege to see the birds making it their feeding station. The Eastern Spinebills and the New Holland Honeyeaters adopt the currants; there are often 4 or 5 on the same bush. October will see the roses starting to bloom and we hope to be able to identify some of them. If you have any knowledge of the older varieties of roses, do come along and help us put a name to the rose!

Mini working bees on the2nd and 4th Thursdays in the month are working well. Just an hour's work - from 10 to 11 - and then a coffee at one of the great cafes Romsey has to offer. Just phone to check if you are coming along for the first time, in case we've had to change plans. The grounds are looking trimmer, (though rose pruning was not done) and we are slowly rejuvenating some compacted areas. The end purpose is to make the upkeep as simple as possible. The 'inside staff' are busily working through the display items and are trialling a program to be used for all our items.







ROMSEY PRIMARY ROCKS THE PREMIERS' READING CHALLENGE

Students from Romsey Primary School have successfully completed the 2016 Premiers' Reading Challenge.

The Stamp Story goes on -

This story, "Foreign Mission Stamp Department" comes from the PWMU Missionary Chronicle in **1934**, issued as the Centenary Souvenir of Women's Work 1934.

It is nearly 11.30am on Thursday morning. Up Collins Street comes an important volunteer with a suit case in one hand. A few minutes later the door of the Upper Foreign Mission Office opens, and she enters, followed by three or four stamp collectors or dealers.

A small table, which is leaning against the wall, is hastily put up, the suit case is opened, and the contents displayed. All eyes are upon the volunteer as she brings forth the stamps, but she has been selling stamps for a number of years, and knows how to deal with her customers.

"I've sorted them all out - I've put some for each of you in the different packets - No! No! You cannot have those, they belong to Mr. X. Here is your packet. It will be 2/6d., please, and yours will be 5/-. I cannot let you men have all that I have brought in; I must keep some for the later customers. Stamp buyers keep coming in, and from 11.30am until after 1pm, there is a constant stream coming and going. Of course this selling of stamps means hours of work on the part of many friends of Foreign Missions who collect and send in the stamps to the office.

At 2pm the members of the stamp team come in, and for the next hour and half we see stamps being sorted - the 1d. Green and 1½d. and 2d. Red King George Vth being put on one side to be sold later at 3d. per lb. weight. 3.30pm is afternoon tea time.

After this is over the takings of the day are handed over - £1, £2, or even £3 or £4, as the result of a fortnights work. The amount is written in the book which shows that £1,658 has been received from the sale of used stamps since the Department commenced 15 years ago.

In September 2016 Sammy Stamp continues under the heading Uniting Church Adult Fellowship Stamp Fund.

In the September UCAF Network magazine it is reported that Sammy Stamp up to and including 4th August, sales have reached about \$20,549.62 for the year 2016 (same week last year \$16,374.75) A very pleasing result.

Grants totaling \$31,560 have been approved so far this year. Grants are given to many different organisations - Frontier Services towards purchase of outdoor furniture for an aged care facility.; Uniting Care Lentara - money goes towards their Communal Justice Programme.; Asylum Seekers Program Winter Appeal; Share Uniting World; Mission Liaison Group; Uniting World - to assist in clean safe water program and many more.

Western Water celebrates National Water Week

It makes up 60% of our bodies, we drink it, cook with it, bathe and swim in it, irrigate our gardens and sports grounds with it – in fact we couldn't live without it. Now is the time to celebrate it, with October 16-22 marking National Water Week.

This year's theme is "Water – life – growth", aimed at encouraging people to use water wisely to ensure there is enough to meet the needs of future generations. Western Water is supporting this goal through the State Government's voluntary Target 155 program, which asks people to use no more than 155 litres of water each per day.

Customers in the Western Water region used around 185 litres per person per day during 2015-16, up almost 10 litres on the previous year. With summer approaching and the region switched over to the Melbourne supply system after local reservoirs dropped to low levels, it's a good time to be using water wisely.

There are lots of simple measures to save water, such as taking a four-minute shower, only running dishwashers and washing machines with a full load, and scraping dirty dishes instead of rinsing. Outside, you can reduce water use by choosing plants with low water needs, mulching to keep water in the soil and using a pool cover to prevent evaporation.

Ensure your property is fire ready

Macedon Ranges Shire Council is encouraging residents to star cleaning up their properties in preparation for the fire season. With summer just around the corner, now's the time to undertake necessary measures to ensure that you, your family and your property are fire ready.

Preparations to make sure you are fire ready include:

- Slash grass and keep it under 75mm high
- Rake up and remove dry grass, leaves, twigs and loose bark
- Remove any rubbish or material that is likely to cause, maintain or promote a fire
- Keep gutters clean of leaf litter
- Remove all noxious weeds from your land.

To assist residents in the clean-up, Council will lift burning off restrictions for the month of October for those residents living on land less than 4,000 square metres (one acre).

When burning off, please note the following:

- You must not cause a nuisance to neighbours
- Register your burn by calling 1800 668 511
- Burn-offs should not be left unattended.

Council urges residents to monitor weather conditions prior to the commencement of any burning off on their property.

Council's Chief Executive Officer, Peter Johnston said it was important that everyone started their preparations early given the unpredictable nature of the weather. "It's never too soon to start preparations when it comes to bushfires", he said. "You can significantly help to reduce the risk of fire by cleaning up around your property and removing fine fuels such as long grass, weeds, twigs and leaves."

Council's Fire Management Officer will begin inspecting private properties for fire risk throughout November and December. Fire Prevention Notices will be issued to any properties which pose a serious fire risk to their neighbourhood.

Council has also put together a useful planner which outlines

the preparation activities that you should undertake to adequately prepare your property and household in the event of an emergency.

The Macedon Ranges Community Emergency Preparation Planner can be picked up from one of Council's customer service centres in Kyneton, Gisborne, Romsey and Woodend. The planner also provides information on what to do on high fire risk days, and encourages community members to share information about emergencies.


