More than 30,000 Australians die of HEART ATTACK each year. Many thousands of these deaths occur amongst people in their most productive years - men and women with responsible jobs, with children still at school and mortgage payments still due.

This area has one of the highest rates of death by heart attack in the State.

If you have a combination of **risk factors** and are between the age of 30 and 60 years, your potential of developing heart disease, angina and heart attack within 5 years is as high as 1 in 6. But eliminating some or all of these **risk factors**, you can reduce your chance of having a heart attack to 1 in 70.

No one can give you or your family an unconditional guarantee of protection from heart disease but knowing and understanding the risk factors is the first step in tackling the problem. Some factors are beyond our control such as age, sex and heredity.

Heart disease is a family affair.

Families tend to share the risk of heart disease, not only because of inherited traits, but because children follow their parent's living habits. The family is the nautural social unit in which changes are more likely to be consistent. The selection of meals and attitudes about smoking and exercise are often made as a family.

A few simple changes to your family's lifestyle will benefit everyone - children as well as adults. Your children stand to gain the most if they are encouraged from the start in eating and living patterns that will help protect their hearts from premature disease in adult life.

There are certain risk factors that we can do something about such as weight, exercise, blood pressure, smoking and cholesterol levels.

RE: VICROADS COMMUNITY CONSULTATION MEETING WOODEND - TUESDAY 28TH MARCH 1995

VicRoads Northern Region has conducted a number of community consultation meetings throughout the Region. These meetings provide an opportunity for local community road user interest groups and road management partners to raise issues of concern for discussion and allow VicRoads to publicise current initiatives. The outcome of these meetings is an important input to the formulation of the Region's strategic plans and the annual program for works and services.

To date, meetings have been held at Mildura, Swan Hill, Kyneton, Echuca, Wedderburn, Bendigo, Castlemaine, Heathcote, Kerang and Charlton and it is intended to hold a further meeting at Woodend on Tuesday 28 March 1995. The meeting will be held at the Woodend Community Centre Cnr. Forest St. & High St. Woodend, commencing with light refreshments at 7.00pm and an opportunity to mix informally with VicRoads Officers and other invited guests. The meeting will commence at 7.30pm and will finish by 10.30pm.

I would be grateful if you would advise me of any road or road user issues which are of concern so that the meeting agenda can be properly focussed on local concerns - eg. traffic safety education programs, heavy truck routes, highway and bridge development strategies, traffic management issues on highways and main roads. Romsey Primary School News:

Ineffective communication is the most common reason for misunderstandings to develop. This simple statement would, I believe be accepted by the vast majority of thinking people but it is one thing to present a message and quite another to have it received and acted upon positively in the way the sender had anticipated. We can tell one another facts that we believe are interesting, pertinent and should elicit informed responses but does action follow or are we becoming too apathetic to the expressed needs of others?

We hear but do we listen? We read but do we comprehend and interpret the message? Do we take the view that if it is important enough it will be drawn to our attention again or repeated at a later time?

At Romsey Primary School we try to train children to receive and carry messages accurately. We issue detailed newsletters every Tuesday for parents display school and community notices on our notice boards, produce the Romsey Rag, conduct face to face information sessions, seminars, monthly education forums and interviews for parents. It is because we care that we try to share information with our community.

Throughout February the four teaching units within the school have conducted information/ curriculum evenings for parents. The Prep unit teachers were pleased to see every new family represented as they outlined the schools expectations and the programs that will be conducted for our youngest pupils. Approximately half of the families with children at the school attended these four sessions.

Recently produced brochures describing the functions of this school and providing an A- Z guide for parents about the operations of the Directorate are available upon request from the office. It is planned to produce 8 new brochures this year, each of which will focus on a different aspect of the schools services.

T.R.I (Towards Real Independence) is a program developed specifically to assist parents gain a greater understanding of the processes pupils are expected to cope with at the school level. Participation in this six week course (which begins this Thursday evening) will provide interested parents with an insight into homework & project tasks that often create How best to help, is often a frustrations at home. The course will be concern raised by parents. conducted at the school every Thursday evening March This highly recommended course will be conducted by Heather Turnham & John Fryer. Please phone the office on 295 099 if you are interested.

The Australian Contemporary Dance Company performed at the school last Wednesday. The 75minute performances were followed by a series of workshops for children throughout the school and were thoroughly enjoyed by those who attended. With constantly rising bus costs, we have tried to address this problem by inviting quality performers to come to the school. This not only dramatically reduces the cost involved but also reduces the time that would other wise be lost in transporting the children. It is a shame that more children do not choose to participate in cultural type activities such as this one which emphasised the skills and training required and encouraged appreciation,

understanding and participation. The dancers from the Australian & Polish ballet were excellent with the children and came highly recommended.

School Council Elections: Before the end of March all schools will have to have completed the process of electing their School Councillors. At Romsey Primary School nominations closed on the 1st of March. Ballot forms will be sent home on March 7th.

Votes will be able to be hand delivered to the school up to seven days before the close of the ballot on March 15th. The result will be posted on the school noticeboard and announced at the school's A.G.M which commences at 7.30pm on March 15th.

The Uniform Shop has moved to the canteen area of the school and will operate only on Mondays and Thursdays between 3.15 & 3.45pm. It constantly amazes parents and staff just how much uniform or other items of clothing end up in the lost property boxes, unnamed and unclaimed. What a waste. Please ensure all clothing is named. We guarantee that if it is collected it will be returned.

Congratulations to the Shire for the way in which the old Primary School has been transformed for community use. The building will provide a permanent home for the playgroup and will ofcourse be available for other community groups.

Congratulations to the Playgroup and the initiative shown by Gillian Gorrie and her group on the organisation of the Street Festival that attracted so many people last weekend. Thankyou too for the support and co-operation provided by our local shop keepers.

Vic Roads are holding a local consultation meeting at Woodend on Tuesday 28th March. With the recent improvements to Barry Street, and the increased speed limits through the town, the increased 60km zone in Barry St near the Park and the 40km zone in Main St near the School Crossing, there are sure to be some genuine issues raised. If you cannot attend, please contact the school before the 12th March and your opinions will be presented on the night.

As the team at Romsey have stressed on many occasions, if you have any concerns or ideas related to the school, please contact the staff or Principal by phone or drop in at any time.

DEEP CREEK LANDCARE GROUP

Landcare is a community program involving groups of landholders working together to tackle land protection issues in their areas. The group approach provides a very effective way to tackle land degradation problems because such problems extend beyond on individual's fence line, often covering a complete catchment.

The fact that our group is located on the rural/urban fringe of Melbourne means that our members have a diverse range of interests. While we aim to address the state-wide problems of soil erosion, salinity, weed control etc., we are also concerned about flora and fauna conservation, and improving landscape values.

A major role of all Landcare groups is to provide a forum for the exchange of information within the community and one of the particular aims of our group for 1995 is to conduct field days and seminars to facilitate this exchange.

At a recent field day, Jim Robinson, from "Greening Australia", and Robin Baker, a local conservationist, provided some on-the-spot advice about revegetation techniques for specific sites. That is, "what to plant where, and how to go about it".

Our group plans to put this information into practice by revegetating some degraded public land in the area. Our first revegetation project is planned for a roadside site at Doggett's Bridge, Lancefield, where the Kilmore Road crosses Deep Creek. This site already has several species of native grasses which, with some minor works, are expected to flourish. Local shrub and tree seeds will be collected from the surrounding area and it is expected that they should be ready to plant during the Spring. The value of this project is twofold. Not only will the visual landscape of the site be improved, but the information gained from the project can be put to use on other degraded sites within our area.

EMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

DO YOU HAVE A DISABILITY?

DO YOU WANT TO WORK?

DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO HAS A DISABILITY AND WANTS TO WORK?

If the answer is yes to the above questions then there is a new service which is establishing itself in Romsey which may be able to help you.

Able Employment Service (AES) is a free, specialist employment service which helps people who have a disability find and keep a job in the open work force. AES is a federally funded, non profit organisation

AES has offices in both Sunbury and Glenroy and has recently been given expansion money from the government to service the people in the towns and surrounding areas of Romsey, Lancefield, Riddells Creek and Woodend.

AES is funded to work with people who have permanent disabilities who require support to find and keep a job. Some of the more prominent disabilities which we work with are intellectual, psychiatric, physical and sensory.

AES always focuses on the abilities of the people that we work with rather than the disability as we take a positive approach to finding work for our clients. All people have abilities, some people require a little more support than others.

The ways in which we assist clients are by helping them to determine what their job and training options are, helping them to settle into the workplace, providing ongoing training and support as needed and ensuring that they are paid fairly and treated fairly.
