Dreams and hard work becomes a reality

On Friday April 19th the dreams and efforts of a very willing and hard-working local group became a reality when a ceremony was held to mark the commencement of building of the new Romsey Ambulance and Police complex. Assisted by Ambulance Auxiliary Secretary Margaret Howatson, Minister for Police Andre Haermeyer, Deputy Premier John Thwaites and local MP Joanne Duncan turned the first sod. In addressing the audience of about 80 guests, many of whom represented local government and all branches of the

ergency services, both Mr Haermeyer and Mr Thwaites emphasised the state government's commitment to improved health and emergency services for regional centres in Victoria. Joining in the celebrations were most of the members of the Ambulance Auxiliary. The Romsey community owes congratulations and a huge vote of thanks to this group for bringing this plan to fruition after many years of often frustrating work. November 2002 is the target date for completion of the buildings and commissioning of the services, to be located on the site of the present Romsey Police Station.

Commonwealth Romsey Branch To Close

The Commonwealth Bank recently announced that its Romsey branch ... uld close at end of business on Friday, 28 June 2002.

Mr John Burrows, the Bank's Regional Manager, Sales and Service Western Victoria Region, said that "the decision to close was a difficult one and was taken only after a thorough analysis of business trends and future growth potential."

Regional Bank personnel stated that the branch closure was done independently of other financial institutions and was not subject to agreements and arrangements that would exist for towns left with only one bank. The bank is prepared for some customers to take their business elsewhere, but felt that customers would still have a range of banking alternatives open to them. The bank was not able to respond to the requirement of businesses and other customers that required a full banking service based on a cash transactions, other than increasingly these customers were conducting their businesses through eftpos, or other arrangements.

Given the potential Romsey has further growth, it is hoped that other financial institutions display greater foresight in servicing our community's needs.


FLU VACCINATION

This year, why not weigh up the pros and cons of vaccination and decide whether you can afford to risk getting the flu and, if not, get a shot! Plenty of people continue working with a common cold, but very few can keep going right through a bout of the flu. The typical symptoms are chills, sweating, high fever, weakness, extreme tiredness, muscle aches and pains in the back and legs as well as coughing.

The difficulty of stopping the spread of influenza makes vaccination one effective practical measure you can take to prevent the infection. However, vaccination won't work immediately. It takes about 2 weeks for your new antibodies to build up to effective levels, so you need to think about vaccination before a flu outbreak starts. In Australia most cases occur between May and September.

The Romsey Medical Centre hosts flu vaccination clinics every year. These sessions are bulk billed for all patients For patients over the age of 65, the vaccine is provided at no cost. For all other patients, the vaccine will need to be purchased.



The Yellow Monster and the Men in Yellow

Even tough willow roots had to give way when seized by the yellow monster last weekend on the second clean-up of Romsey Five Mile Creek. After 22 residents had cut, raked and dug channels over Sunday morning, the yellow monster came along, guided by Lindsay, and gathered up all the debris into a future bonfire.

The men in yellow came as promised to destroy the evidence – the blackberry cuttings, branches and willow logs are gone with little smoke or fuss.

Watch for news of more events down the creek, as it comes alive. Last weekend's debris will make a great winter bonfire.

Everyone can see the results ... and more Romsey residents are coming down to walk along the creek and investigate. Did you know there is an island in Five Mile Creek, with native grasses on it? (just a small one, but the channels are now clear around it). The creek has heaps of mint growing along it.

Over 50 people have come so far to help. It's a chance to work with and get to know other local people, and see some results for the efforts. The autumn mist soon cleared as we rested on a nearby verandah enjoying tea & coffee and surveying the changes.

From council files we dug out and laminated the original plan, showing indigenous trees planted and the walking track. The landscape architect will come to talk to us one weekend about what could be done now. We hope to uncover the walking track shown on the plan.

East of Main Street, green foliage overhangs but doesn't hide the creek, thanks to the separate hard work of the stratscape group... the creek may have new secrets downstream we haven't discovered yet.

Lancefield & Romsey Community Financ^{*} Services Ltd COMMUNITY BANK BASE OPEN IN ROMSEY


Our local Community Bank branch of Bendigo Bank has moved quickly to open a base for manager Rod Browning in Romsey two days a week, to offer residents an information point and basic facilities.

Rod is working ir, Romsey from midday to 3pm on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, along with a customer service staff member. They are based in the Mechanics Hall in Main Rd., and can answer queries, sign up new customers and accounts and accept cheque deposits, which can then be delivered to the Lancefield branch office.

Community Bank chairman John Chisholm said the presence was the first move in the plan to establish a permanent f γ in Romsey, following on from the opening of the branc. In Lancefield last May. "Following the announcement that the Commonwealth Bank would be closing its Romsey branch, many residents and businesspeople asked the Community Bank to provide a presence in the town," Mr Chisholm said. "Local residents and businesses own our Community Bank as shareholders through our company, Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services Ltd, and our main reason for being is to provide banking services in our towns.

"Since the beginning of the project to establish a Community Bank in Lancefield, it was our stated intention to have branch facilities in Romsey. An office for our manager and staff is the next step as part of that commitment." Mr Chisholm urged Romsey residents and businesses to utilise the new base and transfer their accounts and their support to the Community Bank. "Our Community Bank has a Board comprising Lancefield and Romsey residents, and our decisions are made in our two towns, for the benefit of our residents and com nity," he said. 





Nusponding to Your Issues

Firstly some feedback about my survey. Responses trickled in a for a while and the total number was about thirty. Thanks again to those who responded, particularly where names were included. It is very frustrating when I can't follow up on issues raised. If anyone raised an issue through the survey without giving their name I'd appreciate your contacting me again and giving me the opportunity to follow up.

A school crossing is needed at Newham. The Shire infrastructure officers found that the traffic count is sufficient to justify a crossing, according to Vicroads rules and recommended that one be installed. The ball is now in their court, we can only wait for the outcome.

I agree with the person who said that a most important duty of a councillor is to protect what their community values. During the last two years, Macedon Ranges Shire has been running many forums to find out what community values are. Yet another source of that information will be the neighbourhood character studies of our townships which I have been advocating for strongly, starting with Romsey and Lancefield. What kind of development suits a town is a bit like what kind of clothes suit a person. We all know it when we see it, but it's hard to define. However defining neighbourhood character is possible! We'll need some help from people with the right experience AND we need people who care enough to put in to the process. You will all be invited so please join in!

One survey respondent suggested having community forums to identify community strengths and emerging issues.

aim would be to find new ways for community and the Shire to work in partnership to address the issues that the community sees as important. This is my aim for the Mt William Reference Group (see below). The first meeting at Lancefield was well attended and focussed mainly on planning issues particularly on commercial land in Romsey. Since then senior shire planning officers have met with the Romsey Business and Tourism Association, improving understanding and exchange of ideas.

To the person who asked about recycling of paper, no, it is not dumped. The co-mingled (that is everything mixed together) collection we have in Macedon Ranges is sorted by ingenious machines. I went on a tour to observe first hand because I didn't believe it either! There is minimal hand sorting (thank goodness, what an awful job). The more carefully we follow the rules about what to put in the recycling bin, the better the outcome and the less hand sorting is needed. Would you like better, clearer information about recycling? Call me if you do, on 5427 0156.

Sad and disappointing news about the Commonwealth Bank at Romsey. A very short sighted decision which shows a lack of understanding of Romsey's potential for growth I believe. You will have seen how strongly the Shire is advocating on this issue. All Commonwealth Bank account holders, consider taking your business elsewhere, preferably to the Bendigo Community Bank in Lancefield. Maybe we can attract a branch to Romsey.

I hope you all had a chance to read about the Community Vision for 2025 in the recent Shire Update. Remember this is a community vision, not a council one. Don't be cynical about this, it will work if people make it work. It can't be ignored if enough people get behind it. Please pick up a copy of the full document and send in your comments.





What's News

If ever there was an unanswerable question, it would be 'What is art?' Certainly abstract modern art is beyond my comprehension. Consider Melbourne's examples of the Yellow Peril and the Federation Arch.

Yet one of the elements present in all of the arts is passion. The passionate expression of the artist. The passionate view of the reviewer and critic. And the passions of the people in response. Consider the music of Eminem, or the photograph 'Piss Christ', or the film 'The Last τ potation of Christ'.

I unit kyou could argue that art is about struggle. There is a struggle for self-expression, and the expression of the indescribable. There is a grappling with beliefs and values, with purpose and what matters. There is a struggle for understanding and tolerance. Art will always be a place of conflict between those who appreciate the artists work, those who don't, and those who are offended.

Whilst the freedom of artistic expression brings conflict, it is precisely this freedom that makes it an important medium for humanity. In art, we are not bound by rules of logic and reason. In art we can explore beyond artificial boundaries, entering the theoretical and abstract in relative safety. In art, we can find different ways of expressing that which cannot be contained within the confines of language.

As a society, we need to recognise art as a safe space for exploring a wide range of issues and feelings. Art is not necessarily a statement of dogmatic belief, but can j as easily be a reflection of reality or a tinkering with the edges. It can be a safe 'what if' without the often gruesome consequences.

The confrontation of art provides a direct challenge to the church. We can be forced to confront our beliefs and values, with several possible responses. We can ignore art, therefore alienating ourselves from society. We can oppose art as expressing the darkest depths of human-



ity. Or we can embrace the challenge, seeking to enter the realm of exploration and deepen our own understanding of our beliefs and values.

I'll admit to being a sports nut, which is often seen as being diametrically opposed to art. But as I recognise my own struggling with the paradoxes of life and faith, I am appreciating more and more the freedom art gives to explore and learn.

Peer Mediation

The Peer Mediation program is an important initiative at Romsey Primary School in promoting social well-being, leadership and advanced problem solving strategies amongst students. The Peer Mediation program teaches students new, effective ways to deal with potentially difficult situations. Students help other students by using mediation approaches to problem solving. The program empowers students, lowers administrative time, and settles small disputes before they become major battles.

At Romsey mediation begins in the playground where specially trained students act as mediators for other students who have fights or disputes. When a conflict occurs, the student mediators use a structured conflict resolution process and mediation techniques to help the students in dispute reach agreement.

Peer Mediators-

Are the peacemakers of the school Listen to and respect all points of view Know how to help other students resolve their conflicts

Peer Mediators are trained to follow an agreed plan in assisting students. These are life long skills. The mediation process involves 6 steps.

- 1. Agree to mediate
- 2. Talk and listen to each other
- 3. Find out what is needed
- 4. Think of ways to solve the problem
- 5. Choose a solution
- 6. Make a plan and go for it!

Following their training, our first group of mediators will be working in the schoolyard in the coming weeks. Our students are selected for the job as they have met the personal criteria of demonstrating qualities of being fair, kind & caring, responsible, friendly, helpful, able to solve problems, ask questions, trustworthy, showing initiative, a good listener, willing to do the job properly, patient, understanding, allowing an equal say, respectful and able to keep the process confidential. In skilling students to aspire for such positive attributes the school is confident that we are not only working towards positive social environment, but also teaching really important skills for life.


