

### **Delivered Meals Volunteers Needed!**

Volunteers are needed to be become a part of the Delivered Meals Program which provide meals to older persons in Macedon Ranges municipality. Meals are delivered in Kyneton, Gisborne, Woodend, Macedon Romsey and Lancefield.

Volunteers are asked how often they would like to deliver meals each month and on what days. Volunteers are sent a monthly roster well in advance so any changes can be made.

Volunteers are offered a petrol voucher to help with the cost of using their own cars. We also have volunteers who do not drive but are matched with another volunteer who do the deliveries together. Meals delivery takes approximately an hour and begin around 11.45am.

Our current volunteers enjoy the contact with the elderly people who receive the meals and are a valued greatly by their community.

#### SO NOW THAT I HAVE YOUR ATTENTION.....

After much consideration, Sam and I have bitten the bullet and decided to re-locate up to Tocumwal - we have had a van there for the last few years and just love the climate and the Murray, so now is the time.

We will miss Romsey and the people very much and the talk of uprooting brings back all the memories of what has been my "Romsey Experience".

It all started back in 1980 when we lived in Riddells Creek. Sam saw an ad for a typist in the Rates Office at the Romsev Shire - I was driving up and down to North Melbourne every day and the travelling was getting to me - so phoned, got an interview and early one morning headed up to Romsey (which I had only every passed through on the way to somewhere else!) and had to ask the Lolly Pop Lady where the Shire Office was! Lynn Moss was that Lolly Pop Lady who was standing at the wee bridge opposite the old Infant Welfare Centre and Laing's Garden Centre at the time! I will never forget Lynn for her kindness that morning, she must have thought I was a city slicker! But being the lovely lady she was sent me back up the street to my interview in the Council Chamber! Couple of days later Rose McCarthy phoned to tell me Mr. Carne had confirmed I had got the job and so it all started - me and Romsey! So I worked with the staff at the Shire, a great bunch and Kaylene Cruise (who started at the same time as I did) is my best friend to this day! But, after a couple of trips back to Scotland, Sam and I settled in Romsey and just in time as in September, 1988 I took ill and needed a Heart-Lung Transplant - only being able to have that done at the time in London. Well, the people of Romsey came to the fore and rallied around. We were members of the Bowling Club and they just supported Sam and I all the way - I had about 10 Aussie Mums and the same num-

ber of Grandads all sharing the load. Rose McCarthy started a Fund to help meet the cost of the trip to London and the generosity of locals at that time was what kept Sam and I going. This is around the time that Trevor Turnham was looking for helpers with the Romsev Rag and with an old golf ball typewriter from the Shire I would help Jeni Clampit type the Romsey Rag from the end of my bed with the oxygen tube stuck up me nose! (And thank you to Ken Paterson at Mitre 10 for keeping the oxygen supply up!). Mr. Esmore took over the Transplant Unit at the Alfred a year or so later which meant I could have my transplant in Melbourne. Dr. Paul Carter and the rest of the doctors and staff at the Romsey Medical Centre kept me as well as was possible - and so started the long wait for organs. We were called down three times but sent home again but the op went ahead on the fourth call (three and a half years later!) and really life just changed overnight - our own wee miracle! 21 days later I went home to my Romsey and three months later opened the Romsey Book Exchange and Secretarial Service - which got bigger than Myers and took over my life! So when I was offered a job at the Medical Centre, I jumped at it and stopped working seven days a week! Around that time I was at the starting gate of the Rotary and the Business Association so life was indeed very hectic. Around that time I was also asked to become secretary of the Lancefield Hospital Committee which was in the process of winding up the hospital and that has just come to conclusion in the past few weeks, with funds from the sale being distributed within the commu-

Romsey, in the meantime, is getting bigger and bigger and we start to try and secure an ambulance station from government funds - that was to take us seven years but we did it! Sam says I smile like a Cheshire Cat every time I pass it! And then came along the Centenary of Federation in 2001 and my being Secretary of the most dedicated committee you would ever care to work on and hence the Bike Track! It is just magnificent, a monument to what the community can do when they put their mind to it, and will be there all the way to Lancefield and back for generations to come.

So that's my "Romsey Experience" over the past 20 years or so - many memories, many friends and many laughs! But it is time to slow down and smell the roses as it were, or at Toc smell the gum leaves!!!

But as that Great Scot once said - "We're no awa to bide awa, we'll aye come back and see ye!"

# Romsey Primary School News Bad Hair Day

Our Junior School Council organised a whole school "Bad Hair Day" recently to raise funds for Frederick, our sponsored child in Kenya, Africa. This was a fun day with students and staff alike joining in to raise money for this good cause. Our Junior School Councillors came up with the idea of sponsoring a child, and its great to have our relatively very well off children thinking of others who do not have the many advantages we enjoy in Australia. Through the Bad Hair Day enough money was raised to bring the total up to cover the sponsorship for a full year.



### Land for Wildlife

The school was recently assessed as a suitable site for "Land for Wildlife." Over the past few years we have commenced work on creating corridors of native vegetation around the perimeter of the school grounds, as well as developing special habitats such as the "Honeyeater Haven" and the frog pond areas. By inclusion with the "Land for Wildlife," the school can access a range of support material applicable to classroom programs, as well as receive a site report that gives us further ideas for planting and habitat development.

### Prep students transition to school

Our prep students for 2004 are well underway for a smooth start for the commencement of the new school year. There have already been a number of orientation visits for these youngsters as they explore the playground and get the feel of the school and its layout. Following a further parent information session last week, our 2004 preps will be having two further sessions this term with their teacher for next year. At this stage our focus has been on getting the new preps to school on the first day, happy and eager to start on this new adventure. Further support for the students and their families will be offered next year as we develop individual learning goals for all students, and we hold further information sessions for parents giving greater detail on the school program for the year.

### Fire Restrictions, Summer 2003/2004

Good rains over the past few weeks have delayed the decision to introduce fire restrictions into the area however by the time the next issue of the newsletter is published the restrictions will be in place. The Macedon Ranges Shire Council has erected a number of sign across the district that will proclaim the introduction of fire restrictions. Keep you eye open for the changes.

At the moment our best guess is that restrictions will be in place by Christmas. It is your responsibility to check if restrictions are in place before you light a fire. Ignorance is no excuse. CFA produces a Can I. Can't I pamphlet that sets out what can and can't be done during the Fire Danger Period. Contact the brigade or CFA for a copy.



Do you really need to burn?

The Council has introduced some restrictions on burning in the open outside the fire danger period. If you must burn contact the Shire on 1300 123 456 to ensure you are not exposing yourself to prosecution. Burning is a very dangerous occupation. Changes in the wind strength and direction can quickly turn a small fire into a runaway beast that cannot and will not be contained. History has shown that even to most careful of people can loose a burn-off.

If you must burn create a small pile and burn that then slowly add to the pile as it burns away. Burning a large pile may be quicker but it greatly increases; the heat and sparks that could carry the fire outside your control lines.

If you must burn choose a day that is cool with little or no wind. If it is warm then burn in the evening when the temperature drops and the wind slows down.

If you must burn you must have a water supply handy, you must be in attendance at all times. If you need to leave the fire it should be completely extinguished.

Don't burn. Recycle.

To reduce the need to burn the Shire has announced free green waste disposal. For further details of the program contact the shire on 1300 123 456.

### 10 things you can do before summer

Develop you summer Fire Plan 1.

Talk to your neighbours about their plan 2.

Attend a Bushfire Blitz or Community Meeting, if there isn't one scheduled in your area go to the one nearest 3. or ask for one in your street (ring Peter Moore 0409 407 725)

Make sure the fire truck has access to your property 4.

Make sure you haven't covered the Fire Hydrant that may be outside your house 5.

6. Trim branches that overhang the house

Remove dead branches and twigs that accumulate in and under shrubs. 7.

8. Keep the grass cut

Have a special paddock that has been eaten out as a shelter for you livestock. 9.



Really, we do all "learn from every experience".

By the time you read this we will have had our new 2004 Preps for an Orientation Day with their new teachers in readiness for their new adventure next year. Grade 5's will be going to Gisborne Secondary College for an Introduction Day shortly and of course the Grade 6's time at Bolinda is quickly running out as they prepare for a new phase of their lives at secondary school. It is very pleasing to tell you that our school performed very well in the statewide AIM Testing involving Grade 3 and Grade 5 children. In Grade 3, nearly all children performed at or above the Statewide average in maths, spelling and reading. In Grade 5, all children were at or above the state average in maths and the majority were above the state average in spelling and reading.

Our Children's Fundraising Committee is organizing a lunch time disco to raise money to support "Secret Life of Us" actor Samuel Johnson, who recently rode a unicycle from Sydney to Melbourne to help raise money for "Kids with Cancer". The awareness of our children to the presence of cancer in our society and how it can also affect children is a reality that our children are able to cope with, and as they are developing their sense of community and belonging, they want to be able to help in their small way.

### IN ANOTHER ROMSEY VEGETABLE GARDEN

Inspired by the writer on this subject in the November issue, I would like to add a few comments from my experience over the last 75 years in growing vegies and other plants. Since my childhood at Nathalia in the Goulburn Valley in the 1920's when my father, an ex-market gardener from the Melbourne south-eastern area, grew vegetable, fruit trees and grapevines for our own use, I have followed his teachings and developed many of my own ideas supplemented by those learned from professional market gardeners at Dandenong in the early 1930s and practised at Newport in the 1950s before starting again at Tullamarine in 1960 and again in moving to Romsey in 1978.

It was at Newport that I became interested in competing at flower shows and importing seeds from overseas while a member of the Royal Horticultural Society, England, and completing a four year part time course in horticulture at Burnley and joining the newly formed Society For Growing Australian Plants (now Australian Plants Society APS).

On moving Romsey after abandoning my Tullamarine Plant Farm following the reservation of its site for the Western Ringroad, I soon established a vegetable garden containing 22 raised beds about 4 metres by 2 metres of which about 15 were used each year, allowing a rest of 1 or 2 years of each bed after about 3 years of alternating crops, with the application of compost make from crop residues, tree trimmings and kitchen waste – after feeding crows and mynahs!

Although my tool collection includes 134 shovels as well a spades, rakes and hoes, I have only limited use for hand tools, all beds being cultivated by rotary hoe. Beds are then levelled with a homemade grader to obtain uniformity, all sowings and transplantings being recorded on cards. Watering has been done with 18mm handheld hoses eliminating run-off on a sloping block and fertiliser obtained for Pivot in 50 kg bags every 5 to 10 years.

Diseases are rare and controlled by spraying with copper and other sprays and weeds on paths with use of REGA knap-sacks bought at clearing sales for almost nothing, with small bucket and one hand sprayers, for small jobs, like white butter-flies on cabbages, using appropriate materials. Aphids are easily controlled with Clensel or other safe sprays. Fruit trees receive more intensive treatment.

Because of the current watering restrictions which limit the use of hoses to unsuitable times ie. Twice in one 24 hour period with a 2 day gap to the next, I am confining my efforts to 3 beds of potatoes and 2 x 25 year old asparagus beds and neglecting most of my ornamental garden, many of my 17 outside taps now disused.

Seeds and cutting of ornamental plants are available at various times free of charge to residents and schools.

### ROMSEY TOPS \$400,000 TARGET IN PUSH FOR OUR BANK

The Romsey community has rallied magnificently in our bid to establish our own Romsey Community Bank branch. Romsey Community Bank Steering Committee chair Maureen Wiltshire said the warning last month that a Community Bank would not just happen, but that Romsey residents had to demonstrate that they really wanted it, seemed to have been the catalyst to a late run of pledges.

"In July we had 126 local residents who had put their hands up to be counted, and \$310,000 in pledges," Mrs Wiltshire said. "At that stage, we looked to be a long way from our target of \$400,000. But the community responded in great Romsey fashion to the stage where we've exceeded the initial target. At last count 247 local residents and businesses have pledged \$425,300 towards the Bank, and more pledges are still coming in."

Mrs Wiltshire said senior Bendigo Bank staff met with the Romsey Steering Committee members and the Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services Ltd Board after the target was reached in November, and gave approval for the next step — an independent feasibility study. "However, everyone must recognise that the feasibility study is just the next step in the project to open our own Romsey Community Bank branch, and does not guarantee that it will go ahead," she said. "Feasibility questionnaires will be mailed to every household in Romsey and surrounding areas in late January or early February. These confidential surveys will ask people whether they would be prepared to transfer their investments, deposit accounts, overdrafts and loans across to a Romsey Community Bank branch, and it is vital that as many people as possible respond."

The individual questionnaire information will be confidential, and will be available only to the consultants in assessing the viability of the bank and preparing the business plan. If our community members can demonstrate that we will bring in enough business to make a Romsey branch a viable financial proposition, we will have gone a long way towards convincing Bendigo Bank we are able to take the final step and open for business.

"If we don't get our survey questionnaires in, we may lose our chance to have our own branch and to 'bank-proof' Romsey for the future. A successful feasibility study is one of the remaining key steps we need to take before we can choose premises, hire local staff and open our doors for business."

Mrs Wiltshire said a Romsey branch would be owned by the pledgors and other local people buying shares in Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services Ltd, the company which already owns and operates the Lancefield branch. She said pledges were still open, and urged residents who had not already come 'on board' to fill out a form and be part of the group who were working to make the local branch happen, and to further demonstrate to Bendigo Bank the level of support.

Lancefield & Romsey Community Financial Services chair Russell Pattinson said he was delighted that the Romsey Community had risen to the challenge of reaching the pledge target – particularly the surge in support over the past three months. "Everyone can be proud of their efforts in getting behind the push to open a Bank branch," he said. "I would especially like to acknowledge the incredible work performed by the Romsey Steering Committee. They have done and continue to do a wonderful job for their community."
