
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

Stamp of approval for voting through the mail

Voting for this November's Macedon Ranges Shire Council elections will be conducted under the postal system. The postal voting system is one I fully support, and I have worked hard over the past couple of months to successfully overturn a previous Council decision to conduct the election under the compulsory attendance system. With the move to change ward boundaries and establish multimember wards for the 2005 election it was especially important to simplify procedures for the voters through postal voting.

Instead of voting for one candidate in Mt William Ward or Monegeetta Ward as was the case last time around, this time residents will be voting for three candidates in the new East Wardwhich takes in a large area of the Shire all the way from Baynton to Riddells Creek. Under the postal voting system, each voter will receive information through the mail from the Victorian Electoral Commission on each of the candidates, and a voting slip. Residents have the chance to digest the information and consider the policies and issues put forward by the candidates before casting their vote and mailing it back by the due date, in the postage-paid envelope provided.

This is the fairest, most democratic

system available, which is why I strongly supported it and why I was able to successfully move a rescission motion in Council to overturn the previous decision requiring people to turn up on the day to vote. Postal voting gives residents a real say in who represents them on Council and is democracy in action. It is a more desirable system than people having to turn up on a Saturday and having how-to-vote cards thrust into their hands as they walk towards the polling booth.

It is also better value for money for we ratepayers. Council officers have prepared a document which shows we will save \$26,000 by moving to the postal voting system, compared with the cost of having paid staff in attendance at booths across the municipality.

It is important for residents to ensure they are on the electoral roll so they can exercise their right to vote. There will be important information in the local newspapers for residents on the new system.

It's up to you though to make sure your vote counts.

Romsey Heights footpaths

My attention was recently drawn to the lack of footpaths in the Romsey Heights estate around Robb Drive. I immediately investigated this matter through Council, and am pleased to advise that work to construct concrete paths is scheduled to start this month,




weather permitting. Romsey's Newnham Earthmoving have been contracted to build the paths. The current path in Robb Drive will be continued from where it ends at Harvest Close to Drovers Retreat on the north side of the road, and then to Hutchinsons Lane on the west side. It's pleasing that the Council was able to respond promptly when this matter was raised. Residents will be further notified by letter when work is about to start. Some residents who do not have an existing concreted driveway will not be able to drive on or off their property for a short time while the path is laid, but the contractor will liaise with them when this is about to happen.





Ripper Reads From Mitchell Library

Avenger - Frederick Forsyth

It's been quite a while since I've read a Frederick Forsyth novel, but his most recent book Avenger reminded me why his publishers call him 'the master storyteller'. It was fantastic. Forsyth places the characters in the most amazing places and situations and the reader becomes engrossed with their lives and ernbroiled in the wider political implications. A tight plot, an unforgettable hero - Cal Dexter - and concise, gripping descriptions make for a fast, racy read. Of course there is the Forsyth trademark of not one but several twists in the tale that make a fitting finale. Great stuff.

An Affair to Remember - Megan Gressor & Kerry Cook

The subtitle of this book is the Greatest Love Stories of all Time and within its pages 43 couples from all eras and backgrounds are portrayed in all their glory. From history - Napoleon and Josephine from royalty - Victoria and Albert, from literature - Agatha Christie and Max Mallowan, from politics - Joseph Lyons and Enid Burnell, from the arts - John Lenn and Yoko Ono and from Hollywood - Paul Newman and Joannne Woodward to name just a few. Although all their affairs were passionate and romantic not all of them lasted the distance of time or fidelity. In fact quite a lot of the partners were already married, or otherwise involved, when they met 'the love of their life'. An entertaining read and apparently the authors are now working on a companion volume.

Two Weeks in Grade 6 - Anna & Mary K.Pershall

This book was written by a mother and daughter collaboration and is a great little read about the trials and tribulations of friendship when one is a girl in grade 6. At the start of term 3 Mr Callaghan, obviously frustrated with the social circles happening in his grade, decides to reorganise all the seating arrangements despite the howls of protest from the students about it not being fair. He suggests that they just give it a trial for two weeks and then he may review that decision. For Kaitlin it is the longest two weeks of her life as she discovers what it means to have friends and also gets to know her English grandmother for the first time.

What's News

This will be my second last article for the *Rag*. In August, I will be leaving the church in Lancefield and Romsey to join the Air Force as a chaplain.

Some people may be surprised at this move. Whilst I have been exploring this possibility for quite some time, the final decision has come quite suddenly. However for some, the idea of a minister being in the military just doesn't make sense.

It would be reasonable for me to try to explain why I am making this move. There is a danger, however, that any explanation will appear to be nothing more than an attempt to justify myself. And I think that this trend is becoming more and more common in our society.

Too often, our politicians, and others, sound like they are trying to convince themselves that they have made the right decision. Instead of explaining their reasoning, it seems as though the decision has come first (for whatever reason) and the rationale is conceived to support the decision.

This inherent dishonesty can be found in almost any organization where decisions have to be made, especially when there are some who will not agree with the decision that has been made. Rather than address a conflict and seek a compromise or alternative solution, we become polarised, leaving no room for dialogue or negotiation. As a result, the rationale is more about why 'l'm right and you're wrong'.

To have authentic relationships with other human beings requires us to be honest in our communication. And being honest means admitting when we have made a mistake or are wrong.

Unfortunately, our society does not reward honesty. It rewards 'success', however that may be defined. Being wrong is simply not good enough.

Yet I believe that a part of being human is to make mistakes. No one is perfect. To admit mistakes is to be admitted as a member of the human race. Whilst we may place some members of society onto pedestals, expecting them to be perfect role models, in doing that we are only setting ourselves up to be disappointed. That is why the media jumps all over them when they do get it wrong. Personally, I find it much easier to relate to someone who not only makes mistakes, but also admits them. For me, that gives them much more integrity and character than anyone trying to be 'perfect'.

Mrs Wiltshire said around 240 residents had so far shown their support for the Bank by buying shares.


"With Romsey's population of around 4000 residents, there are a lot of people in the town and surrounding area who still haven't put up their hand to be counted," Mrs Wiltshire said. "I am sure there are many potential 'mum-and-dad' investors around the town who strongly support the concept of a community-owned bank in Romsey, but aren't confident about taking the next step into a shareholding. I can assure them that for a minimum \$500 it's a simple process and a tangible way to support our town.

"Our Bank will provide a significant benefit for Romsey, both in terms of convenience, face-toface personalised service, Saturday morning banking and funds to help our town grow and prosper into the future. All of Romsey's people will benefit."

Mrs Wiltshire said Romsey could follow the lead of the Lancefield community which opened its branch four years ago, when a number of residents invested in the future of their children by buying shares for them.

Some preliminary building work has been carried out at the Romsey branch's chosen location at Shop 1, 112 Main St.

At Macedon Ranges Computer Club (MRCC) we're all about informing you of the best possible practices for your computing. Our motto is that we take the frustration out of computers. We want to tell you about a problem that potentially affects EVERY computer user who's ever bought software and why you shouldn't purchase pirate software and allow yourself to be ripped off.

Piracy is a huge problem for the software industry and a major profit for organized criminals. I'm not talking about the friend who copies their software and hands it around to their mates; I'm talking about career criminals. Everyone who pays for their software is actually paying that bit extra to support the activities of both the organized crime and the pirating friend.

If there was no piracy, then most software would be cheaper for everybody!

With pirated software there's no quality control and often a pirate CD will be blank, or worse still it may contain a virus. Some viruses can log your key strokes, from your PC's keyboard (key logging), and send the information to criminals via the net. This is just one of the methods used to get your bank account details and password etc.

If you were to pay say \$140 for one of the pirated Microsoft Windows XP Professionals from the better known internet based auction web site....., you'd be giving away \$135 to a criminal. It costs just \$5 to produce the junk pirate CD the rest is clear profit for the "crims". If a crim sells 100 copies via an auction site, they'll have made \$13,500 bucks ... a little over a weekend!!! This is not small bickies. **WARNING** – Don't try this at home because a number of organizations such as the Australian Federal Police, Microsoft and the Australian Tax Office are all very interested in this type of activity, and like any crime committed via the internet it can be traced DIRECTLY back to the offender.

Sometimes the pirated CD's are very real in appearance and function, but for one minor detail, you cannot authenticate or register them with Microsoft. This is a dead give away and if you've purchased such an item, then keep reading because we have some good news for you.

The CD will work ok to begin with, and you'll get your updates from Microsoft, but all too soon the update function will stop working and you'll quickly realize you've been ripped off by an expert criminal. Microsoft is currently adding details to their update web sites so that pirated software will no longer be able to gather updates.

In some cases Microsoft can help unsuspecting purchasers, but not all. You should contact them on 1800 639 963 Mon to Friday from 6 am to 6 pm. Talk with them and hopefully you'll decide to dob in the person who blatantly ripped you off. In return Microsoft will evaluate your pirated CD and determine if it qualifies you for a replacement with a genuine Microsoft product equivalent.

Any computer problems that you have can be submitted in writing and we'll present it to our panel of experts so it can be resolved. At our last meeting Deb Burge gave a talk on computer hacking and how it can be used for good. Everyone was shown how hacking works and we legally hacked a web site that had been setup for this express purpose. Details were provided to members on how the knowledge of good hackers can help web site and software developers to plug any loopholes that bad hackers might exploit. This was done at a level where everyone could understand and see how hacking is actually accomplished. Hacking 101 made easy!

ARE YOU BURNING THEIR HOMES TO WARM YOURS?

Collecting firewood is one of humankind's oldest activities. Australians enjoy the beauty and warmth of a wood fire, and in many regional areas wood fires are the only practical source of heating.

Dead trees, often with hollows make popular firewood. But firewood collection comes at a cost to the environment, the consequences of which may not be entirely understood for years. Many firewood users are unaware of the ecological price of collecting dead trees and fallen logs. Often they mistakenly think they are just keeping the forest or farm 'tidy'.

Firewood harvesting has an effect on our native woodlands, and a variety of threatened species. Dead standing and fallen timber provides crucial habitat for numerous species of animals and birds. It is now recognised that the removal of this wood for firewood is contributing to a significant loss of wildlife, particular in the woodlands of south-eastern Australia.

Not only does standing and fallen dead wood provide important habitat for animals and birds it also plays an essential role in maintaining forests and woodland nutrient cycles. Dead wood is as important as living trees, fallen leaves and soil for the maintenance of ecological processes sustaining biodiversity.

FOUR EASY THINGS YOU CAN DO

1. Collect Thoughtfully

* If you are collecting firewood leave hollow logs alone whether they are standing or lying. They are the dwindling homes to some of Australia's most beloved animals. So try and take smaller diameter solid pieces of wood instead of large diameter hollows.

* Do not collect from endangered woodland communities. These communities are declining and are protected by state and federal legislation so penalties apply to firewood collecting. Look on the threatened species web site for your state to find out what is endangered at your state level.

* When you take firewood leave some behind and move on. If there is very little around leave it and search somewhere else. It is often the cumulative impact of lots of people taking a little firewood that causes depletion. As with recreational fishing, over harvesting will destroy the resource for everyone.

2. BUY RESPONSIBLY

* Encourage your wood seller to stock plantation wood or the less threatened species of hardwood such as stringybark. This will help conserve declining forests and woodlands.

* If there is enough consumer demand for alternative products then merchants will progressively turn away from the threatened woodland species.

* Ask your wood merchant whether they can supply a mixed load of hardwoods (eg more than one type). This will help to reduce the pressure on woodland species that aren't regenerating.

3. If you own a property, try to plant as much as you take. That way you will create your own renewable source of wood.

4. Recycle / use old fence posts and off cuts.

Up to 5.5 million tonnes of timber is harvested annually for domestic firewood use. This number increases to 6-7 million tonnes when industrial firewood in included. Eighty four percent of domestic firewood is collected on private property.

Remember that logs have life inside!

From the Anglican Church Dealing with grief.

In recent weeks, I have been involved in a number of funerals, helping people celebrate and mourn the loss of someone near and dear to them. Our community has been saddened by the passing of Robert Clements and Mary Madigan, and many have been shocked by the awful accident which took the life of Eddie Green. We all know that it is inevitable that we will lose friends and family members through sickness, old age and accident but that realisation does nothing of itself to help that sense of loss.

I have been reading lately about grief and loss, and have been reminded that grief and loss are integral to our lives. We need to *learn* how to deal with it, otherwise we are at risk of never recovering. We actually grieve over many things: moving from one house to another, for example. We leave behind gardens, friends, homes in which a great deal of our life has been lived, familiar surroundings and associations. I have been a "wanderer" in my work, and while I personally have become partly immune to this, I did not realise how much it affected my children, my parents, (who saw very little of their grandchildren) and so on. The grief may not have been recognised at the time but lately I have come to realise how it took its toll.

Children experience grief. They grieve, for example, when they lose friends. It doesn't need to be a change in school, although that is usually pretty traumatic, just a change in patterns of friendships can cause grief. We need to help our children at these times, especially if they are the ones left behind. The death of a pet can be very difficult, but it can be a wonderful opportunity to learn about grief.

One enormous problem is the grief caused by divorce. I


have experienced this pain myself, and know what a shattering experience it is. It impacts not just on the children, but on the wider family as well, especially on grandpatts, who frequently lose contact, causing them great grief. Divorce brings huge changes, loss of friends, familiar neighbourhood, school and so on, to say nothing of the fractured relationship between the parents and children.

We all understand this; few of us have not been affected, so the big question is how to deal with it, and how to teach our children to cope.

A new "industry" of grief counselling, is on the rise. Being able to talk over the situation causing grief and recognising it for what it is can, in itself, be a wonderful help. Friends, church members, clergy, counsellors all help at these times. The recognition that grief is shared by **all** human beings, is probably the first step.

From a Christian perspective, the Bible is full of instances of people pouring out their grief to God. A belief that God is involved in our daily life and concerned about us, is a great help. I think it is something like an unhappy child, blaming the parent and putting on a temper tantrum. The *lov*(the parent is strong enough to absorb that fury. One day the child will come to understand that it is the parents' love which is their anchor. This is a reflection of what it is like with between us and God. Blame God for our troubles if we like; God's love is able to absorb our anger and frustration. God's love and healing will be revealed to us if we are able to recognise that love, expressed in the suffering and grief in the life of Jesus. God's love can be an anchor for our daily life.
