
We should all be aware of and acknowledge the heroic efforts of;



December in the garden

So much Rain!

During the millennium drought I swore I would never again say 'stop raining' but I'm getting close to it now! The lawns are soggy, the garden beds are wet and the paths are slippery. It's not much fun being outside and you shouldn't work soil when it is wet anyway, because you can damage its structure. So, I have concentrated on tending to my succulent pot collection. I Seasoled and liquid fertilised all of them and moved the ones on the verandah forward into the sun. I had a large multi-headed Agave attenuata which was getting a bit unwieldy, so I cut all the heads off and reset 3 into a pot, giving the other 3 away.

Trevor and I made a mercy dash into town the other day to rescue a ponytail palm Beaucarnea recurvata that was about to be thrown into the skip. It stands almost 2m tall and its swollen base made it very heavy so it was a tricky job getting it into the trailer. But we have it home now and just need to find somewhere to place it until our new house is built and it will then go to its final location.

My Californian tree anemone Carpenteria californica is in full bloom and its huge fried egg flowers are waving around in the breeze. It's hard to believe this plant is in the hydrangea family! It has taken a few years to hit its straps but I think it's shaping up nicely and it should be pretty drought tolerant now. Also flowering now is my Chinese windmill palm Trachycarpus fortunei which is one of the coldest tolerant palms of all, hailing as it does from the mountainous areas of Asia. It produces large plumes of soft yellow teeny tiny flowers.

Parks Victoria

Storm clean-up

Recent severe weather has lashed parks in Victoria. Damage is widespread, with gusts up to 140 kilometres per hour.

Latest closures

In severe storms, rainfall soaks deep into the ground, softens the soil and reduces the grip of tree roots.

Recently large trees fell on walking tracks, fences, bridges and access roads. Where trees are grouped, some became uprooted but remain hanging against other trees and could fall without warning – even in light winds.

With more wet weather on the way, the soil will continue to move and disrupt the structural integrity of many trees. It is extremely important that visitors stay out of closed parks as rangers assess safety and remove hazardous trees. Stay out of fenced or taped off areas.

Local Macedon Closures:

- Macedon Regional Park
 - Walking track between Bawden Road and the Memorial Cross Reserve
 - Hoods Track Francis Track
 - Link 1 Track and Link 2 Track
- Coliban River Scenic Reserve (Trentham Falls)
 - Whole site closed (incl. toilet block and entrance to Trentham Falls)
- Hepburn Regional Park
 - Goldfields Track (from Telegraph Rd to the Midland Hwy)
 - Vehicle tracks south of the Midland Highway (except Old Tom Track)

Some Macedon sites have reopened, being cleared of minimal damage.


Romsey Police Station

Hello Romsey,

We hope you have been making the most of being able to get out and about and are enjoying the warmer weather. With that, it is timely to mention the imminent fire danger period and related restrictions. Please refer to the CFA website – www.cfa.vic.gov.au for fire danger period dates relevant to Macedon Ranges and a list of activities restricted during this period.

Additionally, with an increase in traffic on the roads please be mindful of road safety, put your mobile phone away and limit other distractions, keep to the speed limit and be considerate of other road users. We want to see everybody getting to their destinations safely.

We are also currently in the midst of a national firearms amnesty. Any person wanting to surrender an unwanted or unregistered firearm can do so at any police station or licenced firearms dealer with no obligation to provide a name or other details and are free from prosecution for possessing an unregistered firearm. Refer to the crime stoppers website for more details. For firearms licence holders with registered firearms, we are ramping up storage inspections in the area so please ensure you are compliant, such as keeping ammunition separate from firearms, bolting your safe to the wall and/or floor where it is under 150kg and ensuring it is fitted with a lock of sturdy construction.



Recent crime

 In incidents believed to be related, a male since identified by police crashed and rolled his car onto its side on Melbourne-Lancefield Road in Monegeetta. It's believed the male then abandoned the wreckage and entered a nearby property where he



attempted to steal 2 cars before stealing a third, being a black coloured 2002 Jeep Cherokee. Attending police searched the rolled vehicle, locating a quantity of methyl amphetamine "ice" and drug paraphernalia. The investigation is continuing.

- Further incidents include, offenders who committed a burglary at an unoccupied residential property in Rogers Street, Romsey. The offenders stole power tools and lit a small fire inside which caused no damage.
- A single registration plate which was stolen from a vehicle in Muir Ct, Romsey and a deception offence relating to a fraudulent ad on Facebook selling puppies.





Book Review: Three Sisters by Heather Morris

After the enormous popularity of The Tattooist of Auschwitz in 2017, survivors and their families from around the world contacted author Heather Morris with messages of thanks and support. Among them was Livia Ravek, who was spurred on after recognising people she knew in the story, and whose own family history forms the basis of this novel.

The Tattooist of Auschwitz and its immediate sequel Cilka's Journey are both stories of resilience, but they nonetheless revolve around the atrocities that came to punctuate the daily lives of the central characters. With the Three Sisters, Morris has selected a storyline that focuses more on the fortitude of the sisters and the bond between them. The tale spans out many years beyond the end of the war, to encompass the psychological journey of adapting to life in a changed world that remains deeply troubled.

As well as being a portrait of resilience and kinship, this novel provides a very interesting human context to world events as they unfolded post-1945. For the many readers who were deeply moved by the earlier stories in the series, Three Sisters will bring a sense of completion and a renewed sense of hope.

WHITE CHRISTMAS:

Ingredients:

- 250gm copha
- 1 cup desiccated coconut
- 2 cups rice bubbles
- 1 cup full cream powdered milk
- 1 cup icing sugar • ginger.

Method:

- 1. Melt copha in a pan over low heat. Place rice bubbles, coconut powdered milk, icing sugar and mixed fruit into a bowl. Add vanilla essence to melted copha and stir into dry ingredients. Press mixture into a greased 18cm x 28cm tray.
- 2. Refrigerate until firm, approx. 2 hrs. Cut into pieces and serve.

Cooking with Peter Russell-Clarke



Apple Sauce.

Ingredients

- 250 g tart cooking apples 2 tablespoons water
- 1/2 small brown onion, thinly sliced
- a thin strip of lemon rind
- juice of 1 clove of garlic
- Method

- 1 tablespoon butter 1 tablespoon Calvados
- 1 1/2 tablespoons caster sugar

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- 1. Peel the apples, cut them into quarters and remove the core. Cut into thin slices then put the slices into a pan with the onion, lemon rind, garlic juice and water and cook, uncovered, over a low heat until they're very soft. Stir them occasionally whilst they're cooking.
- 2. Take out and discard the lemon rind then beat the apples to a pulp with a fork or wooden spoon, or press them through a sieve. Stir in the butter and Calvados and add sugar to taste.
- 3. If you want a creamy savoury apple sauce stir in, at the end, 2 tablespoons of sour cream - and who says Apple Sauce doesn't enhance a Christmas fish dish? (Christ was a fisherman as well as a carpenter.)

Have a good-oh Christmas.

Long before God and Man made the mighty Snowy Hydro Scheme, great trees were felled for logs to make bridges and other public structures which civilised the region of the Snowy Mountains. Tough men and even tougher bullocks were responsible for bringing jinkers carrying these logs down the precipitous tracks to the disposal camps at the base of these fearsome mountain ranges.

The men were hard-bitten hard-living sons of these mountains, and were brothers to the bullocks who strove, with every sinew of their powerful bodies, to pull the log-laden jinkers over this dangerous terrain.

I have been asked (a couple of times) what these bullock drivers ate to keep so fit. So I did a little research. They had the mailman leave a pig under certain bridges. Not a four-legged pig that goes "honk-honk". A 'pig' in their vocabulary was a flagon of a sherry-like liquid which was kept cold in the flowing mountain stream over which the said bridge spanned. That looked after their sugar from which they derived their energy.

In the same stream they caught trout which gathered around the hairy bullocks' legs to eat the grass seeds which the legs attracted. They cooked the trout (or rabbit) on a green stick held over the fire which boiled their billy and cooked their damper, which they flavoured with various grass seeds. In their packs they carried salt and onions to 'appetise' the food. They also planted apple seeds to augment their diet once the seeds became a fruit-bearing tree.

They certainly did make the following Apple Sauce. Theirs was much cruder fare - but they did make Damper, which served as a plate for their chosen tucker.

PS. The reason for the above is that a Tumut jinker rests in all its glory in the house yard, at Romsey, of Jodie. Jodie's a fanatical fly fisherman who depletes the Tumut River of rainbow and brown trout several times a year.

- 4. Admittedly Christ didn't fish for fresh-water trout, and He didn't frequent the mountain streams of Talbingo or Argalong, but He would have known of them. So, too, would Santa have flown over them with Rudolf. Therefore I'm suggesting we serve a whole smoked trout with a sour-creamed Apple Sauce to our loved ones.
- 5. Arrange the flesh attractively on a large white plate, scatter a few washed baby spinach leaves over the pink flesh, then pour some (not too much) sour-creamed Apple Sauce over it and serve it with a wedge of buttered ciabatta toast.

This dish will need a glass of bubbly to wash it down.

PS. Time flies like an arrow - fruit flies like apples.

Recycle soft plastics at your local transfer station

Macedon Ranges Shire Council is conducting a six month soft plastics recycling trial with local recycling company, Victorian Regional Recyclers.

To recycle your soft plastics simply drop them off at Council's transfer stations in Kyneton, Woodend or Romsey. This service will be free for all Macedon Ranges Shire residents and businesses.

Soft plastics are plastics that can be scrunched in your hand and bounce back to their original shape, or flexible films such as bubble wrap or cling wrap.

These plastics cannot be recycled through the co-mingled kerbside recycling bin as they get stuck in the trucks and sorting machinery, and can cause costly damage. Up to 70 per cent of the contents in household general waste bins is made up of soft plastics and the more resources we can keep out of landfill, the better for our environment.

What can be recycled as part of the soft plastics recycling trial:

- **Plastic bags** including reusable shopping bags (polypropylene), bulk bags, for example rice bags, dry pet food and stock feed bags and bulka bags.
- **Plastic films** including bubble wrap, cling wrap and plastic film from grocery items, pallet wrap and shrink wrap.
- Other plastic items including bread bag tags (collected separately in a clear plastic bag) and plastic bottle caps (collected separately in a clear plastic bag).

Plastics must be completely dry and free of food and other products.

There are some common household items, such as silver lined snack wrappers and bread bags, which are not yet able to be accepted in the soft plastic trial. Council is committed to finding solutions for these items and hopes to add to the list of accepted items as the trial progresses.

Items that cannot be recycled through this service may be recycled through the RedCycle supermarket drop-off program or placed in the general waste bin.

'Lancefield Dreaming'

The making of a modern songline

Documentary - 28 minutes

Produced by: Paul Carter 2021

Concept: How the populace of a modern small rural town can learn from the first peoples about nurturing and preserving community values.

Watch it on Sunday 12th December 5pm on the main SBS channel

Lancefield is a small rural town about an hour North of Melbourne, where I was privileged to be the GP for over thirty years. This film, which I made together with Harry Nanos, Jon Nanos and Mike Jones, is about the inspiring community that the people of Lancefield have created.

From the moment people arrive in Lancefield they feel a special quality about the place. There is a friendliness and an immediate welcoming. An invitation into the community and, for many, even a sense of having come home. There is no drawing of any lines between long term residents and newer arrivals. Established families embrace newcomers as an opportunity to enhance the community rather than resent them. Lancefield is not an especially wealthy place, in a monetary sense, but it is rich beyond measure in its populace. It is a place where people measure their value by what they can give rather than by what they can take away.

Through interviews with local people including schoolchildren, this documentary explores what had led to Lancefield's 'specialness'. It also explores how best to nurture and preserve those attributes in a world that seems ever more rushing and less caring. It is suggested in the film that the present population of Lancefield has much to learn from the first peoples who inhabited this area, for, despite all the abuses and devastating cruelty, their culture has survived. And this survival, at least in part, has been due to the creation of songlines down which knowledge is passed from generation to generation.

The film concludes that the creation of modern songlines is central to safeguarding the specialness of small communities such as Lancefield.



Two years of COVID - Deep Creek Landcare, undiminished, is still doing our bit for the local environment. Thank you to our loyal members - willing workers. In November we met back in Lancefield Mechanics Hall - everyone fully vaccinated or an excepted person – and we stream meetings on Skype. (For Skype, members/guests inform our President by Sunday 10:00 pm prior to the 7.30 meeting - second Monday).

Gallagher's Ford - where Joyce's Rd crosses Deep Creek - is ongoing. Willows and exotics were removed and the site cleaned up in 2 working bees. October working bees planted 500 indigenous grasses, shrubs and trees, one with Lancefield Girl Guides, and then with members and industrious locals. We planted a few yellow box, although not local. Member Robin Ford, Natural Resource Manager, believes that with local climate change, we will succeed with redgums as well as red, white, grey and yellow box. We will water if necessary. In autumn, we will replant if needed and work with MRSC, to improve roadside amenity and biodiversity. We monitor all projects -Linehan's Bridge, Doggetts Bridge, Forbes Crossing and Sheehan's Crossing, and Lancefield Park garden.

- Lancefield and Romsey Mens' Sheds make nesting boxes for birds and small mammals including micro-bats. Nesting boxes sell for \$25 (members) or \$35 (non-members).
- Early 2022: Landcare and Gardens for Wildlife hold a joint Expo at the Lancefield Farmer's Market. Gardens for Wildlife is a valuable local addition. Also, Landcare Facilitator Clare Watson, free of charge, can visit/advise rural properties eg. brief property plans of natural assets and land management, improvement to productivity, sustainability and biodiversity.
- Dec 11: A Landcare seed identification, collection and storage workshop.
- Rural Aid has advised that services to farmers now extend to financial assistance, mental wellbeing and counseling. Further info - www.ruralaid.org.au

Can you pour from an empty glass?

Self-care is often the first thing that gets sacrificed when life is busy and stressful, and people often think that taking time for themselves seems indulgent, even more so for those in caring roles.





What is self-care?

Self-care refers to the activities and practices that we deliberately choose to engage in on a regular basis to maintain and enhance our health and wellbeing.

FACT: Good self-care practices can make you more effective.

Bringing more balance to your daily routine will help you be more productive and more resilient to stressors.

When you take time for yourself and give your body the food, rest, and the activity it needs, you will actually have more energy to meet the demands of daily life - however unusual they might be.

Looking at your own habits can be useful to see where you can support your individual self-care. Can you identify when you need to take a break?

When faced with challenges, we can use either positive coping strategies or negative coping strategies, and in the lead up to Christmas we can often feel more stressed to meet the demands of others.



Positive strategies include: deep breathing, exercising, listening to music, meditation, connecting with others and engaging in an activity you enjoy.

Negative coping strategies may be: yelling, smoking, pacing, skipping meals, reading, drinking alcohol to excess, withdrawal from friends and family, biting fingernails.

Just observe your responses to stressful situations. With awareness pivot towards a healthier option if you can. In time, this process will become more familiar.

Seeing a psychologist to assist with strategies to support you manage your stress triggers can be useful and a conversation with your GP to obtain a Mental Health Care Plan may support subsidised sessions with a psychologist.


That to a world that preaches selfindulgence you came to show concern for the needs of others; that in a world torn by hatred and strife a message of peace and goodwill proclaimed your birth.



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
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Romsey Primary School News

Bushfires and your

mains water supply

As we approach fire season, Greater Western Water is reminding customers in the Macedon Ranges that they should not rely on their mains water supply if there is a bushfire in the region.

During or after a bushfire, customers may experience issues with their water pressure or water quality. In extreme circumstances, the water supply may be cut.

In the lead up to the bushfire season, Greater Western Water prepares the network and water storages in high-risk areas. They also have emergency plans ready to support the CFA.

Despite these preparations, water supply issues can still be caused by power outages, damaged equipment, or extreme demand for water during firefighting.

It's important to remember this summer that bushfires can impact the mains water supply. The CFA advises the safest option is to leave early.
