





Our focus during November has been on **Technology.**

In the Prep/1/2 class the children have been bringing the world to Bolinda! We are pen-pals with children in a Brooklyn, New York City school. Letters have been swapped with our pen-pals and we have been very fortunate enough to receive

gifts from the class teacher. All children in my class have a pen-pal to write to and learn more about. We are writing back detailing how our school is vastly different to theirs. Have a great season by keeping burglars at bay

Christmas and the holiday season is meant to be a time of fun and enjoyment, but opportunistic criminals can put a real dampener on the joy. The violation of a home burglary can knock the stuffing out of you, and that's why I thoroughly endorse the role of our local police and the Crime Stoppers program in putting the finger on crime.

Crime Stoppers engages the community in working together on home security, and we all need to be the community's collective eyes and ears. Information usefully shared with Crime Stoppers could include details of time and place of someone offering to sell household goods cheaply, at places which might include pubs. Information lodged with Crime Stoppers might well lead to arrests and charges. 1800 333 000 is the number to call without needing to give your name.



There are plenty of easy tips which might prevent home burglary while you're away.

- Check that all house locks and windows are activated and lock the garden shed.
- Cancel mail and newspaper deliveries.
- Ask a neighbour to clear your letterbox of junk mail.
- Place rubbish bins out of sight.
- A trusted neighbour, given a key, may alter curtain and blind positions daily.
- Invite the neighbour to park in your driveway.
- Ask the neighbour to water pot plants. Dying plants are a sign of absence.
- NEVER hide a key on a verandah or porch.

Crime Stoppers in Victoria takes almost 30,000 calls annually, passing information about many crime themes ranging from theft from country properties to production of illegal drugs. Over 720 arrests have followed calls to Crime Stoppers in Victoria so far in 2006. Well over 3000 charges have been laid, and millions of dollars worth of stolen property has been recovered.

We can all work together by following the Crime Stoppers method of putting the finger on crime, and ring 1800 333 000.

Transfer station opens

The long-awaited Romsey Transfer Station's official opening is 2pm on Monday, December 4. The Lancefield tip closes its gates for the last time on the same day. The opening of the new transfer station and materials recycling facility in Portingales Lane will in no way impact on the regular weekly rubbish collections. Residents should take their hard rubbish and tree clippings, etc to the new station.

And have a happy Christmas!

Christmas and the New Year are fast looming, and this is my last opportunity before the holiday break to get a message out to the residents of Romsey and the region.

The Romsey Rag must be thanked for providing me with the space for a regular message to the community.

With the current drought, water conservation and the environment are key issues. And whether you stay at home or go away, remember that the weather conditions have made for a potentially severe bushfire season. The bush and the countryside are tinder-dry, and water shortages won't help. Think about a fire plan now.

Have a happy and prosperous Christmas and New Year, come back safe and refreshed, and we can look to addressing the issues that matter to the residents of Romsey and surrounding areas.

Ralph is the 1st Lieutenant in the Romsey Brigade and a Deputy Group Officer with the Romsey Group.

"I joined because having moved into the area I thought I had a responsibility to be part of the town and one of the best ways to achieve that was to join the brigade."

"Not all firefighting is done from the back of a truck. I've had the opportunity to be involved in Incident Management Teams working on Logistics, basically ensuring firefighters are fed, have a place to sleep and transport home after their shift. This is almost as physically exhausting as actual firefighting, but just a satisfying".


