
Ripper Reads for November On, off - Colleen McCullough

What's new on the "Wildlife Front".

First a very big 'Thankyou' to all you people who visited us and our new rescue trailer at the various markets throughout the Shire during the Wildlife Awareness Month of October. A lot of people asked us how they could help if they encounter an injured native animal. Your team from the Macedon Ranges Wildlife Network has prepared a brief "Emergency Checklist", in case you encounter an injured animal.

What can be done? There are some simple measures that can be taken to help minimise the risk to both motorist and animals. They also can reduce costly repairs to your motor vehicle - not to mention the devastating effect on our native wildlife.

- Identify Roadkill Hotspots

- Take note of wildlife warning signs. They are provided to advise us of known "black spots".

- Slow down when driving in these areas.

- Drive slower at night!

- Reduce your speed by at least 10km, and scan both sides of the road for wildlife. Animals such as wombats are very hard to see against a black bitumen road, particularly when it is wet.

- Each year all sorts of wildlife species, from kangaroos, wallabies and wombats, parrots and birds of prey are orphaned on our roads.

- Marsupials may be carrying young in their pouch - which can survive the collision only to die a lingering death.

- When it is absolutely safe to do so, move dead animals off the road and check pouches for young. This removes the hazard to other vehicles and reduces the risk to animals or birds that may scavenge.

- Do not under any circumstances approach an adult injured marsupial, as they can be extremely dangerous when in pain and cannot escape!!!

- If safe to do so, place injured animal in a box with sufficient air in a quiet dark warm place. Turn off car radio and keep noise down to a minimum (most injured native animals find it difficult to deal with stress).

- Do not give food or water.

- As soon as you have secured the animal, call your local wildlife rescue and care organisation for advice.

- Kangaroos, wombats etc – Again, do not attempt to approach a large live animal!!!! Contact your local wildlife rescue and care organisation for advise. If however the animal is dead, check the pouch and carefully remove any baby (joey) and place in a cotton bag or similar. Keep animal warm and quiet. Contact your local wildlife rescue and care organisation or your local vet. - Birds – Place towel over the bird to stop it thrashing

around. Pick up with a slow steady movement. A baby

bird dislodged from a nest can be placed in an ice cream type container with small holes in the bottom for drainage, and lined with leaves and may be tied to a tree branch close to the nest. Watch to see whether parent birds feed the chick, otherwise call your local wildlife rescue and care organisation.

- Possums and Bandicoots – Use gardening gloves and a thick towel when picking up injured adult possums, cover and place in a secure box. If the possum is dead, check the pouch for any live joeys. If possum has pouch joey attached to teat, do not remove, but keep warm and contact your local wildlife rescue and care organisation or your local vet.

- Lizards: Make sure when holding in a towel that the entire body is supported.



Walking School Bus News



DON'T WASTE YOUR VOTE ON NOVEMBER 24TH!

A NON-PARTY GUIDE TO A BETTER AUSTRALIA.

November 24th will be a very important date when many Macedon people will go to vote for the very first time. Over lunch today with three friends, two year12 high school boys and a female university student, we discussed the issues - and two issues became important.

- 1. That like most people, they did NOT understand what we were voting for; they are being blinded by the political SPIN from the political parties – and media.
- 2. The election is all about the three L's - Labor. Liberals and Liars.

You might well ask who I am to discuss these issues. Well, I'm a very active octogenarian who has voted for more than 60 years in three states and lived for 20 years in the United States where I've made an intensive study of their system and politicians. (I had to vote in the Australian elections while there).

In California for example, they elect the Governor, judges, politicians, school boards, district attorney et al, then a referendum is conducted on how specific laws should be treated. It seems to me that every part of the US system is corrupt. Unfortunately almost everything that happens in the USA is soon reflected in Australia.

My definition of **COURAGE is the power to release the** familiar. Australia has political parties for almost every taste but about 90% of the unthinking electors chose one of the two major parties – WITHOUT THOUGHT –we are creatures if habit. There is also the Greens and Family First, two parties which should be of vital interest to voters living in the McEwen electorate.

Who am I going to vote for? I have never had a political party affiliation and have always voted for the best qualified candidate – a bad choice - because as soon as that person gets to Canberra all their good intentions for their

electorate are swamped by party loyalty - and to hell with those who elected them; there are very rare exception and I can only think of one. Why do we NOT have a performance contract with those we voted for?

Let's take a look at the person we elected as the member for McEwen, now a Minister of two Federal Departments which come first and second in her priorities. This gives her a much healthier pay packet plus interstate and overseas travel demands while leaving our representation absolutely naked by the person we elected to do our job. She has failed me on many occasions with most times NOT even an acknowledgement of my correspondence.

In the USA those jobs are awarded to non-politician outsiders who are specialists in those fields - leaving the elected people to do what they were elected to do. Any private MHR will tell you that they are overworked just looking after an electorate without two ministerial portfolios to look after.


If you are like most other Australians, you do NOT want our troops in IRAQ but our MHR doesn't vote that way because of the adopted Presidential rather than parliamentary style of government the PM prefers. Is this the type of democracy we voted for; one man alone selected the date of the election because he didn't trust the others? Incidentally, we have troops and federal police in nine other countries.

Again, who am I going to vote for? Unless the two major parties sign a contract to do as they say, for me #1 vote will go to the Greens or Family First - #2 to the other - #3 will probably go to another minor party of choice and the remainder to probably, Labor. I prefer the Greens because of their power in the Senate so that it can be the House of Review it is supposed to be rather than the rubber it has become.

Lancefield & Romsey Community Banks OUR BANKS SHOW THEIR FINANCIAL STRENGTH



1. The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. 2. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters:

3. he restores my soul.

He leads me in right paths for his name's sake. 4. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, Rough rippled by the first breath of wind over the water. I fear no evil: for you are with me: your rod and your staff – they comfort me.

5. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

6. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord my whole life long.

Holy Bible : New Revised Standard Version.

Psalm 23 is reassuring.

The image of the shepherd guiding, guarding and feeding his flock is comforting. Reading it for the umpteenth time the other day, though, something struck me that I'd never noticed before.

The psalmist writes confidently that God guides him in the paths of righteousness, but follows this immediately with "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death ... "

Leading me in paths of righteousness sounds great, particularly after the green pastures and still waters bit. But then comes the valley of the shadow....

The writer. I assume, saw no contradiction between the two. He's saying that paths of righteousness don't always lead to still waters, and having the right religious passport doesn't guarantee trouble-free travel.

It's echoed in verse five. "You prepare a table for me..." but I'm warned that it may be in the presence of my enemies. That "table" isn't a quiet picnic by the lake, when the only discordant note is the ants on the cake. God provides my needs, but it may well be in preparation for the next part of the struggle. My enemies, says the psalmist, are nearby.

But so is the shepherd; not to make life easy, but to surround me with love, and to give me the strength for the next step forward.

Lord, there's always a catch. I'd open my eyes and watch the clouds sail by, safely far overhead. That's where clouds should be. But when those clouds draw thick chill curtains over the sun, their shadow racing over the ground,

I shiver. And when they come down to ground level, my level, shrouding me in mist, I walk a panic path of fear. The still surface of my peace shattered.

Are these the paths of righteousness?

I pick my way through, hesitating at every step. Worried that when I move my foot may slip, my ankle twist. And, sometimes, putting out my hand, there's nothing there. Or so it seems.

And yet, somehow a strength is there. Supporting me.

The shepherd takes me high to pasture, over rocky paths. Calling me to effort. I climb, struggling through thorn thickets, the way marked by scraps of wool torn from the fleece of my self-satisfaction. It makes me breathless.

But you are there. Counting the sheep. Knowing when I stray. Giving your life to rescue me. Taking me, each day, nearer the fold.






Ask The Right Questions



HOUSE NEWS

What's happening at the Hub?

Building works remain well on target for completion in early 2008. A lot of "behind the scenes" activity is going on with several committees meeting regularly to monitor building progress, and to develop a management model for the facility once it is up and running. All the proposed user groups, including the community House, have representation on this committee.

The Romsey Community House committee recently put in two submissions to the state government for funding for co-ordinator hours, and for a grant for training volunteers to help with the operation of the House. We had mixed success with these submissions. We did receive a grant of over \$3000 for volunteer training, and plans will be developed for a volunteer training program after our Annual general Meeting in late October. We were not successful in obtaining on-going funding for paid co-ordinator hours. We are in dialogue at the moment with the local MP Joanne Duncan and the Department of Victorian Communities to find out why we were unsuccessful, and to explore whether there will be future opportunities to apply for funding for this purpose. We note that Riddells Creek Neighbourhood House were successful in their application for paid co-ordinator hours, so this offers us some hope that we may also be in the future.

Our Annual General Meeting will be held on October 30th at Romsey Primary School. We are looking forward to welcoming new members on our committee, with many of our existing members indicating that they are willing to continue as committee members. This is a great opportunity to expand the membership of the committee, to make it more representative of the community we seek to serve. At our most recent committee meeting we discussed the specific tasks that now need to be undertaken

to ensure the future growth and usefulness of the community house, and to this end we encourage people to attend our AGM and offer their talents, services and ideas.
