A Winter Energy Concession is available to eligible cardholders. Present your card when paying your energy bills at Australia Post, or notify your energy company when paying over the telephone or the internet.

The Non-Mains Winter Energy Concession is an annual rebate that is also available to eligible cardholders if you use LPG or an alternate fuel such as diesel, petrol or heating oil for domestic heating or cooking.

To find out if you are eligible for concessions or for more information, telephone the Concessions Information Line on 1800 658 521.

There is also a Solar Hot Water Rebate between \$800 and \$2350 available to help cover the costs of changing from gas or electric hot water systems, to a highly efficient solar hot water system.

Also as part of the Victorian Government's *Energy Saver Incentive* program, accredited businesses are offering discounts when you purchase energy saving products or services. Romsev Secondary College?

Your local councillors agree one of the top priorities for the Romsey community is a secondary college.

On Wednesday 18th March a meeting was held in Kyneton with members of the Education Department to discuss the prospects of a future secondary college in Romsey. The outcome of this meeting was that a Romsey Secondary College was not planned.

On Thursday 11th June Cr Joan Donovan and I attended a meeting with Joanne Duncan MP, State Member for Macedon, and Steve Herbert MP, Parliamentary Secretary for Education, at Parliament House to further discuss the topic. (*Mr* Herbert has fond memories of our area as he grew up in Glenroy and would often cycle to Clarkefield in his youth).

At this meeting we had two main questions for Mr Herbert:

- 1. Would the current investments into the surrounding secondary schools in Gisborne and Kyneton reduce the feasibility of a future Romsey Secondary College?
- 2. Why does Romsey not have a secondary college and what is required to get one?

The response was simply that the current population is too low to sustain a local secondary college. The trigger point is approximately 1,100 students. When the local student numbers approached this level the education department would act accordingly.

Mr Herbert discussed the evolution and advances in education where a broad range of subjects are now expected

the giant in the forehead with a stone. Exit giant, minus head.

I used to find that story a bit hard to believe. Killing a strong man with a small stone seemed unlikely. Then I visited the British Museum in London.

They've got sling stones there that were dug up in Israel by archaeologists. The stones are as big as cricket balls - and thrown expertly by a sling can travel at a hundred miles an hour.

That could change the face of cricket. It certainly changed the face of Goliath.

The Bible tells us that when David first saw Goliath David was up on a hillside, Goliath in the valley below. My guess is that from up there the giant didn't look so big. But as David moved down and nearer, the giant seemed to get bigger and bigger, more threatening.

That's how our problems sometimes appear. The nearer they get the bigger and heavier we feel they are, but they're the same size really.

Someone imagined David's reaction as he saw the giant close up. His first though was, "He's big!" but his next thought was, "I can't miss!"

Some of our problems are only as big as we make them and can be cut down to size with a bit of courage and the sort of trust in God that David had.

dure a mix of being educated at their local secondary college, neighbouring secondary colleges and possibly some correspondence education to experience the same range of subject opportunities modern schools provide.

The two main towns that would feed into a future Romsey Secondary College are Romsey and Lancefield. Although Riddells Creek is in our East Ward it is closer to Gisborne and accordingly the Riddells Creek Primary School students numbers (320) are not counted.

The current student numbers are approximately: Romsey Primary School 410 students Lancefield Primary School 140 students Darraweit Guim, Bolinda, Hesket, Clarkefield 150 students Total 700 students

RPS will be investing \$200,000 into maintenance and refurbishment as part of the Federal Government boost to the economy. This expenditure will be made up of a number of outdoor projects needed to improve the school. All the outdoor pergolas will be replaced with steel structures and laserlight. The original structures were made of oregon and were not sealed correctly consequently they are beginning to rot. Another project which the school started last year and only a small area was completed is covering all the fascias with a colorbond material, as similarly there is a problem



A lasting memory will be our students and the students from Middle Kinglake Primary playing together on the football oval with the backdrop of the burnt and blackened forest. This was a very proud and rewarding day for all involved. The sense of community spirit was strong and I hope the values instilled from this project will stay with the students throughout life.

On for June 9th Casey was selected for the state team and will represent Victoria in the Nationals in August. Congratulations, Casey!!





Vale Jan (John) Van Arkel

On June 13th 2009 our community lost a quiet achiever, Jan Van Arkel. John, as he was known many, led a remarkable life and made a remarkable contribution to his adopted country. John was born in Indonesia to a Dutch family, and as a young child went to boarding school in Holland. With the German invasion and occupation of Holland in World War II, John was forced into hiding with relatives for several years. In 1950 he migrated to Australia with little money and little English, determined to make a new life. His wife Lyn followed a short time later.

John had many jobs in his early years, some of which are chronicled in his memoirs that we have been publishing in the Rag recently. Without any qualifications, and too old for an apprenticeship at 26, John put himself through college to qualify as an accountant. He held various clerical and accounting positions over several years in the shipping industry. When John was 45, his job was relocated to Sydney, but he opted to remain in Victoria. He retrained as a teacher and worked at Glenroy Tech. He was instrumental in setting up youth groups, and a St John's Ambulance First Aid Training facility in Glenroy. He worked tirelessly for his students and the youth of the area generally. Where many of his peers and colleagues had negative views of the young people they encountered on a daily basis, John was optimistic and positive and strove to assist them to be the best they could.

John's active involvement in and promotion of the Romsey & Lancefield Probus Club and the Romsey branch of the Red Cross are typical of his commitment to his community. As a founding member of the Romsey Community House John's contribution was immense. He was often the voice of reason and considered opinion at committee meetings, and kept the committee on track. He believed passionately and positively in youth and their place in society, and advocated strongly for youth to be consulted about what they wanted out of their community. He also championed the needs of older people.

John was a man of many talents, among them writing, building and woodwork. He also embraced change, and became a very competent computer user. Up until his last days, at the age of 83, he was still writing, getting his thoughts down and trying to make a difference.

We don't know how well the people of Romsey knew John—certainly those who were involved in his various groups would have, but we suspect that to many people he may have gone unnoticed. We know that the Red Cross, Probus and the Community House will miss him immensely, as will his family and wide circle of friends. He was well-liked and much respected. The members of the Community House team feel privileged to have known and worked with John. John was farewelled on Thursday June 18th at a funeral service in Kyneton, attended by many. John is survived by his wife Lyn, their two daughters, and their respective families, to whom we offer our most sincere sympathy.

RRBATA Guests at Tourism Macedon Ranges Inc. Meeting

On Tuesday 16th June, Jenny Stillman represented RRBATA as an invited guest at the Tourism Macedon Ranges (TMR) Inc.'s Committee Meeting held at the Macedon Spa Motel. The key purpose of this meeting was to introduce Mr. Graham Middleton who has been recently appointed as Executive Officer of Daylesford Macedon Ranges. (DMR). Graham will be involved in a Tourism Victoria campaign over the next 3 years which will focus on the Daylesford Macedon Ranges region as THE place to visit in Victoria. The Yarra Valley has been a similar focus recently. This \$7.3 million dollar campaign will be focused primarily interstate to target the 50+ age group with a "Health and Wellbeing" theme in the context of the "Villages" of the region. Whilst Daylesford will be the "jewel" in the advertising campaign, the Macedon Ranges will certainly be a part of the campaign. This will be an opportunity for RRBATA to stamp Romsey's place to be a part of this campaign in the context of its village identity in the Macedon Ranges. This emphasises the need for RRBATA to continue building relationships with groups such as Tourism Macedon Ranges and the Macedon Ranges Shire Council.

The Benefits of Networking Out of Town – MRSC Wants To Help

Subsequent to our representation at the TMR meeting, RRBATA was contacted by the Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Economic Development and Tourism Unit who had "heard" about some of the RRBATA initiatives. We have subsequently organised a meeting with Leanne Davey and Kylie Lethbridge for early July to discuss how they can assist RRBATA in the future.

June Meeting Report - A Taste of Community Planning

The RRBATA meeting held on Monday 15tJune at the Romsey Community Hub featured Kirsten Larwill form the MRSC Community Planning Unit who spoke about the concept of Community Planning and the MRSC's experience with this process so far. Various community groups (including the Lions Club, Rotary, CWA, Community House, Romsey Rag, and Bowls Club) and the Bendigo Bank had accepted RRBATA's invitation to attend this meeting to get a taste of what "community planning" is all about. 2009 Romsey Fire Brigade Appeal Under Way

By now residents of Romsey will have found a brochure from the Romsey Fire Brigade in their letterbox. Last year the Brigade conducted an appeal to help fund the purchase a four wheel drive utility. The brigade is pleased to announce that the vehicle has indeed been purchased, but they are again appealing for public help in purchasing some specialised radios and other equipment that needs to be installed in it before it can become operational.

"Although we have bought the car we still need to spend a considerable amount of money on it before we can use it in an operational role", said Third Lieutenant and appeal organiser, Nicholas Needham. "Radios are critical to us, but unfortunately they are a major expense item. We are hopeful that our local residents can see their way clear to help us again, by making a donation this year."

Whilst the Romsey township was not directly threatened during this recent fire season, Romsey Brigade was extensively committed at all of the major fires. Crews were deployed to the large fire at Woodend; Mirboo North and Churchill; at Wandong, Broadford and Mt Disappointment areas, during the Black Saturday fires; to Redesdale and to the Musk, Dalesford areas. "It is a pity we didn't have the new car ready for this past fire season, we really could have done with it, said Nic, this seasons deployments have just reinforced our need for a brigade vehicle, so we are relieved to finally have it."

Romsey Brigade has previously shared access to a four wheel drive station wagon that is owned by the Romsey Fire Brigades Group. When the Group Car was deployed by the CFA to an intrastate or interstate incident, the brigade had no Command and Control vehicle. "We were forced to depend on one of our neighbouring brigades for support. Now we will be more self sufficient and not relying on others to help us out, " added Nic.

All premises within the Romsey area should have received a brochure that explains the details of the appeal and how householders may contribute. The brigade asks that everyone take the time to read the brochure and then consider making a donation, if they can possibly do so. If residents have not got a copy of the brochure and would like to donate, they can do so through the Romsey Post Office, or the Romsey branch of the National Australia Bank.

The Romsey Fire Brigade is also recruiting volunteer firefighters, with a recruit training course set to start soon. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer, don't wait until the fire season starts, come and see us now!
