Combine spring onions, cheese, soup & curry powder and season to taste. Pour over broccoli chicken mixture.


Top with extra cheese and paprika.

\$700 Warmer Winter Discount now available to low-income Victorians

Parliamentary Secretary for Environment and Climate Change, Donna Petrovich, is encouraging concession card holders to take advantage of the new government gas heater rebate scheme that started on the 1st July 2011.The Victorian Coalition Government Gas Heater Rebate is being managed by Sustainability Victoria and is part of the Victorian Government's 2011 budget announcement to assist low income households purchase energy efficient appliances.

"With winter now upon us and the cost of living rising, it's great to be able to give people a break by upgrading their old electric heaters to a more energy-efficient gas model," Ms Petrovich said. "Eligible Victorian householders can receive a 'warmer winter discount' when they replace their electric heater with a more costeffective gas heater. On top of the \$700 discount, switching to a gas heater can save householders up to \$280 per year on their energy bills."

To date, more than 50 retailers and suppliers have signed up across metropolitan and regional Victoria and more are expected to join the scheme in the coming days and weeks. CEO of Sustainability Victoria Anita Roper said heating accounted for around 50 percent of total energy used in most Victorian homes.

"By replacing an electric heater with a gas heater, householders could save up to two tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions per year," Ms Roper said. "The scheme is also available to renters. Those people who are eligible should first check with their landlord or their agent."

The gas heater rebate will be provided as a point-of-sale discount to eligible concession card holders at participating retailers and suppliers until 2013.



Essentially what you've got is two professional entertainment troupes working in tandem to create a cinematic gestault greater than the sum of the parts. 

More people will be able to enjoy the health benefits of getting more active, more often and clubs can cater for more members all year round."

Test & Measure – Learn from Experience

One thing that most people in business know is that often less than 50% of marketing and advertising expenditure is effective. The problem is that more often than not we don't know which 50% is effective and what is not. This is why Test & Measure activity can be one of the best investments in cost saving for a business that uses advertising, promotion and marketing as key strategies to gain and retain business.

A five step strategy to your marketing plan can ensure the return on investment is at its maximum.

Plan - plan once, plan properly. Be specific about your target market, what you want to achieve from your marketing activities and finally when & how you want to execute the activity.

Execute – execute the marketing activity. Deliver according to the plan.

Test & Measure – for every step of the marketing activity measure everything that can be measured. How many flyers were sent? How many phone calls were made? How many replies to the first email? How many replies to the second email? What was the postcode for each enquiry?

Review the activity – using the test & measure data review the campaign identifying what worked and what needs to be improved. Execute with enhancements – this is where the time and money is saved. Don't go back to planning (you've already done this). Simply use the information obtained from the test and measure and the interpretations from the review process to execute the activity with enhancements.

It sounds overly simple but think about it for a moment. Parents Learn Essential Mental Health First Aid Skills

Parents in the Macedon Ranges Shire are learning essential skills to help young people navigate their way through mental illness. Throughout September, Council is offering free Youth Mental Health First Aid training to parents, as part of the Live4Life initiative. Since March 2010, more than 150 people have received the training, with a view to increasing this to 200 by the end of this year. In 2010, the training focused on teachers from five secondary schools in the shire who participate in the Live4Life program. These schools now have a small team of Youth Mental Health First Aiders who can respond appropriately to the needs of the students in their school.

"This year, we've focused on making the course available to parents and the response has been overwhelming," Live4Life project coordinator, Sarah Hardy said. "Initially we thought we'd trial one course to see how many parents would be interested. That course was booked out in a matter of days, and now we are just about to schedule our fourth course for parents. There is clearly a desire among parents to know more about mental illness and to learn how to help their children."

Trevor Kinsey from Riddells Creek, who is a parent and also a Venturer Scout Leader at 1st Gisborne Scout Group, took part in the course in May.

"The course provided me with many insights into the issues facing young people of today, and gave me strategies to help them cope with the challenges they face. The knowledge I gained on the course will help me to be a better parent for my adolescent children and in my Scouting role," he said.

Live4Life is a unique mental health promotion concept which engages young people, teachers and families. The 'Live4Life' initiative was established in response to a reported increase in depression, anxiety, cyber bullying and non-suicidal self-injury by schools, police and community health services. This highlighted the need for a coordinated local response to address young people's mental health and wellbeing.

The next course will commence in September and parents can book or make an enquiry by contacting Charmaine Vanderbeek via email cvanderbeek@mrsc.vic.gov.au. Priority will be given to parents who have a child at one of the participating Live4Life schools – Gisborne Secondary College, Kyneton Secondary College, Braemar College, Macedon Grammar School and Sacred Heart College.

FREE zoo entry for kids initiative

Donna Petrovich, State Member of Parliament for Northern Victoria Region and Parliamentary Secretary for Sustainability and Environment, welcomes the Victorian Coalition Government's initiative to give kids free entry to three of Victoria's outstanding zoos, Healesville Sanctuary, Werribee Zoo and Melbourne Zoo, from 1 July as part of a \$10.7 million promise to subsidise zoo entry fees for an estimated 266,000 kids.

Mrs. Petrovich said the free entry for kids subsidy will make it even more affordable for Victorian families to visit Victoria's zoos and will be in place in time for the winter school holidays. The subsidy will reduce the cost of a full priced child's ticket from \$12.6 to \$0. A family ticket will be reduced from \$58 to \$50.80.

"As a parent I know how difficult it can be to find low-cost ways to entertain kids and provide them with a unique and fun holiday experience," Mrs. Petrovich said. "The Coalition Government is committed to easing cost-of-living pressures for Victorian families and is pleased to help out by making the zoo more accessible and affordable."

The initiative will grant children under 16 years of age free entry to three of Victoria's great zoos, Healesville Sanctuary, Werribee Zoo and Melbourne Zoo, on weekends, Victorian public holidays and Victorian school holidays from 1 July 2011. Children under 15 years of age must always be accompanied by an adult (over 17) for safety considerations.

"The zoo is a fantastic place to take kids, encouraging them to appreciate and better understand wildlife conservation and environmental protection," said Mrs. Petrovich. "Creating greater access for parents, carers, guardians and grand-parents to take children to zoos by reducing the costs, is an outstanding outcome from the Coalition Government."

Activities 4 Kids from the Toy Library How to make the Kite

Looking for a new and fun activity to do with your kids? This is a simple art and craft activity that you can enjoy with your little ones and their masterpiece will be ready to fly outside in minutes!!

What You Need:

- 1 sheet A4 paper
- String
- Stapler
- Hole punch
- Pencil
- - Ruler
 - Crayons or textas

Activity:

Step 1. Let your child draw and decorate the paper on both sides with textas or crayons, the brighter the better!

Step 2. Fold the sheet of paper in half so the shorter sides meet. Then set the paper on the work surface so the fold is at the bottom.

Step 3. Measure and mark with your pencil two points on the folded edge of the paper. Point "A" should be 6.35cm or 2 ½ inches from the end and point "B" another 6.35cm or 2 ½ inches from the first mark.

Step 4. Taking the top corner nearest the first mark, bend down one layer of the paper so it meets point "A". Be careful not to crease the paper, just bend it back.

Step 5. Then fold down the other top corner in the opposite direction so that it is even with the first corner.

Step 6. Staple the corners in place at point "A".

Step 7. Punch a hole at point "B" then loop one end of your string through the hole and knot it tightly.

Step 9. All you need is a good breeze and your kite is ready to fly!!



Seymour Cottage, Romsey—Built C 1855

A young man called Sidney Seymour and his wife Elizabeth settled in a place called Five Mile Creek around 1855. The name Five Mile Creek was later changed to Romsey.

Sidney had been a carter and had spent some time on the diggings before he settled near Five Mile Creek purchasing land and started farming. Eventually he was farming about 300 acres.

What makes Sidney Seymour so different from all the other people around the area that came, settled and built a house for his family you ask? Well it was the way he chose to build his house. Local timbers were cut and sawn for the frame and he chose shingles for the roof, built a very impressive Roman Oven and open fire in the kitchen for cooking. The thing that makes Seymour Cottage stand out from all other homes built by settlers was that he purchased a bulk lot of Meranti panels These are believed to have been left over doors from imported kit homes.

The cottage is not a kit home but the doors or panels were used for both the external and internal walls. In hindsight thinking about what Sidney Seymour did was a great idea because he would have been able to complete his home far faster than anyone who chose to build in the normal way.

Surprisingly, even though these panels are thinner than a normal wall, the cottage remains warmer than expected inside in the cold weather and is still standing 156 years after it was initially built.

In 1982 Seymour Cottage was gifted to the Romsey & Lancefield Historical Society to be preserved for the people of Romsey. Members of the society restored and have preserved the cottage and its garden since that date. This year 2011 the cottage was registered as a historic building and is now on the VICTORIAN HERITAGE REGISTER NUMBER: H2268.


