

Book Review – Macedon Ranges Book Club The Burial

Our annual Art Show was a huge success early in this term. We are fortunate to have Ms Annie Betts, a brilliant Visual Arts teacher who develops the creativity and expression of all students. The year 5/6 classes painted their interpretation of Edvard Munch's "Scream "and decorated the entry to the gym with ghostly scary images and showed a rotating Photostory to display students' work, with voice over to describe their scary experiences. Many classes based their work on other famous paintings including Jackson Pollock's "Blue Poles", Picasso's "Weeping Woman" and Van Gogh's sunflower series. Classroom Programs

This term the whole school approach to reading has all classes focusing on the same reading comprehension strategy, Think Aloud. The degree of difficulty is adjusted for the appropriate year level. Simply put, this is when readers recognise and talk out loud about the process that is occurring in their head (metacognition), as they read. It is important for students to acquire the ability to selfmonitor their reading comprehension, think about what they don't comprehend, learn a range of 'fix up' strategies and to be conscious of understanding what they are reading.

In writing students are enjoying using their personal writer's notebooks to continue to generate ideas/ brainstorm 'seeds' to develop in longer pieces of writing. A range of graphic organisers will be used to assist students in this process. The genre focus for the term is information reports.

This term the preps' Integrated Inquiry topic is 'Living and Non-Living things. Students will have the opportunity to investigate, classify and describe both living and non-living things and have a 'Creatures Incursion'. Year 1/2 students' inquiry is Build Me a House where they will be exploring questions such as, why do people live in houses? Are all houses the same? What materials are used to build houses and what purpose do they have? The year 3/4s have the Science inquiry based on energy and will explore electricity as a form of energy. A range of hands-on experiments will make this a fun learning experience. The year 5/6s' inquiry is based on environmental issues and is called 'Protecting our Planet'. The focus is on individuals and the community and how we can assist in protecting our environment. Year 6 students will also be participating in the specially designed program Preparation for Puberty which is led by qualified nurse.

Musical Soiree

At Romsey Primary School we are fortunate to be able to offer our students the opportunity to have private lessons in guitar, keyboard, flute, trumpet, clarinet and violin. Our Soiree, held in term 4 is an opportunity to celebrate the achievements of these students. This year the school choir trained by Mrs Ira Furfaro opened the evening with a selection of songs followed by individual performances. A large audience enjoyed the performance.

Transition at Romsey Primary School

Transition from one year level to the next, from kinder to school and from Year 6 to secondary school is a very important component of our school programs. Our whole school approach to learning. whole school events and regular buddy activities (such as the co-operative games in the photos above) assist our students in making a happy, positive and smooth transition to the next stage in their schooling.

CALL FOR IDEAS TO BOOST RECREATIONAL FISHING

Donna Petrovich encourages local organisations to apply for funding of up to \$100,000 under the Victorian Coalition Government's 2012-13 Recreational Fishing Grants Program. Mrs Petrovich said organisations such as angling clubs, boat hire businesses, local councils and schools are invited to submit grant applications and proposals under the program.

"The Recreational Fishing Grants Program uses revenue from the sale of recreational fishing licences to fund projects that enhance fishing opportunities for Victorian anglers," Mrs Petrovich said. "The submission period opened recently and the Victorian Government would like to hear from any organisation that has good ideas for projects that will improve recreational fishing opportunities.

"Victoria boasts some great freshwater and saltwater fishing and the Government is keen to invest fishers' licence fees to make things even better. We encourage fishing groups in Northern Victoria who have ideas for improving fishing in their local area to apply for funding. That could be fish cleaning tables next to boat ramps, stocking of trout or native fish, fishing platforms, access tracks alongside waterways or improvements to fish habitat."

Large grants are available for projects up to \$100,000 in one or more of four categories:

- Fisheries sustainability and habitat improvement;
- Fishing access and facilities;
- Fisheries related education, information and training; and
- Recreational fisheries research.

Large grant submissions must be received by 28 February 2013 and are open to fishing clubs, community groups, incorporated bodies, registered companies and government and statutory bodies. Small grants of up to \$5000 are available year round.



Open letter to Macedon Ranges Shire Council

On Friday 19th October an important ceremony was held at the Mt William Green-stone Axe Quarry near Lancefield, to mark the hand-over of title to the traditional custodians the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin Nation.

As local residents and Co-Convenors of the Macedon Ranges Reconciliation Group we are proud that this historical event has taken place in our community.

We would like to recognise the vital role of the Macedon Ranges Shire Council in bringing about this important act of reconciliation.

Our Council has demonstrated great leadership, working in partnership with the Wurundjeri people to protect the Mt William Green-stone Axe Quarry - a nationally significant Aboriginal heritage site. Since gifting the property to the Indigenous Land Corporation in 1997 the Macedon Ranges Shire Council has supported the Wurundjeri people to protect and manage the site, which was granted National Heritage Listing earlier this year.

We hope the new Council will continue this commitment and support Council staff to build on these relationships with Aboriginal people and recognition of their history and culture.







Psalm 139:1-10 Reflection.

P.D. JAMES writes the best detective stories I know. Actually, that comment is less than fair to her.

She writes fine novels, full of deep observation of people and their ways, and crime just happens to be the focus for her stories. In "The Black Tower", a ten-year-old boy is talking to an old priest.

The priest is sitting at his desk, his diary in front of him. "It's just an ordinary diary, then?" asks the boy. "It isn't about your spiritual life?"

"This is the spiritual life," the priest answers gently, "the ordinary things one does from hour to hour." Some of us spend so much time and energy trying to be "spiritual", Choosing our words, our attitudes, with care.

We see it in the pulpit at times. Preachers who adopt a tone of voice, even a body language, that's strained and artificial. The effect often colourless and bland and, dare I say it, plain boring.

It's as though we daren't be ourselves; as though the only way to please God was to lose identity, to become production line Christians, all in the same mould.

If we do this we're also in danger of trying to squeeze God out of "ordinary" life, as though there were bits of it he wasn't supposed to be in.

Pigeonholing doesn't work. God has to be in everything we do, or he'll end up being in nothing.

The "spiritual life" is our ordinary life, lived with Jesus. It's not a separate entity, a front parlour we keep for special occasions. It's our day to day attitudes and actions, lived out in love.

I heard a Christian say recently, "God's not just in prayer meetings and conventions, but in chips and peas." He connects with life as we know it.

The most "spiritual" people I've met, in the sense of being close to God, and living with him, show a worldly awareness that means they are in touch with life as it really is. And, because of that, are competent and

effective in the way they live it.

Lord, give me the courage to be myself today.

To live life as it comes, welcoming it, and saying yes to

You made me, Lord, and made me human,

so being human can't be bad. Nothing to be ashamed of. And if you made me different from everybody else, it has to be because you want me different, and there must be, in me, something you want the world to see. Something that only I can give, some colour to enrich life's palette.

But, sometimes, caution mixes all the colours into grey, mutes them to monochrome.

I narrow my mind, conform to some safe picture of respectability, endlessly repeated, leaving me faded, dull.

Lord, teach me to live today.

Help me to see that love and holiness have dirty feet through dancing joyfully about the earth, hands joined in

That life with you is whole, and holy. That everything I do con bear your imprint, con be coloured in love.

Teach me that fear is for the Pharisees, not for the free. And I am free in you to paint my picture as I will, Knowing that however individually my brush may paint, as long as it be true, you will be satisfied.







Lancefield / Macedon Ranges Relay for Life

Understanding the impact of cancer on our communities

Cancer is a leading cause of disease burden in Victoria with 78 new diagnoses and 29 deaths from cancer every day. A total of 28,363 Victorians were diagnosed and 10,673 died from cancer in 2010. An estimate of the effect of a disease on the community is the "years of potential life lost" (YPLL). This measures the loss of life due to a disease up to an arbitrary life expectancy of 75 years.

In 2010, persons dying of cancer in Victoria lost an estimated 62,000 years of potential life. This is more than four times the YPLL from other major causes of death, such as ischaemic heart disease, stroke and chronic respiratory disease.

Though cancer incidence rates continue to increase (annual % increases of 0.9% for men and 0.6% for women), death rates have declined steadily since 1982 with average falls of 1.4% per year for males and 1.1% for females. This reflects earlier detection through screening, falling tobacco-related cancer rates for males and improvements in treatment and outcome.

It is estimated that by 2013 the annual incidence of cancer will reach almost 32,000, an increase of 16% from 2010. During the same period, deaths from cancer will increase to around 11,000 per year. Though actual numbers of new cases and deaths are increasing rapidly, this is largely due to the growth and ageing of the Victorian population.

The latest report on cancer from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare shows the five-year survival rate from all cancers increased from 47 per cent to 66 per cent from 1987 to 2010. However the improvement was mixed for individual cancers. The cancers that had the largest survival gains over time were pros-

tate cancer, kidney cancer and non-Hodgkin lymphoma. Over this period there was no appreciable improvement in five-year survival rates for those with mesothelioma, pancreatic cancer and lung cancer.

Women recorded higher survival rates after a cancer diagnosis than men at 67 per cent, compared to 65 per cent.

The Cancer Council of Victoria has been leading the fight against cancer for over 70 years. It provides a range of support services for cancer sufferers and their families, funds and conducts research into cancer and has an active public advocacy program directed at reducing the risk and incidence of cancer. As an event the Relay acknowledges and celebrates the lives of those who are living with cancer, remembers those we have lost to cancer and commits to fighting back against cancer by raising funds to be used by the Cancer Council in combating cancer.



Mintaro for Sale

RRBATA notices with interest the upcoming sale of historically significant local property, Mintaro. The grazing licence for the original 12,800 acre run of Mintaro was apparently first held by John Pascoe Fawkner in 1844, before being taken over by Robert Gardiner in 1860, who later built Mintaro influenced by the design of Osborne House, Queen Victoria's summer residence on the Isle of Wight. This once grand Italianate mansion was built in 1882 as a "mini replica" of Victoria's Government House. Whatever lies ahead for Mintaro, its significance as an historical feature of our local area cannot be denied. One can only hope it can regain some of its former grandeur as a local jewel in the crown of Romsey region's rich historical tapestry.
