Winner: Pat Chisholm (17) 34 pts. NTPs; 15 - John Boyce.



Bridge & roundabout upgrades in progress

Several bridge upgrades are underway in the Macedon Ranges, with some due for completion in the next few weeks. "There have been some impacts on traffic conditions due to these works, with diversions on place in some instances. We thank motorists for their patience while these works are completed," said Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Director of Assets and Operations, Dale Thornton.

Three Chain Road, Carlsruhe (photos next page)

Three Chain Road is a significant and direct link between Lancefield and Kyneton. Construction works are progressing well, and the concrete deck has now been poured. The road approaches (asphalt surface) will be constructed shortly. Traffic diversions are currently in place while works are completed and it is expected that the road will be re-opened within the next fortnight.

Central Road, Tylden

The existing deck has been removed, the abutments have been repaired and the deck supports have been constructed. The concrete deck is expected to be installed this week and the road approaches constructed within the next fortnight. Traffic diversions are currently in place while works are completed.

Moffats Lane, Romsey

The existing deck has been removed and the abutments are to be repaired shortly. The concrete deck has been cast and will be installed when the repair work is complete. Traffic diversions are currently in place while works are completed.

Aitken Street/Willowbank Road Roundabout, Gisborne

Construction works started at the beginning of the school holidays and works are progressing well, with concrete kerbing currently underway. Pavement preparation will begin over the next week with asphalting planned in approximately three weeks. There are no traffic diversions and it is expected all works will be completed in 5-6 weeks.

Romsey bore to help boost drinking water supply

Water from Romsey's new bore will be used to supplement the Romsey drinking water supply, after a drop in water levels in Kerrie Reser-

Bore water will comprise up to 15 per cent of Romsey's drinking water over the next few months, to give the reservoir a chance to recov-

"Using local water from the Romsey bore will save us pumping water from Melbourne and help boost Kerrie Reservoir in time for summer." Western Water's Managing Director, Neil Brennan, says.

"The cost of water from Melbourne has increased, so using local water where possible is one way we are keeping price rises down for our customers," Mr Brennan says.

The \$1.9 million Romsey bore project was completed a year ago, including upgrades to the bore and water filtration plant, a new pipeline and expanded bore monitoring network.

"Residents shouldn't notice a change in their drinking water, as the concentration of bore water is quite low," Mr Brennan says.

"All drinking water for Romsey is treated at our filtration plant to meet the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines."

Western Water prices went up on July 1, with an average homeowner's annual bill going up by \$47 this year, and tenants' bills by \$15.





OLD DOG - RENEWED TRICKS!

When Amanda's old dog Muffin was not only struggling to get up and about in the mornings, but was struggling to move all the time, she wondered what she could do to help her best friend.





Meditation:

He went up into the mountain to pray. He was there alone. It is evening. The Sea of Galilee lies before your eyes. In the west the splendid scarlets and golds have faded. To your left, mountains run down steeply to the sea.

Jesus is climbing up a spur of one of these mountains, seeking quiet in the hills; seeking to push back the tumultuous demands of all there is to do, to pray. But in the east clouds have gathered that mean a storm. The water of the lake turns from amber to steel. The wind strikes chill and cold, then the swish of the rain. Jesus sees in front of Him a shepherd's hut on the hillside. He makes for it to avoid getting soaked, lights the simple lamp He finds within, and kneels to pray.

Now imagine that you are on the mountain, too.

The storm is on you, you see a light shining from the window of the hut and you rush up to it, seeking shelter.

Glancing through the window, you see who is there, and you turn away. Shelter or not you feel you cannot intrude on His seclusion. But He has heard you. He rises, flings open the door. For you there is his smile, His word of welcome. Then the door closes. Just you and Jesus. Jesus and you.

I will not try to imagine some of the things he would say to you. I know, I think, some of the things He would have to say to me. But if he said nothing, His presence would say everything. I think at first you would lift your eyes to His. Then somehow I think you would drop them. It is hard to look into eves that search the uttermost depths of the heart. Yet, if it be hard to look at Him, it is harder not to look at Him.

After a while you would look again into those dark, clear, steady eyes and find them not searching, but shining with compassion and you would see the answer to all your prayers. You would know that He believed in you.

A tremendous confidence would drive away all your fears. A sense of unbreakable security would possess you because you would know yourself forgiven, understood, accepted and loved. Now the storm has passed. It is long after midnight. He sees you a little way on your path homewards. Then He turns back to pray. The thought of parting seems for a moment more than you can bear. Then you feel that you never can really be parted from Him, though He goes His way and you yours.

Something marvellous has happened. He is still with you. He is dwelling within you. There has been a new birth. Something mystical has happened for which there are no words.

The wind is hushed now. A crescent moon sails quietly through the last racks of storm-cloud. You stride back to your home on

feet that scarcely touch the mountain turf; back to a life that can never be the same again.

For in your heart there is an inward strength, a sense of complete well-being, an outgoing love and an ineffable peace. They do not belong to this world, and nothing in this world can destroy

News from Deep Creek Landcare Group

Covering Lancefield and Romsey Districts

In the late May there was a working bee at Sheehan's Crossing.

100 plants were added to previous plantings in the area. The funding for this has been provided by Melbourne Water and Parks Victoria.

Message from the Mayor

I take this opportunity to highlight a few of the most recent happenings around the shire to keep our community informed.

Community Satisfaction Survey

The independent Community Satisfaction Survey results for 2013 were recently released. The results reflect higher levels of community satisfaction with Council's overall performance and direction than previous years.

While we will maintain a focus on continuous improvement and take on board the community's feedback, it is very pleasing that in all five core performance areas (and in comparison to similar councils) the community has noted good overall performance in our collective works and services, and in our partnership with the com-

2013/14 Budget

At the Council meeting on 12 June Council adopted its 2013/14 budget with amendment that will reduce the rate revenue by \$723,000 and lower the average rate increase from the proposed 6.9% to an actual 4.9%. This is the sixth year in a row that the average rate increase has remained below 5%.

The \$723,000 saving was achieved by removing the purchase of new land for a proposed early years hub in Gisborne from the budget. Council will instead explore the option of building the hub on a small portion (10%) of the Council owned original proposed site of Daly Reserve.

Council also upheld its proposal to sell four pieces of vacant land in Gisborne to fund the construction of a \$1.5 million netball complex, to which Council has allocated \$800,000. An adjustment to the draft budget was also made to provide \$90,000 for refurbishments to the Bluestone Theatre in Kyneton, which will require the support of a \$290,000 state government grant.

Council took on board community feedback and adjusted the budget to better meet community expectations. As these are economically challenging times, we have sought to keep rates as low as possible while maintaining all our services and allowing for some much needed capital works due to a growing popula-

Gisborne Early Years Hub

Together with considering the Gisborne Pine Plantation site for an Early Years Hub in Gisborne, Council has also recently added the Council owned UL Daly Reserve to the shortlist of preferred

Council's requirements for a hub location. Council will therefore continue to advocate for a portion of the state government owned pine plantation site (located between the cemetery and the secondary school), however this is dependent on securing an appropriate lease arrangement with the Victorian government.

At the Council Meeting on 12 June Council resolved to allocate \$25,000 from the Public Open Space—South Financial Reserve to complete a master plan for UL Daly Reserve in accordance with the reserve management planning process. This process will include a footprint for an Early Years Hub and recognition of the environmental significance of Daly Reserve. The footprint will equate to approximately 10% of the reserve.

Once planning for this master plan project starts (expected to be in August), Council will provide updates and regularly communicate with the community. Council looks forward to working with stakeholders and residents to achieve a good outcome for the

Walking and Cycling Strategy

Council is currently developing a comprehensive Walking and Cycling Strategy for the shire.

During the budget process, Council received some submissions in relation to cycle safety. Although some of these requests were well beyond the capacity of Council to provide an immediate solution, they will be considered as part of the development of the new Walking and Cycling Strategy. Many of the roads in recent requests/submissions are the responsibility of VicRoads.

Council is committed to walking and cycling safety in the shire and for the benefit and enjoyment of our community, and I look forward to the outcomes of the strategy.

Community Funding Scheme

Council's annual Community Funding Scheme has this year awarded \$164,000 to 52 local community groups for projects with a total combined value of \$375,000.

I praise the standard and range of applications we received. Of the 70 applications received this year, 74 per cent were recommended for funding. Many applicants are contributing to their projects in other ways such as fundraising, sponsorship and in kind support, bringing the total value of projects happening on the ground to over \$375,000.

A high percentage of applications were for community projects, followed by sporting activities, arts and tourism events, and initiatives relating to family and children's services in the shire.

Red Attraction, Plural, Zenith Skies, Einstein, Room 237, I'll be an Indian, Wonderbeast, Tim Allan, Flaxxon and Automatic, Everywhere will compete for a chance to go on and perform at the Regional Push Finals to be held later this year. Eater of the Sky, winners of the 2012 regional finals will be headlining the event, along with 2012 finalist's Modern Savage.

Battle of the Bands events provide bands with a platform to have their music heard by a large audience. Winners of the regional finals get the opportunity to perform at the annual Push Over Festival, along with recording time at one of Melbourne's top studios and the chance to create a video clip of one of their recorded songs. Many of Australia's great artists have had connections to the Push and FReeZA mentoring programs. In 2008 local band Stonefield won several Battle of the Bands competitions and went on to win the Triple J Unearthed competition in 2010.

Presale tickets to the heat on Saturday 3 August at the Town Hall can be purchased for \$7 from any of the bands, or at Council Offices in Gisborne, Kyneton and Woodend. The heat commences at 6pm and tickets will be available to purchase on the night for \$10, unless sold out. Strictly no pass outs.
