



October /November 2016 (Palmer Street - look for the blue Heritage Plaque on the gatepost on the left; open on the last Sunday of the month, from 11-2. Barton (Seymour) Cottage is a heritage listed dwelling built around 1855.) THE FRIENDS OF THE COTTAGE ARE LOOKING FORWARD TO WELCOMING VISITORS AGAIN TO THE COT-TAGE ON JULY 31ST - AND THE LAST SUNDAY OF EACH MONTH THROUGHOUT 2016.



Mega Plans for the Extinct-Lancefield Megafauna Festival.

A talk by passionate environmentalist, prolific author and former Australian climate commissioner, Tim Flannery is one of the highlights of this year's Extinct- festival in Lancefield. Dr. Flannery will speak about extinction and changes in the central Victorian landscape at Lancefield Mechanics Institute on Saturday 26th of November.

The programme for the Lancefield festival, now in its second year, also includes tours of the nearby Mt William Stone Axe Quarry, a National Heritage Place of special significance for the Wurundjeri people, with a Wurundjeri elder. These tours are offered on 25th and 26th of November.

The programme also includes children's activities and family entertainment in Lancefield's much-liked Centre Plantation with a giant fossil puzzle, a feature show by Prof. Doug A. Bone, as well as roving entertainment from Prof. Bonev Saurus and Festive Factory's Giant Butterflies.

Daddy P and the Hot Saxes, among others, provide musical grooves and the festival will overlap with Lancefield's popular Farmers Market on Saturday morning. Yet further talks explore the real Australian 'paleo-diet' and bushfire history in Victoria, and there will be a chance to explore the history of the area at the Local History Centre.

As part of the festival, organisers are also planning to host a group of palaeontologists who will carry out re-

search in Lancefield Park, or Lancefield Swamp as the site was endearingly-and once again appropriatelyalso known. This includes a plan to map the site with the help of a drone and Ground Penetrating Radar. Conditions permitting, plans also include the opening of an excavation in order to better understand past water flow across the site. This is key to understanding the unusually rich local accumulation of fossils of giant marsupial animals-or 'megafauna'- that roamed our area until 50,000 years ago.

The Extinct- Lancefield Megafauna Festival is a project of Lancefield Neighbourhood House, funded by Macedon Ranges Shire Council, with the Lancefield Community Bank® branch of Bendigo Bank as a major sponsor. 

Bike Safe in the Macedon Ranges

Recently, the Victorian Parliament's Economy and Infrastructure Committee announced its support for a bill that would amend the state's road laws to require drivers to maintain a minimum of 1 metre or 1.5 metres when overtaking cyclists. This follows legislation that is already in place in a number of other states. We were fortunate to be invited to provide a country perspective at the inquiry and we welcome the support for the introduction of a clear rule for road users.

It can be difficult for road users out there to know how much space to give a cyclist so the bill will be in everyone's

interests. It includes practical approaches such as allowing an overtaking car to straddle a solid white line if it is safe to do so whilst maintaining the minimum passing distance. That's an important inclusion for many of our smaller roads. Hopefully, if the bill gets passed, it will encourage more people to safely get out on their bikes with their families. The more bikes out there, the more other road users will get used to, and expect to see, cyclist on our roads.

Legacy was originally established in Melbourne in the aftermath of the First world War in 1923 by ex-servicemen, to care for dependants of Australian service personnel who died during or after the war. This legacy for caring for dependants continues to this day. Australia is the only country in the world where an organisation exists for the dependants of service persons who have died in conflicts, or as the result of conflict.

There are 50 Legacy Clubs in over 300 locations around Australia supporting and caring for about 80,000 widows of deceased veterans. Assistance can vary from providing transport, home visits, morning teas, assistance with heating costs and ageing aids around the home.

Macedon Ranges Legacy Group has 26 volunteers Legatees who service Kyneton, Woodend, Riddells Creek, Lancefield and Gisborne, supporting approximately 150 widows in this area. The badge selling is the only means of financing these activities. Romsey and Lancefield citizens have always been mot generous in supporting our fundraising and we thank them.
