





We would like to take this chance to wish all our user groups and the whole of the community a very happy and safe Christmas and New Year.



- **Hot cars kill:** Never leave kids, adults or pets in hot cars. The temperature inside a parked car can double within minutes.



#### Victorian Serrated Tussock Working Party

#### **Treat Tussock Before Seeding**

Now is the right time to check your property for the noxious weed serrated tussock (Nassella trichotoma). The recent rains and warm winter in some parts of Victoria has been good for crops, but unfortunately, also good for the growth of serrated tussock. Controlling serrated tussock before the plant goes to seed is critical to prevent further spread, lost productivity and increased control requirements.

"Before flowering serrated tussock has a lime green appearance. When flowering the flowerheads have a distinctive purple colour developing as the seeds ripen in late spring and early summer. These features help serrated tussock stand out from the native tussock grasses," Victorian Serrated Tussock Working Party Community Engagement Officer Ivan Carter said.

The VSTWP has developed an online video and information sheet to help landowners identify the unwanted grass, at http://www.serratedtussock.com/how-identifyserrated-tussock

"Serrated tussock has a fine leaf and will roll smoothly between the index finger and thumb, while native tussocks feel as though they have flat edges." Mr Carter said. "The leaves also feel rough when you run your fingers downwards due to fine serrations," he said. "A mature serrated tussock plant can produce thousands of seeds in a season, blowing up to 20 kilometres from the parent plant."

Controlling mature serrated tussock plants before they flower and seed can be done with registered herbicide, manual removal or cultivation. "Having a healthy pasture and competitive ground cover is one of the most important aspects to weed management, serrated tussock is a prime example of a weed that does not like competition and well established pastures," Mr Carter said.

It's believed serrated tussock now covers more than 140,000 hectares of land in Victoria. Large infestations require ongoing management and the integration of a number of control techniques.





#### **Unveiling of plaques**

Have you ever wandered down the path to Lancefield and discovered the Memorial plagues along the way, if you are interested in a little bit of history its worth a wander.

The Romsey-Lancefield Rotary Club's Avenue of Honour had an additional five plaques dedicated at an impressive ceremony earlier this month.

State RSL president Dr Robert Webster OAM commended the Rotary club on its ongoing avenue project initiative, and the Romsey-Lancefield RSL sub-branch for its partnership involvement.

"These sort of things keep communities together," Dr Webster said, referring to similar examples in other parts of the

The five new plaques donated by local sponsors are located over a distance of approximately 800 metres of the avenue (and walking track) to the north of Hutchisons Lane, Romsey.

There are now 18 plaques containing brief summaries of battles -- some not so well known - where Australian defence personnel served, dating back to 1885.

Eventually Rotary hopes the time will come when plaques are placed right along the avenue linking Romsey and Lance-

In addition to Dr Webster, special quests at the ceremony included Federal Member for McEwen Rob Mitchell, Rotary District Governor Bernie Bott and assistant district governor Kaye Gauci.

"As a club, we are proud of what we have achieved so far ... we want to make it an Avenue of Honour both towns are proud of," stated Rotary club president Anne Collins in opening formalities at the plaque commemorating those who lost their lives when the HMAS Canberra was attacked and sunk during World War 2.

Ms Collins praised Rotary secretary Shane Pettingill for his "labor of love" in getting the latest stage of the avenue up and running.


Romsey resident and plaque sponsor Marjorie Davis has a family connection with the Canberra, with her late husband Jim Webster surviving the sinking.

RSL sub-branch vice-president John Horan researched the history for the inscriptions on the plaques, and sponsored the one for The Sudan campaign in 1885.

Other new plaques marked the Villers Britonneux battle (sponsor Joan Donovan), Papua New Guinea final campaign (Christine Whitney), and Bullecourt (Eileen, Bruce and John Laing).

The Rotary club and RSL sub-branch is pleased that schools in Romsey and Lancefield have previously sponsored plaques, with the Avenue of Honour playing an educational role as well as honouring the fallen. The Rotary club will be pleased to hear from any potential plaque sponsors.

#### Reflection

No doubt all of us are getting ready for Christmas celebrations with family and friends and it can be a stressful time. If you have a large gathering at your home there is the food to organise, gifts to purchase and Christmas cards to send to those you don't see very often.

When I was going through last years Christmas cards and many of them were very similar, one of them stood out. It had a painting of a small stable building in which were assembled Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus, the usual array of shepherds and sundry animals.

The wise men, dressed in rich robes like kings, were approaching.

On surveying the scene, one turned to the others and said, "I think we are a trifle overdressed."

For centuries we have overdressed the wise men. There is nothing in Scripture to indicate that they were kings but we seem to prefer them that way.

In the hope of making things splendid for the celebration of Jesus' birth, many of us overdress all of Christmas. Nobody knows the true story of Jesus' birth, it doesn't

seem to have been important to the earliest Christians. The gospels of Mark and John, don't speak of it.

The stories in Matthew and Luke have almost nothing in common, except that he was born in Bethlehem to Mary and Joseph.

Luke's story of the stable and the shepherds Indicates a humble birth in keeping with the rest of Jesus' life.

We are inclined to get so caught up in the

commercial hype that we overlook its actual significance. We may not be conscious that we are making it more and more elaborate.

Perhaps we can make a noticeable difference in how we celebrate this Christmas by keeping it from

becoming overdressed and ourselves becoming overstressed.

After all, the whole point of the incarnation was to make a difference.

Praver: God in Jesus Christ, we are amazed and humbled by your lowly birth.

We are more surprised when we realise that it was consistent with your life.

Help us to know when we are overdressing situations and ourselves.

Help us to be symbols of difference in our communities. Bless our humble Christmas celebrations and all whom we feed and clothe. Amen.
