OUR BANK – TIME TO STAND UP AND BE COUNTED!

We are now entering the crucial stage of the push to establish a Community Bank in Romsey, and it's vital that all residents fill out and return the survey form that will land in their letterboxes in the next three weeks. Romsey Community Bank Steering Committee chair Maureen Wiltshire said Romsey residents had demonstrated with their pledges that they were prepared to put up the capital to establish the branch – we now had to demonstrate to Bendigo Bank that it would be viable. "So far the Romsey community has shown that we want a Bank – this next vite¹ ⁻⁺age is to demonstrate that we would use it," she said.

"only way that Bendigo Bank can satisfy itself that a community-owned Romsey branch would be a viable and successful operation is through an independent feasibility study of people's banking intentions. From talking to people all around the Romsey region I am confident that if we opened the branch they would support it – but we have to demonstrate this to Bendigo Bank in hard facts and figures through the feasibility study. We must have a firm financial basis on which to plan - and we won't get those firm figures for the balance sheet unless everyone returns their survey form."

Mrs Wiltshire said the confidential survey needed to establish whether people would transfer their loans, deposits, investments and business accounts to the branch. It also needed to establish whether people were already banking with the Lancefield branch – which will operate in partnership with, not opposition to – Romsey.

"The survey period will only be open for three weeks, so it' al that people fill out the form and return it as soon as ...ey receive it in their mail," Mrs Wiltshire said. "It is the only way that Bendigo Bank can gauge its likely viability, so if we want to 'bank-proof' Romsey with a communityowned Bank, we all have to make sure we return the questionnaire."

Mrs Wiltshire said the State Government and the Macedon Ranges Shire had demonstrated their confidence in the Community Bank project by agreeing to jointly fund the survey costs of around \$12,000. The Romsey Community Bank would operate as a full branch of Bendigo Bank, with the same range of products and services as those provided by any of Bendigo's branches, and a locally-based manager able to make grass-roots decisions. The community owns and operates the bank, with all deposits and business protected by Bendigo under the normal banking arrangements that apply to all its branches. Profits generated after the payment of costs and dividends are able to be channelled into community projects across the district.

Mrs Wiltshire said more than 250 local residents and businesses pledged to purchase more than \$430,000 in shares should the project pass the feasibility study and move into the final stage – more than enough funds to open a branch and provide working capital.

"But we can't let the cart get in front of the horse – the final step of issuing a prospectus, issuing shares and opening our doors for business is wholly dependent on a successful feasibility study," she said. "That's why it's so vital that everyone returns the study form."

Mrs Wiltshire said Bendigo Bank consultants would also spend several days in Romsey after the questionnaires were mailed out, conducting personal interviews with local shopkeepers and business owners to further gauge banking support.

Tuesday morning Assembly always sees a student read out our Statement of Commitment after the National Anthem. We had a special visit from Graeme Gordon, a wheelchair athlete who shares his experiences with the children, his thoughts on leadership, his attitude to life and who encourages the children to always give their best effort. The children certainly had fun using the wheelchairs in game situations with Graeme, but they also came to understand some of the difficulties that people in wheelchairs have to endure. His visit was a great experience for us all !

Clean Up Australia, Keep Australia Beautiful. We always try to impress on our children the importance of looking after our own backyards, and to take our rubbish home with us. It doesn't always work, but we have to keep trying. We picked up three big wheelie bins of rubbish along the main road beside the school on the 5th of March. The children were amazed to think that people could throw so much rubbish out of cars in just a short section of road. What must it be like along all our roads?

So that was our little contribution towards cleaning up our own backyard.

Let's hope the message gets across to more and more of our community.


Activities



COUNCIL NEWS

My apologies for not having submitted an article for the last few editions. The Christmas/New Year period was a relatively quiet period with little to report; however I would like to take this opportunity now to convey my best wishes to you for the 2004 year. Since late January the pace has picked up considerably, and I've found the weeks passing so quickly - including the deadlines for this column.

One of the projects that I'm sure everyone is pleased to see underway is the toilet block adjacent to Romsey's skate park. This is progressing well and will be completed towards the end of April.

After securing \$1 million from the State Government for the shoulder sealing of the Lancefield-Melbourne Road, I'm pleased to report that the contract for this has been awarded and works are expected to commence within the next couple of weeks.

Coinciding with this project, will be the construction of bicycle lanes along the Lancefield-Melbourne Road, linking the walking track through to the Romsey Primary School and possibly further. \$20,000 has been received from the State Government towards this project and the plans have been approved by VicRoads, police and local traders.

The health of Romsey's street trees was discussed at the Council meeting on 10th March in the context of allocating funding in the 2004-05 budget towards conducting an audit of street trees across the Shire, including the prioritisation of works on Romsey's street trees.

With the Lancefield tip projected to reach capacity within 12 months, plans for a replacement facility in Romsey are being prepared and consultation is about to commence.


Council had been granted \$300,000 in funding from Ecorecyle towards establishing a transfer station in the south of the Shire and we are now hoping to have the funding transferred towards the cost of establishing a facility for the eastern areas of the Shire. The proposed site would involve the sealing of Portingales Road, which would also facilitate the consolidation and expansion of the industrial estate.

The Lancefield Streetscape Committee has received a tremendous response to the questionnaire that's been circulating. The Streetscape Committee has been analysing the responses received and is progressing well with the plans, which include a new toilet block to replace the current toilet block - which has to be the worst in the district. \$150,000 towards the cost of the new toilets has been referred for consideration in Council's 2004/05 budget.

The proposed skate park for Lancefield has also moved a step forward, with the Lancefield Park Committee agreeing to the siting of the skate park within Lancefield Park. The exact site within the park is yet to be determined. This project has received part funding of \$21,000 from th Youth Foundation, and a funding application for 30,000 has been submitted to Sport and Recreation Victoria, which will be supported by in-kind labour.

Perhaps the most recent news I have is the approval received last week from Vic Roads for a turning lane into Macintosh Terrace, which is to be undertaken within the next 3-4 weeks.



Rule No.5 No Sex on the Bus (Confessions of a Tour Leader) – Brian Thacker

This book is an absolute must read for anyone who has ever been a punter (you pays your money you takes your chances) on either a Top Deck or Contiki (18-35 years) tour of Europe. The memories of your trip will come flooding back and even if some of the described activities are beyond your own experiences you can truly appreciate the delightful and/or disgusting scenarios throughout the book. 



Don Fairlie, former Curate of Rev. Tom Morgan. Present was Father George O'Connor from Lancefield/Romsey Catholic

urch. Rev. Tom knew Father George during his Army Chaplaincy days. He was delighted to find him in use parish when he retired back to Romsey.

Letters were received from the Archbishop of Melbourne, the Most Reverend Peter R. Watson and the Right Reverend Paul White, Bishop of the Western Region.
