Isn't the year just flying by? Have you got stuck into those New Year's resolutions yet? Was one of them more "me time"? Well now's the time to catch up on that particular resolve by popping into your local library to borrow and read some GREAT books. Enjoy!

Sucked in – Shane Maloney

As the blurb on the front of the book says "Maloney just gets better." This is the sixth book about the hapless Murray Whelan, Labor party gopher and now Upper House member for Coolaroo. When skeletal parts are found at the bottom of Lake Nilharcootie, Murray finds himself drawn into a web of intrigue from 20 years previous that certainly includes his good, but recently deceased mate, Charlie Talbot. Whilst the plot meanders, it is Maloney's use of first person, dead-pan narration and his glorious employment of laconic Aussie understatement, at its best, that is the highlight of the book.

Talk to the Snail – Stephen Clarke

I enjoyed Stephen Clarke's first book *A Year in the merde* but found the sequel *Merde actually* a little bit pretentious. However he's back to his best form with this little gem subtitled *Ten Commandments for understanding the French*. From eating to working to not being served Clarke covers all aspects of French life and how even the French have trouble negotiating the pitfalls of everyday living in France. An entertaining and informative read that helps to explain a little more about the Gallic psyche.

Starfish sisters – J.C.Burke

Burke is one of the recent crop of "new kids on the block" authors writing for teenage readers and she does so exceedingly well. Knowing absolutely nothing about surfing will not stop you from enjoying her most recent publication, 'Starfish Sisters'. Four talented teenage surfers, Georgie, Ace, Micki and Kia and thrown together in the same bungalow for a 3 week training camp for elite surfers. Needless to say there are fights, jealousies and secrets amongst them and all is not plain sailing, err surfing. How they resolve these issues makes compulsive reading as Burke tells the same story from four different viewpoints. A great read and there is a sequel in the pipeline.




Romsey Primary School News



WOODEND WINTER ARTS FESTIVAL

World-class chamber music in the Macedon Ranges

QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY WEEKEND

6 - 9 June 2008

The *Woodend Winter Arts Festival* is a unique celebration of the arts presented each year in the picturesque township of Woodend over the Queen's Birthday weekend. The festival showcases music — classical music from the Renaissance to the present day and jazz — and contains strong literary and visual arts components held in intimate historical venues over the long weekend.

To launch the 2008 *Woodend Winter Arts Festival* the **Choir of Ormond College** will hold a special recital on Friday, March 14 beginning at 8.00 pm at St Ambrose Church, Woodend.

The Choir of Ormond College, formed in 1983 and now under the directorship of John O'Donnell, consists of 24 students, most of whom are undergraduates at The University of Melbourne. During term time the choir sings Chapel services every Sunday evening, drawing on a broad repertoire of liturgical music of the past five centuries. The choir also contributes to Melbourne's concert life and records a wide variety of choral music. In July the choir will undertake a European tour, singing services and concerts in Italy and Switzerland.

The occasion will also offer an opportunity to hear Kyneton twins *Daniel and Matthew Thomson*, who have been members of Ormond College and its choir over the past year. Both have also recently been admitted to the rarified ranks of the performance stream in the third year of their Bachelor of Music course at The University of Melbourne.

The launch program on March 14 will include 20th-century English works by Arnold Bax and Benjamin Britten, Renaissance Latin motets by Josquin Desprez, Clemens non Papa and Richard Dering, and German Baroque works by Michael Praetorius and Johann Sebastian Bach. Entry to the concert is \$10, and tickets are available at the door – cash sales only.

Musical highlights of this year's *Woodend Winter Arts Festival* include Marco da Gagliano's 1608 opera *Dafne*, Prokofiev's *Peter and the Wolf*, featuring **Max Gillies** and the Scotch College Orchestra, and jazz great **James Morrison** in concert.

Not taken for granted

The 2007/08 round of Council's community funding scheme, which provides grants for local clubs and organisations, is being launched this month. The scheme has distributed more than \$1 million to worthy groups over the past 10 years, and I urge any of our hard-working volunteer groups to apply if they are seeking funding for a project. The categories are for recreation and facilities grants; community wellbeing; and culture, festivals and events. Last year more than \$118,000 was given to 73 projects and groups across the Shire, which provided a significant boost to our local clubs and groups and their projects.

Council is keen that the clubs and groups try to match Council funding or contribute towards their project in either cash or labour. This matching commitment will enable us to stretch out our dollars as far as possible. Our Council officers this year will be particularly interested in targeting applications that are supported by Community Action Plans, and those that improve disability access.

Officers have written to all groups which applied last year to advise them of the new round of funding, and will be advertising in the local newspapers this month inviting applications.

I would expect that the successful applicants will be notified in early August. I urge all groups within Romsey and the East Ward to consider an application. 

Pokies in Romsey Update

On March 19th 2008 the Supreme Court of Appeal found that VCAT had erred in its decision to grant approval for poker machines at the Romsey Hotel by failing to take into account a community survey that had been presented to the Gaming Commission as evidence of the community's opposition to poker machines. This means that the matter will be re-heard by VCAT. Previously the Gaming Commission had refused approval for pokies, but the Romsey Hotel had applied to VCAT to overturn this decision. The Supreme Court found that VCAT had erred in not taking community opinion into account, as the Gaming Act specifically states that community well-being is a relevant consideration. The Court noted that a citizen's sense of happiness with, or contentment in their community is part of "well-being". The Court also noted that "The fact that the act allows gaming to occur in approved premises does not mean that any Victorian community is *obliged* to accept gaming machines."

No date has yet been set for a further hearing by VCAT. We will bring you further updates as they are available.

Know your rights, celebrate Law Week 12-18 May

Dear Friends

May 12-18 is Law Week in Victoria. It's an annual event co-ordinated by the Victoria Law Foundation and the Law Institute of Victoria to encourage the community to learn about, and understand our law and justice system. The theme of this year's Law Week is 'Reaching Out', which is focussing on rural Victorians, seniors, young people, Indigenous Australians and multicultural communities. Many informative and interesting events are being held throughout the week covering topics such as; family law, human rights, local laws affecting you and your neighbours, tours of the Courts and recent changes to law.

One of the recent changes is a greater emphasis on victims of crime and greater acknowledgement of them in the Victorian justice system. The impact of crime on the victim is lifelong often affecting their relationships, family life, ability to work and participate freely in the community.

One of the biggest steps forward in formally recognising the rights of crime victims was taken when the *Victims Charter Act* became law in 2006. Victims now have the right to be informed of: the progress of a police investigation, victim support services, the right to apply for compensation, and eligible victims have the right to request information about sentenced offenders.

Further, in July last year, the *Victims of Crime Assistance Amendment Act 2007* came into effect, giving victims of crime a 30 per cent increase in compensation to recognise the victim's pain and suffering, counselling and medical expenses.

I encourage everyone to find out more about our law and justice system. There are many resources available from my office that can assist you to find out where you can register a complaint, or find local legal services.

'DETOX YOUR HOME' – A FREE CHEMICAL DISPOSAL SERVICE

Sustainability Victoria (EcoRecycle) is providing a free **DETOX YOUR HOME** house hold chemical collection service for **Macedon Ranges Shire on 19 April 2008.**

In 2008, Sustainability Victoria (EcoRecycle) will again provide the opportunity for Victorians to dispose of unwanted household chemicals or similar products without risking damage to the environment. The most recent collection in Macedon Ranges Shire was in April 2006. There were 92 customers and 6.9 tonnes of chemicals collected. It is important that we use this service so we have an argument for more frequent collections.

What can be disposed of?

Items such as dead batteries, household cleaners, paint, transmission or brake fluid, weed killer, insect sprays, ammonia based cleaners, nail polish, fluorescent tubes, gas cylinders, fertiliser, rat poison, radiator coolant, motor oil, solvents and glues, pool chemicals, and car body filler can be brought to the facility. Please ensure against spillage, and do not remove product labels. Containers must be less than 20 litres.

What cannot be accepted as part of this service?

Commercial quantities and chemicals used for industrial purposes, farm (rural) chemicals, asbestos, ammunition and flares. For help with advice on the suitable and safe disposal of these products, please call or email for contact details.


