Puree in a blender adding a little stock as required.

Return to pan, add remaining stock. Bring to boil, add pasta and simmer for 10 mins.

Taste, adjust seasoning if necessary.

"How do we remember them? They died so young. They missed so much. They gave up so much: their dreams; their loved ones. They laid down their lives that their friends might live. Greater love has no man than this."

These words from Lieutenant-Colonel Ralph Honner, DSO, MC, who commanded the 39<sup>th</sup> Battalion on the Kokoda Track during World War II, capture the sacrifices of our service men and women and the true spirit of the Anzacs.



If you currently hold any ASX listed shares in your own name or a related entity you can transfer them to your SMSF without having to sell and repurchase the shares – from 1 July, 2012 this is no longer possible
- In the 2012 financial year any minors who are beneficiaries of a family trust can only receive \$416 tax free. Prior to this the limit was as high as \$3,333 by taking advantage of low income offsets that are no longer available
- From 30 January, 2012 the Personal Property Security Act has become effective which changes the way a business deals with debtors and financiers

Quite often when a change takes place there will be some form or honeymoon period or transitional phase and it is often in these times that we have the greatest opportunity to plan. Other times the change is effective immediately and we must make do.

# Trust – The Oil in the Machine of Everyday Life.

At many levels, the simple notion of *trust* is what keeps relationships of all sorts - in families, partnerships, businesses, community groups, governance bodies, diplomatic relations (local and international) and society in general - functional. Trust can relate to honesty and integrity but, in short, is synonymous with feeling safe in a relationship.

Trust can erode suddenly or insidiously over time. Either way, when it is lost, the consequences are almost always disastrous at some level and long lasting. Relationships are sacrificed, group functionality is lost, and individuals are hurt often forever. What was once productive and satisfying is no more.

So, why does trust break in the first place? Sometimes it is because of eqo (or lack thereof). Sometimes it is because of arrogance or even complacency. Sometimes it is because of greed related to power. Sometimes it is the development of a siege mentality - "He said, She said", "Them Versus Us". Without trust, the oil in the machine of everyday life is missing. The machine heads for inevitable breakdown. How sad when it is so easy to just oil the machine.....

# Use your extra hour to protect home and family

CFA in partnership with Duracell is calling on Victorians to use their 'bonus' hour when clocks go back on 1 April to make sure their home has a working smoke alarm and a home fire escape plan.



"For most of us the end of daylight saving means an extra hour in bed," said Deputy

Chief Officer Alan Ellis. "We're asking Victorians to instead devote some of this time to protecting their homes and families from a house fire. It only takes ten minutes to check your smoke alarm batteries, and not much longer to talk with your family about what they would do if there was a fire."

In the same time it takes to cook a piece of toast, a spark can become a life-threatening blaze so it's critical for Victorian households to know and be able to implement their home fire escape plan quickly and confidently.

CFA recommends you:

- Use long-lasting 9V alkaline batteries to ensure yearround protection.
- Test smoke alarms once a month using a broom handle – the alarm should produce a beeping sound when the test button is pressed.
- Use the brush attachment on your vacuum cleaner to dust around the smoke alarm.
- Install photo-electric smoke alarms rather than ionisation smoke alarms where possible.
- Replace all smoke alarms (both battery powered and 240v hard-wired) after ten years. The year of manufacture is displayed on the alarm.

"Kids enjoy being involved in the process – changing the battery and pressing the test button. From there it's a great opportunity to remind them of what the alarm is for and what actions to take when it goes off," said Mr Ellis. "Simple actions like getting down low and crawling under smoke save lives so it is important kids get involved."

Tips for involving children with smoke alarms and home fire safety:

- Make testing the smoke alarm, or reminding an adult to do so, part of their regular responsibilities.
- Help them make their own 'smoke alarm tester' using a piece of wooden dowel decorated with paint, tape or ribbons.
- Talk through your home fire escape plan highlighting actions they can take, such as knowing when to dial 000.

CFA has partnered with Duracell for more than ten years now to urge Victorians to change their smoke alarm batteries when they change their clocks at the end of daylight saving.

Without a working smoke alarm, residents are four times more likely to die in a house fire, 57 per cent more likely to suffer property loss or damage, and 25 per cent more likely to suffer serious injury.

# FIRE DANGER PERIOD TO FINISH IN SELECTED MUNICIPALITIES

The Fire Danger Period finished on Monday, 19 March, in the following municipalities in CFA's Loddon Mallee Region District 2:

#### **Greater Bendigo City Council Central Goldfields Shire Council Mount Alexander Shire Council** Macedon Ranges Shire Council

Fire Danger Periods are based on local conditions and take into account fuel moistures, fuel loads, grassland curing, weather and rainfall. They are a seasonal declaration. Information about fire restrictions is available in CFA's Can I or Can't I brochure available on the CFA website http://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/restrictions, or by phoning the Victorian Bushfire Information Line (VBIL) 1800 240 667. Although CFA places only limited restrictions on the lighting of fires in the open air outside of the Fire Danger Period, lighting of fires may be fully or partly restricted under legislation and by-laws administered by municipalities and Department of Sustainability and Environment. A person who lights a fire in dangerous weather or fuel conditions or lights a fire that damages another person's property whether intentionally or not is guilty of a serious crime.

Although the fire danger period is ending, it is important the community takes extreme care when burning off. If a fire is left unattended in windy conditions it can spread guickly and can burn into bushland or onto neighbours' properties.

Always remember to:

- Check local by-laws before burning-off;
- Never leave a burn-off unattended;
- Tell your neighbours and call the VicFire Burn-Off • Line on 1800 668 511 so that brigades don't get called out unnecessarily and;
- Check the weather forecast before you burn-off never burn-off in dry, hot, windy conditions.

Some larger sized fires over the past few weeks, particularly the recent grassfire near Ararat, highlights the importance of being fire ready and always remaining vigilant.

CFA Chief Officer, Euan Ferguson, said although there had been wet conditions and flooding in Victoria, the recent grassfires demonstrated how quickly fires could take hold.

"Grassfires travel faster than you can run. They can threaten properties and even kill," he said."People should have a fire plan and prepare for the event of fire - never be complacent."



# Water mains in line for a clean up

Western Water staff members are rolling up their sleeves for a huge cleaning job in Romsey. The town's water mains will be progressively cleaned during late March and April to make sure residents are receiving the best quality drinking water possible.

"During the drought we scaled back our mains cleaning program to help save water, but with good rains over the past year, we are getting back on track," Western Water's Managing Director, John Wilkinson, says. "We will need to turn the water off temporarily in each street as we work our way through the town, but anyone who is affected will be notified individually by letter prior to the work. We have tried to minimise the inconvenience as much as possible, for example, by working at night in areas where there are businesses, and during the day in residential areas when people are less likely to be home."

The cleaning process involves injecting compressed air into the pipe to stir up the water, then flushing the turbulent water out.

"What we are cleaning out is just very fine sediment that settles to the bottom of the pipe, and doesn't generally have any effect on the safety or quality of the water," Mr Wilkinson says. "After their mains have been cleaned people may find the water from their tap is cloudy, or tastes a bit 'earthy'. The cloudiness is just residual air – if you leave the water in a jug or glass for a few minutes, the air will bubble out leaving the water clear. The taste will settle down fairly quickly. People may notice water flowing out of hydrants at times. This is just drinking water stirred up with air and the fine sediment being cleaned out from the bottom of the pipe," Mr Wilkinson says.

In Lancefield, the Group has started work on its "Celebrating Landcare Indigenous Garden" at Lancefield Park, the recreation centre of the town. Funding of \$3,731 for the project has been provided by the State Government as part of the Victorian Landcare Grants delivered by the Port Phillip and Westernport CMA Community Grants Program.

President Robin Ford says that the Group is keen to undertake works on the ground in both Romsey and Lancefield, and would love to have more local community members join in the fun.


