

Following the service tea, coffee and refreshments will be provided for the community by the Lancefield Neighborhood House Committee at the Mechanics Hall All families, individuals and in particular our school children are welcome to attend this important day in Australia's history.

A smaller wreath-laying service will be conducted at the Romsey Cenotaph at 07:30 am ALL ARE WELCOME TO ATTEND

ANZAC DAY small commemorative service.

Perhaps of interest to some there will be a

small commemorative service following the main ceremony. It will be a service blessing with the addition of a veterans name to the cenotaph after 101years.

The RSL were approached by the family for assistance over a year ago and with a lot of to-ing and fro-ing, it's about to happen in time for this Anzac Day.

Having checked the veterans military service records that of Private Herbert Golding, it would appear his name had been accidently omitted from the cenotaph, despite having enlisted at Lancefield.

Following discussions with MRSC seeking their approval for the addition of Private Golding's name to the cenotaph, the location and the lead lettering was finally given the all clear to proceed.

The MRSC have also generously contributed to the cost of the lead casting of the letters and their installation, by making a donation to share the funding with the RSL and with the family concerned.

Private Herbert Golding is the great uncle of Mrs Jay Brooks of Romsey and the grandfather of Douglas Golding of Queensland.

Who is planning to travel down from Queensland to attend the service.

It was pointed out by Jay that her great uncle had been the proprietor, publisher and printer of The Lancefield Mercury from 1913 to 1915. Selling the newspaper when he enlisted and immediately afterwards his wife and children moved to Cheltenham to be with family.

He was killed at Pozieres on 27th August 1916 aged 36.





On Friday March 3rd Mary-Anne Thomas, the member for Macedon, visited the RMI to formally announce the \$4,100.00 grant to repair and restore the two WW1 Honour Rolls that have hung in the hall since the early 1920s. Mary-Anne also urged other groups to submit applications for the next round of grants. This project, \$5400.00 in total, will be jointly funded by the Department of Premier & Cabinet (80%) and the RMI CoM (20%).

Once Honour Rolls have been repaired and restored to their original condition they will be hung at the back of the main hall. The correct method of hanging the Honour Rolls and appropriate lighting will be put in place of the next few months. We expect the works to be completed by late May/early June.

The CoM would like to thank the organising committee for the **2017 Antiques Fair and the Garden Show**, Diane Irvine, Gail Middleton & Kathy Lakey for all their hard work to get both events up and running. We would also like to thank all those locals who took the time to visit the RMI on one or both

days. It is good to see the RMI serving the purpose for which it was intended.

The Mechanics Institute of Victoria (MIV) has recently handed over the RMI's Historical Plaque.

The MIV hopes that all Mechanics Institutes across Victoria will participate in this program and that the some of the history of these wonderful community buildings will be preserved in these plaques. Our plaque is number 58, hopefully, over the next few years all the remaining (500+) Mechanics Institutes in Victoria will have their own individual plaques.

The CoM is currently looking for an experienced and qualified tradesperson to review the damage to the render within the main hall and supper room and design a program to repair this damage. Once these areas are repaired we will be able to begin planning the staged repainting of sections of the RMI. We will be keeping an eye out for any grants that will be bale to assist us with these works.

Now that the building drying out we have also been able to attack the loose paint that has been effected by damp. The peeling paint, cobwebs and much staining has been scraped/brushed/washed away and the foyer, main hall and supper room look much the better. This is also part of the major refurbishment works that the RMI will require to bring this "Grand Old Lady" back to her former glory.

A new program will be starting at the RMI in early May. It will be "Mums & Bubs Yoga". The hour sessions will begin at 9.30 am and the program will commence on Tuesday May 2nd. Cost will be \$15.00 per session, please bring your own yoga mat. Enquiries to Kalma - 0408 170 913




to those who have had, or are being treated for,



- Seek an annual donation from local groups that have previously enjoyed free promotion of their organisations and activities.







Many people will be aware of the annual problem the Golf Club has had with the Little Corellas. These birds arrive in large numbers in late December and spend the next two months digging up Romsey Park and the Golf Club Greens. Over the past few years the club has tried rubber snakes, cut -out cats, holographic tape, whistling tape, "Deter" spray, chili spray & mustard spray; all to no avail. Recently representatives from The Department of Environment, Water, Land & Planning (DEWLP) visited Romsey Park to see first hand the damage these birds cause. The club was very pleased with the response from DEWLP and we will be applying for a "Permit To Control Wildlife". We will have to wait and see just what restrictions, if any, are placed on this permit.

On Friday night March 3rd vandals attacked the eastern end of Romsey Park. Four golf flags were stolen. On Saturday night March 4th there was another visit, this time to the western end of the Park. Six flags were stolen, irrigation taps were turned on and there was some damage to the sprinkler system. The police visited the Park to record the vandalism and to take finger prints from tee markers and sand buckets that had been thrown around or damaged. The damage to the irrigation system meant the pump was continually on pumping water to four locations along the western end of the Park. No other sections of the course received water that night.
