THE PUB IS NOT ON THE MARKET, COMMUNITY MEETING TOLD

A public meeting to report the outcomes of a Romsey Hotel Working Group consultation with hotel site owner, Mr Jim Hogan, was held on Wednesday, March 14th at the Romsey Mechanics Institute. Jenny Stillman, spokesperson for RRBATA, firstly told the meeting that the Romsey Hotel site and its facade would be part of the "southern gateway", and thus a crucial component of the Romsey Streetscape Project, which essentially covered Main Street between Barry Street and Palmer Street.

Working Group spokesperson, John Boukouras, told the meeting that a conference with the site owner, Jim Hogan, sought to answer the following questions:

- Is the property on the market?
- Could the community purchase the pub?
- What ideas have there been for future use of the site?

The fact is that the Romsey Hotel property is not on the market, so there is no sense at present in suggesting that the community could be involved in any way in a purchase. However, if the property came on the market, then the community could be part of an offer. John said that the owner had recently rejected an offer of \$3 million for the site.

A spokesman for Macedon Ranges Shire Council reported that Council has a current application for a caravan park on the hotel site. However, due to insufficient information, this application is not presently being advanced.

The hotel building carries a heritage overlay, and the façade must be

retained in any future re-development.

The meeting was interested in other possibilities in Romsev for hotel. or similiar developments. There were several applications for liquor licences current for Romsey, and the 5 Kings Café is expanding the scope of its business, and applying to modify its liquor licence.



Talking Animals & ANZAC



ANIMALS IN WAR

Every April we remember the sacrifices made by our ANZAC troops in Gallipoli, and soldiers who have fought in other battles, but do we know much about the animals who went to war to help them?


Australian author and illustrator Mark Wilson has written a number of well-researched picture storybooks for primary aged children, many of which are about animals. Some are devoted to animal conservation, and others tell the stories of some very remarkable animals whose contributions saved countless lives during WW1 and WW2.

'Digger: The Dog Who Went to War' was inspired by the true story of a brave little terrier called Driver who was smuggled onto an Australian troop ship during WW1. Mark's story reconstructs the kinds of experiences typical of soldiers who had managed to take their pets with them as mascots, messengers, and sometimes as sentinels whose superior senses enabled them to warn troops of approaching aircraft or the presence of poisonous gases.

Driver travelled to France in March 1916. He was an expert ratter, and his master claimed that he could tell the difference between the sounds made by German and Allied aircraft, choosing only to hide when he heard German aircraft approaching.

Strict quarantine laws meant that, sadly, most of the animals taken overseas were unable to return to Australia for fear that they might be carrying diseases; however owing to ingenuity, subterfuge, and the ability of a very clever little dog to remain silent during countless onboard searches, Driver was successfully smuggled back to Australia after the war to live out the remainder of his life in Sydney.

Another of Mark's books, 'Flapper VC', is the true story of a carrier pigeon whose bravery saved the lives of an entire patrol when it was surrounded by enemy troops in the jungles of Papua New Guinea, and had no other way of communicating with the main battalion. He flew through hails of bullets, thick smoke, rain and strong winds to carry his message. For his efforts he was awarded the Dickin medal, the animal



equivalent to the Victoria Cross. His medal can be viewed at the War Memorial in Canberra, (Dickin Medal: Pigeon Q879).

Another Australian author, Corinne Fenton, also researches true stories about animals. Her picture storybook, 'My Friend Tertius', tells the true story of a British intelligence officer, living and working in Hong Kong at the beginning of WW2. One day when walking through a market he saw a baby gibbon, so he decided to buy him and take him home, and the two became inseparable.

Soon afterwards orders arrived and Tertius and his best friend moved to Singapore, and when Singapore was no longer safe, they moved again, heading for Australia. Once again, strict Australian quarantine regulations meant that there were complications. I won't spoil the story by telling you what happened.

BOOK REVIEW The Trumpet Calls

Romsey's Tribute 1914 - 1919

Michael P Garnett, OAM Historical Publications, Romsey 2018 Paperback: 55 pages Reviewer: Lt. Colonel Neville Taylor, March 2018

This monograph is a companion to Michael's Kyneton Mounted Rifle Corps and Militia Units of Maryborough 1860-1901 that were published in 2013 and 2017 respectively.

When approaching some Australian towns by car, one may drive through an Avenue of Honour - trees planted to honour those who fought in the First World War. The people in the (then) Romsey Shire opted to recognise all who served in WWI by striking the Romsey Tribute Medal. It is this Medal that large memorial medallion that was issued to the next of kin to provided the catalyst for the writing of Romsey's Tribute 1914 -1919.

By 1914 Romsey had become an independent town that was served by a railway line providing access to Melbourne and seaside resort towns for day-trippers. Mills and factories provided employment for those not on the land, and numerous trades, three hotels, and two papers made it a self-sufficient and important local hub.

A brief history of the volunteer units and rifle clubs that existed prior to Federation (and that subsequently became militia and Romsey's Tribute is available from the author, Michael Garnett cadet units) explains how, in 1914, Australia was in a sound position to raise a sizeable force to send overseas. In September 1914, the local Red Cross Society moved that the Shire put aside money for a Patriotic Fund. There was no lack of local patriotism as the Shire moved that 'the meeting of residents of Romsey re-affirm its determination to assist in every possible way in the prosecution of the war in which the British Empire and her Allies are now engaged.' This level of patriotism was to persist for the duration of hostilities. Extracts from The Romsey Examiner indicate the pressure exerted on the local citizens to enlist or support the war. The Examiner regularly published a Roll of Honour listing those who had volunteered. The problem of recruiting diminishing the farm labour pool certainly had a local impact.

In 1916 Romsey and Lancefield had a military visitor seeking suitable horses for mounted and artillery regiments of the Australian Imperial Force. There were huge demands for horses for Light Horse and Mounted Regiments both in Europe and the Middle East.

At Mia Mia, 45 kilometres north of Romsey, John Duigan flew Australia's first homemade aeroplane in 1910. Duigan enlisted and flew with No. 3 Squadron, Australian Flying Corps, winning the Military Cross for action in May 1918. He returned to pioneer aviation and helped to transform communications and travel in Australia.

At home, at the 1882-built mansion, Mintaro, Madame Charlotte Crivelli, the vice-president of the French Red Cross in Victoria hosted a Grand Fete to raise funds for the women and children in France. Over 500 people attended, with a special train assisting district locals who wished to attend the April 1916 event.

The Shires of Romsey, Lancefield and Springfield amalgamated to form the Shire of Romsey in June 1916. The amalgamated shires continued with the recommendation to honour citizens with a commemorative medal as a tribute for their service. The September 1916 Gisborne Gazette noted: 'The public of Romsey will give a bronze medal (cost 5/-) to each of the men from the district going to the front (sic).' The Tribute Medal had a Shire

Crest surrounded by 'Romsey and District, Victoria,' and the obverse with a margin, 'Honour to whom Honour is due,' and a ___who nobly responded central inscription, 'Presented to ____ to the Empire's call in the Great European War 1914-15,' indicating that it was issued subsequent to the Gallipoli campaign. It came with its own ribbon and was the same size as bravery and campaign medals.

There were numerous well-attended public occasions when departing enlistees received their Medal as well as those who had been wounded and returned. Former residents who had moved and enlisted at other locations also received the Tribute Medal.

Other aspects of the First World War are also mentioned: the every soldier of the British Empire who died (to become known as 'the dead man's penny'), and the Lancefield connection to Lieutenant Harry (Breaker) Morant.

This 2018 production contains a large number of pertinent photographs of places, events and people, portraits and facsimiles as well as a map of Romsey and the surrounding towns. This is an extremely appropriate and timely work that reflects Garnett's love of his local history.

ANCHOVY PASTE

Anchovy paste is used as a spread or to flavour mayonnaise, vinaigrettes, marinades etc.

150g anchovy fillets; 2 cloves garlic; 4 tablespoons olive oil; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; freshly ground black pepper.



Put the anchovy fillets and peeled garlic into a food processor and puree until they form a paste. (Or use a mortar and pestle - but the food processor is easier.). Blend in the olive oil and lemon juice and season with freshly ground black pepper.

ANCHOVY FLAVOURED, CRUSTY LAMB.

The crust is a great contrast to the sweetness of the lamb. Mix together the parsley, ground almonds,

3 tablespoons anchovy paste;

1/4 cup finely chopped parsley;

1 cup ground almonds;

2 egg whites;

4 small lamb racks, trimmed; salt:

freshly ground black pepper

Mix together the parsley, ground almonds, anchovy paste and lightly beaten egg whites. Press this mixture onto the outside of the racks. Put the racks into a roasting pan and season with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Put the roasting pan into the oven, preheated to 190 deg. C for 20 minutes if you like your lamb medium rare as I do. Leave it a little longer if you like it a little more cooked. One baby lamb rack serves one person.



Looking Back in Time The Wurundjeri People

Prior to white settlement, the area of the Romsey Shire was inhabited by aborigines from the Wurundjeri tribe. Because they were nomadic, they camped in different parts of their territory, where they hunted wild life and fished the local streams. Their camps were near creeks and springs, one of which was the Lancefield Park Spring. Another spring was north of Brock's Monument. Near these camps were camp fires, which burned continuously while the tribe was hunting in the area. Over time, the burnt logs left large mounds of ashes, called camp ovens. Two of these camp ovens were located east of Lancefield, between the town and the Deep Creek. It is now estimated aboriginal occupation goes back some 50,000 years. With the arrival of the Europeans, many aboriginals succumbed to white man's diseases. William Thomas, Protector of Aborigines, estimated that within a few years of settlement, up to 90% of Victorian aborigines had died from European diseases. Before settlement of Victoria, the aboriginal people had a structured and complex society. There were two major

groups, one covered the central region and was called the Kulun nation, the other covered Gippsland and was called the Kurnai. Within these nations were language groups- in our region, the Wurundjeri. The Wurundjeri language was Woiworung. Their groups were further divided into five clans, which included the Gunung-Willam-Bullak, and Wurundjeri-Willam clans. The Gunung-Willam-Bullak land extended from the Werribee river in the west, and Kyneton and Lancefield in the north. The Wurundjeri-Willam group extended from the Yarra River near Kew and the Maribyrnong River, north to near Mount William. The word Wurundjeri translates as "People of the white gums" a reference to the Manna gums that grew so profusely in the region. The Willam part of the name referred to the bark shelters that they built from the stringy bark and peppermint gums. The Bullak part refers to the number of people. Howitt in "The Native Tribes of South-East Australia" explains that the right to hunt in any particular tract of country, belonged to the people born there and could not be infringed upon by others without permission.



JOIN COBAW IN GETTING ACTIVE THIS APRIL

Cobaw Community Health is encouraging schools within the Macedon Ranges Shire to join them in signing up to the Premier's Active April this year. Premier's Active April encourages all Victorians to do 30 minutes of physical activity a day during April. It's free, fun and part of the Victorian Government's commitment to get more people active and healthy.

According to the 2015 Victorian Population Health Survey, only 34.7 per cent of Macedon Ranges Shire residents participated in physical activity on four or more days of the week, compared with the Victorian average of 41.3 per cent. Engaging in regular physical activity has important benefits for both mental and physical health. Physical activity reduces the risk of many health problems, such as cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes, anxiety, depression, musculoskeletal problems, some cancers and unhealthy weight gain.

Participation in Premier's Active April has been made easy for schools with the free downloadable mobile app which tracks activity. To participate as a school, a teacher can sign up to Premier's Active April via the website www.activeapril.vic.gov.au or mobile app and register their school and students. Alternatively students can sign up themselves and join the school team. By signing up to the month long challenge, the school and students automatically receive a range of prizes and go in the draw to win even more.

Developing a regular pattern of physical activity for children and adolescents can help establish lifelong enjoyment and an appreciation of the benefits of physical activity.

"Supporting schools within the Shire to sign up and participate in Premier's Active April is one strategy we are implementing to help improve the health and wellbeing of our local community," said Margaret McDonald, Cobaw CEO. "Cobaw participated as a workplace last year and are signed up again, encouraging our own staff to take the time to be active."

The influenza season is coming - Think about a flu vaccination!



Last year's flu season was one of the most severe we've experienced in some time. There were 250,000 cases of flu across Australia, with nearly 4,000 children affected, and 745 deaths. Many of the people badly affected by flu were over 65 years of age. This year, new, stronger and more effective vaccines will be provided for this group.

To reduce risk to you, your family and community of another season of severe flu, we encourage everyone to consider influenza immunisation this year. The government will fund vaccination for the following groups who are at a higher risk of complications of flu: **Seniors over 65 years or age**







THE HISTORY OF THE ROMSEY BOWLING CLUB

In 1962, the Senior Police Constable stationed at Romsey, Snr. Leon Aarons and the Manager of the National Bank Mr. H.G. Mitchell, felt that Romsey should have a Bowling Club. A Sub-Committee was formed to gauge the feeling of the Romsey community.

The Sub-Committee scoured the district for promises of support through the purchase of debentures. At a public meeting held on 18 February 1963 it was reported that sixty nine people were prepared to purchase £25 debentures and a total of £1725 was raised. Mr. Aarons reported that he made an enquiry to the Royal Victorian Bowls Association and that the cost of a green by contract was £2250. Voluntary help from the community would be needed to realise the construction of a green, within budget.

The inaugural General Meeting of the Romsey Bowling Club immediately followed the public meeting and the following community members formed the first committee - President: Cr. L.J. Cook, Senior Vice President: W. Tom, Junior Vice President: H.G. Mitchell, Hon. Secretary: L. Aarons, Hon. Treasurer: Cr. L.A. McIntyre. Thanks to the generosity of sixty nine people, the Romsey Bowling Club was formed and all efforts were turned to the preparation of the green.

It was reported at the Committee Meeting of 8th March 1963 that committee members met with Mr. W.J. Lowe of the RVBA and they inspected the proposed green site in Romsey Park. They decided that the position was ideal and no difficulty was anticipated in the laying down of the green. It was then moved, "That application be made immediately to the Romsey Park Committee, to put down a bowling green and to remove all trees necessary to this end."

Also at this meeting, arrangements were made to purchase precast concrete slabs for the ditches, agricultural pipes for drainage and fowl manure to promote growth. They discussed excavation work, working bees and decided to advertise for volunteers. The transfer of an electric light pole and the digging of a fresh hole were organised. Sand samples for the base were arranged as was the felling and removal of the trees. The use of machinery and equipment for the working bee was arranged and donated.

"The best working bee ever to be held in Romsey" soon followed. Some men were working at shovelling cinders from the old railway line, some were shovelling sand. There were trucks of all shapes and sizes, some were tip trucks but many were farm tray trucks on which the sand or cinders had to be shovelled on and off. Then there were those who were spreading the material as it was dumped. What a mammoth task! Prior to spreading the sand, a grader levelled the site, a vibration roller was used to consolidate the area, a ditch digger dug the drains and the agricultural



pipes were laid. Then followed the cinders, screenings, sand levelling, topsoil, more levelling with wires and hundreds of pieces of wood. The green was on the way.

As the Club became financial, a draw of "Holders" took place. Gradually debentures were repaid. Again the generosity of the holders was shown, for some would not accept the return of their money, leaving it in the hands of the Club Treasurer as a donation.

At the Annual Meeting held on 21 November 1969, it was decided to convene a meeting of ladies, regarding the formation of an Associates section of the Club. The inaugural meeting of the Romsey Bowling Club Associates was held 9 December 1963. The elected committee consisted of – President: Mrs. H. Tointon, Senior Vice President: Mrs. K. Fraser, Junior Vice President: Mrs. J. Reynolds, Secretary: Mrs. N. Anderson, Treasurer: Mrs. W. Thomas, Auditor: Mr. C. Fricker.

Initially, there were forty four Associate Foundation Members.

Immediately, the ladies made their mark at both Club and District level. They excelled at fund raising and catering and showed that they would soon be a force to be reckoned with on the green.

Today, with the unification of bowls, the Club operates with a single Board of Management. We have

continued to function successfully from these early beginnings. Our membership figures now hover in the mid thirties and we are always seeking new members. Despite the limited numbers, as a Club we have experienced our successes with several premierships in both Saturday Pennant Division 2 and Midweek Pennant Division 1. In 2014 our Midweek Pennant team became the Champions of State Pennant at Barham in NSW. This was a great achievement for a small club, competing against much larger clubs. Over the years we have produced a number of State and Divisional Champions in all facets of the game – singles, pair, triples and fours.

As a matter of interest, the cost of a new green today would be greatly in excess of \$200,000, a far cry from the humble beginnings of the Romsey Bowling Club green of 1963.

In conclusion, I must give credit for much of this information to the late Mr. Norm Thompson, a club stalwart of many years. Norm put together an invaluable history "Booklet" of the Club's first twenty five years. Our bowling green

is named in his honour, due to the countless hours that he contributed to the Club.
