If you ever thought nothing happens in Romsey, think again...

On Tuesday 21st April James Merlino MP. Minister for Sports & Recreation announced funding of \$500,000 for the Romsey Sports Precinct. The proposed development includes the construction of a new sports ground. including an 8-lane grass athletics track, soccer pitch, and a cricket and football ground at the Romsey Primary School, which is located within the sports precinct. The project also includes the provision of a club facility and car park, paths and pedestrian links to Romsey Park.

The State Government's \$500,000 funding commitment towards this project adds to the \$466,662 being provided by Council and \$58,000 from local community organisations.

Construction will be worked in with the seasons & existing users of the ground and is expected to be completed within 12 -18 months. These projects take many years to develop and our thanks must be extended to those who worked to make this a reality including both past and present councillors and staff.

Council is currently exhibiting it's 2009-2012 Family & Children's Strategy and seeks your feedback & suggestions (deadline has been extended to mid May). For example I believe that improved public transport is fundamental to families and has not been addressed in the current draft. So please read it, submit your thoughts and lets look after our families & children. The strategy can be viewed both at the Romsey Community Hub or online at: www.macedon-ranges.vic.gov.au/Page/page.asp?Page_Id=1726

After much uncertainty the Romsey ABC Learning Centre has found a new provider to assume management responsibilities. The new operator will be Amberlee McFarland who is currently the operator of LuLa Mays Child Care in Lancefield

The Romsey Community Hub was recently visited by John Cain whom was highly impressed and surprised that such a high quality facility serviced a population of only 3,500. Additionally the Council recently voted to move it's library services from the current provider Mitchell to Goldfields Library Corporation. This change will increase the available stock from about 15,000 titles to over 277,000.



This will be a unique project between the Macedon Ranges Shire Council and Romsey Primary School where the Macedon Ranges Shire Council will develop a facility on the Department of Education and




Early Childhood Development land. An additional \$466,000 will be funded by the Macedon Ranges Shire Council, \$8,000 from user groups with a further \$50,000 to be raised by the community. The sports field will be sited opposite Romsey Park partly on the present Little Athletics track and partly on the 'horse paddock.' The project involves the

construction of a new sports ground including an 8 lane grass athletics track, soccer pitch, cricket and football ground. The project will also include the provision of club facilities and associated car parks, paths and pedestrian links to Romsey Park. The major users will be Little Athletics, Junior Cricket and Junior Football Clubs and the primary school. It will also be available for Cobaw District Schools. This investment is estimated to cost \$1.025 million for a quality sports field for Romsey, which is an exciting development for our community.

Fran's message for Anzac Day 2009

On Anzac Day, our communities will pause to remember and reflect on the spirit of service and sacrifice that shapes our nation in war, peace and disaster. It is a spirit born on the beaches of Gallipoli on the morning of April 25, 1915, forged in the muddied trenches of the Somme in later years of World War One and reinforced in other conflicts and battles over the last 90 years.

That same spirit is ever present in our everyday lives, not always saluted with gratitude, but often quietly binding together our communities through service to each other and striving to improve the lives of all. Our communities have experienced the strength of the Anzac spirit over the 11 weeks since the Black Saturday fires. People, who had faced and survived the ferocity of nature that left in its wake total and utter destruction not unlike that encountered by Australian men and women in war zones, were comforted by the spirit of volunteers, friends and strangers in beating the menace and beginning the recovery. That demonstration of service is a treasured and valued part of the great Australian character.

Australians have volunteered in time of war to preserve our cherished freedom and protect the principles of democracy from regimes and dictators who attack liberty. They have been ordinary men and women offering to serve.

There have been times, too, when Australians have been conscripted into military service and not always shown the gratitude of the nation for their service and displays of that same spirit carried forward from the fateful day at Gallipoli. All who wear the uniform of the army, navy or air force are bound by that one spirit, of being Australian and helping others. For many, service in the Australian Defense Force is a short, shaping experience in the journey of life, for others a life-long career. But service for these men and women - and today we have ADF personnel on tours of duty in Afghanistan and Iraq and in peacekeeping operations in the Solomon Islands and other countries -does not end with their discharge. Returned serviceman or woman are in all walks of life, just like you and me, working in our midst applying the Anzac spirit to our communities through sporting clubs, volunteer organisations like the Country Fire Authority and Red Cross. They are, to use the RSL motto, serving still. That spirit of service that has so positively influenced our communities and our nations has never been found wanting as we can testify following February 7 this year. May we always give thanks and gratitude to those original Anzacs and all who uphold their spirit.

Editor's Note: although Anzac Day was before the publication of this edition of the Rag, the sentiments contained herein are important, and therefore included in this edition.



Luke 24: 13-16

Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him.

He was a prophet "mighty in deed and word", said the disciples to the stranger on the Emmaus road. Perhaps it was the shock of radical change which prevented them from recognising Jesus, or the fact that they were still using the past tense about Him.. "was a prophet".

Their failure to recognise their Lord is something we need to think about and relate to our own circumstances. Their experience of Jesus was in the past, and they thought they were alone. The cross had taken Him from them, and their minds had not made sense of the changed situation, or adjusted to it. In this change Jesus was somehow out of context; they couldn't fit Him into the picture.

But do we always recognise Him, beside us? Hard work, routine, tiredness, ill health, can so grind us down that we carry on mechanically, never lifting our eyes - or minds from the dust of the road, unaware of the glory and strength of His presence with us. Life gets thin and weak, the meaning drains out, leaving us with the dry washedout dregs. Yet He is still there, as the "stranger", walking with us, talking to us, listening when we speak. As the two disciples spoke of the cross. He took hold of their bewilderment and sorrow, and "beginning with Moses and the prophets" helped them to make sense of it. Sharing their problem with Him brought them towards a solution.

There is a more profound truth in it too – Christ isn't there beside us simply to help us find solutions. He is often in the problem itself.

The problem for two disciples was how to make sense of the cross, how to accept it. Jesus helped them to do that, but He also showed them that the cross itself was the creative act of God, and that he was in the problem, as well as in the solution.

There are times when a problem looks as though it was sent to break us, but it ends by building us up - Christ in the problem itself, and Christ with us, helping us towards honest thinking; supporting and guiding us to the point where He wants us. "Tried in the fire".

Does it help you to look for the presence of Christ IN your problems? Try it; one day you may be able to thank Him for them, although that's harder!

They felt alone, Lord, as they walked towards Emmaus. The stony ground, the dust, the road, rutted and rough,

meant nothing.

Neither did the stranger, coming from nowhere, breaking in on their arief.

There was nothing left but memories and they were still harsh and painful.

Time had no chance to smooth the rough edges.

Their emotions were raw and bleeding.

Lord, I don't want to dramatise, but I know how they felt. I've stood in the wreckage of my plans, seeing nothing but disappointment.

Shrugging my shoulders, trying to pretend I didn't care. Turned Off.

Then you appeared.

Unexpected.

And the world was good again.

Not like Cinderella and the fairy godmother, rags to riches, pumpkin to coach, mice into horses.

Not like that.

The pain didn't suddenly disappear.

Outwardly there was little change, but the air smelled fresher, the knots relaxed.

I began to function again, to respond to other people, and to see vou.

Lord it is good to know you are with me, in all the strains

In the disappointments and difficulties let me feel your presence.

And, Lord, help me to share this with others. Make my presence with them your presence. May your Spirit in me encourage and strengthen. And as I recognise Jesus walking beside me, may others see something of him in me.

Lord, thankyou, because you are always here.





Dear Friends

Commandment number 2 says, ""You shall not make for yourself an idol in the form of anything in heaven above or on the earth beneath or in the waters below. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love me and keep my commandments.."

God so far has displayed his love in blessings to his people by giving them more than what they need already. He is therefore saying to the people in this second commandment that there is no need to put anything else first other than me. In ancient times, by worshipping an idol what people were doing was reducing God to a thing that was small and material. We cannot reduce God at all. He is always going to be bigger than we think and do more amazing things that we can ever imagine. God was all powerful and in all places.

Jesus reiterated this teaching when he said, "God is Spirit, and only by the power of the Spirit, can people worship him as he really is." (John 4:24)



REFLECTIONS

People, some of them, think ahead and try to work out what the future will be, or hope to be. Fewer will think about getting older, or when you can no longer do what you could do once. People will only think about now, but later when old age strikes, illness becomes a problem. Very little thought is given to the time that no doubt comes to all of us.

I have been reflecting on my life. I have a happy family life, a good family indeed, but what about my working life? I often reflect and being a person born with an enormous curiosity, and the words 'Why, What and How' were my key words but rarely gave me all the answers.

My greatest love is my wife and children. I also loved animals, plants and flowers. My baboo (my Indonesian nanny, a Hindu by upbringing, always taught me to respect life, all life:" Only kill to eat" was her motto.

When I came to Australia in 1950 my English was poor. I started to look for a job in the then Forestry Commission. As I was too old at twenty-three for an apprenticeship and I could not get the job.

Instead I started work as a builder's labourer and a little later joined the Australian Jam Company as a floor worker. It was the people I met there, Italian, Greek, German, Spanish, English migrants and the odd Australian I became interested in and found their life stories fascinating.

I lunched with them and they started to talk about personal issues. I became a trusted person. <u>I learned to listen</u>. I learned about their hopes and dreams.

I took some of them to the YMCA with me. This organisation I believe was the <u>forerunner</u> of what became the Community Houses of the future.

It took many years before all migrants were accepted into the community. Now in the years 2000 onwards, we find the people from the Middle East and African nations to be something to wary of. It is time to learn about other races and their religions and cultures for peace and harmony.

Since the early migration program started, Australia began to change, not only in population mix, but also in the array of food and services. In the early fifties Australia was a

My wife arrived from Holland and joined me in Kalorama. Our living arrangements were rather primitive. Two weeks later she had a job in a bank in Melbourne. She had worked in banks in Holland as a secretary and had qualifications in English shorthand. A bus took her from Kalorama to Croydon to catch the train to Melbourne. On the platform in Croydon she met a couple who worked in the same bank. Travelling together daily, they soon became good friends of ours. They are still our friends fifty-five years later.

Good friends are for life. Treasure them.
